NOTE 1 - NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Sixpoint Partners LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, is a registered broker-dealer with the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "SEC") and is a member of the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (the "FINRA"). The Company is a global placement agent and leading provider of alternative investment solutions for private equity funds.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A summary of the significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements is as follows:

Estimates

The financial statements are prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States which require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain amounts and disclosures reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Depreciation

Depreciation is computed using the straight line method based on the estimated useful lives of the individual items comprising depreciable assets.

Cash and cash equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Company considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three (3) months or less to be cash equivalents.

Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable are shown net of a reserve for bad debts.

NOTE 3 - CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

The Company is subject to the SEC's Uniform Net Capital Rule (the "Rule") and the FINRA's growth and business reduction capital requirements. The Company computes its net capital under the basic method of the Rule which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital equal to the greater of \$5,000 or 6 2/3% of aggregate indebtedness, as defined.

The following is a summary of the Company's net capital position at December 31, 2012.

NOTE 4 - CUSTOMER SECURITIES - POSSESSION AND CONTROL REQUIREMENTS

The Company is exempt from certain provisions of rule 15c3-3 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 since it carries no customer accounts, and does not otherwise hold funds or securities of customers.

NOTE 5 - INCOME TAXES

The Company has elected to be taxed as a partnership and income taxes are not assessed on a partnership. Each member's share of Company income or loss is included in the respective member's individual income tax return.

NOTE 6 - PROFIT SHARING PLAN

The Company has adopted a 401(k) profit sharing plan. The Company has the discretion to match participants' 401(k) contributions and to contribute additional amounts on behalf of the participants. In 2012 the Company made no matching contributions.

NOTE 7 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Company has evaluated subsequent events through February 14, 2013, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No events have occurred subsequent to the balance sheet date through February 14, 2013 that would require adjustment or disclosure in the financial statements.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplemental information of Sixpoint Partners LLC (the "Company"), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2012 in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Company's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "SEC"), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company including consideration of control activities for safeguarding securities. This study included tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons,
2. Recordation of differences required by rule 17a-13, and
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above-mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from

unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

Because of inherent limitations in internal control and the practices and procedures referred to above, error or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first and second paragraphs and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control and control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes.
