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



Reports on Internal Control Required by SEC Rule 17a-5

In planning and performing my audit of the financial statements of Starshak Welnhofner & Co., for the year ended December 31, 2001, I considered its internal control structure, including procedures for safeguarding securities, in order to determine my auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing my opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

I also made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company that I considered relevant to the objectives stated in SEC Rule 17a-5(g), in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11) and the procedures for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3. I did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in making the quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications and comparisons, and the recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13 or in complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, because the Company does not carry security accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the Commission's above mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of an internal control structure and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Starshak Welnhofner & Co. (continued)

Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure or the practices and procedures referred to above, errors or irregularities may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

My consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of the specific internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, I noted no matters involving the internal control structure, including procedures for safeguarding securities, that I consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

I understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the Commission to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on my study, I believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2001, to meet the Commission's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the use of management, the Securities and Exchange Commission, National Association of Securities Dealers and other regulatory agencies which rely on Rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and should not be used for any other purpose.

For the Year Ended December 31, 2001Note 1 - Significant accounting policiesIndustry and background

Starshak Welnhofer & Co., ("SW & Co.") was originally incorporated in the State of Illinois on February 9, 1990 as Mayflower Partners & Co. On May 7, 1991 the Board of Directors passed a resolution changing the name to Starmann Starshak Welnhofer & Co. On June 26, 1998 the Board of Directors passed another resolution changing the name to Starshak Welnhofer & Co. "SW & Co." is a private investment banking firm primarily established to provide financial advisory services and also to represent as an independent intermediary for friendly negotiated transactions. These include corporate finance engagements in which companies seek to raise outside capital for various purposes, and acquisitions or divestitures of businesses. "SW & Co." is a member of the National Association of Securities Dealers, and is a registered broker/dealer with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Accounts Receivable

Management believes all accounts receivable are current and collectible. Therefore, the corporation has not included a provision for uncollectible accounts. Any accounts deemed to be uncollectible will be charged to expense when that determination is made. There were no uncollectible accounts for the year ended December 31, 2001.

Investment banking income

Investment banking income is recorded as follows: management fees on offering date, sales concessions on settlement date, and underwriting fees at the time the underwriting is completed and the income is reasonably determinable.

Depreciation and amortization

Fixed assets are stated at cost. Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line method for financial statements and MACRS (Modified Accelerated cost recovery system) for tax reporting purposes over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets. Organizational cost is amortized over a period of sixty months.

Note 1 - Significant accounting policies (continued)

Income taxes

The Company elected to be taxed as an "S" Corporation pursuant to Subchapter S of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 for its initial taxable year and for its subsequent taxable years. The company does not directly pay any federal income tax. Corporate income is reported proportionately on the shareholder's individual income tax returns and the shareholders pay the tax. Accordingly, there is no provision for income taxes included in the financial statements.

Note 2 - Related party transactions

The Company entered into an annual management service agreement effective January 1, 1997 with Starshak & Associates, a related corporation insofar as the corporations have the same officers, directors, and shareholders. The agreement called for Starshak Welnhofler & Company to pay Starshak & Associates monthly management fees plus other reimbursable expenses including office rent. During 2001, total management fees paid was \$840,000 and the office rental reimbursement paid was \$59,624.

Note 3 - Net capital requirements

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (Rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital shall not exceed 15 to 1 (and NASD rule also provides that equity capital may not be withdrawn or cash dividends paid if the resulting net capital ratio would exceed 10 to 1). At December 31, 2001, the Company had net capital of \$82,039 which was \$77,039 in excess of its required net capital of \$5,000 and aggregate indebtedness of \$3,200.
