General

Investors should be willing to forgo interest and dividend payments and, if the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price by more than 25.00%, be willing to lose some or all of their principal. Any payment on the notes is subject to the credit risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co.
- Unsecured and unsubordinated obligations of JPMorgan Chase & Co. maturing April 9, 2014†
- Minimum denominations of \$10,000 and integral multiples of \$1,000 in excess thereof

We urge you to consult your investment, legal, tax, accounting and other advisers before you invest in the notes.

What Is the Total Return on the Notes at Maturity, Assuming a Range of Performances for the Reference Stock?

The following table illustrates the hypothetical total return at maturity on the notes. The “total return” as used in this pricing supplement is the number, expressed as a percentage, that results from comparing the payment at maturity per \$1,000 principal amount note to \$1,000. The hypothetical total returns set forth below assume an Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 and reflect the Digital Return of 11.25% and the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%. The hypothetical total returns set forth below are for illustrative purposes only and may not be the actual total returns applicable to a purchaser of the notes. The numbers appearing in the following table and examples have been rounded for ease of analysis.

Hypothetical Examples of Amounts Payable at Maturity

The following examples illustrate how the total returns set forth in the table above are calculated.

Example 1: The closing price of one share of the Reference Stock increases from the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 to a Final Stock Price of \$11.6235. Because the Final Stock Price of \$11.6235 is greater than the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34, regardless of the Stock Return, the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$1,112.50 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times 11.25\%) = \$1,112.50$$

Example 2: The closing price of one share of the Reference Stock decreases from the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 to a Final Stock Price of \$10.773. Although the Final Stock Price of \$10.773 is less than the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34, because the Final Stock Price is not less than the Initial Stock Price by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$1,112.50 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times 11.25\%) = \$1,112.50$$

Example 3: The closing price of one share of the Reference Stock decreases from the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 to a Final Stock Price of \$5.67. Because the Final Stock Price of \$5.67 is less than the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00% and because the Stock Return is -50%, the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$500 per \$1,000 principal amount note, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times -50\%) = \$500$$

Example 4: The closing price of one share of the Reference Stock increases from the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 to a Final Stock Price of \$17.01. Because the Final Stock Price of \$17.01 is greater than the Initial Stock Price of \$11.34 and although the Stock Return of 50% is greater than the Digital Return of 11.25%, the investor receives a payment at maturity of \$1,112.50 per \$1,000 principal amount note, the maximum payment on the notes, calculated as follows:

$$\$1,000 + (\$1,000 \times 11.25\%) = \$1,112.50$$

The hypothetical returns and hypothetical payments on the notes shown above do not reflect fees or expenses that would be associated with any sale in the secondary market. If these fees and expenses were included, the hypothetical returns and hypothetical payments shown above would likely be lower.

Selected Purchase Considerations

- **FIXED APPRECIATION POTENTIAL** — If the Final Stock Price is greater than or equal to the Initial Stock Price, you will receive a fixed return equal to the Digital Return of 11.25% at maturity, which also reflects the maximum return on the notes at maturity. Accordingly, the maximum payment at maturity is \$1,112.50 per \$1,000 principal amount note. Because the notes are our unsecured and unsubordinated obligations, payment of any amount on the notes is subject to our ability to pay our obligations as they become due.
- **POTENTIAL FOR A FIXED RETURN ON THE NOTES EVEN EQUAL TO THE DIGITAL RETURN EVEN IF THE INDEX RETURN IS NEGATIVE** — If the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price by up to the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, you will earn a fixed, positive return on the notes equal to the Digital Return of 11.25%. If the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, for every 1% that the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price, you will lose an amount equal to 1% of the principal amount of your notes. Accordingly, under these circumstances, you will lose more than 25.00% of your initial investment and may lose all of your initial investment at maturity.
- **RETURN LINKED TO A SINGLE REFERENCE STOCK** — The return on the notes is linked to the performance of a single Reference Stock, which is the common stock of Bank of America. For additional information see “The Reference Stock” in this pricing supplement.
- **CAPITAL GAINS TAX TREATMENT** — You should review carefully the section entitled “Material U.S. Federal Income Tax Consequences” in the accompanying product supplement no. 4-I. The following discussion, when read in combination with that section, constitutes the full opinion of our special tax counsel, Davis Polk & Wardwell LLP, regarding the material U.S. federal income tax consequences of owning and disposing of notes.
Based on current market conditions, in the opinion of our special tax counsel it is reasonable to treat the notes as “open transactions” that are not debt instruments for U.S. federal income tax purposes. Assuming this treatment is respected, the gain or loss on your notes should be treated as long-term capital gain or loss if you hold your notes for more than a year, whether or not you are an initial purchaser of notes at the issue price. However, the Internal Revenue Service (the “IRS”) or a court may not respect this treatment of the notes, in which case the timing and character of any income or loss on the notes could be materially and adversely affected. In addition, in 2007 Treasury and the IRS released a notice requesting comments on the U.S. federal income tax treatment of “prepaid forward contracts” and similar instruments. The notice focuses in particular on whether to require investors in these instruments to accrue income over the term of their investment. It also asks for comments on a number of related topics, including the character of income or loss with respect to these instruments; the relevance of factors such as the nature of the underlying property to which the instruments are linked; the degree, if any, to which income (including any mandated accruals) realized by non-U.S. investors should be subject to withholding tax; and whether these instruments are or should be subject to the “constructive ownership” regime, which very generally can operate to recharacterize certain long-term capital gain as ordinary income and impose a notional interest charge. While the notice requests comments on appropriate transition rules and effective dates, any Treasury regulations or other guidance promulgated after consideration of these issues could materially and adversely affect the tax consequences of an investment in the notes, possibly with retroactive effect. You should consult your tax adviser regarding the U.S. federal income tax consequences of an investment in the notes, including possible alternative treatments and the issues presented by this notice.

