Investment Description

Performance Securities with Contingent Return Linked to the S&P 500® Index (the "Securities") provide exposure to the S&P 500® Index (the "Index") as well as a specified Contingent Return if the Index level does not close below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period. If the Index level never closes below the Trigger Level on any such day, at maturity investors will receive their principal plus the greater of the Index Return or the Contingent Return. The Securities do not guarantee any return of your initial investment. If the Index level closes below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period, at maturity investors will receive their principal multiplied by the Index Return, which may be negative. A negative Index Return where the Index level closed below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period will result in a payment at maturity of less than \$10.00 per Security. The contingent principal protection feature applies only if you hold the Securities to maturity. Any payment on the Securities, including the contingent principal protection feature, is subject to the creditworthiness of the Issuer.

Features

- ❑ **Growth Potential:** The Securities provide the opportunity to receive returns equal to the greater of the Index Return and Contingent Return if the Index level never closes below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period. The Securities are not subject to a maximum gain.
- ❑ **Contingent Return of the Invested Amount:** Payment at maturity will depend on the Index Return and whether or not the Index level closed below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation period.
- ❑ **Exposure to U.S. equities:** Investors can gain exposure to U.S. equities through the Index.
- ❑ Contingent principal protection only applies if the Securities are held to maturity, and is subject to the Creditworthiness of the Issuer.

The Securities are not subject to a predetermined maximum gain and, accordingly, any return at maturity will be determined by the performance of the Index. The Securities are our senior unsecured obligations and are offered at a minimum investment of \$1,000.

Investor Suitability

The Securities may be suitable for you if:

- ◆ You seek an investment with a return linked to the performance of the S&P 500® Index and the opportunity to outperform the S&P 500® Index if the Index level never closes below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period and the Contingent Return exceeds the Index Return.
- ◆ You either believe the Index level will never close below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period, or you believe the Index Return will be positive.
- ◆ You are willing to be exposed to the risk that the Index level could close below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period and you could lose 1% of your initial investment for each 1% of negative Index Return.

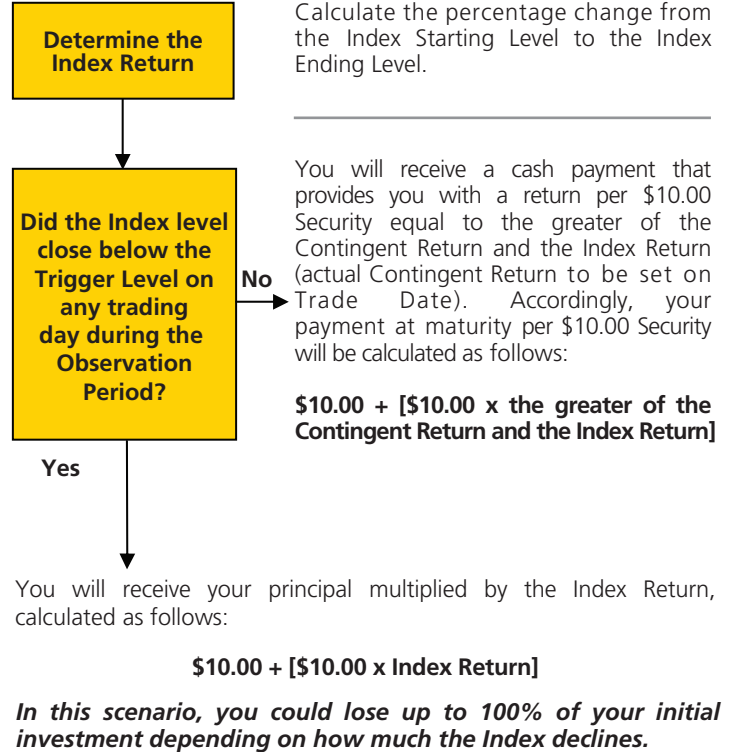

What are the tax consequences of the Securities?

