YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2002

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization - The Company was incorporated in the state of Illinois on January 30, 1987. The Company is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission and is a member of the National Association of Securities Dealers, Inc. The Company's principal business activity is the sale of securities. Operations began June 23, 1988.

Securities Transactions - Commission revenue and related expense arising from securities transactions are recorded on a trade date basis.

Long Securities - Marketable securities are valued at market value and securities not readily marketable are valued at fair value as determined by the Board of Directors. The resulting difference between cost and market value (or fair value) is included in income.

Cash Equivalents - Cash equivalents are defined as certificates of deposit and U.S. government obligations with a maturity date at the time of acquisition of less than 90 days and those securities registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940 which are comprised of cash and other short-term debt instruments and are commonly referred to as "money market funds."

Furniture and Equipment - Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis using an estimated useful life of five years.

Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 2 - S CORPORATION ELECTION

The Company has elected S Corporation status for federal income tax purposes. Income taxes are therefore the responsibility of the individual shareholder of the Company.

NOTE 3 - NET CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

As a registered broker/dealer and member of the National Association of Securities Dealers, Inc. the Company is subject to the Uniform Net Capital Rule, which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregated indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 1500%. At December 31, 2002 the Company's net capital and required net capital were \$20,875 and \$5,000 respectively. The ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital was 79%.

NOTE 4 - LEASE COMMITMENTS

Quotation Services Lease - Minimum annual rentals under noncancellable lease for quotation services which expires November 30, 2003, exclusive of additional payments which may be required for certain increases in operating and maintenance costs, are \$6,882 for 2003. Total expense for the year ended December 31, 2002 relating to this lease was \$11,063. This amount includes additional charges pursuant to the lease agreement.

Occupancy Lease - Minimum annual rentals under a noncancellable lease for office space which expires April 30, 2003 are \$3,608 for 2003. The total expense for office space for the year ended December 31, 2002 was \$10,811.

NOTE 5 - CLEARING AGREEMENT WITH OFF-BALANCE-SHEET RISK

The Company has entered into an agreement with another broker/dealer (Clearing Broker/dealer) whereby the Company forwards (introduces) customer securities transactions to the Clearing Broker/dealer, fully disclosing the customer name and other information. The processing and, if applicable, any financing pertaining to the introduced securities transactions is performed by the Clearing Broker/dealer. The customer account is therefore maintained and recorded in the books and records of the Clearing Broker/dealer on the Company's behalf. In consideration for introducing customers to the Clearing Broker/dealer, the Company receives commissions and other consideration, less the processing and other charges of the Clearing Broker/dealer. As part of the terms of the agreement between the Company and Clearing Broker/dealer, the Company is held responsible for any losses arising when the customers introduced by the Company to the Clearing Broker/dealer fail to meet their contractual commitments pertaining to the purchase, sale and possible financing of securities transactions. The Company may therefore be exposed to off-balance-sheet risk in the event the customer is unable to fulfill its contracted obligations and it is necessary for the Clearing Broker/dealer to purchase or sell the securities at a loss. The Company's exposure to risk would consist of the amount of the loss realized and any additional expenses incurred pertaining to the transaction or other customer activity. The Company has deposited \$25,000 with the Clearing Broker/Dealer to assure the Company's performance under the agreement. This amount is included in "Receivable from broker/dealers". The agreement may be terminated by either party with 90 days prior written notification. In addition, if the Company terminates this agreement at any time, it will be liable for the expenses incurred by the Clearing Broker/dealer in connection with converting or closing the accounts.

Customers of the Company may enter into various transactions involving derivatives and other off-balance sheet financial instruments. These financial instruments include exchange traded options. As a writer of options, the

customer receives a premium in exchange for giving the counterparty the right to buy or sell the underlying security at a future date at a contracted price. The contractual or notional amounts related to these financial instruments reflect the volume and activity and do not reflect the amounts at risk. Market risk is substantially dependent upon the value of the underlying financial instruments and is affected by market forces such as volatility and changes in interest and foreign exchange rates. In addition, customers may sell securities they do not own and therefore will be obligated to purchase such securities at a future date. The risk to the customer arises if the market values of the related securities increase subsequent to the date of sale. The Company's exposure to risk with respect to any of these customer transactions would consist of the amount necessary to satisfy the contractual requirement of the financial instruments should customers fail to meet their contractual obligations.
