

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

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Portfolio Trading, L.L.C.

1. NATURE OF BUSINESS

Portfolio Trading, L.L.C. (the Company), a Tennessee limited liability company, is engaged in the business of general securities brokerage, including sale of variable life insurance and annuities.

The Company offers accounts on a fully disclosed basis through contractual agreements with clearing brokers. Accordingly, the Company operates under the exemptive provisions of Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) rule 15c3-3(k)(2)(ii). Substantially all of the Company's clients are also clients of a registered investment advisor, affiliated through mutual ownership.

Securities transactions are recorded on a trade date basis.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. NET CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

As a registered broker-dealer, the Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital. At December 31, 2004, the Company had net capital of \$147,537, which was \$142,537 in excess of its minimum net capital required of \$5,000.

3. INCOME TAXES

As a limited liability company, the net income of the Company is not subject to federal income tax. The members report the net income of the Company on their personal income tax returns.

4. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Management fees totaling \$135,723 were paid to entities affiliated through mutual ownership. These fees were paid under a month-to-month management agreement and covered expenses related to the Company's operations including rent, utilities, salaries, equipment and other general and administrative expenses. Included in accrued expenses are management fees due to the entities of \$38,501.

3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.
