General

- The notes are designed for investors who seek a Contingent Interest Payment with respect to each Review Date for which the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock is greater than or equal to 75% of the Initial Stock Price, which we refer to as the Interest Barrier. In addition, if the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any Review Date (other than the final Review Date) is greater than or equal to the Initial Stock Price, the notes will be automatically called. Investors in the notes should be willing to accept the risk of losing some or all of their principal and the risk that no Contingent Interest Payment may be made with respect to some or all Review Dates.
- Investors should be willing to forgo fixed interest and dividend payments, in exchange for the opportunity to receive a Contingent Interest Payment with respect to each Review Date for which the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock is greater than or equal to the Interest Barrier. **Any payment on the notes is subject to the credit risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co.**
- The first Review Date, and therefore the earliest date on which an automatic call may be initiated, is November 15, 2012.
- Unsecured and unsubordinated obligations of JPMorgan Chase & Co. maturing August 28, 2013[†]
- Minimum denominations of \$10,000 and integral multiples of \$1,000 in excess thereof

Key Terms

Reference Stock:	The common stock, par value \$2.50 per share, of Halliburton Company (New York Stock Exchange symbol "HAL"). We refer to Halliburton Company as "Halliburton."
Contingent Interest Payments:	If the notes have not been previously called and the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any Review Date is greater than or equal to the Interest Barrier, you will receive on the applicable Interest Payment Date for each \$1,000 principal amount note a Contingent Interest Payment equal to \$38.625 (equivalent to an interest rate of 15.45% per annum, payable at a rate of 3.8625% per quarter). <i>If the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any Review Date is less than the Interest Barrier, no Contingent Interest Payment will be made with respect to that Review Date.</i>

Recent Developments

On July 13, 2012, we reported that we had reached a determination to restate our previously filed interim financial statements for the first quarter of 2012 and that our previously filed interim financial statements for the first quarter of 2012 should not be relied upon. The restatement will have the effect of reducing our reported net income for the 2012 first quarter by \$459 million. The restatement relates to valuations of certain positions in the synthetic credit portfolio of our Chief Investment Office. Our principal transactions revenue, total net revenue and net income for the first six months of 2012, and the principal transactions revenue, total net revenue and net income of our Chief Investment Office for the first six months of 2012, will remain unchanged as a result of the restatement.

We also reported, on July 13, 2012, management's determination that a material weakness existed in our internal control over financial reporting at March 31, 2012. During the first quarter of 2012, the size and characteristics of the synthetic credit portfolio changed significantly. These changes had a negative impact on the effectiveness of our Chief Investment Office's internal controls over valuation of the synthetic credit portfolio. Management has taken steps to remediate the internal control deficiencies, including enhancing management oversight over valuation matters. The control deficiencies were substantially remediated by June 30, 2012. For further discussion, please see Item 4.02(a) of our Current Report on Form 8-K dated July 13, 2012.

The reported trading losses have led to heightened regulatory scrutiny, and any future losses related to these positions and the material weakness in our internal control over financial reporting may lead to additional regulatory or legal proceedings against us and may adversely affect our credit ratings and credit spreads and, as a result, the market value of the notes. See Item 4.02(a) of our Current Report on Form 8-K dated July 13, 2012 and "Selected Risk Considerations — Credit Risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co." in this term sheet for further discussion.

What Are the Payments on the Notes, Assuming a Range of Performances for the Reference Stock?

The following table illustrates payments on the notes, assuming a range of performance for the Reference Stock on a given Review Date. The hypothetical payments set forth below assume an Initial Stock Price of \$34.00, an Interest Barrier and a Trigger Level of \$25.50 (equal to 75% of the hypothetical Initial Stock Price) and reflect the Interest Rate of 15.45% per annum (payable at a rate of 3.8625% per quarter). Each hypothetical payment set forth below is for illustrative purposes only and may not be the actual payment applicable to a purchaser of the notes. Hypothetical Examples of Amounts Payable on the Notes

The following examples illustrate how a payment set forth in the table above is calculated.

