1D SteelOaks Investment Advisers, Inc. (the _Registrant_) is an investment adviser providing consulting and investment management services to individuals, pension and profit sharing plans, trusts, estates, charitable organizations, corporations and business entities. The Registrant, depending upon the engagement, offers its services on a fee basis which may include fixed fees as well as fees based upon assets under management. Prior to engaging the Registrant to provide any of the foregoing investment advisory services, the client will be required to enter into one or more written agreements with the Registrant setting forth the terms and conditions under which the Registrant shall render its services (collectively the "Agreement").

The Registrant's investment advisory services are generally limited to the discretionary management of investment portfolios in accordance with the investment objective(s) of the client. The Registrant does not provide financial planning services. However, the Registrant may provide consulting services on investment-related matters for which the Registrant may or may not receive additional compensation, as further discussed below.

In the event the client determines to engage the Registrant to provide investment management services, the Registrant shall do so on a fee basis. If engaged, the Registrant shall charge an annual fee based upon a percentage of the market value of the assets being managed by the Registrant. As discussed in response to Item 12B (below), the Registrant's annual fee is exclusive of, and in addition to brokerage commissions, transaction fees, and other related costs and expenses which shall be incurred by the client. However, the Registrant shall not receive any portion of these commissions, fees, and costs. Unless agreed otherwise with the client, the Registrant's annual fee shall be prorated and charged quarterly, based upon the market value of the assets on the last day of the previous quarter. The Registrant's annual fee shall generally be charged in advance, but may occasionally be charged in arrears, as agreed upon with clients. The annual fee shall vary (up to 1.50%) depending upon the market value of the assets under management and the type of investment management services to be rendered.

The Registrant offers advice on each type of investment described in Part II of Form ADV (Item 3). However, the Registrant intends to primarily allocate its client's investment management assets, on a discretionary and/or a non-discretionary basis among individual debt and equity securities, mutual funds, exchange traded funds and/or options in accordance with the investment objectives of the client.

As further discussed in response to Item 12B (below), the Registrant shall generally recommend that clients utilize the brokerage and clearing services of Fidelity Investments and its affiliates (collectively referred to as "Fidelity") for investment management accounts.

The Registrant may only implement its investment management recommendations after the client has arranged for and furnished the Registrant with all information and authorization regarding accounts with appropriate financial institutions. Financial institutions shall include, but are not limited to, Fidelity, any other broker-dealer recommended by the Registrant, broker-dealer directed by the client, trust companies, banks, etc. (collectively referred to herein as the "Financial Institutions(s)").

Clients may incur certain charges imposed by the Financial Institution(s) and other third parties such as custodial fees, charges imposed directly by a mutual fund or exchange traded fund in the account, which shall be disclosed in the fund's prospectus (e.g., fund management fees and other fund expenses), deferred sales charges, odd-lot differentials, transfer taxes, wire transfer and electronic fund fees, and other fees and taxes on brokerage accounts and securities transactions. Additionally, for assets outside of any wrap fee programs, clients may incur brokerage commissions and transaction fees. Such charges, fees and commissions are exclusive of and in addition to the Registrant's fee.

The Registrant's Agreement and/or the separate agreement with the Financial Institution(s) may authorize the Registrant through the Financial Institution(s) to debit the client's account for the amount of the Registrant's fee and to directly remit that management fee to the Registrant in accordance with applicable custody rules. The Financial Institution(s) recommended by the Registrant have agreed to send a statement to the client, at least quarterly, indicating all amounts disbursed from the account including the amount of management fees paid directly to the Registrant.

The Registrant also may render non-discretionary investment management services to clients relative to: (1) variable life/annuity products that they may own, and/or (2) their individual employer-sponsored retirement plans. In so doing, the Registrant either directs or recommends the allocation of client assets among the various mutual fund subdivisions that comprise the variable life/annuity product or the retirement plan. The client assets shall be maintained at either the specific insurance company that issued the variable life/annuity product which is owned by the client, or at the custodian designated by the sponsor of the client's retirement plan.

