

Item 1 – Introduction: Is an investment advisory account right for you?

AUA Private Wealth Advisors, LLC is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment adviser. Please be aware that brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and that it is important for you to understand the differences. Item 2 – What investment services and advice can you provide me?

We offer investment advisory services to retail investors. Our principal service is wealth management. This service combines financial planning with ongoing portfolio management. Wealth management clients first receive a financial plan that is used to assist us in organizing a client's financial information and determining the scope of services that are most suitable for the client's financial situation and investment needs. Once a financial plan is in place, the firm implements investment recommendations as part of its ongoing portfolio management service. The financial plan is monitored and revised on an as needed basis. We use model portfolios developed by our firm or other registered investment advisers. In cases where the model portfolio is developed by other registered investment advisers, these other investment advisers are responsible for the research and security selection within the model. Our portfolio management services are offered on a discretionary basis. *Discretionary* authorization allows us to determine the specific securities, and the number of securities, to be purchased or sold for your account without your approval prior to each transaction. We do not limit our advice to proprietary products, or a limited menu of products or types of investments. We do not require a minimum amount of assets to establish a relationship with our firm.

Item 3 – What fees will I pay?

We are primarily compensated by a percentage of assets under our management and hourly fees. Our fees vary depending on the services you receive. We charge an annual portfolio management fee of up to 1.50% of assets under management, payable monthly, or quarterly in arrears, based upon the market value of the assets on the last day of the previous quarter. Fees will be assessed pro rata in the event the agreement is executed at any time other than the first day of a billing period. Fees will be adjusted for any deposits or withdrawals during the quarter. We may deduct the fee from a single, client-designated account to facilitate billing. The more assets there are in your advisory account, the more you will pay in fees. Therefore, we have an incentive to encourage you to increase the assets in your account. Our fees are negotiable depending upon the complexity and scope of the service, your financial situation, and your objectives. Other fee payment arrangements can be negotiated on a case-by-case basis. These arrangements will be listed in the advisory agreement signed by the firm and the client.

Description of Other Fees and Costs: The fees that you pay to our firm for investment advisory services are separate and distinct from the fees and expenses charged by investment companies (i.e., mutual funds, exchange traded funds, unit investment trusts and variable annuities). These fees are described in each fund's prospectus. These fees will generally include a management fee and other fund expenses. You will also incur transaction charges and/or brokerage fees when purchasing or selling securities. These charges and fees are typically imposed by the custodial broker dealer that executes the trade. The custodial broker dealer may also charge your account for custodial fees, retirement account fees, trust fees, exchange fees, redemption fees that may be assessed on investment company shares, transfer fees, account termination fees or other special service fees and charges. We do not share in any portion of these fees imposed by the custodial broker dealer. To fully understand the total cost you will incur, you should review all the fees charged by investment companies, broker-dealers, our firm, and others.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means:

All investment advisers face conflicts of interest which are inherent in the business. Our primary source of compensation is through asset-based fees. Therefore, we are incentivized to acquire new clients and to increase assets under management. Other conflicts of interest result from other business activities we engage in and relationships we have with business partners our custodial broker dealer(s) (i.e., Schwab), and other third parties; or affiliations we have established with other financial institutions.

When we provide investment advice to you regarding your retirement plan account or individual retirement account, we are fiduciaries within the meaning of Title I of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act and/or the Internal Revenue Code, as applicable, which are laws governing retirement accounts. We have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests.

How do your financial professionals make money?

Our financial professionals receive fees based on a percentage of advisory billings along with bonuses. Financial professionals who have an ownership interest in the firm will also receive additional compensation in the form of distributions. Therefore, our financial professionals have an incentive to encourage you to increase the assets in your account.