Example 1: The closing price of one share of the Reference Stock increases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a closing price of \$37.40 on the first Review Date. Because the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on the first Review Date is greater than the Interest Barrier, the investor is entitled to receive a Contingent Interest Payment in connection with the first Review Date. In addition, because the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on the first Review Date is greater than the Initial Stock Price, the notes are automatically called. Accordingly, the investor receives a payment of \$1,038.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note on the relevant Call Settlement Date, consisting of a Contingent Interest Payment of \$38.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note and repayment of principal equal to \$1,000 per \$1,000 principal amount note.

Example 2: The closing price of one share of the Reference Stock decreases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a closing price of \$20.40 on the first Review Date and \$28.90 on the second Review Date and increases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a closing price of \$37.40 on the third Review Date. Because the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on the first Review Date is less than the Interest Barrier, no Contingent Interest Payment is made in connection with the first Review Date; however, the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on each of the second and third Review Dates is greater than the Interest Barrier, so the investor is entitled to receive a Contingent Interest Payment in connection with each of the second and third Review Dates. In addition, because the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on the third Review Date is greater than the Initial Stock Price, the notes are automatically called. Accordingly, the investor receives a payment of \$38.625 in connection with the second Review Date and a payment of \$1,038.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note on the relevant Call Settlement Date, consisting of a Contingent Interest Payment of \$38.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note and repayment of principal equal to \$1,000 per \$1,000 principal amount note, in connection with the third

Review Date. Accordingly, the total amount paid on the notes over the term of the notes is \$1,077.25 per \$1,000 principal amount note.

Example 3: The notes are not automatically called prior to maturity, Contingent Interest Payments are paid in connection with each of the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock increases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a Final Stock Price of \$44.20. The investor receives a payment of \$38.625 in connection with each of the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and, because the notes are not automatically called prior to maturity and the Final Stock Price is greater than the Trigger Level and the Interest Barrier, the investor receives at maturity a payment of \$1,038.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note, consisting of a Contingent Interest Payment of \$38.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note and repayment of principal equal to \$1,000 per \$1,000 principal amount note. The total amount paid on the notes over the term of the notes is \$1,154.50 per \$1,000 principal amount note. ***This represents the maximum total payment an investor may receive over the term of the notes.***

Example 4: The notes are not automatically called prior to maturity, Contingent Interest Payments are paid in connection with two of the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock decreases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a Final Stock Price of \$25.50. The investor receives two payments of \$38.625 in connection with two of the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and, because the notes are not automatically called prior to maturity and the Final Stock Price is equal to the Trigger Level and the Interest Barrier, even though the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price, the investor receives at maturity a payment of \$1,038.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note, consisting of a Contingent Interest Payment of \$38.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note and repayment of principal equal to \$1,000 per \$1,000 principal amount note. The total amount paid on the notes over the term of the notes is \$1,115.875 per \$1,000 principal amount note.

Example 5: The notes are not automatically called prior to maturity, Contingent Interest Payments are paid in connection with each of the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock decreases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a Final Stock Price of \$20.40. The investor receives a payment of \$38.625 in connection with each of the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and, because the notes are not automatically called prior to maturity and the Final Stock Price is less than the Trigger Level and the Interest Barrier, the investor receives at maturity a payment of \$600 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times -40\%) = \$600$$

The total amount paid on the notes over the term of the notes is \$715.875 per \$1,000 principal amount note.

Example 6: The notes are not automatically called prior to maturity, no Contingent Interest Payments are paid in connection with the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock decreases from the Initial Stock Price of \$34 to a Final Stock Price of \$17. Because the notes are not automatically called prior to maturity, no Contingent Interest Payments are paid in connection with the Review Dates preceding the final Review Date and the Final Stock Price is less than the Trigger Level and the Interest Barrier, the investor receives no payments over the term of the notes, other than a payment at maturity of \$500 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times -50\%) = \$500$$

The hypothetical payments on the notes shown above do not reflect fees or expenses that would be associated with any sale in the secondary market. If these fees and expenses were included, the hypothetical payments shown above would likely be lower.

