





## Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2010 and the Year Then Ended

### (1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

**General.** Halen Capital Management, Inc. (the "Company") is a broker registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and is a member of The Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA). Effective August 16, 2010, the Company changed its name to Halen Capital Management, Inc. Prior to that date, the Company's name was FasTrade, Inc. DBA Anderen Capital. The Company is a Delaware Corporation that is a wholly-owned subsidiary of NexTrade Holdings, Inc. (the "Parent"). The Company is engaged in a single line of business as a securities broker, which comprises several classes of services, including principal transactions, agency transactions, investment banking, investment advisory, and venture capital businesses.

Management has evaluated all significant events occurring subsequent to the balance sheet date through February 25, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, determining no events require additional disclosure in the financial statements.

**Use of Estimates.** The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the dates of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**Cash and Cash Equivalents.** For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the Company considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

**Commissions.** Commissions income is recorded as securities transactions occur and at the time income is reasonably determinable.

**Income Taxes.** The Company files a consolidated tax return with its Parent, Nextrade Holdings, Inc., and records its share of the consolidated Federal tax expense or benefit. The Company has recorded its share of tax expense (benefit) on the statement of loss. An amount due from the Parent for the income tax benefit the Parent owes for the Company's previous losses, plus the current income tax benefit has been included as Due from Parent on the statement of financial condition.

GAAP sets out a consistent framework to determine the appropriate level of tax reserves to maintain for uncertain tax positions.

### (1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, Continued

***Income Taxes, Continued.*** The income tax accounting guidance results in two components of income tax expense: current and deferred. Current income tax expense reflects taxes to be paid or refunded for the current period by applying the provisions of the enacted tax law to the taxable income or excess of deductions over revenues. The Company determines deferred income taxes using the liability (or balance sheet) method. Under this method, the net deferred tax asset or liability is based on the tax effects of the differences between the book and tax bases of assets and liabilities, and enacted changes in tax rates and laws are recognized in the period in which they occur.

Deferred income tax expense results from changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities between periods. Deferred tax assets are recognized if it is more likely than not, based on the technical merits, that the tax position will be realized or sustained upon examination. The term more likely than not means a likelihood of more than 50 percent; the terms examined and upon examination also include resolution of the related appeals or litigation processes, if any. A tax position that meets the more-likely-than-not recognition threshold is initially and subsequently measured as the largest amount of tax benefit that has a greater than 50 percent likelihood of being realized upon settlement with a taxing authority that has full knowledge of all relevant information. The determination of whether or not a tax position has met the more-likely-than-not recognition threshold considers the facts, circumstances, and information available at the reporting date and is subject to management's judgment. Deferred tax assets are reduced by a valuation allowance if, based on the weight of evidence available, it is more likely than not that some portion or all of a deferred tax asset will not be realized. As of December 31, 2010, management is not aware of any uncertain tax positions that would have a material effect on the Company's financial statements. At December 31, 2010, the Company had no deferred taxes.

The Company recognizes interest and penalties on income taxes as a component of income tax expense. The only difference between the statutory Federal rate and the effective income tax rate resulted from state taxes.

### **(2) Related Party Transactions**

The Company has entered into a service and expense agreement (the "Agreement") with the Parent where the Parent furnishes the operational services required by the Company in order to conduct its business or pay for costs of such services or expenses on behalf of the Company. Such costs include salaries and wages, accounting fees, office supplies and expenses, insurance, employee benefits, rents and miscellaneous overhead and general expenses. All services and expenses provided to the Company from the Parent are paid for by the Parent and reimbursed by the Company on a monthly basis. The Agreement is for a period of one year and automatically renews each December. The Agreement may be terminated by either party with advance notice of 30 days. Expenses incurred by the Parent on behalf of the Company were \$48,000 for the year ended December 31, 2010. The Parent forgave the indebtedness of \$48,000 related to the service fees and these amounts were recorded as capital contributions.

### **(3) Net Capital Requirements**

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (Rule 15c3-I), which requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, shall not exceed 15 to 1. The Company had net capital of \$79,434 at December 31, 2010, which was \$74,434 in excess of the required net capital of \$5,000, and had a ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital of .03 to 1.

### **(4) Contingencies**

Various legal claims arise from time to time in the normal course of business which, in the opinion or management, will have no material effect on the Company's financial statements.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplemental schedule of Halen Capital Management, Inc. (the "Company"), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2010, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Company's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

Also, as required by rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company including consideration of control activities for safeguarding securities. This study included tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons and recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A *control deficiency* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.


A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Company's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis.


Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first and second paragraphs and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control and control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate at December 31, 2010 to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC and other regulatory agencies that rely on rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.



3. Compared any adjustments reported in Form SIPC-7 with supporting schedules and working papers by agreeing amounts to the income statement for the year ended December 31, 2010 and the respective quarterly FOCUS reports noting no differences;

4. Proved the arithmetical accuracy of the calculations reflected in Form SIPC-7 and in the related schedules and working papers by reviewing the Form SIPC-7 worksheet supporting the adjustments noting no differences.
