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ITEM 4: Services, Fees and Compensation

About RMB

RMB Capital Management, LLC (“RMB”, “Adviser” or “we”) is an independent, employee-owned firm offering advisory services and investment solutions to a diverse range of clients. RMB was established in Chicago, Illinois, on April 1, 2005 with a team of 19 employees. Since then, we have grown to approximately 190 employees with additional offices in Denver, Colorado; Jackson Hole, Wyoming; Lake Forest, Illinois; Bloomington, Minnesota; Milwaukee, Wisconsin; New York, New York and Washington, D.C. and satellite offices in Skaneateles, New York; Rochester, New York; Atlanta, Georgia; Irvine, California, and Oak Brook Terrace, Illinois. RMB’s principal owner is RMB Capital Holdings LLC. Richard M. Burrige, Frederick Paulman, and Walter H. Clark are the principal owners of RMB Capital Holdings LLC.

As an independent firm, RMB is able to make autonomous decisions without the influence of corporate ties or shareholder influences. Our business is structured to help ensure our clients’ best interests are the driving force behind our practices and recommendations.

RMB services its clients through two primary business units: Wealth Management and Asset Management. Our Wealth Management business focuses on providing holistic solutions to our client’s financial needs while our Asset Management business provides separately managed accounts and other investment products that serve as the building blocks for our clients’ investment portfolios. RMB’s wrap fee managed account program is part of our Asset Management business.

RMB’s Wrap Fee Managed Account Program

General

RMB’s wrap fee managed account program (“Wrap Fee Managed Account Program”) is designed for individuals; pension and profit sharing plans; trusts, estates and charitable organizations; and corporations and other business entities and is currently only provided to Legacy Clients (defined below). RMB’s Wrap Fee Managed Account Program, gives RMB complete and sole investment discretion and authority to manage client accounts to the fullest extent permitted by law.

Types of Investments

Client accounts in RMB’s Wrap Fee Manage Account Program may purchase and sell securities or other financial instruments (including borrowing and lending) and may participate in other transactions in securities and financial instruments. RMB does not general use leverage, unless the client specifically directs RMB to use leverage.

Investments may include, without limitation, exchange-listed, over-the-counter, domestic and foreign equity securities; warrants; commercial paper and other corporate debt securities; certificates of deposit; municipal securities; mutual fund shares; and US government securities; options on securities. Each portfolio manager within RMB’s Wrap Fee Managed Account Program determines his or her investment strategy to achieve the client’s investment objective in accordance with applicable investment guidelines. These objectives may include, for example, capital preservation, total return, after-tax total return, current income, after-tax income, balanced, growth, growth and income or capital appreciation. Guidelines may focus investments

on specific categories of investments – e.g., specific industries, capitalization, indexes or regions. Security analysis methods used may include charting and fundamental, technical or cyclical analysis. Sources of information include financial newspapers and magazines, inspections of corporate activities, research materials prepared by third parties, corporate rating services, timing services, filings with the SEC, corporate press releases, US government statistical reports and other information published by the US government. Portfolio managers may engage in a variety of types of transactions, such as short-term trading, short term purchases, long term purchases, short sales, margin transactions, option writing and borrowing, to implement their strategies.

Transactions in the account will be made in accordance with written investment objectives, policies and guidelines the client may provide from time to time.

Fees-General

The standard fee for RMB's wrap fee accounts ranges from 1.25% to 2% annually depending on the portfolio manager chosen by the Client. This fee is negotiable. Depending on a client's circumstances, actual fees may be higher than, or discounted from, this standard fee range or may be set at a flat amount, and there may be minimum fee requirements. Fees for other types of wrap accounts – e.g., balanced or fixed income accounts – are individually negotiated and are generally less for wrap fixed income accounts than for other wrap accounts. Each portfolio manager negotiates the exact fee for each of the portfolio manager's client accounts.

The standard wrap fees described above (the "Separate Account Wrap Fees") generally include brokerage commissions, custodial costs, and nominal ticket charges and administrative or service fees.

Additional Fees

The Separate Account Wrap Fees do not include brokerage commissions for transactions executed through other broker-dealers as directed by the client; custodial costs other than RMB approved custodial costs; margin costs and costs associated with unsolicited short sales; mark-ups, mark-downs and spreads; wire transfer fees; US treasury auction fees; SEC fees in connection with trades; mutual fund distribution, shareholder servicing or administrative fees; IRA fees; extraordinary fees and other fees that RMB may disclose as excluded from time to time. These additional fees will generally be borne by RMB except in certain limited circumstances.

As RMB absorbs certain transaction costs in its Wrap Fee Managed Account Program, RMB may have a financial incentive not to place transaction orders in those accounts since doing so increases its transaction costs. Thus, an incentive exists to place trades less frequently in its Wrap Fee Managed Account Program versus other programs managed by RMB.

Because the Separate Account Wrap Fees encompass both advisory services and brokerage commissions, it is possible that the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program could cost more or less than separate charges for advisory services and brokerage commissions. For accounts that trade more frequently and/or in markets with relatively higher commissions, the Separate Account Wrap Fees may be less than if fees were charged separately. For accounts that trade less frequently and/or in markets with relatively lower commissions, the Separate Account Wrap Fees may cost more than if fees were charged separately.

Billing

The Separate Account Wrap Fees are generally charged quarterly, in advance, based upon the amount of assets under management at the beginning of each quarter. All other fees that may be outside of the Separate Account Wrap Fees are charged in arrears (if any). Generally, the Separate Account Wrap Fees are deducted from the clients' custodial account unless RMB is instructed by the client to collect its fees by billing the client directly. Billing adjustments may be made in each quarter to reflect substantive contributions or withdrawals made during the preceding quarter. In the event of termination during the quarterly period, the client is entitled to a pro rata refund of that portion of the quarterly fee, paid in advance, for the remaining balance of the quarter.

