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Item 2 – Material Changes

1858 Wealth believes that communication and transparency are the foundation of its relationship with Clients and will continually strive to provide its Clients with complete and accurate information at all times. 1858 Wealth encourages all current and prospective Clients to read this Disclosure Brochure and discuss any questions you may have with us. And of course, we always welcome your feedback.

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Item 4 – Advisory Services

A. Firm Information

1858 Wealth Management, LLC (“1858 Wealth” or the “Advisor”) is a registered investment advisor with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (“SEC”). 1858 Wealth which is organized as a Limited Liability Company under the laws of the State of Ohio. 1858 Wealth was founded in October 2009 and became a registered investment advisor in December 2019. 1858 Wealth is owned by Sean M. Houston (Partner) and Joseph P. D’Anniballe (Partner and Chief Compliance Officer). This Disclosure Brochure provides information regarding the qualifications, business practices, and the advisory services provided by 1858 Wealth.

B. Advisory Services Offered

1858 Wealth offers investment advisory services to high net worth individuals, families, trusts, estates, businesses, and other types of investors (each referred to as a “Client”).

The Advisor serves as a fiduciary to Clients, as defined under applicable laws and regulations. As a fiduciary, the Advisor upholds a duty of loyalty, fairness and good faith towards each Client and seeks to mitigate potential conflicts of interest. Our fiduciary commitment is further described in our Code of Ethics. For more information regarding our Code of Ethics, please see Item 11 – Code of Ethics, Participation or Interest in Client Transactions and Personal Trading.

Investment Management Services

1858 Wealth provides customized investment advisory solutions for its Clients. This is achieved through continuous personal Client contact and interaction while providing discretionary investment management and related advisory services. 1858 Wealth works with each Client to identify their investment goals and objectives as well as risk tolerance and financial situation in order to create an investment strategy. 1858 Wealth will then design an investment strategy that may include the Advisor’s internal investment management and/or the use of independent managers and/or internal investment management.

Internal Management – 1858 Wealth will construct Client portfolios utilizing mutual funds, exchange-traded funds (“ETFs”), mutual funds, individual equities and individual bonds. The Advisor may also utilize options, private investments and other types of investments, as appropriate, to meet the needs of certain Clients.

1858 Wealth’s investment strategies are primarily long-term focused, but the Advisor may buy, sell or re-allocate investments that have been held less than one year to meet the objectives of the Client or due to market conditions. 1858 Wealth will construct, implement and monitor the portfolio to ensure it meets the goals, objectives, circumstances, and risk tolerance agreed to by the Client. Each Client will have the opportunity to place reasonable restrictions on the types of investments to be held in their respective portfolio, subject to acceptance by the Advisor.

1858 Wealth evaluates and selects investments for inclusion in Client portfolios only after applying its internal due diligence process. 1858 Wealth may recommend, on occasion, redistributing investment allocations to diversify the portfolio. 1858 Wealth may recommend specific positions to increase sector or asset class weightings. The Advisor may recommend employing cash positions as a possible hedge against market movement. 1858 Wealth may recommend selling positions for reasons that include, but are not limited to, harvesting capital gains or losses, business or sector risk exposure to a specific security or class of securities, overvaluation or overweighting of the position[s] in the portfolio, change in risk tolerance of Client, generating cash to meet Client needs, or any risk deemed unacceptable for the Client’s risk tolerance.

At no time will 1858 Wealth accept or maintain custody of a Client’s funds or securities, except for the limited authority as detailed in Item 15 - Custody. All Client assets will be managed within their designated brokerage account or pension account, pursuant to the Client investment advisory agreement.

Use of Independent Managers – 1858 Wealth may recommend that a Client utilize one or more unaffiliated investment managers or investment platforms (collectively “Independent Managers”) in connection with a

Client's investment strategy[ies]. In such instances, the Client may be required to authorize and enter into an advisory agreement with the Independent Manager[s] that defines the terms in which the Independent Manager[s] will provide investment management and related services. The Advisor will assist in the development of investment policy recommendations and managing the ongoing Client relationship. The Advisor will perform initial and ongoing oversight and due diligence over the selected Independent Manager[s] to ensure the Independent Managers' strategies and target allocations remain aligned with the Clients' investment objectives and overall best interests. The Client, prior to entering into an agreement with unaffiliated investment manager[s] or investment platform[s], will be provided with the Independent Manager's Form ADV 2A (or a brochure that makes the appropriate disclosures).