The client may make additions to and withdrawals from the account at any time, subject to the Registrant's right to terminate an account. Where fees are charged in advance, if assets are deposited into an account after the inception of a quarter that exceed \$200,000, the fee payable with respect to such assets will be prorated based on the number of days remaining in the quarter. Clients may withdraw account assets on notice to the Registrant, subject to the usual and customary securities settlement procedures. Where fees are charged in advance, for partial withdrawals in excess of \$200,000 within a billing period, the Registrant shall credit its unearned fee towards the next quarter's fee. However, the Registrant designs its portfolios as

long-term investments and assets withdrawals may impair the achievement of a client's investment objectives.

The Registrant's investment management fee is generally inclusive of any investment-related consulting services. For non-investment management clients and investment management clients that require a disproportionate amount of consulting services, the Registrant may charge a separate fee for investment-related consulting services. In these limited circumstances, an additional fixed fee shall be agreed upon prior to rendering the consulting services.

For the initial quarter of investment management services, the first quarter's fees shall be calculated on a pro rata basis. The Agreement between the Registrant and the client will continue in effect until terminated by either party pursuant to the terms of the Agreement. The Registrant's annual fee shall be prorated through the date of termination and any remaining balance shall be charged or refunded to the client, as appropriate, in a timely manner.

Additions may be in cash or securities provided that the Registrant reserves the right to liquidate any transferred securities, or decline to accept particular securities into a client's accounts. The Registrant may consult with its clients about the options and ramifications of transferring securities. However, clients are advised that when transferred securities are liquidated, they are subject to transaction fees, fees assessed at the mutual fund level (i.e. contingent deferred sales charge) and/or tax ramifications.

The Registrant's clients are advised to promptly notify the Registrant if there are ever any changes in their financial situation or investment objectives or if they wish to impose any reasonable restrictions upon the Registrant's management services.

Neither the Registrant nor the client may assign the Agreement without the consent of the other party. Transactions that do not result in a change of actual control or management of the Registrant shall not be considered an assignment.

A copy of the Registrant's privacy policy notice and a written disclosure statement that meets the requirements of Rule 204-3 of the Investment Advisers Act of 1940, as amended ("Advisers Act"), shall be provided to each client prior to or contemporaneously with the execution of the Agreement. Any client who has not received a copy of the Registrant's written disclosure statement at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to executing the Agreement shall have five (5) business days subsequent to executing the agreement to terminate the Registrant's services without penalty.

The Registrant may vote proxies on behalf of its clients. When the Registrant accepts such responsibility, it will only cast proxy votes in a manner consistent with the best interest of its clients. Absent special circumstances, which are fully described in the Registrant's Proxy Voting Policies and Procedures, all proxies will be voted consistent with guidelines established and described in the Registrant's Proxy Voting Policies and Procedures, as they may be amended from time-to-time. At any time, clients may contact the Registrant to request information about how Registrant voted proxies for that client's securities or to get a copy of

the Registrant's Proxy Voting Policies and Procedures. A brief summary of the Registrant's Proxy Voting Policies and Procedures is as follows:

- * The Registrant has formed a Proxy Voting Committee that will be responsible for monitoring corporate actions, making voting decisions in the best interest of clients, and ensuring that proxies are submitted in a timely manner.
- * The Proxy Voting Committee will generally vote proxies according to the Registrant's then current Proxy Voting Guidelines. The Proxy Voting Guidelines include many specific examples of voting decisions for the types of proposals that are most frequently presented, including: composition of the board of directors; approval of independent auditors; management and director compensation; anti-takeover mechanisms and related issues; changes to capital structure; corporate and social policy issues; and issues involving mutual funds.
- * Although the Proxy Voting Guidelines are to be followed as a general policy, certain issues will be considered on a case-by-case basis based on the relevant facts and circumstances. Since corporate governance issues are diverse and continually evolving, the Registrant shall devote an appropriate amount of time and resources to monitor these changes.
- * In situations where there may be a conflict of interest in the voting of proxies due to business or personal relationships that the Registrant maintains with persons having an interest in the outcome of certain votes, the Registrant will take appropriate steps to ensure that its proxy voting decisions are made in the best interest of its clients and are not the product of such conflict.

