8. Discuss the material factors that make an investment in the issuer speculative or risky:

The Company was recently formed, has no significant track record and minimal operating history from which Participants can evaluate the Company or this investment.

The Company's business model involves fundamental risks associated with changes in applicable law.

The grant writers on the Platform are independent contractors of the Company and there is ever-increasing scrutiny by courts and administrative agencies related to the classification of workers as independent contractors. In addition, changes in state and federal laws on the topic of worker classification threaten the model of continuing to have grant writers as independent contractors. While the Company believes in good faith that it is properly classifying grant writers as independent contractors, it is possible that a court or administrative agency may determine otherwise, or that changes in applicable law may occur such that the Company is unable to continue to classify grant writers as independent contractors. If such events were to occur, the Company's business model may not be economically sustainable or may be significantly adversely impacted.

The Company receives, collects, processes, transmits, stores and uses a large volume of personally identifiable information. There are federal, state, and foreign laws regarding privacy, and the storing, sharing, use, disclosure, and protection of personally identifiable information and sensitive data. Specifically, personally identifiable information is increasingly subject to legislation and regulations to protect the privacy of personal information that is collected, processed, and transmitted. Any violations of these laws and regulations may require the Company to change its business practices or operational structure, address legal claims, and sustain monetary penalties, or other harms to the business.

Further, changes in laws or regulations or the regulatory application or judicial interpretation of the laws and regulations applicable to the Company could adversely affect its ability to operate in the manner in which the Company currently conducts business or make it more difficult or costly to operate the business. A material failure to comply with any such laws or regulations could result in regulatory actions, lawsuits, and damage to the Company's reputation, which could have a material adverse effect on the business and financial condition and the Company's ability to operate the business.

The loss of key personnel, particularly the Company's founders, could have a material adverse effect on the Company.

The Company's success depends significantly on the continued services of key personnel, particularly Sedale Turbovsky, Cody Hanson and Hunter Petersen, the Company's founders, directors, and controlling shareholders, who each have been key figures in pioneering the Company's business model and who have been essential in designing the Platform. The loss of services of such individuals could diminish the Company's business and growth opportunities and the relationships with key leaders in the Company's industry and could have a material adverse effect on us.

The Company's business will be adversely affected if it is unable to attract and retain talented employees, including sales, technology, operations and development professionals.

The Company's business operations will require highly specialized knowledge of the grant industry and of technological innovation as it applies to the industry. If the Company is unable to hire or retain the services of talented employees, including executive officers, other key management and sales, technology, operations and development professionals, the Company would be at a competitive disadvantage. In addition, recruitment and retention of qualified staff could result in substantial additional costs. The loss of the services of one or more of the Company's executive officers or other key professionals or the Company's inability to attract, retain and motivate qualified personnel could have a material adverse effect on the Company's ability to operate our business.

The Company's business model represents a new business venture for the Company's management team. While the Company believes in good faith that its management team is capable of managing a complex business venture such as the Company, the management team does not have significant experience managing business ventures, and such lack of experience could be detrimental to the prospects of the business.

The Platform may be an attractive target and potentially vulnerable to cyber-attacks, computer viruses, physical or electronic break-ins or similar disruptions. The Platform processes certain confidential information about users. While the Company intends to take commercially reasonable measures to protect the confidential information and maintain appropriate cybersecurity, the security measures of the Platform, the Company or its service providers could be breached. Any accidental or willful security breaches or other unauthorized access to the Platform could cause confidential information to be stolen and used for criminal purposes or have other harmful effects. Security breaches or unauthorized access to confidential information could also expose the Company to liability related to the loss of the information, time-consuming and expensive litigation and negative publicity, or loss of the proprietary nature of the Company's trade secrets. If security measures are breached because of third-party action, employee error, malfeasance or otherwise, or if design flaws in the Platform's software are exposed and exploited, the relationships between the Company, government and non-government grantors, customers, and/or grant

writers could be severely damaged, and the Company could incur significant liability or have its attention significantly diverted from the intended business model, which could have a material negative impact on the value of the Company.

Because techniques used to sabotage or obtain unauthorized access to systems change frequently and generally are not recognized until they are launched against a target, the Company, the third-party hosting used by the Platform and other third-party service providers may be unable to anticipate these techniques or to implement adequate preventative measures. In addition, federal regulators and many federal and state laws and regulations require companies to notify individuals of data security breaches involving their personal data. These mandatory disclosures regarding a security breach are costly to implement and often lead to widespread negative publicity, which may cause Participants, or the third parties that interface with the Platform to lose confidence in the effectiveness of the secure nature of the Platform. Any security breach, whether actual or perceived, would harm the Company's reputation and the Platform and we could lose Participants, customers, grant writers, and grantors.

