General

- Unsecured and unsubordinated obligations of JPMorgan Chase & Co. maturing February 15, 2028, subject to postponement as described below.
- Interest on the notes will be payable semiannually on each Interest Payment Date in arrears at a rate per annum equal to (a) for the first year to the third year, an interest rate equal to 3.000% per annum, (b) for the fourth year to the sixth year, an interest rate equal to 3.250% per annum, (c) for the seventh year to the eighth year, an interest rate equal to 3.500% per annum, (d) for the ninth year to the tenth year, an interest rate equal to 3.625% per annum, (e) for the eleventh year to the twelfth year, an interest rate equal to 3.750% per annum, (f) for the thirteenth year, an interest rate equal to 4.000% per annum, (g) for the fourteenth year, an interest rate equal to 4.250% per annum and (h) for the fifteenth year, an interest rate equal to 5.000% per annum. **Any payment on the notes is subject to the credit risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co.**
- Unless general interest rates rise significantly, you should not expect to earn the highest scheduled Interest Rate below because the notes are likely to be called prior to maturity if interest rates remain the same or fall during the term of notes. Additionally, the interest rate on the notes does not step up significantly until later during the term of the notes. See "Selected Risk Considerations" in this term sheet.
- These notes, which have a relatively long term, may be more risky than notes with a shorter term. See "Selected Risk Considerations" in this term sheet.
- Minimum denominations of \$1,000 and integral multiples thereof.
- At our option, we may redeem the notes, in whole but not in part, on any of the Redemption Dates specified below.
- The notes are expected to price on or about February 12, 2013 and are expected to settle on or about February 15, 2013.

Payment at Maturity:	If we have not elected to redeem the notes prior to maturity, at maturity you will receive a cash payment for each \$1,000 principal amount note of \$1,000 <i>plus</i> any accrued and unpaid interest.
Payment upon Redemption:	At our option, we may redeem the notes, in whole but not in part, on the 15th day of February and August of each year (each such date, a "Redemption Date"), commencing February 15, 2016. If the notes are redeemed, you will receive on the applicable Redemption Date a cash payment equal to \$1,000 for each \$1,000 principal amount note <i>plus</i> any accrued and unpaid interest. Such amounts will be paid to the person who is the holder of record of such notes at the close of business on the business day immediately preceding (a) the Redemption Date or (b) if earlier, the date in which payment is to be made (as described below). We will provide notice of redemption at least 5 business days prior to the applicable Redemption Date. If a Redemption Date is not a business day, payment will be made on the business day immediately following the Redemption Date. No additional interest will be paid with respect to such a postponement.

You may revoke your offer to purchase the notes at any time prior to the time at which we accept such offer by notifying the applicable agent. We reserve the right to change the terms of, or reject any offer to purchase, the notes prior to their issuance. In the event of any changes to the terms of the notes, we will notify you and you will be asked to accept such changes in connection with your purchase. You may also choose to reject such changes in which case we may reject your offer to purchase.

You should read this term sheet together with the prospectus dated November 14, 2011, as supplemented by the prospectus supplement dated November 14, 2011 relating to our Series E medium-term notes of which these notes are a part, and the more detailed information contained in product supplement no. 1-I dated November 14, 2011. **This term sheet, together with the documents listed below, contains the terms of the notes and supersedes all other prior or contemporaneous oral statements as well as any other written materials including preliminary or indicative pricing terms, correspondence, trade ideas, structures for implementation, sample structures, fact sheets, brochures or other educational materials of ours.** You should carefully consider, among other things, the matters set forth in "Risk Factors" in the accompanying product supplement no. 1-I, as the notes involve risks not associated with conventional debt securities. We urge you to consult your investment, legal, tax, accounting and other advisers before you invest in the notes.