Selected Purchase Considerations

- **QUARTERLY CONTINGENT INTEREST PAYMENTS** — The notes offer the potential to earn a Contingent Interest Payment in connection with each quarterly Review Date of \$38.625 per \$1,000 principal amount note (equivalent to an interest rate of 15.45% per annum, payable at a rate of 3.8625% per quarter). If the notes have not been previously called and the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any Review Date is greater than or equal to the Interest Barrier, you will receive a Contingent Interest Payment on the applicable Interest Payment Date. If the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any Review Date is less than the Interest Barrier, no Contingent Interest Payment will be made with respect to that Review Date. If payable, a Contingent Interest Payment will be made to the holders of record at the close of business on the business day immediately preceding the applicable Interest Payment Date. **Because the notes are our unsecured and unsubordinated obligations, payment of any amount on the notes is subject to our ability to pay our obligations as they become due.**
- **POTENTIAL EARLY EXIT AS A RESULT OF THE AUTOMATIC CALL FEATURE** — If the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any Review Date (other than the final Review Date) is greater than or equal to the Initial Stock Price, your notes will be automatically called prior to the maturity date. Under these circumstances, on the applicable Call Settlement Date, for each \$1,000 principal amount note, you will receive (a) \$1,000 *plus* (b) the Contingent Interest Payment applicable to that Review Date, payable on the applicable Call Settlement Date.
- **THE NOTES DO NOT GUARANTEE THE RETURN OF YOUR PRINCIPAL IF THE NOTES ARE NOT AUTOMATICALLY CALLED** — If the notes are not automatically called, we will pay you your principal back at maturity so long as the Final Stock Price is greater than or equal to the Trigger Level. However, if the notes are not automatically called and the Initial Stock Price is less than the Trigger Level, you will lose more than 25% of your principal amount and could lose up to the entire principal amount of your notes.
- **RETURN LINKED TO A SINGLE REFERENCE STOCK** — The return on the notes is linked to the performance of a single Reference Stock, which is the common stock of Halliburton. For additional information see “The Reference Stock” in this term sheet.
- **TAX TREATMENT** — You should review carefully the section entitled “Material U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences” in the accompanying product supplement no. 20-I. In determining our reporting responsibilities we intend to treat (i) the notes for U.S. federal income tax purposes as prepaid forward contracts with associated contingent coupons and (ii) any Contingent Interest Payments as ordinary income, as described in the section entitled “Material U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences — Tax Consequences to U.S. Holders — Tax Treatment as Prepaid Forward Contracts with Associated Contingent Coupons” in the accompanying product supplement no. 20-I. Based on the advice of Davis Polk & Wardwell LLP, our special tax counsel, we believe that this is a reasonable treatment, but that there are other reasonable treatments that the Internal Revenue Service (the “IRS”) or a court may adopt, in which case the timing and character of any income or loss on the notes could be significantly and adversely affected. In addition, in 2007 Treasury and the IRS released a notice requesting comments on the U.S. federal income tax treatment of “prepaid forward contracts” and similar instruments, which might include the notes. The notice focuses in particular on whether to require holders of these instruments to accrue income over the term of their investment. It also asks for comments on a number of related topics, including the character of income or loss with respect to these instruments and the relevance of factors such as the nature of the underlying property to which the instruments are linked. While the notice requests comments on appropriate transition rules and effective dates, any Treasury regulations or other guidance promulgated after consideration of these issues could materially and adversely affect the tax consequences of an investment in the notes, possibly with retroactive effect. You should consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of an investment in the notes, including possible alternative treatments and the issues presented by this notice.

The U.S. federal income tax treatment of Contingent Interest Payments is uncertain, and although we believe it is reasonable to conclude that Contingent Interest Payments are not subject to U.S. withholding tax (at least if a Form W-8 is provided), a withholding agent may nonetheless withhold on these payments (generally at a rate of 30%, subject to the possible reduction or elimination of that rate under an applicable income tax treaty), unless income from your notes is effectively connected with your conduct of a trade or business in the United States.

Non-U.S. Holders - Additional Tax Consideration

Non-U.S. Holders should note that recently proposed Treasury regulations, if finalized in their current form, could impose a withholding tax at a rate of 30% (subject to reduction under an applicable income tax treaty) on amounts attributable to U.S.-source dividends (including, potentially, adjustments to account for extraordinary dividends) that are paid or “deemed paid” after December 31, 2012 under certain financial instruments, if certain other conditions are met. While significant aspects of the application of these proposed regulations to the notes are uncertain, if these proposed regulations were finalized in their current form, we (or other withholding agents) might determine that withholding is required with respect to notes held by a Non-U.S. Holder or that the Non-U.S. Holder must provide information to establish that withholding is not required. If withholding is so required, we will not be required to pay any additional amounts with respect to amounts so withheld.

