ORDER TO SHOW CAUSE

The Securities and Exchange Commission (“Commission”) issued an Order Instituting Proceedings (“OIP”) on September 13, 2021, pursuant to Section 12(j) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, against respondent WorldNet, Inc. of Nevada (“Respondent”).¹

On October 5, 2021, the Division of Enforcement filed a Declaration of Gina Joyce, which established that, pursuant to Commission Rule of Practice 141(a)(2)(ii),² service of the OIP was made on Respondent on September 27, 2021.³

³ On December 14, 2021, Respondent filed a Form 15 to terminate the registration of its securities under Exchange Act Section 12(g). We note that, unlike in some recent cases in which a Form 15 has been filed but an answer has not been filed, in this case the Division has not filed a motion to find the corporation in default and to revoke the registration of its securities and for expedited consideration requesting that its motion for default and revocation be resolved prior to the effective date of the Form 15. *See, e.g., NXChain, Inc. f/k/a AgriVest Americas, Inc.*, Exchange Act Release No. 87652, 2019 WL 6528959 (Dec. 3, 2019). Nonetheless, Respondent should be aware that it may be deemed to be in default and the registration of its securities revoked before its Form 15 becomes effective if it does not file an answer or otherwise respond to this show cause order. *See, e.g., Piedmont Mining Co.*, Exchange Act Release No. 90998, 2021 WL 302893, at *3, *5 (Jan. 27, 2021) (expediting Section 12(j) proceeding and revoking registration of issuer’s securities where issuer defaulted in proceeding after filing a Form 15).

As stated in the OIP, Respondent's answer was required to be filed within ten days of the service of the OIP.⁴ As of the date of this order, Respondent has not filed an answer. The prehearing conference and hearing are thus continued indefinitely.

Accordingly, Respondent is ORDERED to SHOW CAUSE by January 18, 2022, why the registration of its securities should not be revoked by default due to its failure to file an answer and to otherwise defend this proceeding. When a party defaults, the allegations in the OIP will be deemed to be true and the Commission may determine the proceeding against that party upon consideration of the record without holding a public hearing.

If Respondent fails to respond to this order to show cause, it may be deemed in default, the proceeding may be determined against it, and the registration of its securities may be revoked.⁵ Upon review of the filings in response to this order, the Commission will either direct further proceedings by subsequent order or issue a final order resolving the matter.

The parties' attention is directed to the most recent amendments to the Commission's Rules of Practice, which took effect on April 12, 2021, and which include new e-filing requirements.⁶