Directed Brokerage and Trade Aways

Clients may direct RMB to use a broker of the client's choice; however commissions would not be covered by the Separate Account Wrap Fee and, as a result, your brokerage costs may be higher than those of a client using a broker/custodian that is part of RMB's Wrap Fee Managed Account Program.

In some circumstances for certain instruments, the client may be charged an additional fee if the custodian for the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program does not trade certain instruments held in the account and RMB is required to trade away.

Brokerage Relationships

RMB currently has a brokerage agreement with Schwab Advisor Services for its wrap fee program and may enter into brokerage agreements with additional broker-dealers in the future.

Mutual Funds

If RMB makes an investment in a non-affiliated mutual fund in your account, the non-affiliated mutual fund is not deducted from the overall market value of your assets included in the calculation of your advisory fee to RMB. As a result, you will incur two separate advisory fees on those assets because the mutual fund also charges an advisory fee.

Fee Sharing with Portfolio Managers

RMB may share a portion of the Separate Account Wrap Fees with the portfolio manager responsible for managing a client's account under Wrap Fee Managed Account Program. RMB's portfolio managers may have a financial incentive to recommend the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program because the fees received by a portfolio manager within the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program may be greater than the fees that the portfolio manager would have received if the client participated in a different investment program offered by RMB.

Conflicts of Interest

RMB charges different fees for its various services and products outside of its Wrap Fee Managed Account Program. This creates an incentive for RMB to guide clients to products and services that generate higher fees for RMB. Additionally, when allocating investment opportunities among its investment programs, products and clients, RMB has an incentive to favor the investment programs, products and clients that generate the most revenue for the firm. RMB has procedures designed and implemented to help ensure that clients are treated fairly and to help prevent these conflicts from influencing selection of a client's investments and the allocation of investment opportunities among clients. See Item 6 "Performance-Based Fees and Side-by-Side

Management” in RMB’s 2A for a description of the conflicts of interest related to performance fees and side by side management.

ITEM 5: Account Requirements and Types of Clients

RMB currently offers the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program only to certain legacy clients of RMB (“Legacy Wrap Fee Clients”). RMB generally does not have a minimum investment requirement for Legacy Wrap Fee Clients.

ITEM 6: Portfolio Manager Selection and Evaluation

Portfolio Manager Selection

Each client selects a RMB portfolio manager to manage its account. Only certain portfolio managers of RMB manage our Wrap Fee Managed Account Program. Each portfolio manager within the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program is an employee of RMB. The client is not subject to any restrictions regarding contacting or consulting the portfolio manager for its account.

Accounts in this program may be managed by the portfolio managers in the same manner as accounts that are not part of the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program and have a different fee structure.

Reports; Performance Information

Clients typically receive transaction confirmations and quarterly reports of investment portfolios, as well as other reports as agreed upon with their portfolio managers. Performance information is provided to clients upon request or as agreed between the client and his or her portfolio manager from time to time.

Methods of Analysis, Investment Strategies and Risk of Loss

All accounts are individually managed by each portfolio manager. Securities selection is based on client objectives, needs, assets and personal family obligations, plans, risk tolerance and income requirements.

Methods of Analysis

RMB portfolio managers use a variety of methods of analysis, sources of information and investment strategies. Each RMB portfolio manager determines his or her investment strategy to achieve the client’s investment objective. These objectives may include, for example, capital preservation, total return, after-tax total return, current income, after-tax income, balanced growth, growth, growth and income or capital appreciation. Guidelines may focus investments on specific categories of investments – e.g., specific industries, capitalization, indexes or regions. Security analysis methods used by RMB portfolio managers may include charting and fundamental, technical or cyclical analysis. Sources of information include financial newspapers and magazines, inspections of corporate activities, research materials prepared by third parties, corporate rating services, timing services, filings with the SEC, corporate press releases, US government statistical reports and other information published by the US government. Portfolio managers may engage in a variety of types of transactions, such as short-term trading, short term

purchases, long term purchases, short sales, margin transactions and option writing to implement their strategies.

Investment Strategies

For our Wrap Fee Manage Account Program, our investment decisions are driven by the search for what we believe are the strongest performers in sector equities: those with an attractive business model, valuations and, where appropriate, dividend growth.

In fixed income investments, we take into account the quality of the issuer of the securities, duration, yield to maturity, the potential for ratings upgrade and refinancing, the industry outlook and we match the criteria with the client's preferences. We apply similar criteria to municipal bonds taking into account the quality of the credit and the borrower's ability to pay principal and interest.

Our portfolio managers will consider the asset mix and types of investments to help the client achieve his/her objectives. Attention will also be paid to the client's tax situation (for example, if the client is a tax-exempt entity) in determining whether to recommend tax-free securities and/or whether to recognize short or long-term gains and losses. Tax considerations, however, will typically not be the main reason for selection of securities and tax advice will not be given.

We generally recommend the long-term purchase of securities for client accounts in our wrap program. However, a security may be sold within a year or even a few days if the portfolio manager believes a gain could be realized sooner in order to prevent or limit a loss in case of adverse changes in the security's or market's outlook.

In some accounts, purchases of covered puts or covered calls on stocks may be made, but generally not for speculative purposes. Rather, they typically would be utilized to protect against a loss should the market be expected to decline or as a method of participating more fully in a possible market advance if the portfolio were not committed fully enough in equities. It is not expected that any purchase of these securities will be a significant strategy in an account. This type of activity is not expected to be a major part RMB's strategy.

