Notes to Financial Statements

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

FPA Fund Distributors, Inc. (the Company) is a wholly owned subsidiary of First Pacific Advisors, LLC (FPA), an investment adviser registered with the SEC under the Investment Advisors Act of 1940, that commenced operations on October 1, 2006. Prior to October 1, 2006, the Company was a wholly owned subsidiary of First Pacific Advisors, Inc. (Old Parent), which was a wholly owned subsidiary of Old Mutual (US) Holdings Inc., itself an indirect wholly owned subsidiary of Old Mutual plc (collectively referred to as OM). The principals and key investment professionals of Old Parent entered into an agreement with OM in 2004 to establish a new firm, FPA, and to purchase various operating assets of Old Parent, including the Company. As a result, FPA purchased 100% of the outstanding common stock of the Company as of October 1, 2006. The Company is registered as a broker-dealer under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (the Act) and applicable state securities statutes, and acts exclusively as principal underwriter and distributor for four open-end investment management companies (the Funds) managed by FPA. The Company promotes the sale of shares of the Funds domestically by broker-dealers that are members in good standing with the National Association of Securities Dealers, Inc.

The Company prepares its financial statements on an accrual basis. Income is derived from commissions received from the sale of shares of the Funds managed by FPA and interest received on cash balances. Expenses include those directly related to the Company's wholesale broker-dealer and distribution activities.

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, as described below.

(a) Revenue Recognition

Commission income is recorded on a trade-date basis and accrued as earned based upon the Funds' sales commissions retained by the Company after reallowance to other broker-dealers. Commissions receivable at December 31, 2006 are believed to be collectible.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Company considers investments held within money market accounts to be cash equivalents for financial statement purposes.

(c) Income Taxes

Income taxes are accounted for under the asset and liability method. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognized for the future tax consequences attributable to differences between the financial statement carrying amounts of existing assets and liabilities and their respective tax bases and operating loss and tax credit carryforwards. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured using enacted tax rates expected to apply to taxable income in the years in which those temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled. A valuation allowance is recorded to the extent deferred tax assets are not expected to be realized. The effect on deferred tax assets and liabilities of a change in tax rates is recognized in income in the period that includes the enactment date.

(d) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect amounts and disclosures reported in the accompanying financial statements. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

(2) Stockholder's Equity

At December 31, 2006, the Company has 1,000 shares of common stock authorized, 100 of which are issued and outstanding. FPA has agreed to provide capital contributions to the Company as necessary for it to maintain compliance with minimum net capital requirements.

(3) Charge Off of Accumulated Tax Expense

In years prior to 2006, Old Mutual (US) Holdings had made deemed capital contributions to the Company, to the extent the Company incurred income tax expense, as such taxes were ultimately paid by Old Mutual (US) Holdings. Following the purchase of the Company by FPA in 2006, it was determined that the cumulative tax expense which had occurred under the ownership of Old Mutual (US) Holdings would appropriately be charged against Additional Paid in Capital to reflect the termination of Old Mutual (US) Holding's interest in the Company. This reclassification has no impact on stockholder's equity.

In assessing the realizability of deferred tax assets, management considers whether it is more likely than not that some portion or all of the deferred tax assets will not be realized. The ultimate realization of deferred tax assets is dependent upon the generation of future taxable income during the periods in which those temporary differences become deductible. Based upon the projections for future taxable income over the periods in which the deferred tax assets are deductible, management believes it is more likely than not that the Company will not realize the benefits of these deductible differences. A valuation allowance has been placed against the deferred tax assets as of December 31, 2006 due to uncertainty of their ultimate realization.

The Company's effective income tax rate varies from the federal statutory income tax rate as a result of state income taxes.

(5) Regulatory Requirements

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC Rule 15c3-1) which requires the maintenance of a minimum net capital of \$25,000 and the maintenance of a ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital not to exceed 1,500% (capital may not be withdrawn or cash dividends paid if the resulting net capital ratio would exceed 1,000%). At December 31, 2006, the Company had net capital of \$95,945, which was \$70,945 in excess of the minimum net capital required, and a ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital of 0.042 to 1.

At December 31, 2006, the Company is exempt from the provisions of Rule 15c3-3 (under paragraph k(1) of such rule) of the Act as it is a broker-dealer which deals solely in mutual fund shares and promptly transmits all customer funds and delivers all securities received in connection with its broker-dealer activities.

(6) Related-Party Transactions

The Company participates in the allocation of costs in which FPA allocates a portion of their operating expenses to the Company. It is possible that the terms of certain of the related-party transactions are not the same as those that would result from transactions among wholly unrelated parties. Allocations from FPA to the Company totaled \$337,885 for the year ended December 31, 2006.

**Independent Auditors' Report on Internal Control Required by

The Board of Directors
FPA Fund Distributors, Inc.:

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplemental schedules of FPA Fund Distributors, Inc. (the Company) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2006, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Company's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company including consideration of control activities for safeguarding securities. This study includes tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregated indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons and recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13.
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control and the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first and second paragraphs and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control and control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures, as described in the second paragraph of this report, were adequate at December 31, 2006 to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, the National Association of Securities Dealers, and other regulatory agencies that rely on Rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
