Return Enhanced Notes Linked to the S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index due December 31, 2008

General

- The notes are designed for investors who seek a return of three times the appreciation of the S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index up to a maximum total return on the notes of 43.05% at maturity. Investors should be willing to forgo interest and dividend payments and, if the Index declines, be willing to lose some or all of their principal.
- Senior unsecured obligations of JPMorgan Chase & Co. maturing December 31, 2008[†].
- Minimum denominations of \$50,000 and integral multiples of \$1,000 in excess thereof.
- The notes priced on May 4, 2007 and are expected to settle on or about May 9, 2007.

Key Terms

Index: The S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index (the "Index")
Upside Leverage Factor: 3
Payment at Maturity: If the Ending Index Level is greater than the Initial Index Level, you will receive a cash payment that provides you with a return per \$1,000 principal amount note equal to the Index Return multiplied by three, subject to a Maximum Total Return on the notes of 43.05%. For example, if the Index Return is more than 14.35%, you will receive the Maximum Total Return on the notes of 43.05%, which entitles you to a maximum payment at maturity of \$1,430.50 for every \$1,000 principal amount note that you hold. Accordingly, if the Index Return is positive, your payment per \$1,000 principal amount note will be calculated as follows, subject to the Maximum Total Return:

$$\$1,000 + [\$1,000 \times (\text{Index Return} \times 3)]$$

Your investment will be fully exposed to any decline in the Index. If the Ending Index Level declines from the Initial Index Level, you will lose 1% of the principal amount of your notes for every 1% that the Index declines beyond the Initial Index Level. Accordingly, if the Index Return is negative, your payment per \$1,000 principal amount note will be calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times \text{Index Return})$$

You will lose some or all of your investment at maturity if the Ending Index Level declines from the Initial Index Level.

Index Return: The performance of the Index from the Initial Index Level to the Ending Index Level, calculated as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Ending Index Level} - \text{Initial Index Level}}{\text{Initial Index Level}}$$

Initial Index Level: The Index closing level on the pricing date, which was 598.61.
Ending Index Level: The arithmetic average of the Index closing levels on each of the five Averaging Dates.
Averaging Dates[†]: December 19, 2008, December 22, 2008, December 23, 2008, December 24, 2008 and December 26, 2008
Maturity Date[†]: December 31, 2008



What is the Total Return on the Notes at Maturity Assuming a Range of Performance for the Index?

The following table and graph illustrate the hypothetical total return at maturity on the notes. The “total return” as used in this pricing supplement is the number, expressed as a percentage, that results from comparing the payment at maturity per \$1,000 principal amount note to \$1,000. The hypothetical total returns set forth below assume an Initial Index Level of 610 and reflect the Maximum Total Return on the notes of 43.05%. The hypothetical total returns set forth below are for illustrative purposes only and may not be the actual total returns applicable to a purchaser of the notes. The numbers appearing in the following table, graph and examples have been rounded for ease of analysis.

Hypothetical Examples of Amounts Payable at Maturity

The following examples illustrate how the total returns set forth in the table and graph above are calculated.

Example 1: The level of the Index increases from the Initial Index Level of 610 to an Ending Index Level of 640.50. Because the Ending Index Level of 640.50 is greater than the Initial Index Level of 610 and the Index Return of 5% multiplied by 3 does not exceed the Maximum Total Return of 43.05%, the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$1,150 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + [\$1,000 \times (5\% \times 3)] = \$1,150$$

Example 2: The level of the Index increases from the Initial Index Level of 610 to an Ending Index Level of 762.50. Because the Ending Index Level of 762.50 is greater than the Initial Index Level of 610 and the Index Return of 25% multiplied by 3 exceeds the Maximum Total Return of 43.05%, the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$1,430.50 per \$1,000 principal amount note, the maximum payment on the notes.

Example 3: The level of the Index decreases from the Initial Index Level of 610 to an Ending Index Level of 488. Because the Ending Index Level of 488 is less than the Initial Index Level of 610, the Index Return is negative and the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$800 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times -20\%) = \$800$$

Selected Purchase Considerations

- **APPRECIATION POTENTIAL** — The notes provide the opportunity to enhance equity returns by multiplying a positive Index Return by three, up to the Maximum Total Return on the notes of 43.05%, or \$1,430.50 for every \$1,000 principal amount note. Because the notes are our senior unsecured obligations, payment of any amount at maturity is subject to our ability to pay our obligations as they become due.
- **RETURN LINKED TO THE PERFORMANCE OF THE S&P COMPOSITE 1500 HOMEBUILDING INDEX** — The return on the notes is linked to the S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index. The Index is a float adjusted market capitalization-weighted index of common stocks of companies that are included in the S&P Composite 1500 Index and classified within the homebuilding sub-industry under the Global Industry Classification Standard. There are currently 16 companies represented in the Index, all of which are in the business of residential construction, including manufacturers of prefabricated houses and semi-fixed manufactured homes. For additional information about the Index, see the information set forth under “The S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index” in the accompanying product supplement no. 44-l.
- **CAPITAL GAINS TAX TREATMENT** — You should review carefully the section entitled “Certain U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences” in the accompanying product supplement no. 44-l. Subject to the limitations described therein, and based on certain factual representations received from us, in the opinion of our special tax counsel, David Polk & Wardwell, it is reasonable to treat your purchase and ownership of the notes as an “open transaction” for U.S. federal income tax purposes. Assuming this characterization is respected, your gain or loss on the notes should be treated as long-term capital gain or loss if you hold the notes for more than a year, whether or not you are an initial purchaser of notes at the issue price. However, the Internal Revenue Service or a court may not respect this characterization or treatment of the notes, in which case the timing and character of any income or loss on the notes could be significantly and adversely affected. You should consult your tax adviser regarding the treatment of the notes, including possible alternative characterizations. In addition, subject to the limitations and assumptions described in the section entitled “Certain U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences — Tax Consequences to Non-U.S. Holders” in the accompanying product supplement no. 44-l, and based on certain factual representations and assumptions, special tax counsel is of the opinion that withholding should not be imposed on proceeds paid to Non-U.S. Holders under Section 1445 of the Internal Revenue Code and the regulations thereunder.