Risk of Loss

Investing in securities involves risk of loss that clients should be prepared to bear. Past performance is no guarantee of future results. All investments are subject to various risk factors, including, but are not limited to, the following principal risks:

The value of securities in your portfolio will go up and down. Consequently the overall valuation of the account may decline and you could lose money. The stock market is subject to significant fluctuations in value as a result of political, economic, and market developments. If the stock market declines in value, your portfolio is likely to decline in value. Because of changes in the financial condition or prospects of specific companies, the individual stocks selected by RMB may decline in value, causing the account to decline in value. Investments are not deposits in a bank and are not insured or guaranteed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or any other governmental agency. RMB's investment approach for its wrap accounts may be out of favor at times, causing the strategy to underperform other strategies or funds that use different approaches to securities selection, including other strategies managed by RMB.

When RMB purchases equity securities primarily or exclusively in its investment strategies for its wrap program, clients are subject to the risk that stock prices will fall over short or extended periods of time, and clients could lose all, or a substantial portion, of the value of their investments. Historically, the equity markets have moved in cycles, and the value of equity securities may fluctuate significantly from day to day. Individual companies may report poor results or be negatively affected by industry and/or economic trends and developments. The prices of these companies' securities may decline in response. These factors contribute to price volatility, which is a principal risk of equity investing. In addition, many of the equity securities purchased by RMB are common stocks. Common stocks represent a share of ownership in a company, and rank after bonds and preferred stock in their claim on the company's assets in the event of a liquidation.

The Wrap Fee Managed Account Program may also invest in fixed income securities, typically bonds. The principal risks of investing in fixed income may include interest rate risk, credit risk, prepayment risk and price fluctuation.

Interest Rate Risk

Bonds may decline in value because of changes in interest rates. If interest rates rise, bond prices usually decline. If interest rates decline, bond prices usually increase. If a bond is not held until maturity, you may experience a gain or loss when you sell your bond.

Credit Risk

An issuer could default in the payment of principal and/or interest on a bond.

Prepayment Risk

Some bonds are subject to prepayment risk, or the risk that the issuer of a security will repay principal prior to the bond's maturity date, thereby changing the expected payment schedule of the bond.

Price Fluctuation

Most importantly, you should be aware that bond prices may fluctuate, as the securities are affected by economic and other factors. As a result, the value of your investment may increase or decrease.

Bonds held to maturity will return the full principal amount to the bondholder upon maturity. However, those sold prior to maturity are subject to gain or loss depending on the market price at the time of sale.

The investments made by RMB will generate taxable income and realized capital gains or losses, so investors should consult with their tax advisors about the tax consequences of their investments.

Certain investment strategies for the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program may focus their investments from time to time on one or more economic sectors. To the extent that it does so, developments affecting companies in that sector or sectors will likely have a magnified effect on the strategies investment return. A strategy's concentration in securities of a particular sector may subject it to more volatile price movements than a securities portfolio diversified across multiple sectors.

Certain of investment strategies for the Wrap Fee Managed Account Program are more concentrated, which means that they may invest in the securities of fewer issuers than a more diversified investment strategy. As a result, such strategy may be more susceptible to a single adverse economic or regulatory occurrence affecting one or more of these issuers, and may experience increased volatility.

Options Risks

Investments in covered call options involve certain risks. These risks include limited gains and lack of liquidity of the underlying stock. Investments in covered put options involve certain risks. These risks include the risk of loss if fair value of the underlying securities declines and limited gains. There is no guarantee that a liquid market for options will exist for any option or at any particular time. If we are unable to effect a closing purchase transaction with respect to covered options we have sold, we will not be able to sell the underlying securities or collateral until the options expire or are exercised. Similarly, if we are unable to effect a closing sale transaction with respect to options we have purchased, we would have to exercise the options in order to realize any profit.

Risk of Margin Accounts

Margin exposes investors to the potential for higher losses. You can lose more money than you have invested; you may have to deposit additional cash or securities in your account on short notice to cover market losses; you may be forced to sell some or all of your securities when falling stock prices reduce the value of your securities; and your brokerage firm may sell some or all of your securities without consulting you to pay off the loan it made to you. RMB generally does not invest on margin unless authorized by a client for the client's account.

Security analysis methods, including charting and fundamental, technical or cyclical analysis offer no guarantee of positive performance and are each subject to the risk that they could be misinterpreted.

Competing Trades

RMB's various trading strategies may trade in different positions from each other. For example, a client account may trade and may continue to trade in securities and other financial instruments which may not benefit other client accounts even if such trades compete with, occur ahead of or are opposite positions taken by the other client accounts.

RMB's trading strategies may also compete with each other to buy certain securities, including securities with limited availability. This competition may cause one or more accounts to obtain fewer securities and/or pay higher prices than would otherwise be the case.

Cybersecurity

RMB's information and technology systems may be vulnerable to damage or interruption from computer viruses, network failures, computer and telecommunication failures, infiltration by unauthorized persons and security breaches, usage errors by its professionals, power outages and catastrophic events such as fires, tornadoes, floods, hurricanes and earthquakes. Although RMB has implemented various measures to protect the confidentiality of its internal data and to manage risks relating to these types of events, if these systems are compromised, become inoperable for extended periods of time or cease to function properly, RMB may have to make a significant investment to fix or replace them. The failure of these systems and/or of disaster

recovery plans for any reason could cause significant interruptions in RMB's operations and result in a failure to maintain the security, confidentiality or privacy of sensitive data, including personal information relating to clients. Such a failure could harm RMB's reputation or subject it or its affiliates to legal claims and otherwise affect their business and financial performance. RMB will seek to notify affected clients of any known cybersecurity incident that may pose substantial risk of exposing confidential personal data about such clients to unintended parties.

Proxy Voting

RMB has adopted and implemented policies and procedures that RMB believes are reasonably designed to ensure that proxies are voted in the best interest of clients in those cases where a client has contractually given proxy voting responsibility to RMB.