As the business scales, volume of work increases, and it is likely that the Company will require increasing amounts of capital to build its operations. This need for capital will likely require the Company to find additional investors. The Company's inability to attract sufficient capital at all or on favorable terms will impact its ability to grow and remain in business. And even if the Company does make successful offering(s) in the future, the terms of that offering might result in Participants' investment in the Company being worth less because of the terms of future investment rounds. In short, there is no guarantee that the Company will be able to raise any additional capital in the future or that additional capital will be available on acceptable terms.

The Company's business is partially dependent on the availability and ongoing funding of grants provided by third parties, including grants from various levels of government as well as grants provided by non-government sources. As such, if the government were to decrease or eliminate funding for certain grant programs, or were to stop providing certain grants for other reasons, or were to otherwise change the criteria for grant programs such that they become less accessible to customers, the Company's business would be significantly adversely impacted. Similarly, if non-government grant programs have funding reduced or eliminated, or criteria altered, the Company's business would be significantly adversely impacted.

Because the Company's business depends on third parties beyond the control of the Company, including government and non-government grantors, grant writers, and customers, it is possible that the acts of such third parties could result in reputational damage to the Company. Such reputational damage could, for example, be in the form of negative reviews of the Company and the Platform, formal legal claims against the Company related to acts of such third parties, or disputes among the third parties that are tied to the Company and the Platform. Such reputational risks could be significantly damaging to the Company's business.

Because the Platform contains significant user generated content created and posted by third parties, there are risks to the Company that such content could be infringing on the intellectual property rights of others or could otherwise be offensive, defamatory, harassing, threatening, pornographic, illegal, or otherwise inappropriate. Such user generated content could result in legal claims against the Company or result in significant reputational damage to the Company.

Because the Company serves in a "matchmaker" role of connecting customers with grant writers, it is possible that such third parties could circumvent the Platform to work together outside of the Platform such that the Company is no longer involved in the relationship and loses revenue.

The Company's intellectual property rights may not be sufficiently broad or otherwise may not provide us a significant competitive advantage. In addition, the steps that the Company has taken to maintain and protect its intellectual property may not prevent it from being challenged, invalidated, circumvented or designed-around. In some circumstances, enforcement may not be available to the Company because an infringer has a dominant intellectual property position or for other business reasons. Any failure by the Company to obtain or maintain intellectual property rights that convey competitive advantage, adequately protect the Company's intellectual property or detect or prevent circumvention or unauthorized use of such property, could adversely impact the Company's competitive position and results of operations. The Company also relies on nondisclosure and similar agreements with vendors, consultants and other parties to protect, in part, trade secrets and other proprietary rights. There can be no assurance that these agreements will adequately protect the Company's trade secrets and other proprietary rights and will not be breached, that the Company will have adequate remedies for any breach, that others will not independently develop substantially equivalent proprietary information or that third parties will not otherwise gain access to the Company's trade secrets or other proprietary rights. As the Company expands its business, protecting its intellectual property will become increasingly important. The protective steps the Company have taken may be inadequate to deter competitors from using the Company's proprietary information. In order to protect or enforce the Company's intellectual property rights, the Company may be required to initiate litigation against third parties, such as infringement lawsuits. Also, these third parties may assert claims against the Company with or without provocation. These lawsuits could be expensive, take significant time and could divert management's attention from other business concerns. The Company cannot assure Participants that it will prevail in any of these potential suits or that the damages or other remedies awarded, if any, would be commercially valuable.

The development, structuring, launch and maintenance of the Platform could lead to unanticipated and substantial costs, delays or other operational or financial difficulties. The Platform is complex, and its creation and ongoing improvement requires the integration of multiple technologies and the development of new software. There can be no assurance that the Company will have the financial and technological resources necessary to complete the development of the technologies if their development costs more than the Company has estimated or requires technology and expertise that the Company does not have and cannot develop. Even if the Company is able to develop its Platform as contemplated, it may not be able to develop the Platform on a timely basis.

Misinformation about the Company's team members can spread on social media websites or on public forums. Accounts owned by the Company and the Company's service providers might be hacked to potentially spread misinformation. While the Company plans to take precautionary steps and attempt to address cases of misinformation, there is no guarantee that the Company will be successful in these efforts. Misinformation or negative publicity can negatively impact the company valuation.

