NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization and Nature of Business

The Company is a broker-dealer registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and is a member of the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority, Inc. (FINRA)

Securities Transactions

Customers' securities transactions are recorded on the settlement date basis. The related commission income and expenses are also recorded on the settlement date basis.

Income Taxes

The Company recognizes deferred tax liabilities and assets for the expected future tax consequences of events that have been included on the financial statements or tax returns. Deferred tax liabilities and assets are determined based on the difference between the financial statement and tax basis of assets and liabilities.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

NOTE 2 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Company's customers' securities transactions are introduced on a fully-disclosed basis with its clearing broker/dealers. The clearing broker/dealers carry all of the accounts of the customers of the Company and is responsible for execution, collection of and payment of funds and, receipt and delivery of securities relative to customer transactions. Off-balance-sheet risk exists with respect to these transactions due to the possibility that customers may be unable to fulfill their contractual commitments wherein the clearing broker/dealers may charge any losses it incurs to the Company. The Company seeks to minimize this risk through procedures designed to monitor the credit worthiness of its customers, and tries to insure that customer transactions are executed properly by the clearing broker/dealer.

NOTE 3 - NET CAPITAL

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC Rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital, and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1. The Company had net capital at December 31, 2012 of \$20,013, which was \$13,458 in excess of its required net capital of \$6,555. The Company's net capital ratio was 4.91 to 1.

NOTE 4 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Company reimbursed Success Trade, Inc. (STI), its parent, \$306,864 for payroll and payroll taxes in 2012. At December 31, 2012 the Company owed this entity \$20,266.

The Company was charged \$70,276 in software fees by B.P. Trade, Inc. (BPT) in 2012. BPT is owned 100% by STI. At December 31, 2012 BPT had a credit balance of \$1,520.

Operating results of the Company could differ significantly from those that would have been obtained if this entity were autonomous from STI and BPT.

NOTE 5 - INCOME TAXES

Deferred income taxes are provided for temporary differences that exist between tax and financial statements, as well as for net operating loss carryforwards.

NOTE 6 – LONG TERM LEASE

The Company leases office space at the rate of \$11,760 per month. The lease expires February 2016. Rent expense for 2012 was \$137,169.

NOTE 7 – COMMITMENTS

As of December 31, 2011, the Company reached an agreement in principle with FINRA's Department of Enforcement regarding a Letter of Acceptance, Waiver and Consent in which the Company has agreed to a fine of \$100,000. The balance owing on this agreement as of December 31, 2012 is \$40,000. The agreement was officially accepted by FINRA in February of 2012, the Company intends to pay the fine in installments in accordance with FINRA's installment arrangement. Per FINRA's installment arrangement terms, fines ranging from \$50,000 to \$250,000 cannot exceed 36 months.

NOTE 8 – FAIR VALUE

FASB ASC 820 defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and establishes a fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. A fair value measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability occurs in the principal market for the asset or liability or, in the absence of a principal market, the most advantageous market. Valuation techniques that are consistent with the market income or cost approach, as specified by FASB ASC 820, are used to measure fair value.

The fair value hierarchy prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three broad levels:

Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities the Company has the ability to access.

Level 2 inputs are inputs (other than quoted prices included within level 1) that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability and rely on management's own assumption about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. (The unobservable inputs should be developed based on the best information available in the circumstances and may include the Company's own data.)

A qualifying asset or liability's level within the framework is based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Company's qualifying assets or liabilities are recorded at fair value using Level 1 inputs.

NOTE 9 – UNCERTAINTY IN INCOME TAXES

Effective January 1, 2009, the Company adopted ASC Topic 740-10 Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes, which required the Company to report any uncertain tax positions and to adjust its financial statements for the impact thereof. As of December 31, 2012, the Company determined that it had no tax positions that did not meet the "more likely than not" threshold of being sustained by the applicable tax authority. The Company files taxes and information returns in the United States Federal and District of Columbia jurisdictions. These returns are generally subject to examination by the authorities for the last three years.

NOTE 10 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has evaluated subsequent events through February 1, 2013, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued. There were no subsequent events that require adjustment or disclosure in the financial statements.



In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Success Trade Securities, Inc. (the Company), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2012, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Company's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

Also, as required by rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including consideration of control activities for safeguarding securities. This study included tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under rule 17a-3(a)(11) and determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications and comparisons and recordations required by rule 17a-13.
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control and the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.