Votes are cast in accordance with RMB's fiduciary duties and SEC rule 206(4)-6 under the Advisers Act. The proxy voting guidelines have been tailored to reflect these rules and the long-standing fiduciary standards and responsibilities for ERISA accounts set out by the Department of Labor. Clients may retain their right to vote proxies provided they give RMB prior written notice.

For clients who do not retain their right to vote proxies, RMB has contracted with a proxy advisory firm (the "Proxy Firm") to handle administration and voting of client proxies. Additionally, the Proxy Firm provides research on proxy proposals and vote recommendations based on written guidelines, which are reviewed and approved from time to time by RMB's Sub-Committee (the "Committee"). The Committee is made up of executives of RMB.

RMB, as a general matter, follows the voting recommendations of the Proxy Firm, though RMB retains the right to determine the vote on a particular proxy issue. Accordingly, there may be instances, including those in which the Proxy Firm recommends a vote in line with management, in which the Asset Management team or a Portfolio Manager for a private fund managed by RMB will provide the Committee with its written analysis as to why RMB should not vote as recommended by the Proxy Firm on a particular proxy issue. In those instances, the Committee may decide to vote contrary to the Proxy Firm recommendation if it is determined to be in the best interests of the clients. As a matter of course, members of the Committee will also review issues for which the Proxy Firm does not provide a recommendation.

In cases in which it is determined that RMB has a material conflict of interest that could influence how proxies are voted, such conflicts may be resolved by using the recommendation of the Proxy Firm if it is determined to be in the best interests of the client. Alternatively, RMB, when appropriate, may decide to disclose the conflict to the affected clients and give the clients the opportunity to vote their proxies themselves, or the Committee may review the issue and determine a vote. In any of these material conflict of interest situations, the Committee will review the issue and determine a resolution.

Additionally, there may be cases where RMB deems that the cost-benefit analysis of voting proxies received for client accounts may lead to RMB declining to vote. Such instances may include:

- Voting for foreign securities in countries which require "share-blocking"
- Unsupervised securities

- Securities in Transition or already sold
- Completing ballots for companies held in the client account as of the record date, but which are no longer owned at the time that a vote would be cast.

RMB does not generally participate in class action lawsuits directly on behalf of clients. Clients are given an option to elect a third-party vendor to provide class action litigation monitoring and claim filing. RMB does, however, facilitate an exchange of information between the client and the third-party vendor. Any information received regarding class action lawsuits will be forwarded to the clients who may be eligible to participate and do not elect to utilize the services of a third-party vendor.

ITEM 7: Client Information Provided to Portfolio Managers

Any client-specific information that the client furnishes to RMB is regularly shared with the portfolio manager.

ITEM 8: Client Contact with Portfolio Managers

The client is not subject to any restrictions regarding contacting or consulting the portfolio manager for our wrap fee program.

ITEM 9: Additional Information about RMB Capital

Disciplinary Information

RMB is required to disclose all legal or disciplinary events that would be material to your evaluation of it or the integrity of its management. At this time, RMB has no information applicable to this item.

Other Financial Industry Activities and Affiliations of RMB Capital

RMB Managed Private Funds

RMB has affiliated entities that serve as the general partner or investment manager of certain private funds managed by RMB. South LaSalle Managers LLC, Iron Road Capital Partners LLC, RMB Rail-Splitter Managers LLC, RMB Logan Stone Managers LLC and RMB Mendon Managers LLC are all general partners and/or investment managers of a fund family managed by RMB and its employees.

Outside Directorships and Other Management Positions

A portfolio manager and assistant portfolio manager for our long/short equity financials strategy each serve as a member of the board of directors for a community bank. Each community bank is

owned by the family of private funds managed by them and they each serve as a director, in part, to monitor these investments. Any compensation earned by them as members of the board of directors are paid to the private funds they manage.

An employee of RMB who is a portfolio manager of the long/short equity strategy and long only equity strategy serves as a director of a hedge fund fund-of-funds and receives compensation relating to his directorship. Additionally, the employee serves as an advisor to a family office investment management firm and receives fees associated with this role.

Certain employees of RMB may, from time to time, serve in an executive position for a family investment partnership. These family investment partnerships are legacy clients of an RMB branch. RMB provides investment services to these family partnerships but do not solicit clients who are not part of the extended family. Additionally, legacy clients of an RMB branch have invested in a fund of funds private equity partnership managed by an employee's family member. This employee receives no financial interest and does not have a relationship with this manager of the fund other than a family relationship.

Dual Employee Relationship

MCAC serves as the sub-adviser to RMB Mendon Financial Services Fund and RMB Mendon Financial Long/Short Fund. MCAC's sole employee is also an employee of RMB. This employee is also the sole owner, director and Chief Investment Officer of MCAC. RMB also provides back office, compliance and other administrative services to MCAC.

Retirement Plan Solutions

RMB's affiliate, RMB West, provides retirement plan solution services.

WM Legacy Accounts-Insurance Commissions

As an accommodation to certain WM Legacy Accounts, certain legacy clients were provided with advice related to individual family health insurance coverage, supplemental Medicare coverage and/or life insurance. While this service is not currently offered, certain WM Legacy Accounts pay a commission trail on this former business to an employee of RMB.

RMB Managed Mutual Funds

Certain RMB staff members are registered with FINRA as a representative of unaffiliated distributors of each mutual fund. Some officers of these mutual funds also have roles with RMB that could create a conflict of interest due to competing priorities.

Limited Real Estate Services

Certain employees of a RMB branch office provide limited real estate services to a limited number of clients through a real estate company licensed in their state. These employees generally offer property management services and other real estate services to their clients. These employees do not engage in the business of real estate brokerage. While these services are not currently offered to RMB Clients, certain legacy clients pay a fee for these services to a limited number of employees of RMB.