Non-U.S. Holders - Additional Tax Consideration

Non-U.S. Holders should note that recently proposed Treasury regulations, if finalized in their current form, could impose a withholding tax at a rate of 30% (subject to reduction under an applicable income tax treaty) on amounts attributable to U.S.-source dividends (including, potentially, adjustments to account for extraordinary dividends) that are paid or “deemed paid” after December 31, 2013 under certain financial instruments, if certain other conditions are met. While significant aspects of the application of these proposed regulations to the notes are uncertain, if these proposed regulations were finalized in their current form, we (or other withholding agents) might determine that withholding is required with respect to notes held by a Non-U.S. Holder or that the Non-U.S. Holder must provide information to establish that withholding is not required. Non-U.S. Holders should consult their tax advisers regarding the potential application of these proposed regulations. If withholding is required, we will not be required to pay any additional amounts with respect to amounts so withheld.

Selected Risk Considerations

An investment in the notes involves significant risks. Investing in the notes is not equivalent to investing directly in the Reference Stock. These risks are explained in more detail in the “Risk Factors” section of the accompanying product supplement no. 4-I dated November 14, 2011.

- **YOUR INVESTMENT IN THE NOTES MAY RESULT IN A LOSS** — The notes do not guarantee any return of principal. The return on the notes at maturity is linked to the performance of the Reference Stock and will depend on whether, and the extent to which, the Stock Return is positive or negative. If the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, the benefit provided by the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00% will terminate. In this case, for every 1% that the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price, you will lose an amount equal to 1% of the principal amount of your notes. Under these circumstances, you will lose more than 25.00% of your initial investment and may lose all of your initial investment at maturity.
- **YOUR MAXIMUM GAIN ON THE NOTES IS LIMITED TO THE DIGITAL RETURN** — If the Final Stock Price is greater than or equal to the Initial Stock Price or is less than the Initial Stock Price by up to the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, for each \$1,000 principal amount note, you will receive at maturity \$1,000 plus a fixed return equal to the Digital Return of 11.25%, regardless of any appreciation in the Reference Stock, which may be significant.
- **CREDIT RISK OF JPMORGAN CHASE & CO.** — The notes are subject to the credit risk of JPMorgan Chase & Co., and our credit ratings and credit spreads may adversely affect the market value of the notes. Investors are dependent on JPMorgan Chase & Co.’s ability to pay all amounts due on the notes, and therefore investors are subject to our credit risk and to changes in the market’s view of our creditworthiness. Any decline in our credit ratings or increase in the credit spreads charged by the market for taking our credit risk is likely to adversely affect the value of the notes. If we were to default on our payment obligations, you may not receive any amounts owed to you under the notes and you could lose your entire investment.
- **POTENTIAL CONFLICTS** — We and our affiliates play a variety of roles in connection with the issuance of the notes, including acting as calculation agent and hedging our obligations under the notes. In performing these duties, our economic interests and the economic interests of the calculation agent and other affiliates of ours are potentially adverse to your interests as an investor in the notes. In addition, our business activities, including hedging and trading

activities, could cause our economic interests to be adverse to yours and could adversely affect any payment on the notes and the value of the notes. It is possible that hedging or trading activities of ours or our affiliates could result in substantial returns for us or our affiliates while the value of the notes declines. Please refer to “Risk Factors — Risks Relating to the Notes Generally” in the accompanying product supplement no. 4-I for additional information about these risks.

We and/or our affiliates may also currently or from time to time engage in business with Reference Stock issuer, including extending loans to, or making equity investments in, Reference Stock issuer or providing advisory services to Reference Stock issuer. In addition, one or more of our affiliates may publish research reports or otherwise express opinions with respect to Reference Stock issuer, and these reports may or may not recommend that investors buy or hold the Reference Stock. As a prospective purchaser of the notes, you should undertake an independent investigation of the Reference Stock issuer that in your judgment is appropriate to make an informed decision with respect to an investment in the notes.