Financial Planning Services

1858 Wealth will typically provide a variety of financial planning services to Clients, pursuant to a written financial planning agreement. Services are offered in several areas of a Client's financial situation, depending on their goals, objectives and financial situation.

Generally, such financial planning services will involve preparing a financial plan or rendering a financial consultation based on the Client's financial goals and objectives. This planning or consulting may encompass one or more areas of need, including, but not limited to investment planning, retirement planning, estate planning, personal savings, education savings and other areas of a Client's financial situation.

A financial plan developed for or financial consultation rendered to the Client will usually include general recommendations for a course of activity or specific actions to be taken by the Client. For example, recommendations may be made that the Client start or revise their investment programs, commence or alter retirement savings, establish education savings and/or charitable giving programs. 1858 Wealth may also refer Clients to an accountant, attorney or other specialist, as appropriate for their unique situation. For certain financial planning engagements, the Advisor will provide a written summary of Client's financial situation, observations, and recommendations. For consulting or ad-hoc engagements, the Advisor may not provide a written summary. Plans or consultations are typically completed within six months of contract date, assuming all information and documents requested are provided promptly.

Financial planning and consulting recommendations may pose a potential conflict between the interests of the Advisor and the interests of the Client. For example, a recommendation to engage the Advisor for investment management services or to increase the level of investment assets with the Advisor would pose a conflict, as it would increase the advisory fees paid to the Advisor. Clients are not obligated to implement any recommendations made by the Advisor or maintain an ongoing relationship with the Advisor. If the Client elects to act on any of the recommendations made by the Advisor, the Client is under no obligation to effect the transaction through the Advisor.

C. Client Account Management

Prior to engaging 1858 Wealth to provide investment advisory services, each Client is required to enter into one or more advisory agreements with the Advisor that define the terms, conditions, authority and responsibilities of the Advisor and the Client. These services may include:

- Establishing an Investment Strategy – 1858 Wealth, in connection with the Client, will develop an investment strategy targeted to achieve the Client's investment goals and objectives.
- Asset Allocation – 1858 Wealth will develop a strategic asset allocation that is targeted to meet the investment objectives, time horizon, financial situation and tolerance for risk for each Client.
- Portfolio Construction – 1858 Wealth will develop a portfolio for the Client that is intended to meet the stated goals and objectives of the Client.
- Investment Management and Supervision – 1858 Wealth will provide investment management and ongoing oversight of the Client's portfolio.

D. Wrap Fee Programs

1858 Wealth does not manage or place Client assets into a wrap fee program. Investment management services are provided directly by 1858 Wealth.

E. Assets Under Management

1858 Wealth is a newly established advisor. Assets under management shall be reported in the Advisor's next ADV filing.

Item 5 – Fees and Compensation

The following paragraphs detail the fee structure and compensation methodology for services provided by the Advisor. Each Client shall sign one or more agreements that detail the responsibilities of 1858 Wealth and the Client.

A. Fees for Advisory Services

Investment Management Services

Investment advisory fees are paid quarterly, in advance of each calendar quarter, pursuant to the terms of the investment advisory agreement. Investment advisory fees are based on the market value of assets under management at the end of the prior calendar quarter. Investment advisory fees range from 0.50% to 2.00% annually based on several factors, including, but not limited to: the services offered to the Client, the complexity of the services to be provided, the level of Client assets managed by the Advisor, and/or the overall relationship with the Advisor.

The investment advisory fee in the first quarter of service is prorated from the inception date of the account[s] to the end of the first quarter. Fees may be negotiable at the sole discretion of the Advisor. The Client's fees will take into consideration the aggregate assets under management with Advisor. All securities held in accounts managed by 1858 Wealth will be independently valued by the designated Custodian. 1858 Wealth will not have the authority or responsibility to value portfolio securities.