RMB and its principals have no other financial industry activities or affiliations except as described in this item.

RMB Advised Mutual Funds

RMB Investors Trust

RMB manages RMB Investors Trust, a Delaware business trust registered as an open-end investment company under the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended (the “ICA”). Within RMB Investors Trust, there are three equity sub-funds. The three equity funds are:

RMB Fund seeks capital appreciation, mainly long term. Income is generally of lesser importance, meaning that it is a secondary goal. The fund pursues its goals by investing in a diverse portfolio primarily consisting of common stocks. The fund invests in large-capitalization stocks (i.e., companies with a capitalization generally of \$14 billion or more, commonly known as “blue-chip”), which are usually issued by well-established companies. These companies generally maintain a sound financial base and offer a variety of product lines and businesses. As compared with smaller-capitalization companies, securities of large-capitalization companies historically have involved less market risk and lower long-term market returns.

In managing the fund’s stock portfolio, the adviser uses sector research, which focuses on selecting the industries the Fund will invest in (e.g., top-down research). The fund seeks to reduce risk by diversifying across many different industries and economic sectors. Under normal conditions, the fund intends to remain fully invested with only minimal investments in cash, short-term debt instruments or money market funds. In unusual circumstances, the fund may invest extensively in cash or short-term investment-grade debt securities and/or invest in other investment companies, including money market funds and exchange-traded funds. In such circumstances, the Fund would be assuming a temporary defensive position and would not be pursuing its primary goal.

RMB Mendon Financial Services Fund seeks capital appreciation. The fund is sub-advised by Mendon Capital Advisors Corp. (“MCAC”). The fund pursues its goal by investing, under normal circumstances, at least 80% of its net assets (including borrowing, if any) in stocks of U.S. companies that are in the financial services sector. The Fund may invest in companies of any size, but, under normal conditions, the Fund invests primarily in mid, small and micro capitalization financial services companies.

Ordinarily, the fund’s portfolio will be invested primarily in common stocks. In selecting stocks, the fund’s sub-adviser uses a combination of growth and value strategies. The fund may also invest in companies that may experience unusual and possibly unique developments, or “special situations”, which may create a special opportunity for significant returns. Under normal conditions, the fund intends to remain fully invested with only minimal investments in cash, or short-term debt instruments or money market funds. In unusual circumstances, the fund may invest extensively in cash or short-term investment-grade debt securities and/or invest in other investment companies, including money market funds and exchange-traded funds. In such circumstances, the fund would be assuming a temporary defensive position and would not be pursuing its primary goal.

RMB Mendon Financial Long/Short Fund seeks capital appreciation. The fund is also sub-advised by MCAC. The fund pursues its goal by investing, under normal circumstances, at least 80% of its net assets (including borrowing, if any) in the common stocks of U.S. companies of any

market capitalization that are in the financial services sector. The fund may invest in companies in the financial services sector of any size and the portion invested in small, medium or large companies is expected to vary over time based on the sub-adviser's view as to how to achieve the fund's objective.

Because the fund is non-diversified, the fund may also have larger positions in smaller capitalization companies due to market conditions. Investing in smaller capitalization companies may allow the fund to capitalize on merger and acquisition activity involving regional banking and savings institutions.

The fund is non-diversified and may invest a larger portion of its assets in the securities of a single company than diversified mutual funds. Notwithstanding its non-diversified status, the fund intends to diversify its assets to the extent necessary to qualify for tax treatment as a regulated investment company under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

The fund may use futures and options on securities, indices and other derivatives (a type of instrument whose value is determined by reference to the value or the change in value of one or more securities, indices or other financial instruments) to hedge against market changes or as a substitute for securities transactions.

RMB International Fund seeks long-term capital appreciation ("International Fund"). There can be no assurance that the International Fund will be successful in achieving its investment objective.

The International Fund pursues its investment objective by investing, under normal conditions, in at least three different countries and at least 40% of its total assets in securities of non-U.S. issuers organized or having their principal place of business outside the U.S. or doing a substantial amount (more than 50%) of business outside the U.S. Investments in exchange-traded funds ("ETFs") based on non-U.S. market indices are considered investments outside the U.S. for purposes of the 40% requirement noted above.

The International Fund's non-U.S. investments will be primarily in developed markets, but the International Fund may invest in emerging markets. As of the date of the prospectus, RMB believes that developed markets outside the United States include, but may not be limited to, the following: Austria, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom. The International Fund considers emerging markets to be markets located in countries classified as emerging or frontier markets by MSCI, and are generally located in the Asia Pacific region, Eastern Europe, the Middle East, Central and South America, and Africa. There are no geographic limits on the International Fund's non-U.S. investments.

RMB International Small-Cap Fund seeks long-term capital appreciation ("Int. Small Cap Fund"). The Int. Small Cap Fund pursues its investment objective by investing, under normal conditions, at least 80% of its net assets (plus any borrowings for investment purposes) in small capitalization companies. RMB defines a small capitalization company as any company with a market capitalization less than or equal to the largest market capitalization of any company in the MSCI EAFE Small Cap Index, at the time of purchase, which, as of September 30, 2017, was

approximately \$10 billion. Under normal conditions, the Int. Small Cap Fund will invest in at least three different countries and will invest at least 40% of its total assets in securities of non-U.S. issuers organized or having their principal place of business outside the U.S. or doing a substantial amount (more than 50%) of business outside the U.S. Investments in exchange-traded funds (“ETFs”) based on non-U.S. market indices are considered investments outside the U.S. for purposes of the 40% requirement noted above. At times the Int. Small Cap Fund may increase the relative emphasis of its investments in a particular region, country, sector, industry or other segment of the market.