- **THE BENEFIT PROVIDED BY THE CONTINGENT BUFFER MAY TERMINATE ON THE OBSERVATION DATE** — If the Final Stock Price is less than the Initial Stock Price by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, the benefit provided by the Contingent Buffer Amount will terminate and you will be fully exposed to any depreciation in the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock. Because the Final Stock Price will be determined based on the closing price on a single day near the end of the term of the notes, the price of the Reference Stock at the maturity date or at other times during the term of the notes could be at a level not less than the Initial Stock Price by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount. This difference could be particularly large if there is a significant decrease in the price of the Reference Stock during the later portion of the term of the notes or if there is significant volatility in the price of the Reference Stock during the term of the notes, especially on dates near the Observation Date.
- **CERTAIN BUILT-IN COSTS ARE LIKELY TO AFFECT ADVERSELY THE VALUE OF THE NOTES PRIOR TO MATURITY** — While any payment on the notes described in this pricing supplement is based on the full principal amount of your notes, the original issue price of the notes includes the agent’s commission and the estimated cost of hedging our obligations under the notes. As a result, and as a general matter, the price, if any, at which J.P. Morgan Securities LLC, which we refer to as JPMS, will be willing to purchase notes from you in secondary market transactions, if at all, will likely be lower than the original issue price and any sale prior to the maturity date could result in a substantial loss to you. This secondary market price will also be affected by a number of factors aside from the agent’s commission and hedging costs, including those set forth under “Many Economic and Market Factors Will Impact the Value of the Notes” below. The notes are not designed to be short-term trading instruments. Accordingly, you should be able and willing to hold your notes to maturity.
- **NO OWNERSHIP OR DIVIDEND RIGHTS IN THE REFERENCE STOCK** — As a holder of the notes, you will not have any ownership interest or rights in the Reference Stock, such as voting rights or dividend payments. In addition, the issuer of the Reference Stock will not have any obligation to consider your interests as a holder of the notes in taking any corporate action that might affect the value of the Reference Stock and the notes.
- **NO AFFILIATION WITH THE REFERENCE STOCK ISSUER** — We are not affiliated with the issuer of the Reference Stock. We have not independently verified any of the information about the Reference Stock issuer contained in this pricing supplement. You should undertake your own investigation into the Reference Stock and its issuer. We are not responsible for the Reference Stock issuer’s public disclosure of information, whether contained in SEC filings or otherwise.
- **SINGLE STOCK RISK** — The price of the Reference Stock can fall sharply due to factors specific to the Reference Stock and its issuer, such as stock price volatility, earnings, financial conditions, corporate, industry and regulatory developments, management changes and decisions and other events, as well as general market factors, such as general stock market volatility and levels, interest rates and economic and political conditions.
- **NO INTEREST PAYMENTS** — As a holder of the notes, you will not receive any interest payments.
- **RISK OF THE FINAL STOCK PRICE BEING LESS THAN THE INITIAL STOCK PRICE BY MORE THAN THE CONTINGENT BUFFER AMOUNT IS GREATER IF THE CLOSING PRICE OF THE REFERENCE STOCK IS VOLATILE** — The likelihood that the Final Stock Price will be less than the Initial Stock Price by more than the Contingent Buffer Amount of 25.00%, thereby exposing the notes to the full depreciation of the Reference Stock, will depend in large part on the volatility of the closing price of the Reference Stock. Volatility generally refers to the frequency and magnitude of changes in the closing price of the Reference Stock.
- **LACK OF LIQUIDITY** — The notes will not be listed on any securities exchange. JPMS intends to offer to purchase the notes in the secondary market but is not required to do so. Even if there is a secondary market, it may not provide enough liquidity to allow you to trade or sell the notes easily. Because other dealers are not likely to make a secondary market for the notes, the price at which you may be able to trade your notes is likely to depend on the price, if any, at which JPMS is willing to buy the notes.
- **HEDGING AND TRADING IN THE REFERENCE STOCK** — While the notes are outstanding, we or any of our affiliates may carry out hedging activities related to the notes, including in the Reference Stock or instruments related to the Reference Stock. We or our affiliates may also trade in the Reference Stock or instruments related to the Reference Stock from time to time. Any of these hedging or trading activities as of the pricing date and during the term of the notes could adversely affect our payment to you at maturity. It is possible that these hedging or trading activities could result in substantial returns for us or our affiliates while the value of the notes declines.
- **THE ANTI-DILUTION PROTECTION FOR THE REFERENCE STOCK IS LIMITED AND MAY BE DISCRETIONARY** — The calculation agent will make adjustments to the Stock Adjustment Factor for certain corporate events affecting the Reference Stock. However, the calculation agent will not make an adjustment in response to all events that could affect the Reference Stock. If an event occurs that does not require the calculation agent to make an adjustment, the value of the notes may be materially and adversely affected. You should also be aware that the calculation agent may make adjustments in response to events that are not described in the accompanying product supplement to account for any diluting or concentrative effect, but the calculation agent is under no obligation to do so or to consider your interests as a holder of the notes in making these determinations.
- **MANY ECONOMIC AND MARKET FACTORS WILL IMPACT THE VALUE OF THE NOTES** — In addition to the closing price of one share of the Reference Stock on any day, the value of the notes will be impacted by a number of economic and market factors that may either offset or magnify each other, including:
 - the actual and expected volatility in the closing price of the Reference Stock;
 - the time to maturity of the notes;
 - the dividend rate on the Reference Stock;
 - the occurrence of certain events affecting the issuer of the Reference Stock that may or may not require an adjustment to the Stock Adjustment Factor, including a merger or acquisition;
 - interest and yield rates in the market generally;
 - a variety of economic, financial, political, regulatory and judicial events; and
 - our creditworthiness, including actual or anticipated downgrades in our credit ratings.