3L The Registrant may also provide advice about exchange traded funds (ETF's) and any type of investment held in a client's portfolio at the beginning of the advisory relationship.

7A The Registrant may provide certain of its clients with consulting services (which may include non-investment related matters). The Registrant may or may not charge a fee for these services. Any of the Registrant's consulting fees are negotiable, but generally range from \$500 to \$10,000 on a fixed fee basis, depending upon the level and scope of the services and the professional rendering the consulting services.

Where the Registrant charges a fee for consulting services, the client will generally be required to enter into a written agreement with the Registrant setting forth the terms and conditions of the engagement and describing the scope of the services to be provided and the portion of the fee that is due from the client prior to the Registrant commencing services. Generally, the Registrant requires one-half of the consulting fee payable upon entering the written agreement. The balance is generally due upon completion of the agreed upon services. Either party may terminate the agreement by written notice to the other. In the event the client terminated the Registrant's consulting services, the balance of the Registrant's unearned fee (if any) shall be refunded to the client. If termination occurs within five business days of entering into an agreement for such services the client shall be entitled to a full refund.

In performing its services, the Registrant shall not be required to verify any information received from the client or from the client's other professionals (e.g., attorney, accountant, etc.) and is expressly authorized to rely on such information. The Registrant may recommend the services of itself and/or other professionals to implement its recommendations. Clients are advised that a conflict of interest exists if the Registrant recommends its own services. The client is under no obligation to act upon any of the recommendations made by the Registrant

under a consulting engagement and/or engage the services of any such recommended professional, including the Registrant itself. The client retains absolute discretion over all such implementation decisions and is free to accept or reject any of the Registrant's recommendations. Moreover, each client is advised that it remains his/her/its responsibility to promptly notify the Registrant if there is ever any change in his/her/its financial situation or investment objectives for the purpose of reviewing, evaluating, or revising the Registrant's previous recommendations and/or services.

The Registrant may sell its research and analysis to various institutions as part of its institutional consulting services. The Registrant's institutional consulting services are specialized engagements individually negotiated with each institution based upon their specific needs. The Registrant's institutional consulting services are generally investment related. The Registrant will charge a fixed fee for these services and shall not render such institutional consulting services to its investment advisory clients. Clients are advised that these services present a conflict of interest whereas certain institutional clients of the Registrant could receive and act upon the Registrant's research before the Registrant utilizes its research for its non-institutional clients. In fact, the Registrant's engagement with institutional clients may prohibit the Registrant from utilizing its research until the expiration of an agreed-upon waiting period. Non-institutional clients may be disadvantaged by this delay. The Registrant anticipates that it will devote approximately less than ten percent (10%) of its time to such consulting services.

9E The Registrant does not buy nor sell for itself, as a firm, securities that it also recommends to clients. However, persons associated with the Registrant ("Associated Persons"), in their individual capacities, are permitted to buy or sell securities that the Registrant recommends to clients only if those transactions are in compliance with the Registrant's written policies and procedures.

The Registrant has adopted a code of ethics that sets forth the standards of conduct expected of its associated persons and requires compliance with applicable securities laws ("Code of Ethics"). In accordance with Section 204A of the Advisers Act, its Code of Ethics contains written policies reasonably designed to prevent the unlawful use of material non-public information by the Registrant personnel (called "Access Persons") report their personal securities holdings and transactions and obtain pre-approval of certain investments such as initial public offerings and limited offerings. Clients may contact the Registrant to request a copy of its Code of Ethics.

