



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


The Board of Directors

These financial statements are the responsibility of the company's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. An audit includes examining on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2003

Note A *Organization and nature of business:*

The Street, Inc. was incorporated in the State of Nevada, on May 25, 1999. The corporation is a broker-dealer in securities registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission under (S.E.C.) Rule 15c3-3(K)(2)(ii) which provides that all the funds and securities belonging to the company's customers would be handled by a correspondent broker-dealer.

Note B *Clearing:*

The corporation operates under a "Fully Disclosed Correspondent Agreement" with Emmett A. Larkin Company, Inc., dated March 3, 1999.

The corporation does not carry customer accounts receivable and does not, as a practice, provide custodial services of any securities for any customer.

Note C *Contingencies and Commitments/Related Party Transactions* - The corporation paid \$1,450 to the stockholder of its parent corporation in the form of management fees and expenses, for the year ended 12/31/03. The company currently has no non-cancelable leases. The offices are current provided at no cost by the shareholder of Fuquari, Inc.

Contingencies - The corporation is a party to various claims and complaints arising in the ordinary course of operations. In the opinion of management, all such claims are without merit, and an unfavorable disposition would not have a material effect on the financial position of the corporation. Further, the corporation anticipates no losses due to environmental issues or hazardous employee working conditions.

Note D *Significant accounting policies:*

Income is recorded when services are completed and expenses are recorded when they are incurred. The corporation is on the *accrual method* of accounting.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that effect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Federal Income Taxes - Book basis and tax basis accounting timing differences are immaterial; therefore, deferred taxes have not been recorded in the financial statements.

Cash Flows Presentation - For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the corporation considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased, maturing in three months or less, to be cash equivalents. The statement of cash flows was prepared using the *indirect method*.

Note E *Capital Stock:*

The corporation has 1,000 shares of no par value common stock issued and outstanding on December 31, 2003. The Street, Inc. is wholly owned by Fuquari, Inc., a Nevada corporation.

Note F *Net Capital Requirements:*

The corporation is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1 (and the rule of the "applicable" exchange also provides that equity capital may not be withdrawn or cash dividends paid if the resulting net capital ratio would exceed 10 to 1), At December 31, 2003, the corporation had net capital of \$7,375, which was \$2,375, in excess of its required net capital of \$5,000.

**INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL
REQUIRED BY SEC RULE 17a-5**

The Board of Directors
The Street, Inc.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of The Street, Inc., for the year ended December 31, 2003, we considered its internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on internal control.

Also, as required by rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in rule 17a-5(g), in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11), and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any way for the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons
2. Recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of an internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets for which the company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit preparation of financial statements in


conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

Our consideration of the internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design of operation of the specific internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or fraud, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, we noted no matters involving the internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2003, to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, and other regulatory agencies which rely on rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be, and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
