General

- The securities are designed for investors who seek leveraged exposure to changes in the CPI and who are willing to accept the risk of loss of their entire investment.
- Senior unsecured obligations of Deutsche Bank AG due April 10*, 2010.
- Denominations of \$10,000 and integral multiples of \$1,000 in excess thereof.
- Minimum initial investment of \$10,000.
- The securities are expected to price on or about April 7*, 2008 and are expected to settle on or about April 10*, 2008 (the "Settlement Date").

What is the CPI?

The “**CPI**” for purposes of the securities is the non-seasonally adjusted U.S. City Average All Items Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, published monthly by the BLS and reported on Bloomberg page CPURNSA or any successor service or page. The CPI for a particular month is published during the following month. The CPI is a measure of the average change in consumer prices over time for a fixed market basket of goods and services, which includes food, clothing, shelter, fuels, transportation, charges for medical and dental services, and drugs. In calculating the CPI, price changes for the various items are averaged together with weights that are meant to represent their relative importance in the spending of urban households in the United States. The contents of the market basket of goods and services and the weights assigned to the various items are updated periodically by the BLS to take into account changes in consumer expenditure patterns. The CPI is expressed in relative terms in relation to a time base reference period for which the level is set at 100.0. The base reference period for CPI is the 1982-1984 average.

Hypothetical Examples of Payment at Maturity

Presented below are hypothetical examples showing how the Payment at Maturity is calculated with a Strike of 4.00% and different levels of the CPI for January 2010 (the actual level of the CPI for January 2010 is expected to be published by the BLS in February 2010). The hypothetical examples assume an Appreciation Factor of \$675,000 per \$10,000 security face amount. These examples are provided for illustration purposes only. They should not be taken as an indication or prediction of future investment results. The numbers in the examples have been rounded for ease of analysis.

Example 1: CPI for January 2010 is 225.856.

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Index Return} &= (\text{Final Level} - \text{Initial Level}) / \text{Initial Level} \\ &= (225.856 - 211.080) / 211.080 \\ &= 7.00\%\end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Payment at Maturity} &= \text{Appreciation Factor} \times (\text{Index Return} - \text{Strike}) \\ &= \$675,000 \times (7.00\% - 4.00\%) \\ &= \$20,250\end{aligned}$$

Example 2: CPI for January 2010 is 223.745.

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Index Return} &= (\text{Final Level} - \text{Initial Level}) / \text{Initial Level} \\ &= (223.745 - 211.080) / 211.080 \\ &= 6.00\%\end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Payment at Maturity} &= \text{Appreciation Factor} \times (\text{Index Return} - \text{Strike}) \\ &= \$675,000 \times (6.00\% - 4.00\%) \\ &= \$13,500\end{aligned}$$

Example 3: CPI for January 2010 is 221.634.

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Index Return} &= (\text{Final Level} - \text{Initial Level}) / \text{Initial Level} \\ &= (221.634 - 211.080) / 211.080 \\ &= 5.00\%\end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Payment at Maturity} &= \text{Appreciation Factor} \times (\text{Index Return} - \text{Strike}) \\ &= \$675,000 \times (5.00\% - 4.00\%) \\ &= \$6,750\end{aligned}$$

Example 4: CPI for January 2010 is 219.523.

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Index Return} &= (\text{Final Level} - \text{Initial Level}) / \text{Initial Level} \\ &= (219.523 - 211.080) / 211.080 \\ &= 4.00\%\end{aligned}$$

Because the Index Return of 4.00% is equal to the Strike of 4.00%, the Payment at Maturity in this example is \$0.

Example 5: CPI for January 2010 is 206.858.

$$\begin{aligned}\text{Index Return} &= (\text{Final Level} - \text{Initial Level}) / \text{Initial Level} \\ &= (206.858 - 211.080) / 211.080 \\ &= -2.00\%\end{aligned}$$

Because the Index Return of -2.00% is less than the Strike of 4.00%, the Payment at Maturity in this example is \$0.

