



(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

The Company is a registered broker-dealer incorporated under the laws of the State of California maintaining its only office in Los Angeles, California, and is subject to a minimum net capital requirement of \$5,000 under SEC Rule 15c3-1. The Company operates pursuant to the (k)(2)(i) exemptive provision of SEC Rule 15c3-3 and does not hold customer funds or securities. The Company's revenue has consisted of consulting fees and transaction fees earned in connection with its advisory activities.

Averil Capital Markets Group, Inc. is a boutique corporate advisory practice offering specialized financial advisory services to a broad roster of clients ranging from small, emerging growth to middle market companies. In particular, the Company specializes in mergers and acquisitions and capital-raising transactions. Under the primary direction of Ms. Maranon, the Company offers advisory services across various transactional situations including acquisitions, divestitures, private placements and recapitalizations. The Company also provides specialized consulting services in connection with transactional events requiring substantial specialized advice such as launching an initial public offering, formulating a capitalization strategy for a new company, or developing an international mergers and acquisitions program.

Method of Accounting

The Company maintains its books and records on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation of property and equipment is provided over their estimated useful lives which ranges from five to fifteen years using the straight-line method.

Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Company considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

SIPC

The SIPC assessments have been determined fairly in accordance with applicable instructions and were remitted timely.

Income Taxes

Income tax expense includes federal and state taxes currently payable and deferred income taxes. Deferred taxes result from timing differences between reporting for financial statements purposes and tax purposes primarily consisting of accelerated depreciation for tax and straight-line for books and the use of accrual method for book and cash basis for tax return purposes as well as the tax benefit of net operating loss carryforwards.

Receivable from Related Parties

The receivable from related parties consists primarily of amounts advanced to the Company's sole shareholder. The Company expects repayment during 2008 and will assess a 5% interest rate beginning January 2008 on all unpaid balances.

(2) COMMITMENTS

The Company has entered into a lease agreement for its office facilities which expires in January 2010. Minimum future rental payments under this non-cancellable lease are as follows:

Deferred taxes are accounted for under Financial Accounting Standard No. 109 (FAS 109) which uses an asset and liability approach in recognizing timing differences. This approach requires the recognition of deferred tax assets and liabilities for the expected future tax consequences of such differences. Deferred taxes result primarily from the use of accelerated depreciation for tax purposes and straight-line for financial reporting purposes and the use of the accrual method for financial reporting whereas the cash method is used for tax purposes as well as the tax benefits of net operating loss carryforwards.

The Company has available approximately \$316,000 of unused operating loss carryforwards that may be applied against future taxable income and that expire in 2027.

(4) NET CAPITAL

The Company is subject to a \$5,000 minimum capital requirement under SEC Rule 15c3-1, which requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital shall not exceed 15 to 1. Net capital and the related net capital ratio fluctuate on a daily basis; however, as of December 31, 2007, the net capital was \$120,651 which exceeded the required minimum capital by \$115,651. The aggregate indebtedness to net capital ratio was .25 to 1.

REPORT ON INTERNAL ACCOUNTING CONTROL

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Averil Capital Markets Group, Inc. (the Company) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2007, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Company's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including consideration of control activities for safeguarding securities. This study included tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computation of aggregate indebtedness and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons and recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13.
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control and the practices and procedures referred to above, errors or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first and second paragraphs and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control and control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate an inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures, as described in the second paragraph of this report, were adequate at December 31, 2007, to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, and other regulatory agencies that rely on Rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