Selected Risk Considerations

An investment in the notes involves significant risks. Investing in the notes is not equivalent to investing directly in the Index or any of the component stocks of the Index. These risks are explained in more detail in the “Risk Factors” section of the accompanying product supplement no. 44-l dated October 3, 2006.

- **YOUR INVESTMENT IN THE NOTES MAY RESULT IN A LOSS** — The notes do not guarantee any return of principal. The return on the notes at maturity is linked to the performance of the Index and will depend on whether, and the extent to which, the Index Return is positive or negative. Your investment will be fully exposed to any decline in the Ending Index Level as compared to the Initial Index Level.
- **YOUR MAXIMUM GAIN ON THE NOTES IS LIMITED TO THE MAXIMUM TOTAL RETURN** — If the Ending Index Level is greater than the Initial Index Level, for each \$1,000 principal amount note, you will receive at maturity \$1,000 plus an additional amount that will not exceed the Maximum Total Return on the notes of 43.05%, regardless of the appreciation in the Index, which may be significant.
- **YOUR RETURN IS LINKED TO THE PERFORMANCE OF A SINGLE INDUSTRY** — All of the securities underlying the S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index are issued by companies whose primary lines of business are directly associated with the residential homebuilding industry. Because the value of the notes is linked to the performance of the Index, an investment in these notes will be concentrated in this industry. As a result, the value of the notes may be subject to greater volatility and be more adversely affected by a single economic, political or regulatory occurrence affecting this industry than a different investment linked to securities of a more broadly diversified group of issuers. In addition, the homebuilding industry is significantly affected by a number of factors in general and local economic conditions and real estate markets as well as by weather conditions, natural disasters and geopolitical events, including those described under “Risk Factors” in the accompanying product supplement no. 44-l. These factors could cause a downturn in the homebuilding industry generally or regionally and could cause the value of the stocks included in the Index and the level of the Index to decline or remain flat during the term of the notes.
- **CERTAIN BUILT-IN COSTS ARE LIKELY TO ADVERSELY AFFECT THE VALUE OF THE NOTES PRIOR TO MATURITY** — While the payment at maturity described in this pricing supplement is based on the full principal amount of your notes, the original issue price of the notes includes the agent’s commission and the cost of hedging our obligations under the notes through one or more of our affiliates. As a result, the price, if any, at which JPMSI will be willing to purchase notes from you in secondary market transactions, if at all, will likely be lower than the original issue price, and any sale prior to the maturity date could result in a substantial loss to you. The notes are not designed to be short-term trading instruments. Accordingly, you should be able and willing to hold your notes to maturity.
- **NO INTEREST OR DIVIDEND PAYMENTS OR VOTING RIGHTS** — As a holder of the notes, you will not receive interest payments, and you will not have voting rights or rights to receive cash dividends or other distributions or other rights that holders of securities composing the S&P Composite 1500 Homebuilding Index would have.
- **LACK OF LIQUIDITY** — The notes will not be listed on any securities exchange. JPMSI intends to offer to purchase the notes in the secondary market but is not required to do so. Even if there is a secondary market, it may not provide enough liquidity to allow you to trade or sell the notes easily. Because other dealers are not likely to make a secondary market for the notes, the price at which you may be able to trade your notes is likely to depend on the price, if any, at which JPMSI is willing to buy the notes.
- **POTENTIAL CONFLICTS** — We and our affiliates play a variety of roles in connection with the issuance of the notes, including acting as calculation agent and hedging our obligations under the notes. In performing these duties, the economic interests of the calculation agent and other affiliates of ours are potentially adverse to your interests as an investor in the notes.
- **MANY ECONOMIC AND MARKET FACTORS WILL IMPACT THE VALUE OF THE NOTES** — In addition to the level of the Index on any day, the value of the notes will be affected by a number of economic and market factors that may either offset or magnify each other, including:
 - the expected volatility of the Index;
 - the time to maturity of the notes;
 - the dividend rate on the common stocks underlying the Index;
 - interest and yield rates in the market generally;
 - developments in the residential housing market;
 - a variety of economic, financial, political, regulatory or judicial events; and
 - our creditworthiness, including actual or anticipated downgrades in our credit ratings.