Selected Purchase Considerations

- **LEVERAGED EXPOSURE TO THE CPI** — The securities provide leveraged exposure to the amount, if any, by which the 2-year change in the CPI from January 2008 to January 2010 exceeds the Strike. If the 2-year change in the CPI from January 2008 to January 2010 is less than or equal to the Strike, you will lose the entire amount of your initial investment.
- **NO COUPON OR INTEREST PAYMENTS** — The securities do not provide for interest or coupon payments. The payment you will receive at maturity will be determined pursuant to the terms described herein and could be zero.
- **CERTAIN U.S. FEDERAL INCOME TAX CONSEQUENCES** — You should review carefully the section in this term sheet entitled “Certain U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences.”

Under current law, the United Kingdom will not impose withholding tax on payments made with respect to the securities.

For a discussion of certain German tax considerations relating to the securities, you should refer to the section in the accompanying prospectus supplement entitled “Taxation by Germany of Non-Resident Holders.”

We do not provide any advice on tax matters. Selected Risk Considerations

An investment in the securities involves significant risks. Investing in the securities is not equivalent to investing in securities linked directly to the CPI. These risks are explained in more detail in the "Risk Factors" section of this term sheet beginning on page TS-8.

- **YOU CAN LOSE THE ENTIRE AMOUNT OF YOUR INITIAL INVESTMENT** — The Index Return reflects the 2-year change in the CPI from January 2008 to January 2010. If the Index Return is less than or equal to the Strike, the payment at maturity with respect to your securities will be zero and you will lose the entire amount of your initial investment. Furthermore, even if the Index Return is greater than the Strike, if such excess is less than the percentage obtained by dividing \$10,000 by the Appreciation Factor, you will receive less than your initial investment at maturity.
- **THE SECURITIES HAVE CERTAIN BUILT-IN COSTS** — The original issue price of the securities includes the agents' commission and the cost of hedging our obligations under the securities through one or more of our affiliates. As a result, the price, if any, at which Deutsche Bank AG or our affiliates will be willing to purchase securities from you prior to maturity in secondary market transactions, if at all, will likely be lower than the original issue price and any such sale prior to the maturity date could result in a substantial loss to you. The securities are not designed to be short-term trading instruments. **Accordingly, you should be willing and able to hold your securities to maturity.**
- **LACK OF LIQUIDITY** — The securities will not be listed on any securities exchange. Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates intend to offer to purchase the securities in the secondary market but are not required to do so and may cease such market making activities at any time. Even if there is a secondary market, it may not provide enough liquidity to allow you to trade or sell the securities easily. Because other dealers are not likely to make a secondary market for the securities, the price at which you may be able to trade your securities is likely to depend on the price, if any, at which Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates are willing to buy the securities.
- **POTENTIAL CONFLICTS** — We and our affiliates play a variety of roles in connection with the issuance of the securities, including acting as calculation agent and hedging our obligations under the securities. In performing these duties, the economic interests of the calculation agent and other affiliates of ours are potentially adverse to your interests as an investor in the securities.
- **UNCERTAIN TAX TREATMENT** — Certain aspects of the tax treatment of the securities are unclear and no assurance can be given that the Internal Revenue Service (the "IRS") will accept, or a court will uphold, the tax consequences described in this term sheet.

In addition, on December 7, 2007, Treasury and the IRS released a notice requesting comments on the U.S. federal income tax treatment of "prepaid forward contracts" and similar instruments. While the notice does not appear to encompass instruments such as the securities, it is possible that any Treasury regulations or other guidance promulgated after consideration of these issues might affect the tax consequences of investing in the securities, possibly with retroactive effect. 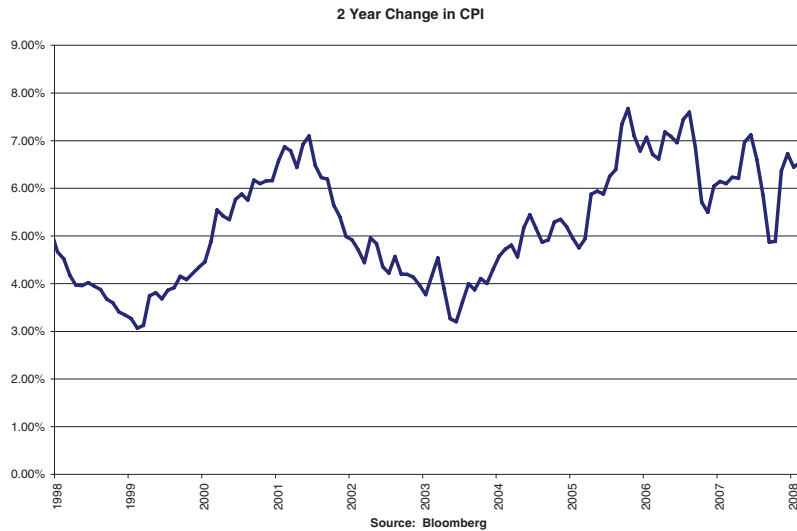

