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Item 4 – Advisory Business

Advisory Firm Description

Riversville is a privately-held investment adviser based in New York, New York. We have provided non-discretionary advisory services to our clients since 2005, and discretionary advisory services to our clients since 2009. Our advisory services are targeted to high net worth individuals and their families. Clients invest with us on an individual basis, as well as through various investment vehicles. We are a New York corporation that is 100% owned by our founder, Lawrence S. Malkin.

Types of Advisory Services

Riversville works closely with its limited number of clients to provide advice that fits each client's individual needs. We typically provide advisory services across multiple asset classes, helping our clients to build attractive investment portfolios. While not every client utilizes all of our service offerings, many of them do engage us to provide more than one type of advisory service.

Our advisory services include:

- management of public equity portfolios on a discretionary basis,
- management of fixed income portfolios on a discretionary basis,
- management of Exchange Traded Fund ("ETF") portfolios on a discretionary or non-discretionary basis,
- selection and monitoring of third-party (i.e., not affiliated with Riversville) investment managers ("Outside Managers") on a non-discretionary basis,
- asset allocation services on a non-discretionary basis ("Asset Allocation Services"),
- investment consulting services on a non-discretionary basis ("Consulting Services"), and
- management of certain public equity positions, fixed income instruments, and direct private equity holdings on a non-discretionary basis.

Our discretionary public equity portfolios are managed in accordance with our traditional equity strategy, our sector focused equity strategy, or our dividend focused equity strategy. The goal for our traditional equity strategy is generally to identify equity securities that have strong potential for long-term appreciation, although we also invest in shorter-term opportunities from time to time. The goal for our sector focused equity strategy is to provide our clients with enhanced exposure to particular sectors or industries within the broader market. The goal for our dividend focused equity strategy is to identify equity securities that offer an attractive yield, while at the same time providing strong potential for long-term appreciation.

The goal for our discretionary fixed income strategy is generally to identify fixed income instruments with attractive yields across multiple currencies, taking into consideration the risks of each instrument.

In addition to any ETFs in which we invest in accordance with our other strategies, clients may engage Riversville to manage separate ETF portfolios on a discretionary or non-discretionary basis. Depending on the specific needs of the client, Riversville will seek the most appropriate ETFs to represent the desired asset class, industry, sector or country.

We provide our discretionary public equity strategies, discretionary fixed income strategy and discretionary and non-discretionary ETF strategies to our clients through separately managed accounts (“Separate Accounts”).

Outside Managers are typically public equity, fixed income, hedge fund or private equity managers, depending on the investment objectives of the client. Clients who engage an Outside Manager based on our recommendations will contract with the Outside Manager directly (or directly through a third-party wrap fee program).

Our Asset Allocation Services include non-discretionary advice on client-specific strategic asset allocations. We believe that the choice and mix of assets and currencies in a portfolio may provide a key source of performance and diversification over the long term. Based on our research and the specific needs of the client, we make recommendations regarding the client’s asset allocation. As the outlook for different asset classes changes over time, we may make recommendations to our clients to periodically change or rebalance the asset allocation.

Our Consulting Services vary from client to client and may include investment services such as recommendations regarding a client’s private equity or real estate transactions or holdings.

Riversville may agree to manage certain public equity positions, fixed income instruments, and direct private equity holdings on a non-discretionary basis. All non-discretionary investment decisions remain the responsibility of the client, who may or may not accept our recommendations. In addition, there may be times when a client may request that Riversville facilitate the execution of a security position not selected by Riversville, in which case such client will be responsible as usual for its brokerage commissions and any other related third-party fees; however, Riversville will not receive any transaction-based compensation for executing requested trades. Riversville will only monitor client directed securities if agreed to in advance with the client.

Each client is advised that it remains its responsibility to promptly notify Riversville if there is ever any material change in its financial situation or investment objectives.

Client Investment Objectives/Restrictions

If a client and Riversville agree in writing, a client may impose specific investment restrictions on our discretionary advisory services, such as restricting the purchase of certain types of securities.

For Separate Accounts with client-specified restrictions, transactions may be executed separately and after Separate Accounts without restrictions to allow necessary time to process the restrictions and/or to find more suitable investments. Accommodating these types of

restrictions may result in differences in Separate Account performance, compositions and the timing of transactions.

Clients may also have different investment objectives, criteria, and/or restrictions with respect to our recommendations of Outside Managers. Accommodating these different objectives, criteria, and/or restrictions may result in differences in the Outside Managers engaged by our clients.

Because we tailor our clients' portfolios to meet their unique and individual needs, we may purchase/sell a security for one client which we do not purchase/sell for other clients. Similarly, we may recommend an Outside Manager to one client which we do not recommend to another client.

Wrap Fee Programs

Riversville does not participate in any wrap fee programs, although it may recommend that clients invest with Outside Managers through such programs. When determining whether to participate in a wrap fee program, a client should consider whether participation in the wrap fee program will cost the client more or less than purchasing the wrap fee program services separately (depending on such factors as the amount of the wrap fee, the type and size of the account, the type of assets to be purchased for the account, the historical and/or expected size and number of trades for the account, the value the client attributes to monitoring, custodial and other services that may be provided pursuant to the wrap fee program, and the value the client places on having access to the particular investment advisers participating in the wrap fee program). A client should also understand that the program broker may charge higher commissions, or may provide less advantageous execution of transactions, than might otherwise be attainable if the client were to purchase the wrap fee program services separately. Clients should review the details of any wrap fee program as set forth in the applicable program documents.

