Item 1: Introduction

THOMPSON CAPITAL MANAGEMENT, LLC is an investment adviser registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission offering advisory accounts and services. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ, and it is important that you understand the differences. This document gives you a summary of the types of services and fees we offer. Item 2: Relationships and Services

Questions to ask us: Given my financial situation, should I choose an investment advisory service? Why or why not? How will you choose investments to recommend to me? What is your relevant experience, including your licenses, education and other qualifications? What do these qualifications mean?

What investment services and advice can you provide me? Our firm primarily offers the following investment advisory services to retail clients: portfolio management (we review your portfolio, and implement investment strategies and provide clients with investment recommendations). As part of our standard services, we typically frequently monitor client accounts, but not less than annually. Our firm has discretionary management. We do not limit the types of investments that are recommended to our clients. Our preferred dollar value for establishing an advisory account is \$100,000. Our firm also provides financial planning services and acts as a sub-adviser to other investment advisory firms. Please see our Form ADV Part 2A ("[Brochure](#)"), specifically Items 4 & 7.

Item 3: Fees, Costs, Conflicts, and Standard of Conduct

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have? *When we act as your investment adviser, we must act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means.*

The amount of assets in your account affects our advisory fee; the more assets you have in your advisory account, the more you will pay us and thus we have an incentive to increase those assets to increase our fee. As fiduciaries, this legal status mitigates the conflict of interest.

Questions to ask us: Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me? How might your conflicts of interest affect me, and how will you address them?

What fees will I pay? Our fees vary depending on the services you receive. The management fee will be paid quarterly, or where applicable, daily in arrears and is calculated as of the close of business on the last business day of the calendar quarter or day, as applicable. Financial planning fees are paid quarterly in advance and sub-advisory fees are billed on a quarterly basis by the third- party adviser, either in advance or arrears depending on the arrangement. You pay our fees even if you do not have any transactions and the advisory fee paid to us generally does not vary based on the type of investments selected. Some investments (e.g., mutual funds, variable annuities, etc.) impose additional fees (e.g., transactional fees and product-level fees) that reduce the value of your investment over time. The same goes for any additional fees you pay to a custodian. Additionally, you will pay transaction fees, if applicable, when we buy or sell an investment for your account. **You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. How do your financial professionals make money? Primarily, the firm and our financial professionals receive compensation from the advisory services we provide to you because of the advisory fees we receive from you. This compensation varies.