Percentage Change in CPI Over Rolling Two-Year Periods

The following graph sets forth the percentage change in the CPI for rolling two-year periods. Each plot point on the graph represents the percentage change in CPI over a two-year period looking back from the time indicated by the plot point. The graph commences on January 1998 (showing the percentage change in CPI from January 1996 to January 1998) and runs through to February 2008 (showing the percentage change in CPI from February 2006 to February 2008). The graph uses the monthly CPI levels as reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and reported on Bloomberg page CPURNSA.

The graph shows that historical changes in CPI over each two year period have produced Index Returns which may or may not have resulted in the return of an investor's initial investment. For example, the two year period between June 1999 and June 2001 shows an Index Return of 7.10% (i.e. CPI increased 7.10% over the two year period), which is more than the Strike, and therefore the investor would have received, at maturity, a return in excess of his or her initial investment. However, the two year period between June 2001 and June 2003 shows an Index Return of 3.20% (i.e. CPI increased 3.20% over the two year period), which is less than the Strike, and therefore the investor would have lost the entire amount of their initial investment.

You could lose the entire amount of your initial investment in the securities.

The Index Return reflects the 2-year change in the CPI from January 2008 to January 2010. If the Index Return is less than or equal to the Strike, the payment at maturity with respect to your securities will be zero and you will lose the entire amount of your initial investment. Therefore, if from January 2008 to January 2010, there is a decrease in the CPI, no change in the CPI or an increase in the CPI that is less than or equal to the Strike (as could occur if such period is a period of deflation or low inflation), you will lose the entire amount of your initial investment in the securities.

You could lose a portion of your initial investment in the securities even if the Index Return exceeds the Strike.

If the Index Return is greater than the Strike but such difference is less than the percentage obtained by dividing \$10,000 by the Appreciation Factor, you will receive less than your initial investment at maturity.

The return on the securities may be less than that of other securities of comparable maturity.

The return on the securities may be less than returns otherwise payable on other securities with comparable maturities, and could be zero or negative.

The securities do not provide for coupon payments.

The securities do not provide for interest or coupon payments. The payment you will receive at maturity will be determined pursuant to the terms described herein and could be zero.

The CPI itself and the way the BLS calculates the CPI may change in the future.

There can be no assurance that the BLS will not change the method by which it calculates the CPI in a way that could negatively affect the Index Return. Accordingly, the value of the securities may be significantly reduced. If the CPI is discontinued or substantially altered, a successor index may be employed to calculate the payment at maturity of the securities, as described herein, and that substitution may adversely affect the value of the securities.

Historical levels of the CPI are not a reliable indication of future levels of the CPI.

Historical levels of the CPI do not provide a reliable indication of the level of the CPI to be expected at maturity. In the past, the CPI has experienced periods of volatility and such volatility may occur in the future. Fluctuations and trends in the CPI that have occurred in the past are not necessarily indicative of fluctuations that may occur in the future.

Your payment at maturity will be affected by changes in the CPI. These changes may be significant. Changes in the CPI are a function of the changes in specified consumer prices over time, which result from the interaction of many factors over which we have no control.

Prior to maturity, the value of the securities will be influenced by many unpredictable factors.

Many economic and market factors will influence the value of the securities. We expect that, generally, the level of the CPI on any day will affect the value of the securities more than any other single factor. However, you should not expect the value of the securities in the secondary market to vary in proportion to changes in the level of the CPI. The value of the securities will be affected by a number of other factors that may either offset or magnify each other, including:

- the expected volatility in the CPI;
- the time to maturity of the securities;
- interest and yield rates in the market, and the volatility of those rates;
- economic, financial, political, regulatory or judicial events that affect consumer prices generally; and
- our creditworthiness.

