

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



A. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

LJS Capital, LLC (the Company) is a Colorado limited liability company formed September 26, 2008 to engage in investment banking and financial consulting. The Company is a broker-dealer registered with the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority.

The Company is 100% owned by LJS Holdings, LLC which is not a broker dealer. These financial statements reflect the assets, liabilities, income, expenses and cash flows of LJS Capital, LLC only.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Company considers cash on hand and investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Company to concentration of credit risk consist primarily of temporary cash investments. The Company restricts temporary cash investments to financial institutions with high credit standing. Such temporary cash investments are often in excess of the FDIC insurance limit.

Income Taxes

The Company is not a taxpaying entity for federal or state income tax purposes. Accordingly, no income tax expense has been recorded in the financial statements. Income of the Company is taxed to the member on his individual return. Therefore, no provision for federal income taxes has been included in these financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

B. Significant Clients

The Company generally derives significant revenue from a few key clients. However, the makeup of the Company's client base varies from year to year. Accordingly, an annual concentration in revenue from the same clients is remote. In 2012, the Company derived 97% of total fee revenue from three clients.

C. Statutory Requirements

Pursuant to Rule 15c3-1 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, the Company is required to maintain minimum net capital as defined under such rule. At December 31, 2012, the Company's net capital was \$36,184 and the required net capital was \$5,000.

The Company is exempt from certain provisions of Rule 15c3-3 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and, accordingly, is not required to maintain a "Special Account for Exclusive Benefit of Customers". Such exemption is in accordance with paragraph (k) (2) (i) of the Rule.

D. Transactions with Related Entities

The Company paid rent and certain overhead costs to LJS Holdings, LLC, a related entity, during the year ended December 31, 2012. The Company pays approximately \$622 a month for office space, internet connectivity, web hosting, personal property, office supplies and telephone to the related party. Management acknowledges this amount represents a reasonable approximate valuation of the personal property, utilities and office space provided. Overhead charges paid to this related entity were \$7,463 per for the year ended December 31, 2012. The Company does not have a balance due to LJS Holdings, LLC at December 31, 2012.

E. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through February 7, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were issued.

F. Income Statement Classification of Interest and Penalties

Interest and penalties associated with the Company's tax positions are reflected as interest expense in the financial statements. There were no interest or penalties incurred during the year ended December 31, 2012.

G. Uncertain Tax Positions

The Company has adopted FASB ASC 740-10-25, Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes. The Company records a liability for uncertain tax positions when it is more likely than not that a tax position would not be sustained if examined by the taxing authority. The Company continually evaluates expiring statutes of limitations, audits, proposed settlements, changes in tax law and new authoritative rulings. The Company's evaluation on December 31, 2012 revealed no uncertain tax positions that would have a material impact on the financial statements. The 2009 through 2011 tax years remain subject to examination by the IRS. The Company does not believe that any reasonably possible changes will occur within the next twelve months that will have a material impact on the financial statements.

1. Making the quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons and recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's previously mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control and the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the company's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first and second paragraphs and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control and control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined previously.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures, as described in the second paragraph of this report, were adequate at December 31, 2011 to meet the SEC's objectives.
