





Dear Louis:

While conducting the audit of the financial statements, we were pleased to see that, again, your books are in good shape. The commission statements are organized and the sales logs are complete and legible.

We did note a few things during the audit that could improve future financial reporting, provide for more accurate FOCUS reporting and reduce taxes.


Since you are a single member LLC, distributions made by the company to you are accounted for as proprietor draw (a balance sheet account). This was reported properly through your posting and acceptance of our recommended adjusting journal entries.

We also noted that certain immaterial expenses were paid for by The Center for Financial Planning on behalf of Morizio Associates, LLC. These expenses included insurance premiums, NASD dues, and certain overhead costs. You would receive greater tax savings by having these expenses included in your single member LLC, where self-employment taxes are paid on net income. Including the expenses in Morizio Associates, LLC will also provide for a more accurate accounting of the Company.

In order to abide by the net capital regulations relating to your industry please keep at least \$8,000 in your operating account at all times. Even though this is \$3,000 over the minimum capital allowance it will protect you from going below this level when certain accruals are factored into the equation.

We have enclosed our recommended adjusting journal entries, which must be posted to your QuickBooks file as of 12/31/03, an accounts receivable work paper as of December 31, 2003 and a final adjusted trial balance for your convenience. If you should have any questions about the above items please feel free to contact me.

December 31, 2003

NOTE 1: ORGANIZATION AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

The Company is a broker-dealer registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and the National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD). The Company began operations in August of 2000 in the State of New York and is located in Albany, New York. The Company provides investment services to businesses and the general public.

NOTE 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

The Company is engaged in a single line of business as a securities broker-dealer, and provides one class of service, agency transactions. These transactions involve the use of mutual funds and insurance products only. The company is a non-clearing broker-dealer.

Income Taxes

The Company is a single member LLC that has elected to be taxed as a sole proprietor. Consequently, income taxes are not payable by, or provided for, the Company. The proprietor is taxed individually on his share of the Company's earnings.

Commissions

Commissions and related clearing expenses are recorded on a trade-date basis as securities transactions occur.

NOTE 3: CASH AND SECURITIES SEGREGATED UNDER FEDERAL AND OTHER REGULATIONS

The company is exempt under rule 15c3-3 of the Securities and Exchange Commission for the use of a special reserve as the Company provides services only as a non-clearing broker.

NOTE 4: COMMISSIONS RECEIVABLE

The company is a non-clearing broker-dealer, the commissions receivable represent commissions and 12b-1 fees earned on investment transactions. The Company considers commissions receivable to be fully collectible. Accordingly, no reserve for bad debts is required.

NOTE 5: CASH FLOW INFORMATION

The Company considers all short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

There was no cash paid for interest or income taxes during 2003.

NOTE 6: SUBORDINATED BORROWINGS

There are no subordinated borrowings at December 31, 2003.

NOTE 7: NET CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

The company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1 (and the rule of the "applicable" exchange also provides that equity capital may not be withdrawn or cash dividends paid if the resulting net capital ratio would exceed 10 to 1). At December 31, 2003 the Company had net capital of \$8,139 which \$3,139 was in excess of its required net capital of \$5,000. The Company's net capital ratio was .02 to 1 at December 31, 2003.

NOTE 8: USE OF ESTIMATES IN THE PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL REQUIRED BY SEC RULE 17a-5 FOR A BROKER- DEALER CLAIMING AN EXEMPTION FROM SEC RULE 15c3-3

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplemental schedules of Morizio Associates, LLC (the Company), for the year ended December 31, 2003, we considered its internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on internal control.

Also, as required by rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company including tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons
2. Recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.



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
The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

Our consideration of internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of the specific internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, we noted no matters involving internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2003, to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the owner, management, the SEC, and other regulatory agencies that rely on rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
