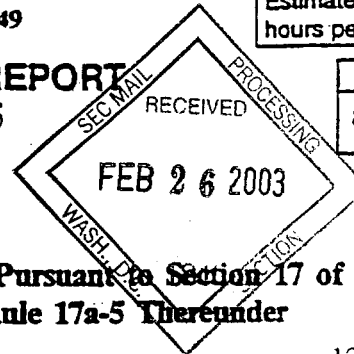

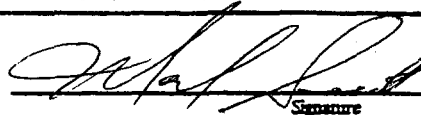

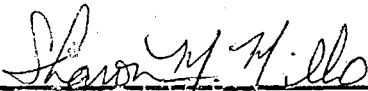

1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES. The Company has a clearing arrangement with Fiserv Securities, Inc. on a fully disclosed basis. The Company's customer accounts are carried on the books of the clearing broker. Commission income from securities transactions are recorded by the Company on a settlement date basis and clearing expenses recorded on a trade date basis. Other miscellaneous income is recorded when received by the Company.

Marketable securities are valued at market value and securities not readily marketable are valued at fair value by the Board of Directors. The resulting difference between cost & market (or fair value) is included in trading gains and losses.

Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis using estimated useful lives of five years.

2. INCOME TAXES. The Company from inception elected to be treated for federal and state income tax purposes as a Subchapter S corporation. No corporate income tax is recognized by the corporation and its shareholders' include their pro-rate share of the corporation's taxable income on their individual tax returns.

3. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENT LIABILITIES. According to Company management, there are no contingent liabilities, commitments or pending litigation against the Company.

4. RELATED PARTIES. The Company on February 1, 2001 entered into a net operating lease for office space located in Denville, New Jersey with its president and stockholder. The annual amount paid during the year of 2002 was \$21,989.02.

5. NET CAPITAL. The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission's Uniform Net Capital Rule (Rule 15c3-1) which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital of \$5,000 for 2002, and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1 for broker/dealers. As of December 31, 2002, the Company had net capital of \$23,709 was \$18,709 in excess of its 2002 net capital requirement of \$5,000.

6. CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK. The Company is engaged in various trading and brokerage activities in which counterparties primarily include broker-dealers, banks, and other financial institutions. In the event counterparties do not fulfill their obligations, the Company may be exposed to risk. The risk of default depends on the creditworthiness of the counterparty or issuer of the instrument. It is the Company's policy to review, as necessary, the credit standing of each counterparty.

In planning and performing my audit of the financial statements and supplemental schedules of Brentworth & Company, Inc. (the Company), for the year ended December 31, 2002 I considered its internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the consolidated financial statements and not to provide assurance on internal control.

Also, as required by rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), I have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company including tests of such practices and procedures that I considered relevant to the objectives stated in rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, I did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons
2. Recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected

benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

My consideration of internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of the specific internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, I noted no matters involving internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, that I consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

I understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, I believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2002, to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, NASD Regulations, Inc. and other regulatory agencies that rely on rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in

their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