Clients may make additions to and withdrawals from their account[s] at any time, subject to 1858 Wealth's right to terminate an account. Additions may be in cash or securities provided that 1858 Wealth reserves the right to liquidate any transferred securities or decline to accept particular securities into a Client's account[s]. Clients may withdraw account assets on notice to 1858 Wealth, subject to the usual and customary securities settlement procedures. However, 1858 Wealth designs its portfolios as long-term investments and the withdrawal of assets may impair the achievement of a Client's investment objectives. 1858 Wealth may consult with its Clients about the options and ramifications of transferring securities. However, Clients are advised that when transferred securities are liquidated, they are subject to transaction fees, fees assessed at the mutual fund level (i.e. contingent deferred sales charge) and/or tax ramifications.

Use of Independent Managers

For Client account[s] implemented through an Independent Manager, the Client's overall fees may include 1858 Wealth's investment advisory fee (as noted above) plus advisory fees and/or platform fees charged by the Independent Manager[s], as applicable. The Independent Manager may assume responsibility for calculating the Client's fees and deduct all fees from the Client's account[s]. In such instances, 1858 Wealth will not charge its fee separately on those assets.

B. Fee Billing

Investment Management Services

Investment advisory fees will be calculated by the Advisor or its delegate and deducted from the Client's account[s] at the Custodian. The Advisor shall send an invoice to the Custodian indicating the amount of the fees to be deducted from the Client's account[s] at the respective quarter-end date. The amount due is calculated by applying the quarterly rate (annual rate divided by 4) to the total assets under management with 1858 Wealth at the end of the prior quarter. Clients will be provided with a statement, at least quarterly, from the Custodian reflecting deduction of the investment advisory fee. It is the responsibility of the Client to verify

the accuracy of these fees as listed on the custodian's brokerage statement as the Custodian does not assume this responsibility. Clients provide written authorization permitting 1858 Wealth to be paid directly from their accounts held by the Custodian as part of the investment advisory agreement and separate account forms provided by the Custodian.

Use of Independent Managers

Client account[s] implemented through Independent Manager[s] will be billed in accordance to the separate agreement[s] with the respective parties. These parties will typically add 1858 Wealth's investment advisory fee and deduct the overall fee from the Client's account[s].

C. Other Fees and Expenses

Clients may incur certain fees or charges imposed by third parties, other than 1858 Wealth, in connection with investments made on behalf of the Client's account[s]. The Client is responsible for all custody and securities execution fees charged by the Custodian, if applicable. The Advisor's recommended Custodian typically provides trading in ETFs and equity securities without cost to the Client. Securities transaction fees are typically charged by the Custodian for mutual funds and other types of investments. The fees charged by 1858 Wealth are separate and distinct from these custody and execution fees.

In addition, all fees paid to 1858 Wealth for investment advisory services are separate and distinct from the expenses charged by mutual funds and ETFs to their shareholders, if applicable. These fees and expenses are described in each fund's prospectus. These fees and expenses will generally be used to pay management fees for the funds, other fund expenses, account administration (e.g., custody, brokerage and account reporting), and a possible distribution fee. A Client could invest in these products directly, without the services of 1858 Wealth, but would not receive the services provided by 1858 Wealth which are designed, among other things, to assist the Client in determining which products or services are most appropriate for each Client's financial situation and objectives. Accordingly, the Client should review both the fees charged by the fund[s] and the fees charged by 1858 Wealth to fully understand the total fees to be paid.

D. Advance Payment of Fees and Termination

Investment Management Services

1858 Wealth is compensated for its services in advance of the quarter, in which investment advisory services are rendered. Either party may request to terminate the investment advisory agreement with 1858 Wealth, at any time, by providing advance written notice to the other party. The Client shall be responsible for investment advisory fees up to and including the effective date of termination. Upon termination, the Advisor will promptly refund any unearned, prepaid advisory fees. The Client's investment advisory agreement with the Advisor is non-transferable without the Client's prior consent.

Use of Independent Managers

In the event that a Client should wish to terminate their relationship with an Independent Manager, the terms for termination will be set forth in the respective agreements between the Client and those third parties. 1858 Wealth will assist the Client with the termination and transition as appropriate.

E. Compensation for Sales of Securities

1858 Wealth does not buy or sell securities and does not receive any compensation for securities transactions in any Client account, other than the investment advisory fees noted above.

Advisory Persons are also licensed as an independent insurance professionals. As an independent insurance professional, an Advisory Person may earn commission-based compensation for selling insurance products, including insurance products they sell to Clients. Insurance commissions earned by an Advisory Person are separate and in addition to the advisory fees charged by 1858 Wealth. This practice presents a conflict of interest as an Advisory Person may have an incentive to recommend insurance products to the Client for the purpose of generating commissions rather than solely based on the Client's needs. However, the Client is under no obligation, contractually or otherwise, to purchase insurance products through the Advisory Person. Please see Item 10 below.