Selected Purchase Considerations

- **PRESERVATION OF CAPITAL** — You will receive at least 100% of the principal amount of your notes if you hold the notes to maturity or to the Redemption Date, if any, on which we elect to call the notes. Because the notes are our unsecured and unsubordinated obligations, payment of any amount at maturity or upon early redemption is subject to our ability to pay our obligations as they become due.
- **SEMIANNUAL INTEREST PAYMENTS** — The notes offer semiannual interest payments which will accrue at a rate equal to the applicable Interest Rate and will be payable semiannual in arrears on the 15th day of February and August of each year, commencing August 15, 2013, to and including the Interest Payment Date corresponding to the Maturity Date, or, if the notes have been redeemed, the applicable Redemption Date, to the holders of record at the close of business on the business day immediately preceding (a) the applicable Interest Payment Date or (b) if earlier, the date on which the interest payment is to be made (as described below). If an Interest Payment Date is not a business day, payment will be made on the business day immediately following such day. No additional interest will be paid with respect to such a postponement.
- **POTENTIAL SEMIANNUAL REDEMPTION BY US AT OUR OPTION** — At our option, we may redeem the notes, in whole but not in part, on the 15th day of February and August of each year (each such date, a "Redemption Date"), commencing on February 15, 2016, for a cash payment equal to \$1,000 for each \$1,000 principal amount note plus any accrued and unpaid interest on notes. Such amount will be paid to the person who is the holder of record of such notes at the close of business on the business day immediately preceding (a) the applicable Redemption Date or (b) if earlier, the date on which payment is to be made (as described below). If a Redemption Date is not a business day, payment will be made on the business day immediately following such day. No additional interest will be paid with respect to such a postponement.
- **TAX TREATMENT** — You should review carefully the section entitled "Material U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences" in the accompanying product supplement no. 1-I. Except to the extent of original issue discount, if any, during the term of the notes, interest paid on the notes will generally be taxable to you as ordinary interest income at the time it accrues or is received in accordance with your method of accounting for U.S. federal income tax purposes. In addition, a U.S. Holder (as defined in the accompanying product supplement) must include original issue discount, if any, in income as ordinary interest as it accrues, generally in advance of receipt of cash attributable to such income. In general, gain or loss realized on the sale, exchange or other disposition of the notes will be capital gain or loss. Notwithstanding the foregoing discussion of, because the period between the last step-up date and the final maturity date does not exceed one year, on the deemed reissuance on February 15, 2027, solely for the purpose of determining original issue discount, the notes should be treated as "short-term debt instruments" for the final period. Prospective purchasers are urged to consult their own tax advisers regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of an investment in the notes, including with respect to the treatment of any original issue discount on the notes. Purchasers who are not initial purchasers of notes at their issue price on the issue date should consult their tax advisers with respect to the tax consequences of an investment in the notes, and the potential application of special rules.

Subject to certain assumptions and representations received from us, the discussion in this section entitled "Tax Treatment", when read in combination with the section entitled "Material U.S. Federal Income Tax

Consequences" in the accompanying product supplement, constitutes the full opinion of Sidley Austin LLP regarding the material U.S. federal income tax treatment of owning and disposing of the notes.

Selected Risk Considerations

An investment in the notes involves significant risks. These risks are explained in more detail in the "Risk Factors" section of the accompanying product supplement no. 1-I dated November 14, 2011.