The Int. Small Cap Fund’s non-U.S. investments will be primarily in developed markets, but the Int. Small Cap Fund may invest in emerging markets. As of the date of the prospectus, the Adviser believes that developed markets outside the United States include, but may not be limited to, the following: Austria, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom. The Int. Small Cap Fund considers emerging markets to be markets located in countries classified as emerging or frontier markets by MSCI, and are generally located in the Asia Pacific region, Eastern Europe, the Middle East, Central and South America, and Africa. There are no geographic limits on the Int. Small Cap Fund’s non-U.S. investments.

RMB Japan Fund seeks long-term capital appreciation (“Japan Fund”). The Japan Fund pursues its investment objective by investing, under normal conditions, at least 80% of its net assets (plus any borrowings for investment purposes) in equity securities of Japanese companies. RMB considers a Japanese company to be a company organized under the laws of Japan, for which the principal securities trading market is Japan, or a company that has a majority of its assets or business in Japan.

The Japan Fund primarily invests in equity securities, including common stocks, preferred stocks, warrants and other rights, and securities convertible into or exchangeable for common stocks. The Japan Fund’s investments also may include pooled investment vehicles (primarily exchange-traded funds or “ETFs”) that invest in equity securities of Japanese companies; Japanese real estate investment trusts (“REITs”); initial public offerings (“IPOs”); equity-linked securities that provide economic exposure to securities of Japanese companies without direct investment in the underlying securities, including derivative instruments such as swaps, options, futures contracts, forward contracts and foreign currency futures. The Japan Fund’s investments may be hedged or unhedged to foreign currencies depending on the market opportunities. Investments in ETFs that invest principally in equity securities of Japanese companies and investments in derivatives that provide exposure to Japanese companies are considered investments in Japanese companies for purposes of the 80% requirement noted above. The Japan Fund may invest in companies of any size. The portion of the Japan Fund’s assets invested in small, medium or large companies is expected to vary over time. The Japan Fund will target a balanced approach with allocations across the market capitalization spectrum. Although most of the Japan Fund’s investments must be liquid at the time of investment, the Japan Fund may invest, to some extent, in securities that are restricted or illiquid, and these securities will be considered in determining compliance with the Japan Fund’s 80% investment policy noted above. The Japan Fund will limit its investment in all restricted securities, including Rule 144A securities, to 15% of its total assets. Restricted securities, other than Rule 144A securities determined by the board of directors of the Japan Fund

to be liquid, are considered to be illiquid and are subject to the Japan Fund's separate 15% limitation on investments in illiquid securities. The Japan Fund may also invest in depository receipts, including American, European, and Global Depository Receipts.

IronBridge Funds, Inc.

IronBridge Small Cap Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing, under normal market conditions, at least 80% of its assets in equity securities of companies with small market capitalizations. For this purpose, RMB defines a small capitalization company as any company with a market capitalization less than or equal to the largest market capitalization (determined at the time of investment) of any company in the Russell 2000® Index, which, as of September 30, 2016, was approximately \$4.83. The IronBridge Small Cap Fund may invest in American Depository Receipts and/or Global Depository Receipts, and may invest a significant portion of its assets in financial services companies.

RMB actively manages the IronBridge Small Cap Fund by applying an economic return framework. This is a valuation model that uses cash flow to determine a company's value, rather than traditional accounting measures such as corporate performance, earnings and book value. RMB uses this methodology to identify attractively-priced companies, and as a result, the IronBridge Small Cap Fund invests primarily in growth and value-style equity securities.

IronBridge SMID Cap Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing, under normal market conditions, at least 80% of its assets in equity securities of companies with small-to-medium market capitalizations. For this purpose, RMB defines a small-to-medium capitalization company as a company that has a market capitalization of between \$100 million and \$10 billion, which definition is applied at the time of purchase. The IronBridge SMID Cap Fund may invest in American Depository Receipts and/or Global Depository Receipts, and may invest a significant portion of its assets in financial services companies.

RMB actively manages the IronBridge SMID Cap Fund by applying an economic return framework. This is a valuation model that uses cash flow to determine a company's value, rather than traditional accounting measures such as corporate performance, earnings and book value. RMB uses this methodology to identify attractively-priced companies, and as a result, the IronBridge SMID Cap Fund invests primarily in growth and value-style equity securities.

IronBridge Large Cap Fund seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing, under normal market conditions, at least 80% of its assets in equity securities of companies with large market capitalizations. For this purpose, RMB defines a large capitalization company as any company with a market capitalization in excess of \$5 billion, which definition is applied at the time of purchase. The IronBridge Large Cap Fund may invest in American Depository Receipts and/or Global Depository Receipts.

RMB actively manages the IronBridge Large Cap Fund by applying an economic return framework. This is a valuation model that uses cash flow to determine a company's value, rather than traditional accounting measures such as corporate performance, earnings and book value. RMB uses this methodology to identify attractively-priced companies, and as a result, the IronBridge Large Cap Fund invests primarily in growth and value-style equity securities.

Code of Ethics, Participation in Client Transactions and Personal Trading

Code of Ethics

RMB has adopted a Code of Ethics for all supervised persons of RMB describing its high standard of business conduct and fiduciary duty to clients. The Code of Ethics includes provisions relating to personal securities trading procedures and employee reporting and attestations, among other things. All supervised persons at RMB must acknowledge the terms of the Code of Ethics as a new employee, annually, or as amended.

Trading

In general, RMB does not allow a portfolio manager for a strategy to establish or maintain contrary long and short positions in the same security in different client accounts that they manage for the same strategy. Exceptions to this policy may be given by RMB's Compliance Department.

When initiating a long position, portfolio managers are required to consider the investment strategies, risk tolerance, asset composition and size, investment guidelines and cash positions of each account in deciding whether to initiate a long position. Each account should be treated equitably and allocated an appropriate position in light of the above factors.