You should review carefully the section of the accompanying product supplement entitled “Certain U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences.” Although the tax consequences of an investment in the Securities are uncertain, we believe the Securities should be treated as prepaid financial contracts for U.S. federal income tax purposes. Based on current law, under this treatment you should not be required to recognize taxable income prior to the maturity of your Securities, other than pursuant to a sale or exchange, and your gain or loss on the Securities should be long-term capital gain or loss if you hold the Securities for more than one year. If, however, the Internal Revenue Service (the “IRS”) were successful in asserting an alternative treatment for the Securities, the timing and/or character of income on the Securities might differ materially and adversely from the description herein. We do not plan to request a ruling from the IRS, and no assurance can be given that the IRS or a court will agree with the tax treatment described in this free writing prospectus and the accompanying product supplement.

On December 7, 2007, the Department of the Treasury (“Treasury”) and the IRS released a notice requesting comments on various issues regarding the U.S. federal income tax treatment of “prepaid forward contracts” and similar instruments, such as the Securities. The notice focuses in particular on whether to require holders of these instruments to accrue income over the term of their investment. It also asks for comments on a number of related topics, including the character of income or loss with respect to these instruments; the relevance of factors such as the nature of the underlying property to which the instruments are linked; the degree, if any, to which income (including any mandated accruals) realized by non-U.S. holders should be subject to withholding tax; and whether these instruments are or should be subject to the “constructive ownership” regime, which very generally can operate to recharacterize certain long-term capital gain as ordinary income that is subject to an interest charge. While the notice requests comments on appropriate transition rules and effective dates, any Treasury regulations or other guidance promulgated after consideration of these issues could materially and adversely affect the tax consequences of an investment in the Securities, possibly with retroactive effect.

Under current law, the United Kingdom will not impose withholding tax on payments made with respect to the Securities.

For a discussion of certain German tax considerations relating to the Securities, you should refer to the section in the accompanying prospectus supplement entitled “Taxation by Germany of Non-Resident Holders.”

Neither we nor UBS Financial Services Inc. provides any advice on tax matters. Both U.S. and non-U.S. holders should consult their tax advisers regarding all aspects of the U.S. federal tax consequences of investing in the Securities (including possible alternative treatments and the issues presented by the December 7, 2007 notice), as well as any tax consequences arising under the laws of any state, local or non-U.S. taxing jurisdiction.

Scenario Analysis and Examples at Maturity

The following scenario analysis and examples assume a Contingent Return of 23.50%, a Trigger Level of 870.80 (75% of a hypothetical Index Starting Level of 1,161.06) and a range of Index Returns. The actual Contingent Return, Trigger Level and Index Starting Level will be set on the Trade Date.

Example 1—The level of the Index increases by 30% from an Index Starting Level of 1,161.06 to an Index Ending Level of 1,509.38, and the Index level never closed below the Trigger Level of 870.80 on any trading day during the Observation Period. Because the Index Ending Level of 1,509.38 is greater than the Index Starting Level of 1,161.06 the Index Return is positive and calculated as follows:

$$\text{Index Return} = (1,509.38 - 1,161.06) / 1,161.06 = 30\%$$

In this scenario, because the Index level never closed below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period and the Index Return of 30% is higher than the Contingent Return of 23.50%, the payment at maturity is equal to \$13.00 per \$10.00 Security, calculated as follows:

$$\text{Payment at maturity per \$10.00 Security} = \$10.00 + (\$10.00 \times 30\%) = \$13.00$$

Example 2—The level of the Index increases by 20% from an Index Starting Level of 1,161.06 to an Index Ending Level of 1,393.27, and the Index level never closed below the Trigger Level of 870.80 on any trading day during the Observation Period. Because the Index Ending Level of 1,393.27 is greater than the Index Starting Level of 1,161.06, the Index Return is positive and calculated as follows:

$$\text{Index Return} = (1,393.27 - 1,161.06) / 1,161.06 = 20\%$$

Because the Index level never closed below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period, and the Contingent Return is greater than the Index Return, the payment at maturity is equal to \$12.35 per \$10.00 Security, calculated as follows:

$$\text{Payment at maturity per \$10.00 Security} = \$10.00 + (\$10.00 \times 23.50\%) = \$12.35$$

In this scenario, the Index Return of 20% is lower than the Contingent Return of 23.50%, so investors will receive their principal plus the Contingent Return.

