





NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND PRINCIPAL BUSINESS ACTIVITY

Ceros Financial Services, Inc. (the "Company") is a securities broker-dealer operating on a fully-disclosed basis. The Company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Ceros Holding AG and a registered member of the Securities and Exchange Commission, the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority, the National Futures Association and various state securities commissions.

NOTE 2 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Revenue Recognition - Commissions and related clearing expenses are recorded on a settlement date basis as securities transactions occur, which management believes is not materially different than trade date basis.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - The Company considers all highly liquid instruments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Property and Equipment - Property and equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation. Expenditures for routine repairs and maintenance are charged to operations as they are incurred while those which significantly, improve or extend the lives of existing assets are capitalized. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line and accelerated methods.

Income Taxes - Income tax expense includes federal and state taxes currently payable and, when material, deferred taxes arising from temporary differences between income from financial reporting and tax purposes and also operating losses that are available to offset future taxable income. Valuation allowances are established when necessary to reduce deferred tax assets to the amount expected to be realized. At December 31, 2010 deferred tax assets and liabilities were immaterial.

Translation of Foreign Currencies - Assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at year-end rates of exchange, whereas the income statement accounts are translated at average rates of exchange for the year. Gains or losses resulting from foreign currency transactions are included in net income.

NOTE 3 - REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC Rule 15c3-1) which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1. At December 31, 2010, the Company had net capital of \$639,381 which was \$389,381 in excess of its required net capital of \$250,000. The Company's ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital was .97 to 1.

NOTE 4 - OTHER REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

The Company is exempt from the customer reserve requirements of the Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c3-3 under Section (k)(2)(ii).

NOTE 5 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

All of the Company's assets and liabilities which are stated at fair value are valued in accordance with Level 1 criteria, as defined in FASB ASC 820. Level 1 value measurement uses quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities the Company has the ability to access.

NOTE 7 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Company is affiliated with other companies in the same line of business. 9% of the Company's commissions are earned from transactions with these affiliates for the year ended December 31, 2010. Per a written agreement, a foreign corporation with the same ownership refers customers who purchase securities through the Company. \$455,648 (72%) of the commissions earned on these transactions were paid back to the foreign affiliate as commission expense.

The Company also has an agreement with its affiliates whereby it receives \$6,000 per month as a clearing charge.

Receivables from affiliate are substantially all for loans and advances

NOTE 8 - CAPITAL STRUCTURE

As of December 31, 2010, the Company had 300,000 shares of Class A voting common stock authorized, \$10 par value, and 250,000 shares issued and outstanding. The first 150,000 shares were issued at \$1, which was par value at the time of issuance.

NOTE 9 - PENSION PLAN

The Company has a defined contribution retirement plan. Discretionary contributions are made to individual accounts of eligible employees. Employees meeting certain age and service requirements participate in the plan. There was no company contribution for the year ended December 31, 2010.

NOTE 10 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

At various times during the year cash and cash equivalents consisted of cash on deposit with banks which were in excess of insured limits and money market mutual funds which are not insured. As of December 31, 2010, the Company had \$276,558 in foreign banks accounts and \$400,830 in money market mutual funds which are not insured. The company has never experienced any losses in these accounts and does not believe that it is exposed to any significant concentration of credit risk.

Gentlemen:

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Ceros Financial Services, Inc. (the Company) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2010, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Company's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including consideration of control activities for safeguarding securities. This study included tests of compliance with such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g), in the following:

1. Making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11) and the reserve required by Rule 15c3-3(e)
2. Making the quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons, and recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System
4. Obtaining and maintaining physical possession or control of all fully paid and excess margin securities of customers as required by Rule 15c3-3

In addition, as required by Regulation 1.16 under the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company

including the consideration of control activities for safeguarding customer and firm assets. This study included tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Regulation 1.16, in making the following:

1. The periodic computations of minimum financial requirements pursuant to Regulation 1.17
2. The daily computations of the segregation requirements of Section 4d(a)(2) of the Commodity Exchange Act and the regulations thereunder, and the segregation of funds based on such computations
3. The daily computations of the foreign futures and foreign options secured amount requirements pursuant to Regulation 30.7 of the CFTC

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraphs. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraphs and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's and the CFTC's previously mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of an internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) and Regulation 1.16(d)(2) list additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraphs.

Because of inherent limitations in any internal control and the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A *control deficiency* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over financial reporting that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the company's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first, second, and third paragraphs and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control and

control activities for safeguarding securities and certain regulated commodity customer and firm assets that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined previously.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second and third paragraphs of this report are considered by the SEC and CFTC to adequate for their purposes in with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, the Commodity Exchange Act, and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures, as described in the second and third paragraphs of this report, were adequate at December 31, 2010, to meet the SEC's and CFTC's objectives.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, the CFTC, and other regulatory agencies which rely on Rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 or Regulation 1.16 of the CFTC or both in their regulation of registered brokers-dealers and futures commission merchants, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