Item 6 – Performance-Based Fees and Side-By-Side Management

1858 Wealth does not charge performance-based fees for its investment advisory services. The fees charged by 1858 Wealth are as described in “Item 5 – Fees and Compensation” above and are not based upon the capital appreciation of the funds or securities held by any Client.

1858 Wealth does not manage any proprietary investment funds or limited partnerships (for example, a mutual fund or a hedge fund) and has no financial incentive to recommend any particular investment options to its Clients.

Item 7 – Types of Clients

1858 Wealth provides investment advisory services to high net worth individuals, families, trusts, estates and businesses. 1858 Wealth does not impose a minimum account or relationship size; however its services are typical designed to meet the needs of high net worth Clients.

Item 8 – Methods of Analysis, Investment Strategies and Risk of Loss

A. Methods of Analysis

1858 Wealth primarily employs fundamental and technical analysis methods in developing investment strategies for its Clients. Research and analysis from 1858 Wealth are derived from numerous sources, including financial media companies, third-party research materials, Internet sources, and review of company activities, including annual reports, prospectuses, press releases and research prepared by others.

Fundamental analysis utilizes economic and business indicators as investment selection criteria. These criteria are generally ratios and trends that may indicate the overall strength and financial viability of the entity being analyzed. Assets are deemed suitable if they meet certain criteria to indicate that they are a strong investment with a value discounted by the market. While this type of analysis helps the Advisor in evaluating a potential investment, it does not guarantee that the investment will increase in value. Assets meeting the investment criteria utilized in the fundamental analysis may lose value and may have negative investment performance. The Advisor monitors these economic indicators to determine if adjustments to strategic allocations are appropriate. More details on the Advisor’s review process are included below in “Item 13 – Review of Accounts”.

Technical analysis involves the analysis of past market data rather than specific company data in determining the recommendations made to clients. Technical analysis may involve the use of charts to identify market patterns and trends, which may be based on investor sentiment rather than the fundamentals of the company. The primary risk in using technical analysis is that spotting historical trends may not help to predict such trends in the future. Even if the trend will eventually reoccur, there is no guarantee that 1858 Wealth will be able to accurately predict such a reoccurrence.

As noted above, 1858 Wealth generally employs a long-term investment strategy for its Clients, as consistent with their financial goals. 1858 Wealth will typically hold all or a portion of a security for more than a year, but may hold for shorter periods for the purpose of rebalancing a portfolio or meeting the cash needs of Clients. At times, 1858 Wealth may also buy and sell positions that are more short-term in nature, depending on the goals of the Client and/or the fundamentals of the security, sector or asset class.

B. Risk of Loss

Investing in securities involves certain investment risks. Securities may fluctuate in value or lose value. Clients should be prepared to bear the potential risk of loss. 1858 Wealth will assist Clients in determining an appropriate strategy based on their tolerance for risk and other factors noted above. However, there is no guarantee that a Client will meet their investment goals.

Each Client engagement will entail a review of the Client's investment goals, financial situation, time horizon, tolerance for risk and other factors to develop an appropriate strategy for managing a Client's account. Client participation in this process, including full and accurate disclosure of requested information, is essential for

the analysis of a Client's account[s]. The Advisor shall rely on the financial and other information provided by the Client or their designees without the duty or obligation to validate the accuracy and completeness of the provided information. It is the responsibility of the Client to inform the Advisor of any changes in financial condition, goals or other factors that may affect this analysis.

The risks associated with a particular strategy are provided to each Client in advance of investing a Client's account[s]. The Advisor will work with each Client to determine their tolerance for risk as part of the portfolio construction process.

Following are some of the risks associated with the Advisor's strategies:

Market Risks – The value of a Client's holdings may fluctuate in response to events specific to companies or markets, as well as economic, political, or social events in the U.S. and abroad. This risk is linked to the performance of the overall financial markets.