Factors that may affect the CPI include:

- general economic, financial, political or regulatory conditions;
- fluctuations in the prices of various consumer goods and energy resources; and
- inflation and expectations concerning inflation.

No one can predict with certainty the future performance of the CPI based on its historical performance.

Secondary trading may be limited.

The securities will not be listed on a securities exchange. There may be little or no secondary market for the securities. Even if there is a secondary market, it may not provide enough liquidity to allow you to trade or sell the securities easily or at a price advantageous to you.

Deutsche Bank AG and its affiliates may act as market makers for the securities but are not required to do so. Because we do not expect that other market makers will participate significantly in the secondary market for the securities, the price at which you may be able to trade your securities is likely to depend on the price, if any, at which Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates is willing to buy the securities. If at any time Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates or another agent does not act as a market maker, it is likely that there would be little or no secondary market for the securities.

We do not make any representation or warranty to any purchaser of a note with respect to any matters whatsoever relating to such activities or future rate movements.

We and our affiliates expect to engage in hedging and trading activities related to the CPI. We may have hedged our obligations under the securities directly or through certain affiliates, and we or they would expect to make a profit on any such hedge. Because hedging our obligations entails risk and may be influenced by market forces beyond our or our affiliates' control, such hedging may result in a profit that is more or less than expected, or it may result in a loss. Although they are not expected to, these hedging activities may adversely affect the market value of the securities. It is possible that Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates could receive substantial returns from these hedging activities while the market value of the securities declines.

Our trading activities related to the CPI may be entered into on behalf of Deutsche Bank AG, its affiliates or customers other than for the account of the holders of the securities or on their behalf. Accordingly, these trading activities may present conflicts of interest between Deutsche Bank AG and you.

Deutsche Bank AG, London Branch will act as the calculation agent. The calculation agent will determine, among other things, the Index Return, the payment at maturity and whether a day is a business day. DESCRIPTION OF THE SECURITIES

*The following description of the terms of the securities supplements the description of the general terms of the debt securities set forth under the headings "Description of Notes" in the accompanying prospectus supplement and "Description of Debt Securities" in the accompanying prospectus. Capitalized terms used but not defined in this term sheet have the meanings assigned to them in the accompanying prospectus supplement and prospectus. The term "**security**" refers to each \$10,000 face amount of our 2 Year Inflation-Linked Leveraged Securities due April 10, 2010.*

General

The securities are part of a series of notes referred to in the accompanying prospectus supplement and prospectus and will be issued by us under an indenture among us, Law Debenture Trust Company of New York, as trustee, and Deutsche Bank Trust Company Americas, as issuing agent, paying agent, and registrar.

The securities are not bank deposits and are not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by any other governmental agency.

The securities are our senior unsecured obligations and will rank *pari passu* with all of our other senior unsecured obligations.

The securities will be issued in denominations of \$10,000 and integral multiples of \$1,000 in excess thereof. The securities will be represented by one or more permanent global securities registered in the name of The Depository Trust Company ("**DTC**") or its nominee, as described under "Description of Notes — Form, Legal Ownership and Denomination of Notes" in the accompanying prospectus supplement and "Forms of Securities — Global Securities" in the accompanying prospectus.

Payment on the Securities

The "**Maturity Date**" is expected to be April 10, 2010, unless that day is not a business day, in which case the Maturity Date will be the first following business day.

The "**Settlement Date**" is expected to be April 10, 2008.

A "**business day**" is any day other than a day that (i) is a Saturday or Sunday, (ii) is a day on which banking institutions generally in the City of New York or London, England are authorized or obligated by law, regulation or executive order to close or (iii) is a day on which transactions in dollars are not conducted in the City of New York or London, England.

On the Maturity Date, you will receive a cash payment, for each \$10,000 security face amount, determined as follows:

If the Index Return is greater than the Strike:

Payment at Maturity = Appreciation Factor x (Index Return — Strike)

If the Index Return is less than or equal to the Strike:

Payment at Maturity = \$0

If the Index Return is less than or equal to the Strike, you will lose the entire amount of your initial investment at maturity. Furthermore, even if the Index Return is greater than the Strike, if such excess is less than the percentage obtained by dividing \$10,000 by the Appreciation Factor, you will receive less than your initial investment at maturity.

