

NOTES TO STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL CONDITION as of September 30, 2002

1. Organization

Leader Investments, Inc. (the "Company") was incorporated in the State of Illinois on August 18, 1994. The Company is a registered securities broker-dealer with the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "SEC") and is a member of the National Association of Securities Dealers. The Company is also registered with the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (the "CFTC") as an Introducing Broker and is a member of the National Futures Association. The Company solicits and accepts orders to buy or sell securities, futures contracts and commodity options but does not accept money or other assets to support such orders.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Depreciation

Furniture, equipment and an automobile are being depreciated over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. For the year ended September 30, 2002, depreciation expense totaled \$8,450.

Income Taxes

The Company provides for taxes in accordance with the Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 109, "Accounting for Income Taxes", which requires recognition of deferred tax liabilities and assets for the expected future tax consequences of events that have been included in the financial statements or tax returns. Under this method, deferred tax liabilities and assets are recognized based on the difference between the financial statement and tax basis of liabilities and assets using enacted tax rates.

Statement of Cash Flows

For the statement of cash flows, cash is defined as cash and cash equivalents with maturities of less than three months.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and the accompanying notes. Management determines that the estimates utilized in preparing financial statements are reasonable and prudent. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

3. Minimum Capital Requirements

The Company is subject to the SEC Uniform Net Capital Rule 15(c)3-1 and CFTC Regulation 1.17, and has elected to use the basic method as permitted by these rules. Under these rules, the Company is required to maintain "net capital" equal to \$100,000. At September 30, 2002, the Company had net capital and net capital requirements of \$804,465, and \$100,000, respectively.

4. Loan Payable

The Company has an automobile loan payable that bears interest at 0.90% and is due in December 2003. At September 30, 2002 the unpaid balance on this loan totaled \$17,392.

5. Related Party Transactions

At September 30, 2002, the Company had a loan receivable from an employee totaling \$13,750. Additionally, the Company had a receivable from an affiliate related by common ownership totaling \$20,549.

The Company charges another affiliate related by common ownership for management services provided and for certain shared expenses. At September 30, 2002, the Company had a receivable from this affiliate totaling \$52,256. During the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002, the Company charged this affiliate \$240,000 and \$320,379, respectively, for management services provided and for certain shared expenses. These amounts are reflected in the statement of operations as other income.

At September 30, 2002, the Company had payables to two other affiliates related by common ownership totaling \$12,512.

6. Concentration of Credit Risk

At September 30, 2002, a significant credit concentration consisted of cash deposited in a bank account that exceeded federally insured limits by approximately \$646,000, which represents approximately 59% of the Company's equity.

7. Subsequent Event

On October 23, 2002, the Company's application to become a futures commission merchant was approved by the CFTC. As a result, the Company is subject to increased net capital requirements with a minimum net capital requirement of \$250,000.

**INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT
ON INTERNAL CONTROL**

To the Stockholders of
Leader Investments, Inc.

In planning and performing our audit of the statement of financial condition of Leader Investments, Inc. (the "Company") as of September 30, 2002, we considered its internal control structure, including procedures for safeguarding customer and firm assets, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statement and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

Also, as required by rule 17A-5(g)(1) of the Securities Exchange Commission (the "SEC"), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in 17a-5(g), in the following:

1. Making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11) and the reserve required by rule 15c3-3(e)
2. Making the quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons, and the recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System
4. Obtaining and maintaining physical possession or control of a fully paid and excess margin securities of customers as required by rule 15c3-3

In addition, as required by Regulation 1.16(d) of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (the "CFTC"), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Regulation 1.17. We did not perform any testwork on the daily computations of the segregation requirements of section 4d(2) of the Commodity Exchange Act and the regulations thereunder, and the segregation of funds based on such computations or the daily computations of the foreign futures and foreign options secured amount requirements pursuant to regulation 30.7 of the Commission since the Company did not handle any customer cash or securities during 2002.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures, and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's and the CFTC's above-mentioned objectives.

Two of the objectives of an internal control structure and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principals. Rule 17a-5(g) and Regulation 1.16(d)(2) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.


Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure or the practices and procedures referred to above, errors or irregularities may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of the specific internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, we noted no matters involving the internal control structure, including procedures for safeguarding securities, that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC and the CFTC to be adequate for their purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and the Commodity Exchange Act and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at September 30, 2002 to meet the Commission's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the SEC, the CFTC, and other regulatory agencies that rely on rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 or Regulation 1.16(d) of the CFTC, and should not be used for any other purpose.
