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

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
DECEMBER 31, 2013

1. ORGANIZATION AND NATURE OF BUSINESS

Arctic Island Financial, LLC dba FundAmerica (formerly known as Vara Securities, LLC) (the "Company") is a broker-dealer registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "SEC"), Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board, and is a member of the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority, Inc. ("FINRA"). The Company received its approval for membership on October 7, 2011. The Company is a Delaware limited liability company ("LLC").

On February 5, 2013, Arctic Island, LLC acquired Vara Securities, LLC and renamed the company Arctic Island Financial, LLC.

The Company is a fully disclosed introducing broker-dealer with the ability to trade equities and fixed income securities for institutional clients.

Since the Company is an LLC, the members are not liable for the debts, obligations, or liabilities of the Company, whether arising in contract, tort or otherwise, unless the members have signed a specific guarantee.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The Company maintains its books and records on the accrual basis of accounting for financial reporting purposes, which is in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles and is required by the SEC and FINRA.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Company defines cash equivalents as highly liquid investments with original maturity dates of less than ninety days that are not held for sale in the ordinary course of business.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is computed on a straight line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset. The useful life for computer equipment is 5 years.

Income Taxes

The Company is an LLC taxed as a partnership for income tax reporting purposes and as such, is not subject to income tax. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes is provided in the financial statements.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Company maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts, which at times may exceed federally insured limits. The Company has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk for cash.

3. NET CAPITAL REQUIREMENTS

The Company is subject to the SEC Uniform Net Capital Rule (SEC Rule 15c3-1), which requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1 (and the rule of the "applicable" exchange also provides that equity capital may not be withdrawn or cash dividends paid if the resulting net capital ratio would exceed 10 to 1). At December 31, 2013, the Company had net capital of \$314,763 which was \$214,763 in excess of its required net capital of \$100,000. The Company's percentage of aggregate indebtedness to net capital was 1.67% at December 31, 2013.

4. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

In the normal course of its business, the Company indemnifies and guarantees certain service providers, such as clearing and custody agents, trustees and administrators, against specified potential losses in connection with their acting as an agent of, or providing services to, the Company or its affiliates. The Company also indemnifies some clients against potential losses incurred in the event specified third-party service providers, including subcustodians and third-party brokers, improperly executed transactions. The maximum potential amount of future payments that the Company could be required to make under these indemnifications cannot be estimated. However, the Company believes that it is unlikely it will have to make material payments under these arrangements and has not recorded any contingent liability in the financial statements for these indemnifications. For the year ended December 31 2013 the Company experienced no material net losses as result of the indemnity.

4. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES (continued)

The Company has evaluated commitments and contingencies in accordance with Accounting Standards Codification 450, *Contingencies* (ASC 450) and Accounting Standards Codification 440, *Commitments* (ASC 440). Management has determined that no significant commitments or contingencies exist as of December 31, 2013.

5. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During the year ended December 31, 2013, the Company received \$320,445 of contributions from its members and paid \$115,497 of distributions to its members. Such amounts are included on the accompanying Statement of Changes in Members' Equity.

6. COMPUTATION FOR DETERMINATION OF RESERVE REQUIREMENTS UNDER RULE 15c3-3 OF THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION

The Company is exempt from the provisions of Rule 15c3-3 under the Security Exchange Act of 1934 pursuant to paragraph (k)(2)(ii) of the rule. All customer securities transactions are cleared through another broker-dealer on a fully disclosed basis.

7. INFORMATION RELATING TO THE POSSESSION OR CONTROL REQUIREMENTS UNDER RULE 15c3-3 OF THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION

The Company is exempt from the provisions of Rule 15c3-3 under the Security Exchange Act of 1934 pursuant to paragraph (k)(2)(ii) of the rule. The Company does not hold funds or securities for, or owe money or securities to, customers.

8. SIPC ASSESSMENT RECONCILIATION

The Company's operating revenue for the year ended December 31, 2013 did not exceed \$500,000. As a result, the Company is not required to include the Form SIPC-7 or the Accountant's Report on the SIPC Assessment Reconciliation. Such items are not included in this filing.

9. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

In January 2014, the Company officially changed its name to FundAmerica Securities, LLC.

In January 2014, the Company was approved by FINRA to revise its operations. The Company may now operate as a limited purpose broker-dealer and has the ability to participate in investment banking transactions and referrals in privately placed transactions for corporations and other companies with tax flow-through treatment. It may also participate in municipal securities transactions. As such, the Company's statutory net capital requirement increased from \$100,000 to \$250,000.

In January 2014, the Company was also approved by FINRA to operate exempt from the provisions of Rule 15c3-3 under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 pursuant to paragraph (k)(2)(i).

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements and supplementary schedule of Arctic Island Financial, LLC dba FundAmerica (the "Company"), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2013, we considered its internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities, in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on internal control.

Also, as required by Rule 17a-5(g)(1) of the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC"), we have made a study of the practices and procedures followed by the Company, including tests of such practices and procedures that we considered relevant to the objectives stated in Rule 17a-5(g) in making the periodic computations of aggregate indebtedness (or aggregate debits) and net capital under Rule 17a-3(a)(11) and for determining compliance with the exemptive provisions of Rule 15c3-3. Because the Company does not carry securities accounts for customers or perform custodial functions relating to customer securities, we did not review the practices and procedures followed by the Company in any of the following:

1. Making quarterly securities examinations, counts, verifications, and comparisons
2. Recordation of differences required by Rule 17a-13
3. Complying with the requirements for prompt payment for securities under Section 8 of Federal Reserve Regulation T of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System

The management of the Company is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of controls and the practices and procedures referred to in the preceding paragraph, and to assess whether those practices and procedures can be expected to achieve the SEC's above mentioned objectives. Two of the objectives of internal control and the practices and procedures are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute assurance that assets for which the Company has responsibility are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Rule 17a-5(g) lists additional objectives of the practices and procedures listed in the preceding paragraph.

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Because of inherent limitations in any internal control or the practices and procedures referred to above, errors or fraud may occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of them to future periods is subject to the risk that they may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or the effectiveness of their design and operation may deteriorate.

Our consideration of the internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in internal control that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of the specific internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that error or fraud in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. However, we noted no matters involving the internal control, including control activities for safeguarding securities that we consider to be material weakness as defined above.

We understand that practices and procedures that accomplish the objectives referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the SEC to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and related regulations, and that practices and procedures that do not accomplish such objectives in all material respects indicate a material inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, we believe that the Company's practices and procedures were adequate as of December 31, 2013 to meet the SEC's objectives.

This report recognizes that it is not practicable in an organization the size of the Company to achieve all the division of duties and cross-checks generally included in a system of internal accounting control, and that alternatively, greater reliance must be placed on surveillance by management.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Directors, management, the SEC, and other regulatory agencies that rely on Rule 17a-5(g) under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 in their regulation of registered brokers and dealers and is not intended to be used by anyone other than these specified parties.