Unless specifically permitted in the Registrant's Code of Ethics, none of the Registrant's Access Persons may effect for themselves or for their immediate family (i.e., spouse, minor children, and adults living in the same household as the Access Person) any transactions in a security which is being actively purchased or sold, or is being considered for purchase or sale, on behalf of any of the Registrant's clients.

When the Registrant is purchasing or considering for purchase any security on behalf of a client, no Access Person may effect a transaction in that security prior to the completion of the purchase or until a decision has been made not to purchase such security. Similarly, when the

Registrant is selling or considering the sale of any security on behalf of a client, no Access Person may effect a transaction in that security prior to the completion of the sale or until a decision has been made not to sell such security. These requirements are not applicable to: (i) direct obligations of the Government of the United States; (ii) money market instruments, bankers' acceptances, bank certificates of deposit, commercial paper, repurchase agreements and other high quality short-term debt instruments, including repurchase agreements; (iii) shares issued by mutual funds or money market funds; and (iv) shares issued by unit investment trusts that are invested exclusively in one or more mutual funds.

11A For those clients to whom the Registrant provides investment supervisory services, the Registrant monitors those portfolios as part of an ongoing process while regular account reviews are conducted on at least a quarterly basis. For those clients to whom the Registrant provides investment management services, account reviews are conducted on a quarterly basis. For those clients to whom the Registrant provides consulting services, reviews are conducted on an "as needed" basis. Such reviews are conducted by one of the Principals of the Registrant. All investment advisory clients are encouraged to discuss their needs, goals, and objectives with the Registrant and to keep the Registrant informed of any changes thereto. The Registrant shall contact ongoing investment advisory clients at least annually to review its previous services and/or recommendations and to discuss the impact resulting from any changes in the client's financial situation and/or investment objectives.

11B Unless otherwise agreed upon, clients are provided with transaction confirmation notices and regular summary account statements directly from the broker-dealer or custodian for the client accounts. Those clients to whom the Registrant provides investment advisory services will also receive a report from the Registrant that may include such relevant account and/or market-related information such as an inventory of account holdings and account performance as agreed with each client.

Those clients to whom the Registrant provides consulting services will receive reports from the Registrant summarizing its analysis and conclusions as requested by the client or otherwise agreed to in writing by the Registrant.

13A Except as provided for in any applicable wrap fee program, the brokerage commissions and/or transaction fees charged by Fidelity or any other designated broker-dealer are exclusive of and in addition to the Registrant's fee.

Factors which the Registrant considers in recommending Fidelity or any other broker-dealer, to clients include their respective financial strength, reputation, execution, pricing, research, and service. Fidelity enables the Registrant to obtain many mutual funds without transaction charges and other securities at nominal transaction charges. The commissions and/or transaction fees charged by Fidelity may be higher or lower than those charged by other broker-dealers.

The commissions paid by the Registrant's clients shall comply with the Registrant's duty to

obtain "best execution." However, a client may pay a commission that is higher than another qualified broker-dealer might charge to effect the same transaction where the Registrant determines, in good faith, that the commission is reasonable in relation to the value of the brokerage and research services received. In seeking best execution, the determinative factor is not the lowest possible cost, but whether the transaction represents the best qualitative execution, taking into consideration the full range of a broker-dealer's services, including among others, the value of research provided, execution capability, commission rates, it may not necessarily obtain the lowest possible rates for client transactions.

If the client requests the Registrant to arrange for the execution of securities brokerage transactions for the client's account, the Registrant shall direct such transactions through broker-dealers that the Registrant reasonable believes will provide best execution. Transactions may be cleared through other broker-dealers with whom the Registrant and the Financial Institution(s) have entered into agreements for prime brokerage clearing services. The Registrant shall periodically and systematically review its policies and procedures regarding recommending broker-dealers to its client in light of its duty to obtain best execution.

