#### Purpose of This Form

#### Our Mission

7 Grain Army empowers the everyday eater to answer food cravings with mindful, health conscious choices.

#### UNIQUE VALUE PROPOSITION

7 Grain Army creates everyday, purpose-based eating through nourishing, accessible comfort foods. All of our recipes are loaded with immune-boosting superfoods and designed with preventative nutrition in mind, but so tasty and satisfying that every bite feels like a treat. This isn't health food; it's about creating a healthier relationship with food.

#### CURRENTLY RAISING

7 Grain Army successfully raised \$71,600 through our previous MainVest campaign, to secure our lease, initiate Phase 1 build-out, purchase equipment and pay for branding and design. Additional funds will be used to cover payroll, ingredient costs and operating expenses during our Phase 1 roll out, and to help push through to Phase 2 of our plan. This means we can increase capacity and grow our revenue streams, and continue investing into our customers, staff and partners to build a community that benefits everyone.

#### LOCATION

- 88 Roebling Street, on the southwest corner of North 7th Street, is only one block from the Bedford Avenue subway in the center of Williamsburg, with hundreds passing on a daily basis.
- The neighborhood consists of busy professionals and young families, demographics who esteem good taste, affordability, wellness and fun in their food choices.

#### HISTORY AND BACKGROUND

Originally founded as a wholesale bakery business by Matthew Tilden in 2009, SCRATCHbread accumulated a top client list of New York restaurants and coffee shops, including Danny Meyer's

Union Square Cafe.

- In the next five years, SCRATCHbread would grow from a \$75,000 annual wholesale business to an \$85,000 a month phenomenon, on a remote corner of Bed-Stuy without a single seat.
- 7 Grain Army is the next step in the evolution - a clean line of baked goods, spreads and ready-to-eat products made in New York's hottest neighborhood, with the heart and soul of one of Brooklyn's most beloved cult food brands.

#### Phase 2B - Local Distribution

Supply Local NYC Businesses with 7GA muFins. Logistics and invoicing are outsourced to a logistics partner, so we can focus exclusively on production and quality control.

- Wholesale program creates a reliable income stream and raises profile of the brand throughout the city

#### [Explanation](#)

A “material change” means a change that an average, careful investor would want to know about before making an investment decision. If a material change occurs after you make an investment commitment but before the Offering closes, then the Company will notify you and ask whether you want to invest anyway. If you do not affirmatively choose to invest, then your commitment will be cancelled, your funds will be returned to you, and you will not receive any securities.

#### (L) Price of the Securities

The Company is offering “securities” in the form of revenue sharing notes, which we refer to as “Notes.” The Notes are being offered at their face amount. For example, you will pay \$1,000 for a Note with a face amount of \$1,000.

<sup>2</sup> The rate of revenue sharing is calculated on a linear scale with a minimum rate of 1.5% and a maximum rate of 15.0% and is rounded to the nearest 1/10th percent. The final rate is based on the amount raised and is calculated after the offering has successfully closed. As the amount raised in the offering increases, the rate of revenue sharing increases. For example, a hypothetical offering could result in the following revenue sharing percentages, depending on the amount raised:

### Your Right to Payments under the Note

Your right to payments under the Note is set forth in the Note, together with a separate document



called the Revenue Sharing Agreement. Copies of the Note and Revenue Sharing Agreement are attached to this Form C. Additionally, general terms are outlined below and in the Company's offering page.

#### Obligation to Contribute Capital

Once you pay for your Note, you will have no obligation to contribute more money to the Company, and you will not be personally obligated for any debts of the Company. However, under some circumstances you could be required by law to return some or all of a distribution you receive from the Company.

#### No Right to Transfer

You should plan to hold the Notes until maturity. The Notes will be illiquid (meaning you might not be able to sell them) for at least four reasons:

- The Revenue Sharing Agreement prohibits the sale or other transfer of Notes without the Company's consent.
- If you want to sell your Note the Company will have the first right of refusal to buy it, which could make it harder to find a buyer.
- Even if a sale were permitted, there is no ready market for Notes, as there would be for a publicly-traded stock.
- By law, for a period of one year you won't be allowed to transfer the Investor Shares except (i) to the Company itself, (ii) to an "accredited" investor, (iii) to a family or trust, or (iii) in a public offering of the Company's shares.

#### Security

The Notes are not secured by any assets of the Company or any assets of persons associated with the Company.

#### Modification of Terms of Notes

The terms of the Notes and the Revenue Sharing Agreement may be modified or amended with the consent of Investors holding 50% of the Notes, measured by the total amount outstanding under each Note.

### Dilution of Rights

The Company has the right to create additional classes of securities, both equity securities and debt securities (e.g., other classes of promissory notes). ### How the Exercise of Voting Rights Could Affect You

You will receive payments with respect to your Note only if the Company makes enough money to pay you, or, if the Company does not make enough money to pay you, if there is enough value in the collateral the Company pledged as security for the Notes.

The people with voting rights control the Company and make all the decisions about running its business. If they make good business decisions, it is more likely you will be paid. If they make poor business decisions, it is less likely you will be paid. For example, if they hire too many people and/or try to expand too quickly, the business could be harmed. The people with voting rights could also decide to file for bankruptcy protection, making it more difficult for you to be paid.

### How the Notes are Being Valued

The Notes are being valued at their face value. We don't anticipate that we'll ever need to place a value on the Notes in the future.

### (N) The Funding Portal

The Company is offering its securities through MainVest, Inc., which is a "Funding Portal" licensed by the Securities and Exchange Commission and FINRA. MainVest Inc.'s Central Index Key (CIK) number is 0001746059, their SEC File number is 007-00162, and their Central Registration Depository (CRD) number is 298384.

### (O) Compensation of the Funding Portal

MainVest will be paid 6.0% of the final offering amount, upon the successful completion of the offering. MainVest does not receive compensation if the offering does not succeed. MainVest, Inc. owns no interest in the Company, directly or indirectly, and will not acquire an interest as part of the Offering, nor is there any arrangement for MainVest to acquire an interest.