Example 3—The level of the Index decreases by 10% from an Index Starting Level of 1,161.06 to an Index Ending Level of 1,044.95, and the Index level never closed below the Trigger Level of 870.80 on any trading day during the Observation Period. Because the Index Ending Level of 1,044.95 is less than the Index Starting Level of 1,161.06, the Index Return is negative and calculated as follows:

$$\text{Index Return} = (1,044.95 - 1,161.06) / 1,161.06 = -10\%$$

Because the Index level never closed below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period, and the Contingent Return is greater than the Index Return, the payment at maturity is equal to \$12.35 per \$10.00 Security, calculated as follows:

$$\text{Payment at maturity per \$10.00 Security} = \$10.00 + (\$10.00 \times 23.50\%) = \$12.35$$

In this scenario, the Index Return of -10% is lower than the Contingent Return of 23.50%, so investors will receive their principal plus the Contingent Return.

Example 4—The level of the Index increases by 20% from an Index Starting Level of 1,161.06 to an Index Ending Level of 1,393.27, and the Index level closed below the Trigger Level of 870.80 on at least one trading day during the Observation Period. Because the Index Ending Level of 1,393.27 is greater than the Index Starting Level of 1,161.06, the Index Return is positive and calculated as follows:

$$\text{Index Return} = (1,393.27 - 1,161.06) / 1,161.06 = 20\%$$

Because the Index level closed below the Trigger Level on at least one trading day during the Observation Period, the payment at maturity is equal to \$12.00 per \$10.00 Security, calculated as follows:

$$\text{Payment at maturity per \$10.00 Security} = \$10.00 + (\$10.00 \times 20\%) = \$12.00$$

In this scenario, the Contingent Return is lost, and investors receive their principal plus the Index Return.

Example 5—The level of the Index decreases by 30% from an Index Starting Level of 1,161.06 to an Index Ending Level of 812.74, and the Index level closed below the Trigger Level of 870.80 at least on one trading day during the Observation Period. Because the Index Ending Level of 812.74 is less than the Index Starting Level of 1,161.06, the Index Return is negative and calculated as follows:

$$\text{Index Return} = (812.74 - 1,161.06) / 1,161.06 = -30\%$$

Because the Index Return is negative, and the Index level closed below the Trigger Level on at least one trading day during the Observation Period, investors will lose 1% of their initial investment for each 1% of negative Index Return, and the payment at maturity is equal to \$7.00 per \$10.00 Security calculated as follows:

$$\text{Payment at maturity per \$10.00 Security} = \$10.00 + (\$10.00 \times -30\%) = \$7.00$$

Key Risks

An investment in the Securities involves significant risks. Some of the risks that apply to an investment in the Securities are summarized below, but we urge you to read the more detailed explanation of risks relating to the Securities generally in the “Risk Factors” section of the accompanying product supplement B. We also urge you to consult your investment, legal, tax, accounting and other advisers before you invest in the Securities.

