**Notes to Financial Statements**  
**December 31, 2002**

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**1. Organization**

Heartland Investor Services, L.L.C. (the Company) is a wholly owned subsidiary of The BISYS Group, Inc. (BISYS). The Company is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) as a broker-dealer and is a member of the National Association of Securities Dealers, Inc. (NASD).

The Company serves as a distributor and principal underwriter to Heartland Mutual Funds (the Funds) and, as a result, substantially all of the Company's revenues are earned from the Funds. The Company receives distribution fees from certain of the Funds, which are determined based on average daily net assets of the Funds and are accrued monthly.

**2. Significant Accounting Policies**

**Cash and Cash Equivalents**

The Company considers all short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. The Company maintains cash deposits in banks which from time to time exceed the amount of deposit insurance available. Management periodically assesses the financial condition of the institutions and believes that any potential credit loss is minimal.

**Investments**

Investments include commercial paper with original maturities of 270 days or less and 300 shares of NASDAQ<sup>®</sup> stock valued at \$3,300. The carrying values of the Company's investments approximated their fair values at December 31, 2002.

**Revenue Recognition**

The Company recognizes distribution fees and interest income on an accrual basis, as earned.

**Income Taxes**

BISYS and its affiliates file a consolidated federal income tax return that includes the Company. BISYS apportions income tax expense or benefit among all the companies based on their taxable income, using corporate statutory rates, adjusted for the effect of temporary differences of the Company.

**Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

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**3. Net Capital Requirement**

As a registered broker-dealer engaged in the sale of redeemable shares of registered investment companies and certain other share accounts, the Company is subject to the SEC's Uniform Net Capital Rule 15c3-1 (the Rule), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital, as defined, and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1. At December 31, 2002, the Company had net capital under the Rule of \$316,220, which was \$299,554 in excess of its minimum required net capital of \$16,666. The Company's ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital at December 31, 2002 was 0.79 to 1.

**4. Related-Party Transactions**

During the fiscal year ended December 31, 2002, BISYS provided various services to the Company, such as use of office facilities, equipment, personnel and other administrative services. BISYS charges the Company an administrative service fee for these services. The administrative service fee would not necessarily be the same if an unrelated party provided these services to the Company.

**5. Regulatory Compliance**

The Company has complied with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3 under Subparagraph (k)(1)—all customer transactions are limited to the sale and redemption of redeemable securities of registered investment companies, and the Company does not handle customer funds.

**Report of Independent Accountants on Internal Control Pursuant to

To the Board of Directors and Member of

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplemental schedules of Heartland Investor Services, L.L.C. (the Company) for the year ended December 31, 2002, we considered its internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including tests of compliance with such practices and procedures, that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g), in the following:

1. Making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11); and
2. Determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3.

Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making the quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons, and the recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13;
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System; and
3. Obtaining and maintaining physical possession or control of all fully paid and excess margin securities of customers as required by Rule 15c3-3.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned

objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, errors or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of internal control to future periods is subject to the risk that controls may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

Our consideration of internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the specific internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, we noted no matters involving internal control, including procedures for safeguarding securities, that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2002 to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, the National Association of Securities Dealers, Inc., and other regulatory agencies that rely on Rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
