Item 3 Disciplinary Information

If there are legal or disciplinary events material to your evaluation of Ms. Evans, we are required to disclose all material facts regarding those events.¹

We have nothing to disclose in this regard.

Item 4 Other Business Activities

A. If Ms. Evans is actively engaged in any *investment-related* business or occupation, including if she is registered, or has an application pending to register, as a broker-dealer, registered representative of a broker-dealer, futures commission merchant (“FCM”), commodity pool operator (“CPO”), commodity trading advisor (“CTA”), or an associated *person* of an FCM, CPO, or CTA, we are required to disclose this fact and describe the business relationship, if any, between the advisory business and the other business.

1. If a relationship between the advisory business and Ms. Evans’s other financial industry activities creates a material conflict of interest with you, the SEC requires us to describe the nature of the conflict and generally how we address it.

We have nothing to disclose in this regard.

¹ **Note:** Our firm may, under certain circumstances, rebut the presumption that a disciplinary event is material. If an event is immaterial, we are not required to disclose it. When we review a legal or disciplinary event involving Ms. Evans to determine whether it is appropriate to rebut the presumption of materiality, we consider all of the following factors: (1) the proximity of Ms. Evans to the advisory function; (2) the nature of the infraction that led to the disciplinary event; (3) the severity of the disciplinary sanction; and (4) the time elapsed since the date of the disciplinary event. If we conclude that the materiality presumption has been overcome, we prepare and maintain a file memorandum of our determination in our records. We follow SEC rule 204-2(a)(14)(iii) and similar state rules.

2. If Ms. Evans receives commissions, bonuses or other compensation based on the sale of securities or other investment products, including as a broker-dealer or registered representative, and including distribution or service (“trail”) fees from the sale of mutual funds, we have to disclose this fact. If this compensation is not cash, we are required to explain what type of compensation she receives. We must explain that this practice gives Ms. Evans an incentive to recommend investment products based on the compensation received, rather than on your needs.

Ms. Evans is a registered representative of Royal Alliance, Inc., member FINRA/SIPC. She may offer securities and receive normal and customary commissions as a result of securities transactions. This presents a conflict of interest to the extent that Ms. Evans recommends that a client invest in a security which results in a commission being paid to her.

A conflict of interest may arise as these commissionable securities sales may create an incentive to recommend products incentive to recommend products based on the compensation adviser and/or our supervised persons may earn and may not necessarily be in the best interests of the client.

- B. If Ms. Evans is actively engaged in any business or occupation for compensation not discussed in response to Item 4.A, above, and the other business activity or activities provide a substantial source of her income or involve a substantial amount of her time, we are required to disclose this fact and must describe the nature of that business. If the other business activities represent less than 10 percent of Ms. Evans’s time and income, we may presume that they are not substantial.

We have nothing to disclose in this regard.

Item 5 Additional Compensation

If someone who is not a *client* provides an economic benefit to Ms. Evans for providing advisory services, we are required to generally describe the arrangement. For purposes of this Item, economic benefits include sales awards and other prizes, but do not include her regular salary. Any bonus that is based, at least in part, on the number or amount of sales, *client* referrals, or new accounts should be considered an economic benefit, but other regular bonuses should not.
