



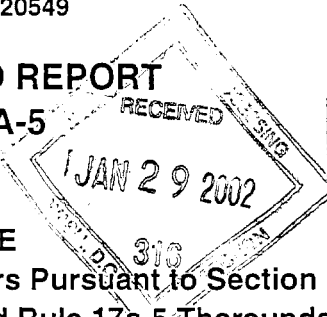



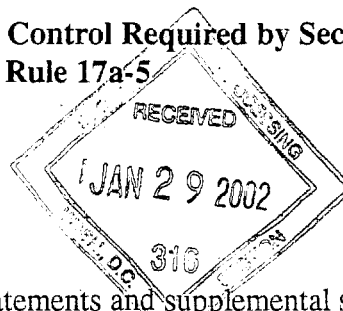

## Report of Independent Accountants on Internal Control Required by Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 17a-5



To the Member of Panttechnica, LLC:

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplemental schedule of Panttechnica, LLC (the "Company") for the year ended November 30, 2001, we considered its internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "SEC"), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including tests of compliance with such practices and procedures, that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g) in the following:

1. Making the periodic computations of aggregate debits and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11); and
2. Determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3.

Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making the quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons, and the recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13;
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System; and
3. Obtaining and maintaining physical possession or control of all fully paid and excess margin securities of customers as required by Rule 15c3-3;

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance

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that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, errors or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of internal control to future periods is subject to the risk that controls may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

Our consideration of internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the specific internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, we noted no matters involving internal control, including procedures for safeguarding securities, that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at November 30, 2001 to meet the SEC's objectives.

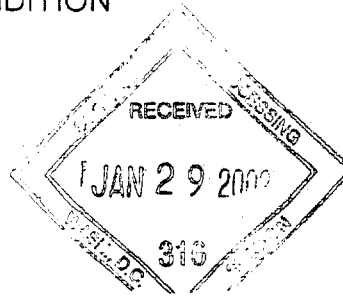

NOTES to STATEMENT of FINANCIAL CONDITION

1. Description of Business:

Panttechnica, LLC (the "Company") is a registered broker-dealer. The company operates as a wholly-owned subsidiary of Spear, Leeds & Kellogg ("SLK"). SLK, a registered broker-dealer and futures commission merchant, is a partnership whose sole general partner is SLK LLC, a limited liability company whose sole member is a wholly owned subsidiary of The Goldman Sachs Group Inc. ("Group"). The Company's business is proprietary trading.

2. Significant Accounting Policies:

The statement of financial condition is prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, which require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the statement of financial condition and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

All securities transactions and related revenues and expenses are recorded on a trade-date basis. Securities owned or sold, but not yet purchased are recorded at market value, with unrealized gains and losses reflected in income.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities (consisting primarily of receivable from clearing broker) are considered to approximate their carrying amounts because they are short-term in nature.

The Company is exempt from the provisions of SEC Rule 15c3-3 under paragraph (k)(2)(ii).

3. Related Party Transactions:

The Company incurs a management fee for general and administrative services provided by SLK. At November 30, 2001, management fee payable to SLK was \$56,000 and is included in due to member in the statement of financial condition.

The receivable from clearing broker represents a trading account the Company maintains at SLK, which has a cash balance of \$1,310,000 as of November 30, 2001.

4. Net Capital Requirement:

As a registered broker-dealer, the Company is subject to Rule 15c3-1 of the Securities and Exchange Commission, which specifies uniform minimum net capital requirements, as defined, for their registrants. The Company computes net capital based upon the basic method, which requires that the Company maintain net capital, as defined, of 6-2/3% of aggregate indebtedness, as defined, or \$100,000, whichever is greater. At November 30, 2001, the Company had net capital of \$1,201,000 which exceeded requirements of \$100,000 by \$1,101,000.
