WealthShield, LLC ® is an investment adviser registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ, and it is important for you to understand the differences. Free and simple tools are available to research firms and financial professionals at investor.gov/CRS, which also provides educational materials about broker-dealers, investment advisers, and investing.

What investment services and advice can you provide me?

We offer investment advisory services to retail investors. Our advisory services for retail investors include asset management and financial planning. We also participate in and sponsor a wrap fee program. As part of our standard asset management services, we monitor client accounts on an ongoing basis. We offer discretionary and non-discretionary asset management services. If you participate in our discretionary asset management services, we require you to grant our firm discretionary authority to manage your account. Discretionary authorization will allow our firm without further authorization from you to, among other things, purchase and sell securities for your account, select and retain sub-advisers and/or money managers and platforms, and all matters necessary or incidental to the management of your account. You may limit our discretionary authority by providing our firm with your restrictions and guidelines in writing. For non-discretionary asset management services, we will review your accounts on a periodic basis (at least annually) and make recommendations to you. You retain the authority to implement any recommendation, and we will obtain your approval prior to executing any transactions. Our financial planning generally includes recommendation for a course of activity to be taken by you. Implementation of any recommendation provided through this service will be at your sole discretion. We generally do not limit investment advice to certain investment types. We do not have a minimum account size or other requirements for opening and maintaining accounts or otherwise engaging us. - What is your relevant experience, including your licenses, education, and other qualifications? What do these qualifications mean?

What fees will I pay?

We typically charge an asset-based fee for asset management services, however in certain situations we will charge a flat fee. Asset-based fees are billed quarterly in advance based on the value of your account on the last day of the previous quarter. We charge on an hourly or flat fee basis for financial planning services. If you participate in our wrap fee program, we will charge you an asset-based fee, and pay all transaction fees using the fee collected from you. Therefore, the asset-based fee for accounts in the wrap fee program will generally be higher than a typical asset-based advisory fee. This asset-based fee is billed quarterly in advance based on the value of your account on the last day of the previous quarter. The more assets that are in your advisory account, the more you will pay in fees; thus, we have an incentive to encourage you to increase the assets in your account. Accounts participating in the wrap fee program are not charged higher advisory fees based on trading activity, but you should be aware that we have an incentive not to place transaction orders in those accounts since doing so increases our transaction costs. Clients not participating in a wrap fee program may incur transaction charges for trades executed in their accounts. These transaction fees are separate from our fees. All clients may incur certain charges imposed by custodians, brokers, and other third parties such as platform fees, sub-advisers, custodial fees, deferred sales charges, odd-lot differentials, transfer taxes, wire transfer and electronic fund fees, and other fees and taxes on brokerage accounts and securities transactions. Also, you will pay the following separately incurred expenses: charges imposed directly by a mutual fund, index fund, or ETF, which expenses and charges are generally disclosed in the fund's prospectus (e.g., fund management fees, distribution fees and other fund expenses). Such charges, fees, and commissions are exclusive of, and in addition to, our fee.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying. Key questions to ask: Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs? How much will be invested for me?

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means. We use retail broker-dealers to execute trades in your account(s). One of the broker-dealers we recommend is Raymond James Financial Services, Inc. ("RJFS"), a FINRA/SIPC member. RJFS has currently provided repayable loans and transition assistance to our firm that is contingent upon us maintaining a certain amount of assets at RJFS for five years through June 2022. If we fail to maintain a certain amount of assets at RJFS, we will be required to repay a portion of the transition assistance. The receipt of economic benefits by our firm or our related persons in and of itself creates a conflict of interest as it creates an incentive to choose RJFS for custody and brokerage services. Client accounts are generally managed via third-party investment management platforms ("Platforms"). Platforms are paid a fee based on the amount of client assets on the Platform ("Platform Fee"). We receive a portion of the Platform Fee either directly or through an affiliate. This creates a conflict of interest as we have an incentive to recommend Platforms based on our receipt of a portion of the Platform Fee rather than your best interests. You should review your client agreement with WealthShield Partners, LLC® to confirm if you are required to pay a Platform Fee. WealthShield LLC ("WS"), an affiliate, has entered into agreements to provide services to ETF Providers. WS receives a flat fee from such ETF Providers as compensation for its services. These services are used by providers in certain ETFs ("Model ETFs"). In addition, WS creates other products such as model investment portfolios ("Model Products"). WS receives an asset-based fee for certain Model Products so the more assets in the Model Product, the more compensation WS will receive. This creates a conflict of interest. We recommend investment in the Model ETFs and Model Products. In addition, WS includes Model ETFs as investments in Model Products. All fees received by WS for Model ETFs and Model Products are in addition to the compensation we receive for our advisory services. WS's compensation for Model ETFs is not directly dependent on the amount of assets invested in the Model ETF. However, if the asset level in a Model ETF decreased the provider of the ETF may close the ETF and terminate its agreement with WS. As a result, this creates a conflict of interest as we have an incentive to recommend Model ETFs. We are affiliated with DIO Management, LLC ("DIO"), an investment advisory firm that is exempt from registration. DIO manages a hedge fund that WSP recommends to certain clients. This presents a conflict of interest as we have an incentive to recommend investment in the hedge fund as a result of fees paid to DIO, which include a mix of management fees and/or performance fees.

Key questions to ask: How might your conflicts of interest affect me and how will you address them?