The client may direct the Registrant in writing to use a particular broker-dealer to execute some or all transactions for the client. In that case, the client will negotiate terms and arrangements for the account with that broker-dealer, and the Registrant will not seek better execution services or prices from other broker-dealers or be able to "batch" client transactions for execution through other broker-dealers with orders for other accounts managed by the Registrant (as described below). As a result, the client may pay higher commissions or other transaction costs or greater spreads, or receive less favorable net prices, on transactions for the account than would otherwise be the case. Subject to its duty of best execution, the Registrant may decline a client's request to direct brokerage if, in the Registrant's sole discretion, such directed brokerage arrangements would result in additional operational difficulties. Transactions for each client generally will be effected independently, unless the Registrant decides to purchase or sell the same securities for several clients at approximately the same time. The Registrant may (but is not obligated to) combine or "batch" such orders to obtain best execution, to negotiate more favorable commission rates, or to allocate equitably among the Registrant's clients differences in prices and commissions or other transaction costs that might have been obtained had such orders been placed independently. Under this procedure, transactions will generally be averaged as to price and allocated among the Registrant's clients pro rata to the purchase and sale orders placed for each client on any given day. To the extent that the Registrant determines to aggregate client orders for the purchase or sale of securities, including securities in which the Registrant's Advisory Affiliate(s) may invest, the Registrant shall generally do so in accordance with applicable rules promulgated under the Advisers Act and no-action guidance provided by the staff of the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. The Registrant shall not receive any additional compensation or remuneration as a result of the aggregation. In the event that the Registrant determines that a prorated allocation is not appropriate under the particular circumstances, the allocation will be made based upon other relevant factors, which may include: (i) when only a small percentage of the order is executed, shares may be allocated to the account with the smallest order or the smallest position or to an account that is out of line with respect to security or sector

weightings relative to other portfolios, with similar mandates; (ii) allocations may be given to one account when one account has limitations in its investment guidelines which prohibit it from purchasing other securities which are expected to produce similar investment results and can be purchased by other accounts; (iii) if an account reaches an investment guideline limit and cannot participate in an allocation, shares may be reallocated to other accounts (this may be due to unforeseen changes in an account's assets after an order is placed); (iv) with respect to sale allocations, allocations may be given to accounts low in cash; (v) in cases when a pro rata allocation of a potential execution would result in a de minimis allocation in one or more accounts, the Registrant may exclude the account(s) from the allocation; the transactions may be executed on a pro rata basis among the remaining accounts; or (vi) in cases where a small proportion of an order is executed in all accounts, shares may be allocated to one or more accounts on a random basis.

The Registrant may receive from Fidelity, without cost, computer software and related systems support, which allow the Registrant to better monitor client accounts maintained at Fidelity. The Registrant may receive the software and related support without cost because the Registrant renders investment management services to clients that, in the aggregate, maintain a certain level of assets at Fidelity.

Specifically, the Registrant may receive the following benefits from Fidelity through the Fidelity Registered Investment Advisor Group: receipt of duplicate client confirmations and bundled duplicated statements; access to a trading desk that exclusively services its Registered Investment Advisor Group participants; access to block trading which provides the ability to aggregate securities transactions and then allocate the appropriate shares to client accounts; and access to an electronic communication network for client order entry and account information.

13B If a client is introduced to the Registrant by either an unaffiliated or an affiliated solicitor, the Registrant may pay that solicitor a referral fee in accordance with the requirements of Rule 206(4)-3 of the Advisers Act and any corresponding state securities law requirements. Any such referral fee shall be paid solely from the Registrant's investment management fee, and shall not result in any additional charge to the client. If the client is introduced to the Registrant by an unaffiliated solicitor, the solicitor shall provide the client with a copy of the Registrant's written disclosure statement which meets the requirements of Rule 204-3 of the Advisers Act and a copy of the solicitor's disclosure statement contains the terms and conditions of the solicitation arrangement including compensation. Any affiliated solicitor of the Registrant shall disclose the nature of his/her relationship to prospective clients with a copy of the Registrant's written disclosure statement at the time of the solicitation.