The Company uses third-party service providers to handle many components of its operations. These service providers may themselves rely on third-party data center hosting facilities or other service providers. The continuous availability of the Platform depends on the operations of these service providers, on data facilities, on a variety of network service providers, on third-party vendors, and on data center operations staff. In addition, the Company depends on the ability of its third-party providers to protect the facilities against damage or interruption from natural disasters, power or telecommunications failures, criminal acts, and similar events. If there are any lapses of service or damage to the facilities, the Company could experience lengthy interruptions in its services as well as delays and additional expenses in arranging new service providers and services. Even with current disaster recovery arrangements, the Company's business could be harmed.

Our future success depends on the efforts of a small management team. The loss of services of the members of the management team may have an adverse effect on the company. There can be no assurance that we will be successful in attracting and retaining other personnel we require to successfully grow our

business.

The Company may never receive a future equity financing or elect to convert the Securities upon such future financing. In addition, the Company may never undergo a liquidity event such as a sale of the Company or an IPO. ## The Offering

### USE OF FUNDS

9. What is the purpose of this offering?

The Company intends to use the net proceeds of this offering for working capital and general corporate purposes, which includes the specific items listed in item 10 below. While the Company expects to use the net proceeds from the Offering in the manner described above, it cannot specify with certainty the particular uses of the net proceeds that it will receive from from this Offering. Accordingly, the Company will have broad discretion in using these proceeds.

10. How does the issuer intend to use the proceeds of this offering?

If we raise: **\$50,000**

Use of Proceeds: 92.5% will go towards hiring additional developers. 7.5% will go towards WeFunder fees.

If we raise: **\$750,000**

Use of Proceeds: 42.5% will go towards hiring additional developers. 20% will go towards marketing. 30% will go towards outsourced talent for SEO, UX/UI upgrades and testing. 7.5% will go towards WeFunder fees.

Book Entry and Investment in the Co-Issuer. Investors will make their investments by investing in interests issued by one or more co-issuers, each of which is a special purpose vehicle ("SPV"). The SPV will invest all amounts it receives from investors in securities issued by the Company. Interests issued to investors by the SPV will be in book entry form. This means that the investor will not receive a certificate representing his or her investment. Each investment will be recorded in the books and records of the SPV. In addition, investors' interests in the investments will be recorded in each investor's "Portfolio" page on the Wefunder platform. The SAFEs. We are offering securities in the form of a Simple Agreement for Future Equity ("SAFE"), which provides investors the right to **preferred stock** in the Company ("Preferred Stock"), when and if the Company sponsors an equity offering that involves **Preferred Stock**, on the standard terms offered to other investors.

**Conversion to Preferred Equity.** Based on our SAFEs, when we engage in an offering of equity interests involving **preferred stock**, investors will receive a number of shares of **preferred stock** calculated using the method that results in the greater number of **preferred stock**:

- proceeds equal to the greater of (i) the Purchase Amount (the "Cash-Out Amount") or (ii) the amount payable on the number of shares of Common Stock equal to the Purchase Amount divided by the Liquidity Price (the "Conversion Amount")

**Liquidity Priority.** In a Liquidity Event or Dissolution Event, this Safe is intended to operate like standard nonparticipating Preferred Stock. The investor's right to receive its Cash-Out Amount is:

The Company's use of the SPV is intended to allow investors in the SPV to achieve the same economic exposure, voting power, and ability to assert State and Federal law rights, and receive the same disclosures, as if they had invested directly in the Company. The Company's use of the SPV will not result in any additional fees being charged to investors.

The SPV has been organized and will be operated for the sole purpose of directly acquiring, holding and disposing of the Company's securities, will not borrow money and will use all of the proceeds from the sale of its securities solely to purchase a single class of securities of the Company. As a result, an investor investing in the Company through the SPV will have the same relationship to the Company's securities, in terms of number, denomination, type and rights, as if the investor invested directly in the Company.

### Voting Rights

If the securities offered by the Company and those offered by the SPV have voting rights, those voting rights may be exercised by the investor or his or her proxy. The applicable proxy is the Lead Investor, if the Proxy (described below) is in effect.