The “**Index Return**” is calculated as follows:

$$\text{Index Return} = \frac{\text{Final Level} - \text{Initial Level}}{\text{Initial Level}}$$

The “**Initial Level**” is 211.080, the level of the CPI for January 2008.

The “**Final Level**” will be the level of the CPI for January 2010 as published by the BLS and reported on Bloomberg page CPURNSA <INDEX> or any successor service or page.

The “**Appreciation Factor**” is a dollar amount between \$650,000 to \$700,000 per \$10,000 security face amount, to be determined on the Trade Date.

The “**Strike**” is 4.00%.

The Consumer Price Index (the “**CPI**”) for purposes of the securities, is the non-seasonally adjusted U.S. City Average All Items Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers published monthly by the BLS and reported on Bloomberg page CPURNSA or any successor service or page.

We will irrevocably deposit with DTC no later than the opening of business on the applicable date or dates funds sufficient to make payments of the amount payable with respect to the securities on such date. We will give DTC irrevocable instructions and authority to pay such amount to the holders of the securities entitled thereto.

Subject to the foregoing and to applicable law (including, without limitation, United States federal laws), we or our affiliates may, at any time and from time to time, purchase outstanding securities by tender, in open market transactions or by private agreement.

Calculation Agent

Deutsche Bank AG, London Branch will act as the calculation agent. The calculation agent will determine, among other things, the Index Return, the payment at maturity and whether a day is a business day. In addition, the calculation agent will determine whether, if the CPI is not published on Bloomberg page CPURNSA, a successor service or page is available, whether the CPI has been discontinued or substantially altered, and if the CPI has been discontinued or substantially altered, the successor index. All determinations made by the calculation agent will be at the sole discretion of the calculation agent and will, in the absence of manifest error, be conclusive for all purposes and binding on you and on us. We may appoint a different calculation agent from time to time after the date of the relevant terms supplement without your consent and without notifying you.

The calculation agent will provide written notice to the trustee at its New York office, on which notice the trustee may conclusively rely, of the amount to be paid at maturity on or prior to 11:00 a.m. on the business day preceding the Maturity Date.

All calculations with respect to the CPI will be rounded to the nearest one hundred-thousandth, with five one-millionths rounded upward (*e.g.*, 0.876545 would be rounded to 0.87655); all dollar amounts related to determination of the payment per \$10,000 security face amount at maturity will be rounded to the nearest ten-thousandth, with five one hundred-thousandths rounded upward (*e.g.*, 0.76545 would be rounded up to 0.7655); and all dollar amounts paid on the aggregate face amount of securities per holder will be rounded to the nearest cent, with one-half cent rounded upward.

Events of Default

Under the heading “Description of Debt Securities — Events of Default” in the accompanying prospectus is a description of events of default relating to debt securities including the securities.

Payment Upon an Event of Default

If an event of default occurs, and the maturity of your securities is accelerated, we will pay a default amount for each \$10,000 security face amount equal to \$10,000.

If the maturity of the securities is accelerated because of an event of default as described above, we shall, or shall cause the calculation agent to, provide written notice to the trustee at its New York office, on which notice the trustee may conclusively rely, and to DTC of the cash amount due with respect to the securities as promptly as possible and in no event later than two business days after the date of acceleration.

Modification

Under the heading “Description of Debt Securities — Modification of the Indenture” in the accompanying prospectus is a description of when the consent of each affected holder of debt securities is required to modify the indenture.

Defeasance

The provisions described in the accompanying prospectus under the heading “Description of Debt Securities — Discharge and Defeasance” are not applicable to the securities.

Listing

The securities will not be listed on any securities exchange.

Book-Entry Only Issuance — The Depository Trust Company

The Depository Trust Company, or DTC, will act as securities depository for the securities. The securities will be issued only as fully-registered securities registered in the name of Cede & Co. (DTC’s nominee). One or more fully-registered global securities certificates, representing the total aggregate face amount of the securities, will be issued and will be deposited with DTC. See the descriptions contained in the accompanying prospectus supplement under the headings “Description of Notes — Form, Legal Ownership and Denomination of Notes.”