- **THE NOTES ARE SUBJECT TO EARLY REDEMPTION PRIOR TO MATURITY** — The notes are subject to redemption at the sole discretion of the Issuer on the specified Redemption Dates indicated above. If the notes are redeemed prior to maturity, you will receive the principal amount of your notes plus accrued and unpaid interest to, but excluding the applicable Redemption Date. This amount will be less than you would have received had the notes not been called early and continued to pay interest over the full term of the notes. We may choose to redeem the notes early or choose not to redeem the notes early on any Redemption Date, in our sole discretion. If we elect to redeem the notes early, your return may be less than the return you would have earned on your investment had the notes been held to maturity, and you may not be able to reinvest your funds at the same rate as the notes. We may choose to redeem the notes early, for example, if U.S. interest rates decrease significantly or if the volatility of U.S. interest rates decreases significantly.
- **THE NOTES ARE NOT ORDINARY DEBT SECURITIES; THE STEP-UP FEATURE PRESENTS DIFFERENT INVESTMENT CONSIDERATIONS THAN FIXED RATE NOTES** — The rate of interest paid by us on the notes will increase upward from the initial stated rate of interest of the notes. The notes are callable by us, in whole but not in part, prior to maturity and, therefore, contain the call risk described above. If we do not call the notes, the interest rate will step-up as described on the cover of this term sheet. Unless general interest rates rise significantly, you should not expect to earn the highest scheduled Interest Rate set forth on the front cover because the notes are likely to be called prior to maturity if interest rates remain the same or fall during the term of your notes. When determining whether to invest in a stepped-up rate note, you should not focus on the highest stated Interest Rate, which usually is the final stepped-up rate of interest. You should instead focus on, among other things, the overall annual percentage rate of interest to maturity or call as compared to other equivalent investment alternatives.
- **THE INTEREST RATE OF THE NOTES DOES NOT STEP UP SIGNIFICANTLY UNTIL LATER IN THE TERM OF THE NOTES** — Unless general interest rates rise significantly, you should not expect to earn the highest scheduled Interest Rate set forth on the front cover because the notes are likely to be called prior to maturity if interest rates remain the same or fall during the term of your notes. Additionally, the interest rate on the notes does not step up significantly until later in the term of the notes. If interest rates rise faster than the incremental increases in the interest rates of the notes, the notes may have an interest rate that is significantly lower than the interest rates at that time and the secondary market value of the notes may be significantly lower than other instruments with a similar term but higher interest rates. In other words, you should only purchase the notes if you are comfortable receiving the stated interest rates set forth on the front cover of this term sheet for the entire term of the notes.
- **CREDIT RISK OF JPMORGAN CHASE & CO.** — The notes are subject to the credit risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co., and our credit ratings and credit spreads may adversely affect the market value of the notes. Investors are dependent on JPMorgan Chase & Co.'s ability to pay all amounts due on the notes, and therefore investors are subject to our credit risk and to changes in the market's view of our creditworthiness. Any decline in our credit ratings or increase in the credit spreads charged by the market for taking our credit risk is likely to adversely affect the value of the notes. If we were to default on our payment obligations, you may not receive any amounts owed to you under the notes and you could lose your entire investment.
Recent events affecting us have led to heightened regulatory scrutiny, may lead to additional regulatory or legal proceedings against us and may adversely affect our credit ratings and credit spreads and, as a result, the market value of the notes. See "Executive Overview — CIO Synthetic Credit Portfolio Update," "Liquidity Risk Management — Credit Ratings," and "Item 4. Controls and Procedures" in our Quarterly Report on Form 10-Q for the quarter ended September 30, 2012 and "Part II. Other Information — Item 1A. Risk Factors" in our Quarterly Report on Form 10-Q for the quarter ended June 30, 2012.
- **POTENTIAL CONFLICTS** — We and our affiliates play a variety of roles in connection with the issuance of the notes, including acting as calculation agent and hedging our obligations under the notes. In performing these duties, our economic interests and the economic interests of the calculation agent and other affiliates of ours are potentially adverse to your interests as an investor in the notes. In addition, our business activities, including hedging and trading activities for our own accounts or on behalf of customers, could cause our economic interests to be adverse to yours and could adversely affect any payments on the notes and the value of the notes. It is possible that hedging or trading activities of ours or our affiliates could result in substantial returns for us or our affiliates while the value of the notes declines. Please refer to "Risk Factors — Risks Relating to the Notes Generally" in the accompanying product supplement for additional information about these risks.
- **THESE NOTES MAY BE MORE RISKY THAN NOTES WITH A SHORTER TERM** — By purchasing a note with a longer term, you are more exposed to fluctuations in interest rates than if you purchased a note with a shorter term. Specifically, you may be negatively affected if certain interest rate scenarios occur. For example, if interest rates begin to rise, the market value of your notes will decline because the likelihood of us calling your notes will decline and the Interest Rate applicable to that specific Interest Period may be less than a note issued at such time. For example, if the Interest Rate applicable to your notes at such time was 3.125% per annum, but a debt security issued in the then current market could yield an interest rate of 6.500% per annum, your note would be less valuable if you tried to sell it in the secondary market.
- **CERTAIN BUILT-IN COSTS ARE LIKELY TO ADVERSELY AFFECT THE VALUE OF THE NOTES PRIOR TO MATURITY** — While the payment at maturity or upon early redemption, as applicable, described in this term sheet is based on the full principal amount of your notes, the original issue price of the notes includes the estimated cost of hedging our obligations under the notes. As a result, the price, if any, at which JPMS will be willing to purchase notes from you in secondary market transactions, if at all, will likely be lower than the original issue price, and any sale prior to the maturity date could result in a substantial loss to you. The notes are not designed to be short-term trading instruments. Accordingly, you should be able and willing to hold your notes to maturity.
- **LACK OF LIQUIDITY** — The notes will not be listed on any securities exchange. JPMS intends to offer to purchase the notes in the secondary market but is not required to do so. Even if there is a secondary market, it may not provide enough liquidity to allow you to trade or sell the notes easily. Because other dealers are not likely to make a secondary market for the notes, the price at which you may be able to trade your notes is likely to depend on the price, if any, at which JPMS is willing to buy the notes.

- **MANY ECONOMIC AND MARKET FACTORS WILL IMPACT THE VALUE OF THE NOTES** — The notes will be affected by a number of economic and market factors that may either offset or magnify each other, including but not limited to:
 - the time to maturity of the notes;
 - interest and yield rates in the market generally, as well as the volatility of those rates;
 - the likelihood, or expectation, that the notes will be redeemed by us, based on prevailing market interest rates or otherwise; and
 - our creditworthiness, including actual or anticipated downgrades in our credit ratings.
- **VARIABLE PRICE REOFFERING RISKS** — JPMS proposes to offer the notes from time to time for sale at market prices prevailing at the time of sale, at prices related to then-prevailing prices or at negotiated prices, provided that such prices will not be less than \$980.00 per \$1,000 principal amount note or more than \$1,000 per \$1,000 principal amount note. Accordingly, there is a risk that the price you pay for the notes will be higher than the prices paid by other investors based on the date and time you make your purchase, from whom you purchase the notes (e.g., directly from JPMS or through a broker or dealer), any related transaction cost (e.g., any brokerage commission), whether you hold your notes in a brokerage account, a fiduciary or fee-based account or another type of account and other market factors beyond our control.
- **TAX DISCLOSURE** – The information under “Tax Treatment” in this term sheet remains subject to confirmation by our tax counsel. We will notify you of any revisions to the information under “Tax Treatment” in a supplement to this term sheet on or before the business day immediately preceding the issue date, or if the information cannot be confirmed by our tax counsel, we may terminate this offering of Notes.