If you are not a United States person, you are urged to consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of an investment in the notes in light of your particular circumstances and the potential application of the proposed regulations discussed in the preceding paragraph.

Selected Risk Considerations

An investment in the notes involves significant risks. Investing in the notes is not equivalent to investing directly in the Reference Stock. These risks are explained in more detail in the “Risk Factors” section of the accompanying product supplement no. 20-I dated January 5, 2012.

10-Q for the quarter ended March 31, 2012. *When making an investment decision to purchase the notes, you should not rely on our interim financial statements for the first quarter of 2012 until we file an amendment to our Quarterly Report on Form 10-Q for the quarter ended March 31, 2012.* See “Recent Developments” in this term sheet and Item 4.02(a) of our Current Report on Form 8-K dated July 13, 2012.

- **YOUR INVESTMENT IN THE NOTES MAY RESULT IN A LOSS** — The notes do not guarantee any return of principal. If the notes are not automatically called, we will pay you your principal back at maturity only if the Final Stock Price is greater than or equal to the Trigger Level. If the notes are not automatically called and the Final Stock Price is less than the Trigger Level, you will lose 1% of your principal amount at maturity for every 1% that the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price. Accordingly, under these circumstances, you will lose more than 25% of your principal amount and could lose up to the entire principal amount of your notes.
- **THE NOTES DO NOT GUARANTEE THE PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND MAY NOT PAY ANY INTEREST AT ALL** — The terms of the notes differ from those of conventional debt securities in that, among other things, whether we pay interest is linked to the performance of the Reference Stock. We will make a Contingent Interest Payment with respect to a Review Date only if the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on that Review Date is greater than or equal to the Interest Barrier. If the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on that Review Date is less than the Interest Barrier, no Contingent Interest Payment will be made with respect to that Review Date, and the Contingent Interest Payment that would otherwise have been payable with respect to that Review Date will not be accrued and subsequently paid. Accordingly, if the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on each Review Date is less than the Interest Barrier, you will not receive any interest payments over the term of the notes.
- **CREDIT RISK OF JPMORGAN CHASE & CO.** — The notes are subject to the credit risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co., and our credit ratings and credit spreads may adversely affect the market value of the notes. Investors are dependent on JPMorgan Chase & Co.’s ability to pay all amounts due on the notes, and therefore investors are subject to our credit risk and to changes in the market’s view of our creditworthiness. Any decline in our credit ratings or increase in the credit spreads charged by the market for taking our credit risk is likely to adversely affect the value of the notes. If we were to default on our payment obligations, you may not receive any amounts owed to you under the notes and you could lose your entire investment.

In particular, on June 21, 2012, Moody’s Investors Services downgraded our long-term senior debt rating to “A2” from “Aa3” as part of its review of 15 banks and securities firms with global capital markets operations. Moody’s also maintained its “negative” outlook on us, indicating the possibility of a further downgrade. In addition, on May 11, 2012, Fitch Ratings downgraded our long-term senior debt rating to “A+” from “AA-” and placed us on negative rating watch for a possible further downgrade, and Standard & Poor’s Ratings Services changed its outlook on us to “negative” from “stable,” indicating the possibility of a future downgrade. These downgrades may adversely affect our credit spreads and the market value of the notes. See “Risk Factors” in our annual report on Form 10-K for the year ended December 31, 2011.

In addition, on July 13, 2012, we reported that we had reached a determination to restate our previously filed interim financial statements for the first quarter of 2012. The restatement relates to valuations of certain positions in the synthetic credit portfolio of our Chief Investment Office. We also reported, on July 13, 2012, management’s determination that a material weakness existed in our internal control over financial reporting at March 31, 2012. The reported trading losses have led to heightened regulatory scrutiny, and any future losses related to these positions and the material weakness in our internal control over financial reporting may lead to additional regulatory or legal proceedings against us and may adversely affect our credit ratings and credit spreads and, as a result, the market value of the notes. See “Recent Developments” in this term sheet and Item 4.02(a) of our Current Report on Form 8-K dated July 13, 2012 for further discussion.

