**Order Finding Service,  
Directing Respondent  
to Show Cause, and Scheduling  
Prehearing Conference**

On September 6, 2017, the Securities and Exchange Commission issued an order instituting proceedings (OIP) against Respondent under Section 12(j) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934. After a prior initial decision was vacated by the Commission, the proceeding was reassigned to me on September 12, 2018. *Pending Admin. Proc.*, Admin. Proc. Rulings Release No. 5955, 2018 SEC LEXIS 2264, at \*2-3 (ALJ). The parties were provided the opportunity to propose how further proceedings should be conducted. *Tintic Gold Mining Co.*, Admin. Proc. Rulings Release No. 6054, 2018 SEC LEXIS 2517, at \*1 (ALJ Sept. 21, 2018). Respondent did not file a proposal.

On September 19, 2017, the Division submitted a declaration of service. After independently reviewing the declaration, I find that it establishes that Respondent was served with the OIP by September 11, 2017, by U.S. Postal Service Priority Mail Express delivery to its registered agent. 17 C.F.R. § 201.141(a)(2)(i), (ii). Respondent did not file an answer.

I ORDER Respondent to SHOW CAUSE by November 19, 2018, why the registration of its securities should not be revoked by default due to its failure to file an answer or otherwise defend this proceeding. If Respondent fails to respond to this order, it shall be deemed in default, the proceeding will be determined against it, and the registration of its securities will be revoked. OIP at 3; 17 C.F.R. §§ 201.155(a)(2), .220(f).

I FURTHER ORDER that a telephonic prehearing conference shall be held December 17, 2018, at 3:30 p.m. EST, if this matter has not been

concluded by then. The Division shall circulate dial-in instructions prior to the conference.
