#### **Investment Summary**

#### **Performance Leveraged Upside Securities**

The PLUS Based on the Value of the S&P 500<sup>®</sup> Index due May 7, 2014 (the "PLUS") can be used:

- As an alternative to direct exposure to the underlying index that enhances returns for a certain range of positive performance of the underlying index.
- To enhance returns and potentially outperform the underlying index in a moderately bullish scenario.
- To potentially achieve similar levels of upside exposure to the underlying index as a direct investment, subject to the maximum payment at maturity, while using fewer dollars by taking advantage of the leverage factor.

The PLUS are exposed on a 1:1 basis to the negative performance of the underlying index.

Maturity:	Approximately 12 months
Leverage factor:	300%
Maximum payment at maturity:	\$11.05 to \$11.20 (110.50% to 112.00% of the stated principal amount) per PLUS (to be determined on the pricing date)

#### Key Investment Rationale

PLUS offer leveraged exposure to an underlying asset, which may be equities, commodities and/or currencies, without any protection against negative performance of the asset. If the asset has decreased in value, investors are fully exposed to the negative performance of the asset. At maturity, if the asset has appreciated, investors will receive the stated principal amount of their investment plus leveraged upside performance of the underlying asset, subject to the maximum payment at maturity. At maturity, if the asset has depreciated, the investor will lose 1% for every 1% decline. **Investors may lose some or all of the stated principal amount of the PLUS.** 

Leveraged Performance	The PLUS offer investors an opportunity to capture enhanced returns for a certain range of positive performance relative to a direct investment in the underlying index.
Upside Scenario	The underlying index increases in value and, at maturity, the PLUS pay the stated principal amount of \$10 <i>plus</i> 300% of the index percent increase, subject to the maximum payment at maturity of \$11.05 to \$11.20 (110.50% to 112.00% of the stated principal amount) per PLUS. The actual maximum payment at maturity will be determined on the pricing date.
Par Scenario	The final index value is equal to the initial index value and, at maturity, the PLUS pay the stated principal amount of \$10 per PLUS.
Downside Scenario	The underlying index declines in value and, at maturity, the PLUS pay an amount that is less than the stated principal amount by an amount that is proportionate to the percentage decline of the final index value from the initial index value. (Example: if the underlying index decreases in value by 20%, the PLUS will pay an amount that is less than the stated principal amount by 20%, or \$8 per PLUS.)



#### How it works

- Upside Scenario. If the final index value is greater than the initial index value, for each \$10 principal amount PLUS investors will receive the \$10 stated principal amount plus 300% of the appreciation of the underlying index over the term of the PLUS, subject to the maximum payment at maturity. Under the hypothetical terms of the PLUS, an investor will realize the hypothetical maximum payment at maturity at a final index value of 103.75% of the initial index value.
- Par Scenario. If the final index value is equal to the initial index value, investors will receive the stated principal amount of \$10 per PLUS.
- Downside Scenario. If the final index value is less than the initial index value, investors will receive an amount that is less than the stated principal amount by an amount proportionate to the percentage decrease of the final index value from the initial index value.
  - For example, if the underlying index depreciates 50%, investors will lose 50% of their principal and receive only \$5 per PLUS at maturity, or 50% of the stated principal amount.

The following is a non-exhaustive list of certain key risk factors for investors in the PLUS. - PLUS do not pay interest or guarantee return of any principal and your investment in the PLUS may result in a loss. The terms of the PLUS differ from those of ordinary debt securities in that the PLUS do not pay interest or guarantee the payment of any principal amount at maturity. If the final index value is less than the initial index value, the payment at maturity will be an amount in cash that is less than the stated principal amount of each PLUS by an amount proportionate to the decrease in the value of the underlying index and may be zero.
- The appreciation potential of the PLUS is limited by the maximum payment at maturity. The appreciation potential of PLUS is limited by the maximum payment at maturity of \$11.05 to \$11.20 (110.50% to 112.00% of the stated principal amount) per PLUS. The actual maximum payment at maturity will be determined on the pricing date. Although the leverage factor provides 300% exposure to any increase in the final index value as compared to the initial index value on the valuation date, because the maximum payment at maturity will be limited to 110.50% to 112.00% of the stated principal amount for the PLUS, any increase in the final index value by more than 3.50% (in the case where the maximum payment at maturity is 110.50% of the stated principal amount) to 4.00% (in the case where the maximum payment at maturity is 112.00% of the stated principal amount) will not further increase the return on the PLUS.