Registrar, Transfer Agent and Paying Agent

Payment of amounts due at maturity on the securities will be payable and the transfer of the securities will be registrable at the office of Deutsche Bank Trust Company Americas ("**DBTCA**") in the City of New York.

DBTCA or one of its affiliates will act as registrar and transfer agent for the securities. DBTCA will also act as paying agent and may designate additional paying agents.

Registration of transfers of the securities will be effected without charge by or on behalf of DBTCA, but upon payment (with the giving of such indemnity as DBTCA may require) in respect of any tax or other governmental charges that may be imposed in relation to it.

Governing Law

The securities will be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.

CERTAIN U.S. FEDERAL INCOME TAX CONSEQUENCES

The following is a general discussion of certain material U.S. federal income tax consequences of the ownership and disposition of the securities to holders who will hold the securities as capital assets within the meaning of Section 1221 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended to the date hereof (the “**Code**”). This summary is based on the Code, administrative pronouncements, judicial decisions and currently effective and proposed Treasury regulations, changes to any of which subsequent to the date of this pricing supplement may affect the tax consequences described below, possibly on a retroactive basis. This summary does not address all aspects of U.S. federal income taxation that may be relevant to an investor in light of the investor’s particular circumstances or to certain types of investors subject to special treatment under the U.S. federal income tax laws, such as certain former citizens or residents of the United States, certain financial institutions, real estate investment trusts, regulated investment companies, tax-exempt entities, dealers and certain traders in securities, partnerships or other entities classified as partnerships for U.S. federal income tax purposes, persons who hold the securities as a part of a hedging transaction, straddle, conversion or integrated transaction, or U.S. holders (as defined below) who have a “functional currency” other than the U.S. dollar.

Tax Treatment of the Securities

We believe that the securities should be treated as cash-settled options for U.S. federal income tax purposes. You should consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of an investment in the securities and with respect to any tax consequences arising under the laws of any state, local or non-U.S. taxing jurisdiction. The following discussion assumes that the above treatment is respected and that the securities are not listed or traded on any securities, options, commodities or other exchange.

Tax Consequences to U.S. Holders

The following discussion applies to “U.S. holders” of the securities. You are a “U.S. holder” if, for U.S. federal income tax purposes, you are a beneficial owner of the securities who is: (i) a citizen or resident of the United States; (ii) a corporation created or organized under the laws of the United States or any political subdivision thereof; or (iii) an estate or trust the income of which is subject to U.S. federal income taxation regardless of its source.

The following are anticipated U.S. federal income tax consequences of the ownership and disposition of the securities.

Tax Treatment Prior to the Maturity Date. You should not be required to recognize taxable income over the term of the securities prior to the Maturity Date, other than pursuant to a sale or exchange, as described below.

Sale, Exchange, Exercise or Lapse of the Securities. Upon a sale or exchange of the securities prior to the Maturity Date, or upon the receipt of a cash payment (or no payment) upon the exercise or lapse of the securities on the Maturity Date, you should recognize capital gain or loss equal to the difference between the amount realized on such sale, exchange, exercise or lapse and your tax basis in the securities so sold, exchanged, exercised or lapsed. Your tax basis in the securities generally should equal the amount you paid to acquire the securities. Such gain or loss should be long-term capital gain or loss if you have held your securities for more than one year. However, there is no authority on point with respect to instruments such as the securities, and it is possible that gain or loss realized upon sale, exchange, expiration or exercise of a security could be treated as ordinary in character. The deductibility of capital losses is subject to certain limitations.

On December 7, 2007, Treasury and the IRS released a notice requesting comments on the U.S. federal income tax treatment of “prepaid forward contracts” and similar instruments. While the notice does not appear to encompass instruments such as the securities, it is possible that any Treasury regulations or other guidance promulgated after consideration of these issues might affect the tax consequences of investing in the securities, possibly with retroactive effect. You should consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of investing in the securities, including the issues presented by this notice.