ETF Risks – The performance of ETFs are subject to market risk, including the possible loss of principal. The price of the ETFs will fluctuate with the price of the underlying securities that make up the funds. In addition, ETFs have a trading risk based on the loss of cost efficiency if the ETFs are traded actively and a liquidity risk if the ETFs has a large bid-ask spread and low trading volume. The price of an ETF fluctuates based upon the market movements and may dissociate from the index being tracked by the ETF or the price of the underlying investments. An ETF purchased or sold at one point in the day may have a different price than the same ETF purchased or sold a short time later.

Bond ETFs – Bond ETFs are subject to specific risks, including the following: (1) interest rate risks, i.e. the risk that bond prices will fall if interest rates rise, and vice versa, the risk depends on two things, the bond's time to maturity, and the coupon rate of the bond. (2) reinvestment risk, i.e. the risk that any profit gained must be reinvested at a lower rate than was previously being earned, (3) inflation risk, i.e. the risk that the cost of living and inflation increase at a rate that exceeds the income investment thereby decreasing the investor's rate of return, (4) credit default risk, i.e. the risk associated with purchasing a debt instrument which includes the possibility of the company defaulting on its repayment obligation, (5) rating downgrades, i.e. the risk associated with a rating agency's downgrade of the company's rating which impacts the investor's confidence in the company's ability to repay its debt and (6) Liquidity Risks, i.e. the risk that a bond may not be sold as quickly as there is no readily available market for the bond.

Mutual Fund Risks – The performance of mutual funds are subject to market risk, including the possible loss of principal. The price of the mutual funds will fluctuate with the value of the underlying securities that make up the funds. The price of a mutual fund is typically set daily therefore a mutual fund purchased at one point in the day will typically have the same price as a mutual fund purchased later that same day.

Options Contracts – Investments in options contracts have the risk of losing value in a relatively short period of time. Option contracts are leveraged instruments that allow the holder of a single contract to control many shares of an underlying stock. This leverage can compound gains or losses.

Margin Borrowings – The use of short-term margin borrowings may result in certain additional risks to a Client. For example, if securities pledged to brokers to secure a Client's margin accounts decline in value, the Client could be subject to a "margin call", pursuant to which it must either deposit additional funds with the broker or be the subject of mandatory liquidation of the pledged securities to compensate for the decline in value.

Alternative Investments (Limited Partnerships) – The performance of alternative investments (limited partnerships) can be volatile and may have limited liquidity. An investor could lose all or a portion of their investment. Such investments often have concentrated positions and investments that may carry higher risks. Client should only have a portion of their assets in these investments.

The risks associated with a particular strategy are provided to each Client in advance of investing Client accounts. The Advisor will work with each Client to determine their tolerance for risk as part of the portfolio

construction process. **Past performance is not a guarantee of future returns. Investing in securities and other investments involve a risk of loss that each Client should understand and be willing to bear. Clients are reminded to discuss these risks with the Advisor.**

Item 9 – Disciplinary Information

There are no legal, regulatory or disciplinary events involving 1858 Wealth or its Supervised Persons. We value the trust you place in us. As we advise all Clients, we encourage you to perform the requisite due diligence on any advisor or service provider with whom you partner. Item 10 – Other Financial Industry Activities and Affiliations

The sole business of 1858 Wealth and Advisory Persons is to provide investment advisory services to its Clients. Neither 1858 Wealth nor its advisory personnel are involved in other business endeavors. 1858 Wealth does not maintain any affiliations with other firms, other than contracted service providers to assist with the servicing of its Client's accounts.

Item 11 – Code of Ethics, Participation or Interest in Client Transactions and Personal Trading

A. Code of Ethics

1858 Wealth has implemented a Code of Ethics that defines our fiduciary commitment to each Client. This Code of Ethics applies to all persons associated with 1858 Wealth (our "Supervised Persons"). The Code of Ethics was developed to provide general ethical guidelines and specific instructions regarding our duties to you, our Client. 1858 Wealth and its personnel owe a duty of loyalty, fairness and good faith towards each Client. It is the obligation of 1858 Wealth Supervised Persons to adhere not only to the specific provisions of the Code, but also to the general principles that guide the Code. The Code of Ethics covers a range of topics that address employee ethics and conflicts of interest. To request a copy of our Code of Ethics, please contact us at (234) 678-5183.