### Proxy to the Lead Investor

The SPV securities have voting rights. With respect to those voting rights, the investor and his, her, or its transferees or assignees (collectively, the "Investor"), through a power of attorney granted by Investor in the Investor Agreement, has appointed or will appoint the Lead Investor as the investor's true and lawful proxy and attorney (the "Proxy") with the power to act alone and with full power of substitution, on behalf of the Investor to: (i) vote all securities related to the Company purchased in an offering hosted by Wefunder Portal, and (ii) execute, in connection with such voting power, any instrument or document that the Lead Investor determines is necessary and appropriate in the exercise of his or her authority. Such Proxy will be irrevocable by the Investor unless and until a successor lead investor ("Replacement Lead Investor") takes the place of the Lead Investor. Upon notice that a Replacement Lead Investor has taken the place of the Lead Investor, the Investor will have five (5) calendar days to revoke the Proxy. If the Proxy is not revoked within the 5-day time period, it shall remain in effect.

### Restriction on Transferability

The SPV securities are subject to restrictions on transfer, as set forth in the Subscription Agreement and the Limited Liability Company Agreement of Wefunder SPV, LLC, and may not be transferred without the prior approval of the Company, on behalf of the SPV.

The holders of a majority-in-interest of voting rights in the Company could limit the Investor's rights in a material way. For example, those interest holders could vote to change the terms of the agreements governing the Company's operations or cause the Company to engage in additional offerings (including potentially a public offering).

These changes could result in further limitations on the voting rights the Investor will have as an owner of equity in the Company, for example by diluting those rights or limiting them to certain types of events or consents.

To the extent applicable, in cases where the rights of holders of convertible debt, SAFES, or other outstanding options or warrants are exercised, or if new awards are granted under our equity compensation plans, an Investor's interests in the Company may be diluted. As holders of a majority-in-interest of voting rights in the Company, the **shareholders** may make decisions with which the Investor disagrees, or that negatively affect the value of the Investor's securities in the Company, and the Investor will have no recourse to change these decisions. The Investor's interests may conflict with those of other investors, and there is no guarantee that the Company will develop in a way that is optimal for or advantageous to the Investor.

For example, the **shareholders** may change the terms of the articles of incorporation for the company, change the terms of securities issued by the Company, change the management of the Company, and even force out minority

holders of securities. **The shareholders** may make changes that affect the tax treatment of the Company in ways that are unfavorable to you but favorable to them. The offering price for the securities offered pursuant to this Form C has been determined arbitrarily by the Company, and does not necessarily bear any relationship to the Company's book value, assets, earnings or other generally accepted valuation criteria. In determining the offering price, the Company did not employ investment banking firms or other outside organizations to make an independent appraisal or evaluation. Accordingly, the offering price should not be considered to be indicative of the actual value of the securities offered hereby.

The initial amount invested in a SAFE is determined by the investor, and we do not guarantee that the SAFE will be converted into any particular number of **shares of Preferred Stock**. As discussed in Question 13, when we engage in an offering of equity interests involving **Preferred Stock**, investors may receive a number of shares of **Preferred Stock** calculated as either (i) the total value of the investor's investment, divided by the price of the **Preferred Stock** being issued to new investors, or (ii) if the valuation for the company is more than the Valuation Cap, the amount invested divided by the quotient of (a) the Valuation Cap divided by (b) the total amount of the Company's capitalization at that time.

Because there will likely be no public market for our securities prior to an initial public offering or similar liquidity event, the price of the **Preferred Stock** that investors will receive, and/or the total value of the Company's capitalization, will be determined by our **board of directors**. Among the factors we may consider in determining the price of **Preferred Stock** are prevailing market conditions, our financial information, market valuations of other companies that we believe to be comparable to us, estimates of our business potential, the present state of our development and other factors deemed relevant.

In the future, we will perform valuations of our **stock (including both common stock and Preferred Stock)** that take into account, as applicable, factors such as the following:

- unrelated third party valuations;
- the price at which we sell other securities in light of the relative rights, preferences and privileges of those securities;
- our results of operations, financial position and capital resources;
- current business conditions and projections;
- the marketability or lack thereof of the securities;
- the hiring of key personnel and the experience of our management;
- the introduction of new products;
- the risk inherent in the development and expansion of our products;
- our stage of development and material risks related to our business;
- the likelihood of achieving a liquidity event, such as an initial public offering or a sale of our company given the prevailing market conditions and the nature and history of our business;
- industry trends and competitive environment;
- trends in consumer spending, including consumer confidence;
- overall economic indicators, including gross domestic product, employment, inflation and interest rates; and
- the general economic outlook.