- **THE APPRECIATION POTENTIAL OF THE NOTES IS LIMITED, AND YOU WILL NOT PARTICIPATE IN ANY APPRECIATION IN THE PRICE OF THE REFERENCE STOCK** — The appreciation potential of the notes is limited to the sum of any Contingent Interest Payments that may be paid over the term of the notes, regardless of any appreciation in the price of the Reference Stock, which may be significant. You will not participate in any appreciation in the price of the Reference Stock. Accordingly, the return on the notes may be significantly less than the return on a direct investment in the Reference Stock during the term of the notes.
- **POTENTIAL CONFLICTS** — We and our affiliates play a variety of roles in connection with the issuance of the notes, including acting as calculation agent and hedging our obligations under the notes. In performing these duties, our economic interests and the economic interests of the calculation agent and other affiliates of ours are potentially adverse to your interests as an investor in the notes. In addition, our business activities, including hedging and trading activities, could cause our economic interests to be adverse to yours and could adversely affect any payment on the notes and the value of the notes. It is possible that hedging or trading activities of ours or our affiliates could result in substantial returns for us or our affiliates while the value of the notes declines. Please refer to “Risk Factors — Risks Relating to the Notes Generally” in the accompanying product supplement no. 20-I for additional information about these risks.

We and/or our affiliates may also currently or from time to time engage in business with Halliburton, including extending loans to, or making equity investments in, Halliburton or providing advisory services to Halliburton. In addition, one or more of our affiliates may publish research reports or otherwise express opinions with respect to Halliburton, and these reports may or may not recommend that investors buy or hold the Reference Stock. As a prospective purchaser of the notes, you should undertake an independent investigation of the Reference Stock issuer that in your judgment is appropriate to make an informed decision with respect to an investment in the notes.

- **THE BENEFIT PROVIDED BY THE TRIGGER LEVEL MAY TERMINATE ON THE FINAL REVIEW DATE** — If the Final Stock Price is less than the Trigger Level, the benefit provided by the Trigger Level will terminate and you will be fully exposed to any depreciation in the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock. Because the Final Stock Price will be determined based on the closing price on a single day near the end of the term of the notes, the price of the Reference Stock at the

maturity date or at other times during the term of the notes could be greater than or equal to the Trigger Level. This difference could be particularly large if there is a significant decrease in the price of the Reference Stock during the later portion of the term of the notes or if there is significant volatility in the price of the Reference Stock during the term of the notes, especially on dates near the final Review Date.

- **THE AUTOMATIC CALL FEATURE MAY FORCE A POTENTIAL EARLY EXIT** — If the notes are automatically called, the amount of Contingent Interest Payments made on the notes may be less than the amount of Contingent Interest Payments that would have been payable if the notes were held to maturity, and, for each \$1,000 principal amount note, you will receive \$1,000 plus the Contingent Interest Payment applicable to the relevant Review Date.
- **REINVESTMENT RISK** — If your notes are automatically called, the term of the notes may be reduced to as short as three months and you will not receive any Contingent Interest Payments after the applicable Call Settlement Date. - **CERTAIN BUILT-IN COSTS ARE LIKELY TO AFFECT ADVERSELY THE VALUE OF THE NOTES PRIOR TO MATURITY** — While any payment on the notes described in this term sheet is based on the full principal amount of your notes, the original issue price of the notes includes the agent's commission and the estimated cost of hedging our obligations under the notes. This secondary market price will also be affected by a number of factors aside from the agent's commission and hedging costs, including those set forth under "Many Economic and Market Factors Will Impact the Value of the Notes" below.

The notes are not designed to be short-term trading instruments. Accordingly, you should be able and willing to hold your notes to maturity.

- **NO OWNERSHIP OR DIVIDEND RIGHTS IN THE REFERENCE STOCK** — As a holder of the notes, you will not have any ownership interest or rights in the Reference Stock, such as voting rights or dividend payments. In addition, the issuer of the Reference Stock will not have any obligation to consider your interests as a holder of the notes in taking any corporate action that might affect the value of the Reference Stock and the notes.
- **NO AFFILIATION WITH THE REFERENCE STOCK ISSUER** — We are not affiliated with the issuer of the Reference Stock. We have not independently verified any of the information about the Reference Stock issuer contained in this term sheet. You should undertake your own investigation into the Reference Stock and its issuer. We are not responsible for the Reference Stock issuer's public disclosure of information, whether contained in SEC filings or otherwise.