Personal Trading

From time to time, employees or related persons of RMB will invest in securities that are also held in client accounts. All transactions in these and other securities must comply with RMB's Code of Ethics, a copy of which is available by request. The Code of Ethics requires, among other things, that employees and related persons of RMB:

- Are limited by size of trade in their ability to trade in such securities if RMB is trading for client accounts on the same day;
- Must report all personal trading and accounts to RMB's Compliance Department to review compliance with these standards;
- Must hold any securities purchased for their personal accounts for a minimum period.

In certain circumstances and upon written request, RMB will permit transactions in a security that would otherwise be prohibited under RMB's Code of Ethics.

Participation or Interest in Client Transactions

Employees of RMB from time to time introduce their clients to private funds managed by RMB. In addition to management fees, depending on market conditions and the strategy, RMB will earn incentive allocations or incentive fees from certain private funds managed by RMB. While RMB has a financial incentive to recommend an investment in a private fund managed by RMB, it will consider the suitability of the investment in light of the client's objectives and restrictions. In addition, RMB will provide the client with a PPM for each private fund which outlines, among other things, the risks, fees, and conflicts of interest related to the private fund. Ultimately, clients retain final discretion with respect to making an investment into a private fund managed by RMB.

RMB will also introduce their clients to mutual funds that it manages and is distributed by an independent third-party broker-dealer. RMB has a financial incentive to recommend the mutual

funds it manages, however, it will consider whether the mutual fund(s) is an appropriate investment for the client.

RMB's Wealth Management department will also introduce their clients to separately managed accounts managed by RMB's Asset Management department. These Clients will not receive any other services from wealth management and will pay higher fees to access separately managed accounts managed by RMB's Asset Management department. RMB has a financial incentive to recommend these separately managed accounts, however, it will consider whether these separately managed accounts are an appropriate investment for the Client.

RMB does not directly buy or sell for itself publicly traded securities that it also recommends to clients, but accounts sponsored by RMB, including its 401(k) plan, may hold such securities. Any transactions in this plan that are directed by employees would be subject to RMB's Code of Ethics. RMB's clients and prospective clients may request a copy of RMB's Code of Ethics by contacting its Compliance Department at (312) 993-5800 or compliance@rmbcap.com.

Participation or Interest in Client Transactions

Employees of RMB may introduce their clients to private funds managed by RMB. In addition to management fees, RMB may earn incentive allocations or incentive fees from certain private funds managed by RMB. While RMB has a financial incentive to recommend an investment in a private fund managed by RMB, it will consider the suitability of the investment in light of the client's objectives and restrictions. In addition, RMB will provide the client with a PPM for each private fund which outlines, among other things, the risks, fees, and conflicts of interest related to the private fund. Ultimately, clients retain final discretion with respect to making an investment into a private fund.

RMB may also introduce their clients to mutual funds that it manages. RMB has a financial incentive to recommend the mutual funds it manages, however, it will consider whether the mutual fund(s) is an appropriate investment for the client.

RMB does not directly buy or sell for itself securities that it also recommends to clients, but accounts sponsored by RMB, including its 401(k) plan, may hold such securities. Any transactions in this plan that are directed by employees would be subject to RMB's Code of Ethics.

RMB's clients and prospective clients may request a copy of RMB's Code of Ethics by contacting its Compliance Department at (312) 993-5800 or compliance@rmbcap.com.

Review of Accounts

Each portfolio manager has primary responsibility for review of accounts that he or she manages. Therefore, the number of accounts assigned to each portfolio manager varies.

For RMB's operations team performs or monitors regular reconciliations of client accounts to help ensure that reported positions match RMB's expected positions for such accounts.

RMB generally makes various reports (generated by the custodian) available to clients on a quarterly basis, at a minimum. These reports detail the performance of the accounts, portfolio holdings, and transactions. Representatives of RMB will generally meet with clients on an annual

basis, or more frequently as requested by the client. The relevant custodian(s) will also send information regarding account holdings, transactions, and cash flows directly to clients. Clients may also choose to receive trade confirmations directly from the custodian.

Client Referrals and Other Compensation

Corporate Financial Planning Services

RMB provides financial planning services to certain clients who are executives or employees of certain companies. RMB is retained directly by the company to provide such services. Each company compensates RMB directly for these services and the amount varies depending upon the level of the executive or employee. RMB may reimburse a portion of the wealth/advisory fees paid directly to RMB by the client in consideration of the amount paid by the company.

Retirement Plan Solutions

RMB West may receive client references from RMB. RMB has an incentive to recommend RMB West to its clients.

Referral Programs

As a result of RMB's participation in referral programs sponsored by certain Custodians and their affiliates, RMB may have potential conflicts of interest including its decision to use certain Custodians for execution, custody, and clearing for certain client accounts, and RMB may have a potential incentive to suggest the use of a Custodian and its affiliates to its advisory clients, whether or not those clients were referred to RMB by a Custodian or its affiliates. A Custodian will most likely refer clients to investment advisers that encourage their clients to custody their assets at such Custodian and whose client accounts are profitable to such Custodian. Consequently, in order to obtain client referrals from a Custodian, RMB may have an incentive to recommend to clients that the assets under management by RMB be held in custody with such Custodian and to place transactions for client accounts with such Custodian. In addition, RMB will generally agree not to solicit clients referred to it by one Custodian to establish brokerage or custody accounts at other custodians, except when RMB's fiduciary duties require doing so.