B. Personal Trading with Material Interest

1858 Wealth allows the purchase or sale of the same securities that may be recommended to and purchased on behalf of Clients. 1858 Wealth does not act as principal in any transactions. In addition, the Advisor does not act as the general partner of a fund, or advise an investment company. 1858 Wealth does not have a material interest in any securities traded in Client accounts.

C. Personal Trading in Same Securities as Clients

1858 Wealth allows the purchase or sale of the same securities that may be recommended to and purchased on behalf of Clients. Owning the same securities we recommend (purchase or sell) to you presents a potential conflict of interest that, as fiduciaries, we must disclose to you and mitigate through policies and procedures. As noted above, we have adopted a Code of Ethics, which addresses insider trading (material non-public information controls) and personal securities reporting procedures. When trading for personal accounts, Supervised Persons of 1858 Wealth may have a conflict of interest if trading in the same securities. The fiduciary duty to act in the best interest of its Clients can potentially be violated if personal trades are made with more advantageous terms than Client trades, or by trading based on material non-public information. This risk is mitigated by 1858 Wealth requiring reporting of personal securities trades by its employees for review by the Chief Compliance Officer ("CCO"). We have also adopted written policies and procedures to detect the misuse of material, non-public information.

D. Personal Trading at Same Time as Client

While 1858 Wealth allows the purchase or sale of the same securities that may be recommended to and purchased on behalf of Clients, such trades are typically aggregated with Client orders or traded afterwards. **At no time will 1858 Wealth transact in any security to the detriment of any Client.**

Item 12 – Brokerage Practices

A. Recommendation of Custodian[s]

1858 Wealth does not have discretionary authority to select the broker-dealer/custodian for custody and execution services. The Client will engage the broker-dealer or custodian (herein the "Custodian") to safeguard Client assets and authorize 1858 Wealth to direct trades to this Custodian as agreed in the investment advisory agreement. Further, 1858 Wealth does not have the discretionary authority to negotiate commissions on behalf of our Clients on a trade-by-trade basis.

Where 1858 Wealth does not exercise discretion over the selection of the Custodian, it may recommend the Custodian to Clients. 1858 Wealth may recommend the Custodian based on criteria such as, but not limited to, reasonableness of commissions charged to the Client, services made available to the Client, and its overall reputation. Clients are not obligated to use the recommended Custodian and will not incur any extra fee or cost associated with using a Custodian not recommended by 1858 Wealth. However, if the recommended Custodian is not engaged, 1858 Wealth may be limited in the services it can provide comparable to other clients.

1858 Wealth will generally recommend that Clients establish their account[s] at Fidelity Clearing & Custody Solutions and other divisions of Fidelity Investments, Inc. ("Fidelity"). Fidelity is a FINRA-registered broker-dealer, custodian and member of SIPC and may serve as the Client's "qualified custodian". 1858 Wealth maintains an institutional relationship with Fidelity, whereby the Advisor receives certain economic benefits. Please see Item 14 below.

Following are additional details regarding the brokerage practices of the Advisor:

1. Soft Dollars - Soft dollars are revenue programs offered by broker-dealers whereby an advisor enters into an agreement to place security trades with the broker in exchange for research and other services. 1858 Wealth does not participate in soft dollar programs sponsored or offered by any broker-dealer. However, the Advisor does receive certain economic benefits from Fidelity. Please see Item 14 below.

2. Brokerage Referrals - 1858 Wealth does not receive any compensation from any third party in connection with the recommendation for establishing a brokerage account.

3. Directed Brokerage - All Clients are serviced on a "directed brokerage basis", where 1858 Wealth will place trades within the established account[s] at the Custodian designated by the Client. Further, all Client accounts are traded within their respective brokerage account[s]. The Advisor will not engage in any principal transactions (i.e., trade of any security from or to the Advisor's own account) or cross transactions with other Client accounts (i.e., purchase of a security into one Client account from another Client's account[s]). In selecting the Custodian, 1858 Wealth will not be obligated to select competitive bids on securities transactions and does not have an obligation to seek the lowest available transaction costs. These costs are determined by the designated Custodian.

