



Note 1 – Organization and Nature of Business

Hudson Heritage Capital Management, Inc. (the “Company”) is a broker-dealer incorporated October 1, 1997 in New York. The company’s primary source of revenue is derived from commissions earned from the sale of mutual funds, municipal securities for Section 529 plans, variable life insurance or annuities and investment advisory services. The Company operates as a Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) member firm and is a registered investment advisory firm. The Company and its owners are licensed with the FINRA. As of December 31, 2012, all registration fees and required filings have been made to the FINRA and the related state securities authorities.

Note 2 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual events and results could differ from those estimates.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Expenses are recognized when incurred, rather than when cash is disbursed, and revenue is recognized when earned, rather than when cash is received.

Statement of Cash Flows

For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, the Company has defined cash equivalents as highly liquid investments, with original maturities of less than three months, that are not held for sale in the ordinary course of business.

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The Company provides for estimated losses on accrued fees receivable, using the allowance method, based on prior bad debt experience and a review of existing receivables. The Company has evaluated its accrued fees receivable at December 31, 2012 and has determined that no allowance for doubtful accounts is required as the accrued fees receivable balance at December 31, 2012 has been collected in full subsequent to December 31, 2012.

Commissions

Commissions are recorded as securities transactions occur and are credited by account.

Note 3 – Fair Value

Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and establishes a fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. A fair value measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability occurs in the principal market for the asset or liability or, in the absence of a principal market, the most advantageous market. Valuation techniques that are consistent with the market, income, or cost approach, as specified by FASB ASC 820, are used to measure fair value.

The fair value hierarchy prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three broad levels:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities the Company has the ability to access.
- Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.
- Level 3 are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability and rely on management's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. The unobservable inputs should be developed based on the best information available in the circumstances and may include the Company's own data.

The Company's financial instruments consist mainly of cash, accounts payable and accrued expenses. The carrying amounts in these financial statements approximate fair value due to their short-term nature.

Note 4 – Income Taxes

The Company with the consent of its shareholders has elected S Corporation status for Federal and New York State income tax purposes. As such, the stockholders of the Company are required to include the Company's taxable income on their individual income tax returns. Accordingly, there is no provision for Federal and New York State income taxes. The Company also does business in New Jersey, where S Corporation status has not been elected. The Company records a provision for income taxes for their New Jersey tax and New York franchise tax. The provision for income taxes for the year ended December 31, 2012 consists of \$1,731 in current state income taxes.

The Company recognizes and measures its unrecognized tax benefits in accordance with FASB ASC 740, *Income Taxes*. Under that guidance the Company assesses the likelihood, based on their technical merit, that tax positions will be sustained upon examination based on the facts, circumstances and information available at the end of each period. The measurement of unrecognized tax benefits is adjusted when new information is available, or when an event occurs that requires a change.

Note 5 – Net Capital Requirement

The Company is subject to the Securities and Exchange Commission Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC Rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1. At December 31, 2012, the Company had net capital of \$164,669, which was \$159,669 in excess of its required net capital of \$5,000. The Company's aggregate indebtedness to net capital ratio as of December 31, 2012 was 0.41 to 1.

Note 6 – Employee Benefit Plan

The Company has a qualified retirement savings plan covering eligible full-time employees.

Note 7 – Commitments and Contingencies

Operating Leases

The Company rents office space under non-cancelable operating lease agreements expiring through 2015. Certain leases are subject to rental increases. The Company is also required to pay its pro-rata share of real estate taxes and other costs under certain leases.

Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons and recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13
2. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and of the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's previously mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures, as described in the second paragraph of this report, were adequate at December 31, 2012, to meet the SEC's objectives.