There is no direct link between RMB's participation in any referral program and the investment advice it gives to its clients, although RMB receives economic benefits through its participation in referral programs that are typically not available to clients of a Custodian. These benefits at certain Custodians include the following products and services (provided without cost or at a discount): receipt of duplicate client statements and confirmations; research related products and tools; consulting services; access to a trading desk serving RMB participants; access to block trading (which provides the ability to aggregate securities transactions for execution and then allocate the appropriate shares to client accounts); the ability to have advisory fees deducted directly from client accounts; access to an electronic communications network for client order entry and account information; access to mutual funds with no transaction fees and to certain institutional money managers; and discounts on compliance, marketing, research, technology, and practice management products or services provided to RMB by third party vendors. A Custodian may also have paid for business consulting and professional services received by RMB's related persons. Some of the products and services made available by may benefit RMB but may not benefit its client accounts. These products or services may assist RMB in managing and administering client accounts, including accounts not maintained at the Custodian providing

the benefit. Other services made available may be intended to help RMB manage and further develop its business enterprise.

RMB's participation in a referral program does not diminish its duty to seek best execution of trades for client accounts. RMB has agreed that it will not charge clients more than the standard range of advisory fees disclosed in its Form ADV 2A Brochure to cover solicitation fees paid to as part of a referral program. As part of its fiduciary duties to clients, RMB endeavors at all times to put the interests of its clients first. Clients should be aware, however, that the receipt of economic benefits by RMB or its related persons in and of itself creates a potential conflict of interest and may indirectly influence the RMB's recommendation for custody and brokerage services.

Certain RMB employees attend a limited number of conference meetings and other meetings sponsored by certain Custodians. These Custodians pay for the flight, hotel, and transportation expenses for these employees to attend these meetings. In addition, the Custodians or RMB may pay for food and beverage expenses at periodic seminars conducted by RMB and attended by clients and prospects.

Financial Information

Registered investment advisers are required in this section to provide you with certain financial information or disclosures about their financial condition. RMB has no financial commitment that impairs its ability to meet contractual and fiduciary commitments to clients, and has not been the subject of a bankruptcy proceeding.

Other Benefits

RMB may recommend/require that clients establish brokerage accounts with the Schwab Advisor Services division of Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. ("Schwab"), a registered broker-dealer, member SIPC, to maintain custody of clients' assets and to effect trades for their accounts. The final decision to custody assets with Schwab is at the discretion of the RMB's clients, including those accounts under ERISA or IRA rules and regulations, in which case the client is acting as either the plan sponsor or IRA accountholder. RMB is independently owned and operated and not affiliated with Schwab. Schwab provides RMB with access to its institutional trading and custody services, which are typically not available to Schwab retail investors. These services generally are available to independent investment advisers on an unsolicited basis, at no charge to them so long as a total of at least \$10 million of the adviser's clients' assets are maintained in accounts at Schwab Advisor Services. Schwab's services include brokerage services that are related to the execution of securities transactions, custody, research, including that in the form of advice, analyses and reports, and access to mutual funds and other investments that are otherwise generally available only to institutional investors or would require a significantly higher minimum initial investment.

For RMB client accounts maintained in its custody, Schwab generally does not charge separately for custody services but is compensated by account holders through commissions or other transaction-related or asset-based fees for securities trades that are executed through Schwab or that settle into Schwab accounts.

Schwab also makes available to RMB other products and services that benefit RMB but may not benefit its clients' accounts. These benefits may include national, regional or RMB specific educational events organized and/or sponsored by Schwab Advisor Services. Other potential benefits may include occasional business entertainment of personnel of RMB by Schwab Advisor Services personnel, including meals, invitations to sporting events, including golf tournaments, and other forms of entertainment, some of which may accompany educational opportunities. Other of these products and services assist RMB in managing and administering clients' accounts. These include software and other technology (and related technological training) that provide access to client account data (such as trade confirmations and account statements), facilitate trade execution (and allocation of aggregated trade orders for multiple client accounts), provide research, pricing information and other market data, facilitate payment of RMB fees from its clients' accounts, and assist with back-office training and support functions, recordkeeping and client reporting. Many of these services generally may be used to service all or some substantial number of RMB accounts, including accounts not maintained at Schwab Advisor Services. Schwab Advisor Services also makes available to RMB other services intended to help RMB manage and further develop its business enterprise. These services may include professional compliance, legal and business consulting, publications and conferences on practice management, information technology, business succession, regulatory compliance, employee benefits providers, human capital consultants, insurance and marketing. In addition, Schwab may make available, arrange and/or pay vendors for these types of services rendered to RMB by independent third parties. Schwab Advisor Services may discount or waive fees it would otherwise charge for some of these services or pay all or a part of the fees of a third-party providing these services to RMB. While, as a fiduciary, RMB endeavors to act in its clients' best interests, RMB's recommendation/requirement that clients maintain their assets in accounts at Schwab may be based in part on the benefit to RMB of the availability of some of the foregoing products and services and other arrangements and not solely on the nature, cost or quality of custody and brokerage services provided by Schwab, which may create a potential conflict of interest.

RMB may receive without cost from Schwab computer software and related systems support, which allow RMB to better monitor client accounts maintained at Schwab. RMB may receive the software and related support without cost because the Firm renders investment management services to clients that maintain assets at Schwab. The software and support is not provided in connection with securities transactions of clients (i.e., not "soft dollars"). The software and related systems support may benefit RMB, but not its clients directly. In fulfilling its duties to its clients, RMB endeavors at all times to put the interest of its clients first. Clients should be aware, however, that RMB's receipt of economic benefits from a broker/dealer creates a conflict of interest since these benefits may influence the Firm's choice of broker/dealer over another that does not furnish similar software, systems support or services.

Specifically, RMB may receive the following benefits from Schwab: (1) up to \$60,000 in credits to be used toward third party providers and offset onboarding of client accounts; (2) receipt of duplicate client confirmations and bundled duplicate statements; (3) access to a trading desk that exclusively services its institutional traders; (4) access to block trading which provides the ability to aggregate securities transactions and then allocate the appropriate shares to client accounts, and/or (5) access to an electronic communication network for client order entry and account information.