Tax Consequences to Non-U.S. Holders

The following discussion applies to you only if you are a non-U.S. holder of the securities. You are a “non-U.S. holder” if, for U.S. federal income tax purposes, you are a beneficial owner of the securities who is: (i) a nonresident alien individual; (ii) a foreign corporation; or (iii) a foreign estate or trust. You are not a non-U.S. holder for the purpose of this discussion if you are an individual present in the United States for 183 days or more in the taxable year of sale, exchange, exercise or lapse. In this case, you should consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of the sale, exchange or exercise of the securities.

Sale, Exchange or Exercise of the Securities. Subject to the discussion below regarding backup withholding, any gain from the sale or exchange of the securities prior to the Maturity Date or upon the receipt of cash payment upon exercise of the securities on the Maturity Date should not be subject to U.S. federal withholding or income tax unless that gain is effectively connected with your conduct of a trade or business in the United States, as described below.

On December 7, 2007, Treasury and the IRS released a notice requesting comments on the U.S. federal income tax treatment of “prepaid forward contracts” and similar instruments. While the scope of the notice does not appear to encompass instruments such as the securities, it is possible that any Treasury regulations or other guidance promulgated after consideration of these issues might affect the withholding tax consequences of an investment in the securities, possibly with retroactive effect. You should consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of an investment in the securities, including the issues presented by this notice.

Income Effectively Connected with a Trade or Business in the United States. If you are engaged in a trade or business in the United States, and if payments on the securities are effectively connected with the conduct of that trade or business, you generally will be taxed in the same manner as a U.S. holder. If this paragraph applies to you, you should consult your tax adviser with respect to other U.S. tax consequences of the ownership and disposition of the securities, including the possible imposition of a 30% branch profits tax if you are a corporation.

Backup Withholding and Information Reporting

Proceeds received from a sale, exchange or exercise of the securities will be subject to information reporting unless you are an exempt recipient (such as a domestic corporation) and may also be subject to backup withholding at the rates specified in the Code if you fail to provide certain identifying information (such as an accurate taxpayer identification number) or meet certain other conditions. If you are a non-U.S. holder and you provide a properly executed IRS Form W-8BEN or W-8ECI, as applicable, you generally will not be subject to backup withholding.

Amounts withheld under the backup withholding rules are not additional taxes and may be refunded or credited against your U.S. federal income tax liability, provided the required information is furnished to the IRS.

USE OF PROCEEDS; HEDGING

The net proceeds we receive from the sale of the securities will be used for general corporate purposes and, in part, by us or by one or more of our affiliates in connection with hedging our obligations under the securities, as more particularly described in "Use of Proceeds" in the accompanying prospectus. The original issue price of the securities includes each agent's commissions (as shown on the cover page of this term sheet) paid with respect to the securities which commissions, as to agents affiliated with us, include the reimbursement of certain issuance costs and the estimated cost of hedging our obligations under the securities. The estimated cost of hedging includes the projected profit that our affiliates expect to realize in consideration for assuming the risks inherent in hedging our obligations under the securities. Because hedging our obligations entails risk and may be influenced by market forces beyond our or our affiliates' control, the actual cost of such hedging may result in a profit that is more or less than expected, or could result in a loss.

In connection with the sale of the securities, we, either directly or through our affiliates or others, may enter into hedging transactions involving the execution of interest rate swap and option transactions or other transactions linked to changes in interest rates both before and after the Settlement Date. From time to time, we or our affiliates may enter into additional hedging transactions or unwind those we have previously entered into. In this regard, we or our affiliates may:

- execute or terminate interest rate swap and option transactions;
- take or dispose of positions in listed or over-the-counter options or other instruments based on interest rates; or
- do a combination of the above.

We or our affiliates may acquire a long or short position in securities similar to the securities from time to time and may, in our or their sole discretion, hold or resell those securities.

Although we have no reason to believe that any of these activities will have a material impact on the value of the securities, we cannot assure you that these activities will not have such an effect.

We have no obligation to engage in any manner of hedging activity and will do so solely at our discretion and for our own account. No security holder shall have any rights or interest in our hedging activity or any positions we may take in connection with our hedging activity.

UNDERWRITING

Under the terms and subject to the conditions contained in the Distribution Agreements between Deutsche Bank AG and each of Deutsche Bank Securities Inc. ("**DBSI**") and DBTCA as agents and certain other agents that may be party to either Distribution Agreement from time to time (each, an "**Agent**" and, collectively with DBSI and DBTCA, the "**Agents**"), each Agent participating in the offering of the securities has agreed to purchase, and we have agreed to sell, the aggregate face amount of securities set forth on the cover page of this term sheet.

