We have reviewed your filing and have the following comments. In some of our comments, we may ask you to provide us with information so we may better understand your disclosure.

Please respond to this letter within ten business days by amending your filing, by providing the requested information, or by advising us when you will provide the requested response. If you do not believe our comments apply to your facts and circumstances or do not believe an amendment is appropriate, please tell us why in your response.

After reviewing any amendment to your filing and the information you provide in response to these comments, we may have additional comments.

The Excalibur Property, page 10

1. We note you report that 250,000 tons of ore are blocked out in this section. Under SEC Industry Guide 7, the terms ore or ore body are treated the same as the term reserve. Please note that proven and/or probable reserves for a mineral property may not be designated unless:
 - Competent professional engineers conduct a detailed engineering and economic study, and the “bankable” or “final” feasibility study demonstrates that a mineral deposit can currently be mined profitably at a commercial rate.
 - The historic three-year average commodity price is used in any reserve or cash flow analysis used to designate reserves.

- The company has demonstrated that the mineral property will receive its governmental permits, and the primary environmental document has been filed with the appropriate governmental authorities.

Please revise your disclosure, perhaps by substituting mineralized material in the appropriate locations.

2. We note your refer to gold values up to certain assay levels in this section and elsewhere in your filing. When reporting the results of sampling and chemical analyses, please revise your disclosure to address each of the following regarding mineralization of existing or potential economic significance on your property:

- Disclose only weighted-average sample analyses associated with a measured length or a substantial volume.
- Eliminate all analyses from “grab” or “dump” samples, unless the sample is of a substantial and disclosed weight.
- Eliminate all disclosure of the highest or best values/grades of sample sets. Present a balanced disclosure of the drill and sampling results
- Eliminate grades disclosed as “up to” or “as high as” or “ranging from.”
- Eliminate statements containing grade and/or sample-width ranges.
- Aggregated sample values from related locations should be aggregated based on a weighted average of lengths of the samples.
- Generally, use tables to improve readability of sample and drilling data.
- Soil samples may be disclosed as a weighted average value over an area.
- Refrain from reporting single soil sample values.
- Convert all ppb quantities to ppm quantities for disclosure.
- Avoid optimistic descriptive adjectives such as high-grade or ore-grade.

Please revise your disclosures to comply with this guidance. Please note the TSX Venture Exchange Corporate Finance Manual – Appendix 3F also addresses many of these items.

3. Detailed sampling provides the basis for the quality estimate or grade of your mineral discovery. Please provide a brief description of your sample collection, sample preparation, and the analytical procedures used to develop your analytical results. In addition, please disclose any Quality Assurance/Quality Control (QA/QC) protocols you have developed for your exploration program. These procedures would serve to inform potential investors regarding your sample collection and preparation, assay controls, sample custody, assay precision and accuracy procedures and protocols.
4. Early in this section and elsewhere in your filing, your company should indicate that it is an exploration state company and that there is no assurance that a commercially viable mineral deposit exists on any of your properties, and that further exploration will be required before a final evaluation as to the economic and legal feasibility is determined. See Industry Guide 7(a) (4).
5. Please disclose the following information for each of your properties:
 - The nature your ownership or interest in the property.
 - A description of all interests in your properties, including the terms of all underlying agreements and royalties.
 - Describe the process by which mineral rights are acquired at this location and the basis and duration of your mineral rights, surface rights, mining claims or concessions.
 - An indication of the type of claim or concession such as placer or lode, exploration or exploitation, whether the mining claims are State or Federal mining claims, patented or unpatented claims, mining leases, or mining concessions.
 - Please include certain identifying information, such as the property names, claim numbers, grant numbers, mining concession name or number, and dates of recording and expiration that is sufficient to enable the claims to be distinguished from other claims that may exist in the area or your properties.
 - The conditions that must be met to retain your claims or leases, including quantification and timing of all necessary payments, annual maintenance fees, and disclose who is responsible for paying these fees.
 - The area of your claims, either in hectares or in acres.

Please ensure that you fully discuss the material terms of the land or mineral rights securing agreements, as required under paragraph (b)(2) of Industry Guide 7.

6. Please disclose the information required under paragraph (b) of Industry Guide 7 for all your material properties listed under this heading. For any properties identified that are not material, please include a statement to that effect, clarifying your intentions. For each material property, include the following information:
- The location and means of access to your property, including the modes of transportation utilized to and from the property.
 - Any conditions that must be met in order to obtain or retain title to the property, whether you have surface and/or mineral rights.
 - A description of any work completed on the property and its present condition.
 - The details as to modernization and physical condition of the plant and equipment, including subsurface improvements and equipment.
 - A description of equipment, infrastructure, and other facilities.
 - The current state of exploration of the property.
 - The total costs incurred to date and all planned future costs.
 - The source of power and water that can be utilized at the property.
 - If applicable, provide a clear statement that the property is without known reserves and the proposed program is exploratory in nature.

Please elaborate on any surface disturbance or contamination issues found on the surface or in the groundwater due to historical mining activities. The extent and significance of the disturbance/contamination, as well as your plans to remediate the site, should be clear.
9. We note you are subject to permitting requirements of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and/or Forest Service in addition to State Environmental requirements. Please provide a short summary of the permits and/or operational plans required to perform exploration and/or mining activities on your properties. Please define your reclamation and closure obligations and requirements.

10. We note your disclosure in this section, referring to mines and other mineral properties that exist in the proximity of your property. Such disclosure may cause investors to infer that your property also has commercial mineralization, because of its proximity to these mines and properties. Please describe only geology, history, or exploration results that are directly related to the properties that your company has the right to explore or mine. Accordingly, we believe that you should remove information about any mines, prospects, adjacent or analogous properties, deposits, occurrences, or exploration activities by other companies operating in or near your properties and instead focus the disclosure solely on your company's property.

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We urge all persons who are responsible for the accuracy and adequacy of the disclosure in the filing to be certain that the filing includes the information the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and all applicable Exchange Act rules require. Since the company and its management are in possession of all facts relating to a company's disclosure, they are responsible for the accuracy and adequacy of the disclosures they have made.

In responding to our comments, please provide a written statement from the company acknowledging that:

- the company is responsible for the adequacy and accuracy of the disclosure in the filing;
- staff comments or changes to disclosure in response to staff comments do not foreclose the Commission from taking any action with respect to the filing; and
- the company may not assert staff comments as a defense in any proceeding initiated by the Commission or any person under the federal securities laws of the United States.