We will analyze factors such as those described above using a combination of financial and market-based methodologies to determine our business enterprise value. For example, we may use methodologies that assume that businesses operating in the same industry will share similar characteristics and that the Company's value will correlate to those characteristics, and/or methodologies that compare transactions in similar securities issued by us that were conducted in the market.

22. What are the risks to purchasers of the securities relating to minority ownership in the issuer?

An investor in the Company will likely hold a minority position in the Company, and thus be limited as to its ability to control or influence the governance and operations of the Company.

The marketability and value of the investor's interest in the Company will depend upon many factors outside the control of the investor. The Company will be managed by its officers and be governed in accordance with the strategic direction and decision-making of its Board Of Directors, and the investor will have no independent right to name or remove an officer or member of the Board Of Directors of the Company.

Following the investor's investment in the Company, the Company may sell interests to additional investors, which will dilute the percentage interest of the investor in the Company. The investor may have the opportunity to increase its investment in the Company in such a transaction, but such opportunity cannot be assured.

The amount of additional financing needed by the Company, if any, will depend upon the maturity and objectives of the Company. The declining of an opportunity or the inability of the investor to make a follow-on investment, or the lack of an opportunity to make such a follow-on investment, may result in substantial dilution of the investor's interest in the Company.

The amount of additional financing needed by the Company, if any, will depend upon the maturity and objectives of the Company. To-date, the company has been financed with \$62,973 in debt, \$70,000 in convertibles, and \$600,000 in SAFEs.

After the conclusion of this Offering, should we hit our minimum funding target, our projected runway is 8 months before we need to raise further capital.

We plan to use the proceeds as set forth in this Form C under "Use of Funds". We don't have any other sources of capital in the immediate future.

We will likely require additional financing in excess of the proceeds from the Offering in order to perform operations over the lifetime of the Company. We plan to raise capital in 4 months. Except as otherwise described in this Form C, we do not have additional sources of capital other than the proceeds from the offering. Because of the complexities and uncertainties in establishing a new business strategy, it is not possible to adequately project whether the proceeds of this offering will be sufficient to enable us to implement our strategy. This complexity and uncertainty will be increased if less than the maximum amount of securities offered in this offering is sold. The Company intends to raise additional capital in the future from investors. Although capital may be available for early-stage companies, there is no guarantee that the Company will receive any investments from investors.

## Runway & Short/Mid Term Expenses

Egeria Corporation cash in hand is \$135,000, as of December 2021. Over the last three months, revenues have averaged \$17,173/month, cost of goods sold has averaged \$2,795/month, and operational expenses have averaged \$36,000/month, for an average burn rate of \$21,622 per month. Our intent is to be profitable in 48 months.

The Company has evaluated events subsequent to December 31, 2020 to assess the need for potential recognition or disclosure in this report. Such events were evaluated through December 7, 2021, the date these financial statements were available to be issued.

In 2021, the Company entered into several SAFE agreement with third parties for \$100,000. The SAFE agreements have no maturity date and bear no interest. The agreements provide the right of the investor to future equity in the Company during a qualified financing event, and either equity or the original purchase amount during a change of control event at a 20% discount. The agreements are subject to a valuation cap of \$7M.

The Company issued 1,100,000 of its common shares to current shareholders in exchange for \$10,000.

In April 2021, the Company entered into a loan agreement for \$23,000 with a fixed fee of \$3,496 and maturity date of October 2022. This loan is secured by the Company's bank accounts with the lender and its receivables.

In May 2021, the Company issued 100,000 shares of Common Stock to an advisor as compensation for consulting work done on behalf of the Company.

In October 2021, the Company entered into a Revenue Sharing Agreement with another entity ("the Entity") that provides grant-management services to various government entities throughout the US. This agreement established a bi-lateral referral relationship between the two parties where both the Company and the Entity are to pay 10% of their respective gross revenue collected from business relationships established by referrals sent from one party to the other. Payment from all revenue that one party collected from the other's referrals shall be due by the last business day of each calendar month.

Our revenues over the next 3-6 months should reach near 100k/month and should continue to grow at an aggressive rate as we scale enterprise deals and expand the marketplace globally. Over the next 6 months we expect expenses to be at \$392,984.

We are not profitable. We will need to complete our full fundraise of 2M in order to give us the correct runway to scale up and reach profitability. We anticipate profitability in 2024, as our model focuses on scaling aggressively to generate data and data products which will eventually drive about 90% of our total revenue.

Our other sources of capital include funding raised from investors in the past and revenue generated by our platform. Our short term burn doing the campaign can be easily covered by our current bank balance and incoming cash.