DBSI has advised us that it proposes to offer the securities for sale from time to time in one or more transactions (which may include block transactions), in negotiated transactions or otherwise, or a combination of such methods of sale, at market prices prevailing at the time of sale, at prices related to such prevailing market prices or at negotiated prices. DBSI may effect such transactions by selling the securities to or through dealers, and such dealers may receive compensation in the form of underwriting discounts, concessions or commissions from DBSI and/or the purchasers of the securities for whom they may act as agent. Deutsche Bank AG may pay fees to the Agents or other broker dealers of up to 2.50% or \$250.00 per \$10,000 security face amount. The Agents may pay a portion of such fees to the brokers or agents through whom the securities are purchased. As a result of these arrangements, DBSI or DBTCA and the individual broker or agent through whom the holder purchases the securities may have economic interests that are different from those of the holder. In connection with the sale of the securities, DBSI may receive commissions from the purchasers of the securities for whom they may act as agent. DBSI and any dealers that participate with DBSI in the distribution of the securities may be deemed to be underwriters, and any discounts or commissions received by them and any profit on the resale of the securities by them may be deemed to be underwriting discounts or commissions.

We own, directly or indirectly, all of the outstanding equity securities of DBSI and DBTCA. The underwriting arrangements for this offering comply with the requirements of Rule 2720 of the Conduct Rules applicable to a FINRA member firm's underwriting of securities of an affiliate. In accordance with Rule 2720, no underwriter may make sales in this offering to any discretionary account without the prior approval of the customer.

DBSI or another Agent may act as principal or agent in connection with offers and sales of the securities in the secondary market. Secondary market offers and sales will be made at prices related to market prices at the time of such offer or sale; accordingly, the Agents or a dealer may change the public offering price, concession and discount after the offering has been completed.

In order to facilitate the offering of the securities, DBSI may engage in transactions that stabilize, maintain or otherwise affect the price of the securities. Specifically, DBSI may sell more securities than it is obligated to purchase in connection with the offering, creating a naked short position in the securities for its own account. DBSI must close out any naked short position by purchasing the securities in the open market. A naked short position is more likely to be created if DBSI is concerned that there may be downward pressure on the price of the securities in the open market after pricing that could adversely affect investors who purchase in the offering. As an additional means of facilitating the offering, DBSI may bid for, and purchase, securities in the open market to stabilize the price of the securities. Any of these activities may raise or maintain the market price of the securities above independent market levels or prevent or retard a decline in the market price of the securities. DBSI is not required to engage in these activities, and may end any of these activities at any time.

To the extent the total aggregate face amount of securities offered pursuant to this term sheet is not purchased by investors, one or more of our affiliates may agree to purchase for investment the unsold portion. As a result, upon completion of an offering, our affiliates may own up to approximately 10% of the securities offered in that offering.

No action has been or will be taken by us, DBSI, DBTCA or any dealer that would permit a public offering of the securities or possession or distribution of this term sheet, the accompanying prospectus supplement or prospectus other than in the United States, where action for that purpose is required. No offers, sales or deliveries of the securities, or distribution of this term sheet, the accompanying prospectus supplement or prospectus or any other offering material relating to the securities, may be made in or from any jurisdiction except in circumstances which will result in compliance with any applicable laws and regulations and will not impose any obligations on us, the Agents or any dealer.

Each Agent has represented and agreed, and each dealer through which we may offer the securities has represented and agreed, that it (i) will comply with all applicable laws and regulations in force in each non-U.S. jurisdiction in which it purchases, offers, sells or delivers the securities or possesses or distributes this term sheet and the accompanying prospectus supplement and prospectus and (ii) will obtain any consent, approval or permission required by it for the purchase, offer or sale by it of the securities under the laws and regulations in force in each non-U.S. jurisdiction to which it is subject or in which it makes purchases, offers or sales of the securities. We shall not have responsibility for any Agent's or any dealer's compliance with the applicable laws and regulations or obtaining any required consent, approval or permission.