B. Aggregating and Allocating Trades

The primary objective in placing orders for the purchase and sale of securities for Client accounts is to obtain the most favorable net results taking into account such factors as 1) price, 2) size of order, 3) difficulty of execution, 4) confidentiality and 5) skill required of the broker. 1858 Wealth will execute its transactions through an unaffiliated broker-dealer selected by the Client. 1858 Wealth may aggregate orders in a block trade or trades when securities are purchased or sold through the same broker-dealer for multiple (discretionary) accounts. If a block trade cannot be executed in full at the same price or time, the securities actually purchased or sold by the close of each business day must be allocated in a manner that is consistent with the initial pre-allocation or other written statement. This must be done in a way that does not consistently advantage or disadvantage particular Client accounts.

Item 13 – Review of Accounts

A. Frequency of Reviews

Investments in Client accounts are monitored on a regular and continuous basis by Partners of 1858 Wealth and periodically by the CCO. Formal reviews are generally conducted at least annually or more or less frequently depending on the needs of the Client.

B. Causes for Reviews

In addition to the investment monitoring noted in Item 13.A., each Client account shall be reviewed at least annually. Reviews may be conducted more or less frequently at the Client's request. Accounts may be reviewed as a result of major changes in economic conditions, known changes in the Client's financial situation, and/or large deposits or withdrawals in the Client's account[s]. The Client is encouraged to notify 1858 Wealth if changes occur in the Client's personal financial situation that might adversely affect the Client's investment plan. Additional reviews may be triggered by material market, economic or political events.

C. Review Reports

The Client will receive brokerage statements no less than quarterly from the Custodian. These brokerage statements are sent directly from the Custodian to the Client. The Client may also establish electronic access to the Custodian's website so that the Client may view these reports and their account activity. Client brokerage statements will include all positions, transactions and fees relating to the Client's account[s]. The Advisor may also provide Clients with periodic reports regarding their holdings, allocations, and performance.

Item 14 – Client Referrals and Other Compensation

A. Compensation Received by 1858 Wealth

Participation in Institutional Advisor Platform (Fidelity)

1858 Wealth has established an institutional relationship with Fidelity to assist the Advisor in managing Client account[s]. Access to the Fidelity platform is provided at no charge to the Advisor. The Advisor receives access to software and related support without cost because the Advisor renders investment management services to Clients that maintain assets at Fidelity. The software and related systems support may benefit the Advisor, but not its Clients directly. In fulfilling its duties to its Clients, the Advisor endeavors at all times to put the interests of its Clients first. Clients should be aware, however, that the receipt of economic benefits from a Custodian creates a potential conflict of interest since these benefits may influence the Advisor's recommendation of this Custodian over one that does not furnish similar software, systems support, or services.

B. Client Referrals from Solicitors

1858 Wealth does not engage paid solicitors for Client referrals.

Item 15 – Custody

1858 Wealth does not accept or maintain custody of any Client accounts, except for the authorized deduction of the advisor's fee. All Clients must place their assets with a "qualified custodian". Clients are required to select their own Custodian to retain their funds and securities and direct 1858 Wealth to utilize that Custodian for the Client's security transactions. 1858 Wealth encourages Clients to review statements provided by the account Custodian. For more information about Custodians and brokerage practices, see "Item 12 - Brokerage Practices".

Item 16 – Investment Discretion

1858 Wealth generally has discretion over the selection and amount of securities to be bought or sold in Client accounts without obtaining prior consent or approval from the Client. However, these purchases or sales may be subject to specified investment objectives, guidelines, or limitations previously set forth by the Client and agreed to by 1858 Wealth. Discretionary authority will only be authorized upon full disclosure to the Client. The granting of such authority will be evidenced by the Client's execution of an investment advisory agreement

containing all applicable limitations to such authority. All discretionary trades made by 1858 Wealth will be in accordance with each Client's investment objectives and goals.

Item 17 – Voting Client Securities

1858 Wealth does not accept proxy-voting responsibility for any Client. Clients will receive proxy statements directly from the Custodian. The Advisor will assist in answering questions relating to proxies, however, the Client retains the sole responsibility for proxy decisions and voting.

Item 18 – Financial Information

Neither 1858 Wealth, nor its management, have any adverse financial situations that would reasonably impair the ability of 1858 Wealth to meet all obligations to its Clients. Neither 1858 Wealth, nor any of its Advisory Persons, has been subject to a bankruptcy or financial compromise. 1858 Wealth is not required to deliver a balance sheet along with this Disclosure Brochure as the Advisor does not collect fees of \$1,200 or more for services to be performed six months or more in advance.