- ♦ **Your Investment in the Securities May Result in a Loss of Your Initial Investment**—The Securities do not guarantee any return of your initial investment. The return on the Securities at maturity is linked to the performance of the Index and will depend on whether, and the extent to which, the Index Return is positive or negative and if the Index level closes below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period. If the Index level closes below the Trigger Level on any trading day during the Observation Period, your initial investment will be exposed to any decline in the Index Ending Level, as compared to the Index Starting Level. Accordingly, you could lose up to \$10.00 for each \$10.00 investment that you make in the Securities.
- ♦ **Contingent Return on Your Initial Investment Applies Only if You Hold the Securities to Maturity**—You should be willing to hold your Securities to maturity. If you sell your Securities prior to maturity in the secondary market, you may have to sell them at a discount and you will not receive the Contingent Return.
- ♦ **No Periodic Coupon Payments, Dividend Payments or Voting Rights**—As a holder of the Securities, you will not receive periodic coupon payments, and you will not have voting rights or rights to receive cash dividends or other distributions or other rights that holders of component stocks underlying the Index would have. As such, owning the Securities is not the same as owning the component stocks underlying the Index.
- ♦ **The Securities have Certain Built-in Costs**—While the payment at maturity described in this free writing prospectus is based on the full face amount of your Securities, the original issue price of the Securities includes the agents’ commission and the estimated cost of hedging our obligations under the Securities through one or more of our affiliates. As a result, the price, if any, at which Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates would be willing to purchase Securities from you prior to maturity in secondary market transactions, if at all, will likely be lower than the original issue price, and any sale prior to the maturity date could result in a substantial loss to you. The Securities are not designed to be short-term trading instruments. Accordingly, you should be able and willing to hold your Securities to maturity.
- ♦ **There May be Little or No Secondary Market for the Securities**—The Securities will not be listed on any securities exchange. Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates intends to offer to purchase the Securities in the secondary market but is not required to do so and may cease such market making activities at any time. Even if there is a secondary market, it may not provide enough liquidity to allow you to trade or sell your Securities easily. Because other dealers are not likely to make a secondary market for the Securities, the price at which you may be able to trade your Securities is likely to depend on the price, if any, at which Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates is willing to buy the Securities.
- ♦ **Potential Conflicts**—We and our affiliates play a variety of roles in connection with the issuance of the Securities, including acting as calculation agent and hedging our obligations under the Securities. In performing these duties, the economic interests of the calculation agent and other affiliates of ours are potentially adverse to your interests as an investor in the Securities.
- ♦ **Potential of Deutsche Bank AG transactions to impact price**—Trading or transactions by Deutsche Bank AG or its affiliates in the Index and/or over the counter options, futures or other instruments with returns linked to the performance of the Index, may adversely affect the market price of the Index and therefore, the market value of the Securities.
- ♦ **We and our Affiliates and Agents May Publish Research, Express Opinions or Provide Recommendations that May Be Inconsistent with Investing in or Holding the Securities. Any Such Research, Opinions or Recommendations Could Affect the Level of the Index to Which the Securities Are Linked or the Value of the Securities**—We, our affiliates and agents publish research from time to time on financial markets and other matters that may influence the value of the Securities, or express opinions or provide recommendations that may be inconsistent with purchasing or holding the Securities. We, our affiliates and agents may have published research or other opinions that are inconsistent with the investment view implicit in the Securities. Any research, opinions or recommendations expressed by us, our affiliates or agents may not be consistent with each other and may be modified from time to time without notice. Investors should make their own independent investigation of the merits of investing in the Securities and the Index to which the Securities are linked.
- ♦ **Price Prior to Maturity**—In addition to the level of the Index on any day, the market price of the Securities will be affected by a number of economic and market factors that may either offset or magnify each other, including: the expected volatility of the Index; the time to maturity of the Securities; the market prices and dividend rates on the component stocks underlying the Index; interest and yield rates in the market generally and in the markets of the component stocks underlying the Index; a variety of economic, financial, political, regulatory or judicial events; supply and demand for the Securities; and our creditworthiness, including actual or anticipated downgrades in our credit ratings.
- ♦ **Credit of the Issuer:** The Securities are senior unsecured debt obligations of the Issuer, Deutsche Bank AG, and are not, either directly or indirectly, an obligation of any third party. Any payment to be made on the Securities, including any principal protection provided at maturity, depends on the ability of Deutsche Bank AG to satisfy its obligations as they come due. As a result, the actual and perceived creditworthiness of Deutsche Bank AG may affect the market value of the Securities and in the event Deutsche Bank AG were to default on its obligations you may not receive the principal protection or any other amount owed to you under the terms of the Securities.

The S&P 500® INDEX

The S&P 500® Index is published by Standard & Poor's ("S&P"), a division of The McGraw-Hill Companies, Inc. As discussed more fully in the underlying supplement No. 1 under the heading "The S&P 500® Index," the S&P 500® Index is intended to provide a performance benchmark for the U.S. equity markets.
