Is an Investment Advisory Account Right for You?

There are different ways you can get help with your investments. You should carefully consider which types of accounts and services are right for you.

Item 1. Introduction

ATX Financial Planning, LLC (“Firm”, “We”, “Us”, “Our”) is an SEC registered investment advisor and provides advisory services for a fee rather than for brokerage commissions. As a retail investor, it is important to understand the differences between services and fees of an investment advisor and a broker-dealer. *Investor.gov/CRS* offers free and simple tools to research firms and financial professionals. Additionally, it also provides educational materials about broker-dealers, investment advisors, and investing.

Item 2. Relationships and Services

What investment services and advice can you provide me?

We offer the following investment advisory services to you:

Asset Management: We will offer you advice on a regular basis. We will discuss your investment goals, design with you a strategy to achieve your investment goals, and regularly monitor your account. We will monitor your account on a discretionary basis (we can buy and sell investments in your account without asking you in advance. We do not limit advisors to proprietary products or a limited menu of products and types of investments. As part of the recommendations provided, the Client may have a financial plan completed. This may include, but is not limited to, a thorough review of all applicable topics such as financial goals, cash flow analysis, comprehensive risk management, tax reduction strategies, personal net worth statement, retirement strategies, long term investment plans, and estate preservation. These services will continue pursuant to the terms of the executed Advisory Agreement. We do not have a minimum to open an account.

Assets Held Away: We use a third party platform to facilitate management of held away assets such as defined contribution plan participant accounts, with discretion. This service will continue pursuant to the terms of the executed Advisory Agreement. We do not have a minimum to open an account.

ERISA Services: We serve as a limited scope ERISA 3(21) Fiduciary that can advise, help and assist plan sponsors with their investment decisions on a non-discretionary basis. Plans are monitored on an ongoing basis. We have a fiduciary duty to act in the best interest of the Client. The plan sponsor is still ultimately responsible for the decisions made in their plan, though using us can help the plan sponsor delegate liability by following a diligent process.

Item 3. Fees, Costs, Conflicts and Standard of Conduct

What fees will I pay?

We are paid for our services as follows:

Asset Management and Assets Held Away: The amount paid to our firm and your financial professional generally does not vary based on the type of investments selected on your behalf. The asset-based fee reduces the value of your account and will be generally deducted from your account. You may also be charged a fee based on the performance in the account. Some investments (such as mutual funds and variable annuities) impose additional fees that will reduce the value of your investment over time. Also, with certain investments such as variable annuities, you may have to pay fees such as “surrender charges” to sell the investment. Fees are billed quarterly in advance. Our fees vary and are negotiable. Generally, the more assets you have in the advisory account, the more you will pay in total fees. We therefore have an incentive to increase the assets in your account in order to increase our fees. You will also pay fees to a broker-dealer or bank that will hold your assets (called “custody”). You pay our advisory fee even if there were no transactions within the account.

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You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying. "Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me?"

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means.

Sponsorships: On an annual basis we receive expense reimbursement/sponsorship from a product distributor for annual client appreciation events. This sponsorship is not tied to any specific sales quota. The receipt of money creates a conflict of interest when selecting investment products for clients. This conflict is mitigated by disclosures, procedures, and the firm's fiduciary obligation to place the best interest of the Client first.

Commissions: Our associated persons may receive commissions from the sale of insurance products and services. This conflict is mitigated by our fiduciary duty and adherence to our code of ethics. When referring clients to purchase insurance, the client's best interest will be the main determining factor.

How do your financial professionals make money?

Our financial services professionals are compensated based on a percentage of assets they manage, a percentage of performance based fees, marketing allowances, meals and travel and by sales commissions on insurance products.

This is a conflict of interest because our financial professionals have an incentive to encourage you to increase your assets in your accounts, recommend our advisory services to you, and recommend you purchase investments that result in additional compensation to them.