Public Information

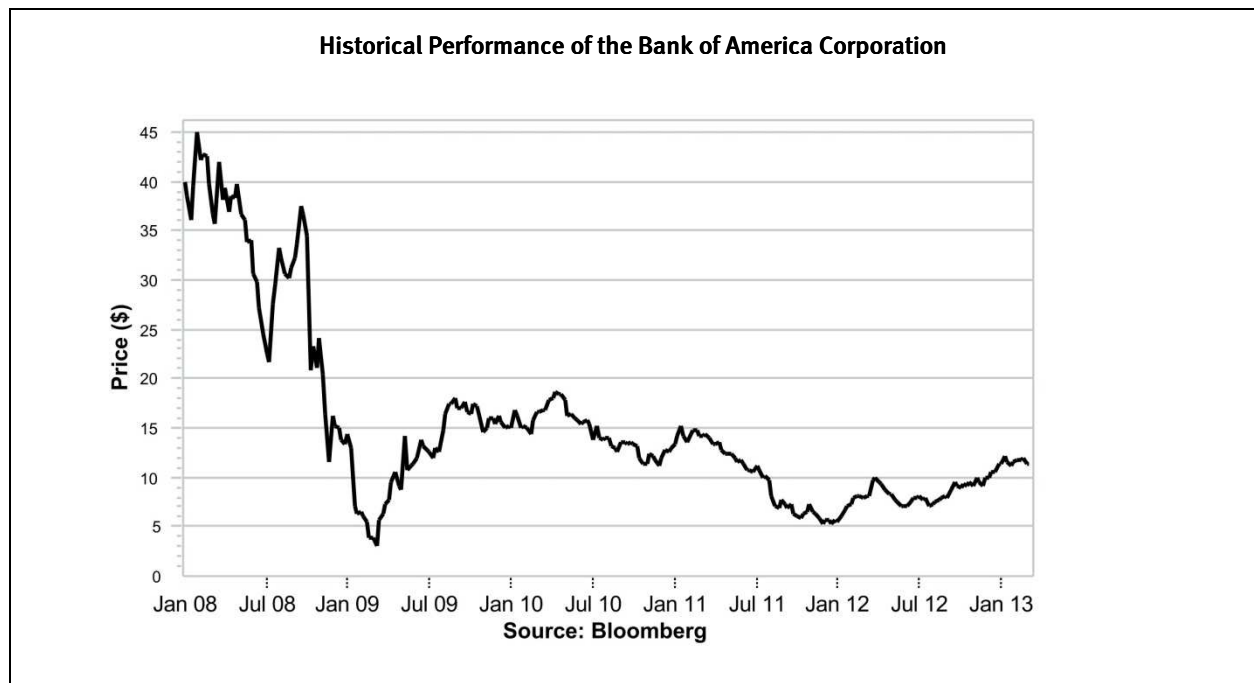

The common stock of Bank of America, par value \$0.01 per share, is registered under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended, which we refer to as the Exchange Act, and is listed on New York Stock Exchange, which we refer to as the relevant exchange for purposes of Bank of America in the accompanying product supplement no. 4-l. We do not make any representation that these publicly available documents are accurate or complete.

Historical Information Regarding the Reference Stock

The following graph sets forth the historical performance of the common stock of Bank of America based on the weekly closing prices of one share of the common stock of Bank of America from January 4, 2008 through March 1, 2013. The closing price of one share of the common stock of Bank of America on March 1, 2013 was \$11.34. We obtained the closing prices below from Bloomberg Financial Markets, without independent verification.