- **HEDGING AND TRADING IN THE REFERENCE STOCK** — While the notes are outstanding, we or any of our affiliates may carry out hedging activities related to the notes, including in the Reference Stock or instruments related to the Reference Stock. We or our affiliates may also trade in the Reference Stock or instruments related to the Reference Stock from time to time. Any of these hedging or trading activities as of the pricing date and during the term of the notes could adversely affect our payment to you at maturity. It is possible that these hedging or trading activities could result in substantial returns for us or our affiliates while the value of the notes declines.
- **THE ANTI-DILUTION PROTECTION FOR THE REFERENCE STOCK IS LIMITED AND MAY BE DISCRETIONARY** — The calculation agent will make adjustments to the Stock Adjustment Factor for certain corporate events affecting the Reference Stock. However, the calculation agent will not make an adjustment in response to all events that could affect the Reference Stock. If an event occurs that does not require the calculation agent to make an adjustment, the value of the notes may be materially and adversely affected. You should also be aware that the calculation agent may make adjustments in response to events that are not described in the accompanying product supplement to account for any diluting or concentrative effect, but the calculation agent is under no obligation to do so or to consider your interests as a holder of the notes in making these determinations.
- **MANY ECONOMIC AND MARKET FACTORS WILL IMPACT THE VALUE OF THE NOTES** — In addition to the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any day, the value of the notes will be impacted by a number of economic and market

factors that may either offset or magnify each other, including:

- the actual and expected volatility in the closing price of the Reference Stock;
- the time to maturity of the notes;
- whether the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock is less than the Interest Barrier and the Trigger Level on the relevant Review Date;
- the dividend rate on the Reference Stock;
- the occurrence of certain events affecting the issuer of the Reference Stock that may or may not require an adjustment to the Stock Adjustment Factor, including a merger or acquisition;
- interest and yield rates in the market generally;
- a variety of economic, financial, political, regulatory and judicial events; and
- our creditworthiness, including actual or anticipated downgrades in our credit ratings.

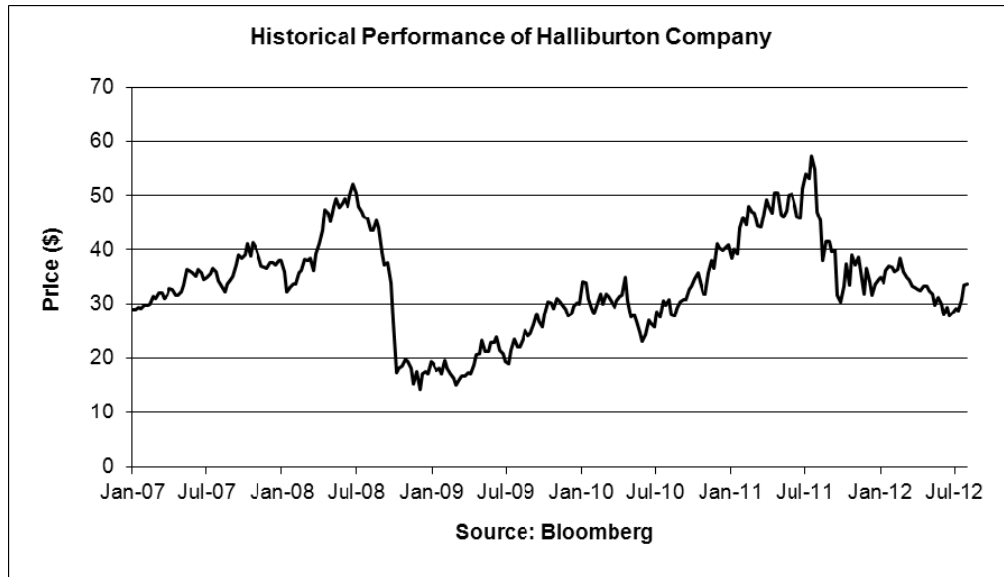
