NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

Aura Financial Services, Inc. (the Company) is a broker-dealer registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and is a member of various exchanges and the National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD). The Company derives the majority of its revenue from commissions associated with the trading of securities, mutual funds, annuities, and other various financial instruments. The Company is an Alabama corporation with offices in Alabama, Florida, and New York.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Company considers all investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash and cash equivalents.

The Company maintains cash depository accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. These amounts represent actual account balances held by financial institutions at the end of the period, and unlike the balance reported in the financial statements, the account balances do not reflect timing delays inherent in reconciling items such as outstanding checks and deposits in transit. The Company has not experienced losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk related to cash balances.

Securities Transactions

Proprietary securities transactions in regular-way trades are recorded on the trade date, as if they had settled. Profit and loss arising from all securities and commodities transactions entered into for the account and risk of the Company are recorded on a trade date basis. Customers' securities and commodities transactions are reported on a settlement date basis with related commission income and expenses reported on a trade date basis.

Marketable securities are valued at market value and securities not readily marketable are valued at fair value as determined by the Company.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Receivables

Receivables are carried at their estimated collectible amounts. Accounts are considered past due based on their contractual terms. Receivables are periodically evaluated for collectibility based on past credit history with customers and their current financial condition. The Company closely monitors outstanding balances and writes off all balances that are deemed uncollectible. Therefore, no allowance is deemed necessary.

Commissions

Commissions and related clearing expenses are recorded on a monthly basis as the securities transactions occur.

Income Taxes

The differences between the income tax expense reflected in the financial statements and income taxes calculated at federal statutory income tax rates consists primarily of state income taxes, net of federal tax benefit. The deferred tax asset recognized in the statement of financial condition is tax benefit associated with the Company's net taxable loss for the year ended December 31, 2006.

Advertising Costs

The Company expenses advertising cost as incurred. Advertising costs totaled \$15,691 for the year ended December 31, 2006.

NOTE 2 - RECEIVABLE FROM AND PAYABLE TO BROKER-DEALERS AND CLEARING ORGANIZATIONS

NOTE 3 - COMMON STOCK

The Company has two classes of common stock issued at December 31, 2006. The holders of Class A common stock have exclusive voting power with respect to all elections of directors of the Company and in respect to all other matters as to which vote or consent of the shareholders of the Company is required to be taken. The holders of Class B common stock have no voting rights in any matters affecting the Company, except as may otherwise be expressly required by law. The holders of Class A and Class B common stock share equally and have equal rights with respect to entitlement to dividends, rights to receive distribution upon liquidation, dissolution or winding up of the affairs of the Company.

NOTE 4 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Company is a party to various regulatory investigations incidental to its securities business. Management of the Company, after consultation with outside legal counsel, believes that the resolution of these investigations will not result in any additional material adverse effect on the Company's financial condition. However, regulatory investigations and any potential disciplinary actions are subject to inherent uncertainties. Were an unfavorable outcome to occur, there exists the possibility of a material adverse impact on the results of operations for the period in which the outcome occurs.

Concentrations of Credit Risk

The Company is engaged in various trading and brokerage activities with counterparties, primarily broker-dealers, banks, and other financial institutions. Currently, substantially all of the Company's securities transactions are cleared through one broker-dealer. In the event the counterparties do not fulfill their obligations, the Company may be exposed to risk. The risk of default depends on the creditworthiness of the counterparty or issuer of the instrument. It is the Company's policy to review, as necessary, the credit standing of each counterparty.

NOTE 5 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Company contracted with Aura Holdings, Inc. to perform administrative and accounting services during the year and to provide payroll services for its employees. The president of the Company is a major stockholder in Aura Holdings, Inc. The amount paid for these services totaled \$1,889,200 for the year ended December 31, 2006.

NOTE 6 - NET CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC rule 15c3-1) which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital. The Company is prohibited from engaging in any security transactions at a time when its "aggregate indebtedness" exceeds fifteen times its "net capital" as those terms are defined by SEC rule 15c3-1. The SEC may also require a member organization to reduce its business if its net capital ratio (aggregate indebtedness divided by net capital) exceeds 12 to 1, and may prohibit expansion of its business if the ratio exceeds 10 to 1. The SEC requires that a minimum of \$50,000 net capital be maintained at all times. At December 31, 2006, the Company had net capital of \$228,543 which was \$178,543 in excess of its required net capital of \$50,000. The Company's ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital was 2.39 to 1.00.

NOTE 7 - SUPPLEMENTAL CASH FLOW DISCLOSURES

The Company paid no income taxes for the year ended December 31, 2006.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON INTERNAL ACCOUNTING CONTROL

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplementary schedules of Aura Financial Services, Inc. (the Company) for the year ended December 31, 2006, we considered its internal control in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on internal control.

As required by rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company including tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons and recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System
3. Obtaining and maintaining physical possession or control of all fully paid and excess margin securities of customer as required by Rule 15c-3-3

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the

objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

Our consideration of internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected. A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected. However, we noted no matters involving internal control that we consider to be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2006 to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, and other regulatory agencies that rely on rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