Assets Under Management as of December 31, 2013

As of December 31, 2013, we had the following Regulatory Assets Under Management:

- \$ 301,703,922 of client assets on a discretionary basis; and
- \$ 19,152,919 of client assets on a non-discretionary basis.

In addition to our Regulatory Assets Under Management, as of December 31, 2013, we advised \$343,515,443 of client assets in connection with Outside Manager advisory services. Therefore, in total, as of December 31, 2013, we had \$664,372,284 in assets under advisement (inclusive of Regulatory Assets Under Management and Outside Manager advisory services). Riversville continues to monitor Outside Managers following a client investment, but does not effectuate such investment activity.

Item 5 – Fees and Compensation

Adviser Compensation

The specific manner in which fees are charged by Riversville is established in each client's investment management agreement. The investment management agreement sets forth the terms and conditions of the engagement and describes the scope of the services to be provided. Fees typically consist of management fees and/or performance-based fees. Management fees are generally fixed (typically subject to annual adjustments for inflation), and may be influenced by the size of the assets under management and the scope of advisory services rendered. Fees may be waived or reduced in our discretion.

All of our clients that pay us fees are "qualified purchasers", as defined in Section 2(a)(51)(A) of the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended. We do not have a standard fee schedule. While fees typically consist of fixed management fees (typically subject to annual adjustments for inflation) and/or performance-based fees, we negotiate separate fee arrangements with each of our limited number of clients.

Payment of Fees

Management fees are calculated and billed quarterly in advance. Bills are normally sent at least 30 days prior to the beginning of each quarter. It is expected that the management fee will be paid within 15 days after receipt of the bill.

Performance-based fees are typically at the discretion of our clients or as otherwise set forth in a client's investment management agreement, and are normally paid within 90 days of the end of the calendar year (refer to Item 6 for a discussion of performance-based fees).

We do not deduct any fees from client accounts.

For any partial quarterly period, the client will be charged a pro-rated fee based on the number of days in the quarter during which advisory services are provided.

Other Fees and Expenses

Riversville's fees are separate from and do not include the following third-party expenses: (i) brokerage commissions, dealer spreads and other transaction costs in connection with buying and selling securities, (ii) custodial fees, (iii) interest, (iv) taxes, duties and other governmental charges, (v) costs and charges associated with foreign exchange, and (vi) other portfolio expenses. These expenses are the responsibility of each client and vary by investment type.

In addition to Riversville's fees, subject to the terms of each client's investment management agreement, clients may also be responsible for the reimbursement of certain Riversville expenses, such as, without limitation, travel and related expenses incurred in connection with client meetings, and travel, legal and related expenses in connection with due diligence on an Outside Manager or other investment. For the reimbursement of expenses in connection with client meetings where more than one client is in attendance, expenses will generally be allocated to such clients in proportion to the total dollar amount managed by Riversville for each such client as of the last day of the month immediately preceding the meeting. For the reimbursement of expenses in connection with due diligence on an Outside Manager or other investment, expenses will generally be allocated to such clients in proportion to the total dollar amount invested by such clients with or in the applicable Outside Manager or other investment at the time the expenses are incurred, or, in the case of expenses incurred in connection with a new potential Outside Manager or investment, in proportion to the total dollar amount of the initial investment subsequently made by such clients. Where expenses have been incurred in

connection with due diligence on an Outside Manager or other investment but no client makes a subsequent investment, expenses will generally be allocated to such clients in proportion to the total dollar amount managed by Riversville for each such client as of the last day of the month immediately preceding the date on which the expenses are incurred, provided that expenses will only be allocated to such clients for whom the applicable Outside Manager or other investment would have been appropriate taking into consideration the types of services such clients have engaged Riversville to provide and each client's asset allocation. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a different methodology may be used for the allocation of any of the expenses described above if agreed to by Riversville and all affected clients, and Riversville reserves the right in its discretion to waive any reimbursement obligation with respect to one more clients.

Clients who invest with Outside Managers will also bear any fees and expenses associated with those investments. While Riversville does not receive any compensation from Outside Managers, Riversville's fees are not reduced by the fees paid to Outside Managers, nor are Riversville's fees reduced by any ETF or mutual fund fees in which we invest.

Item 12 further describes the factors that Riversville considers in selecting broker-dealers for client transactions and determining the reasonableness of their compensation.

Advance Payment of Fees

If fees are paid in advance and our services are thereafter terminated, a refund for unearned fees will be promptly provided to the client based on the number of days in the period during which advisory services were provided.

Additional Compensation by Supervised Persons

Neither Riversville, nor any of its supervised persons, receives compensation in connection with the purchase or sale of any securities.

Item 6 – Performance-Based Fees and Side-By-Side Management

In addition to management fees, Riversville may also receive performance-based fees (i.e., fees based on a share of capital gains on or capital appreciation of the assets of a client) as determined in our clients' discretion or as otherwise set forth in a client's investment management agreement. Riversville structures all performance-based fees in accordance with Section 205(a)(1) of the Investment Advisers Act of 1940 and the rules and regulations thereunder (the "Advisers Act"), including the exemption set forth in Rule 205-3 of the Advisers Act permitting performance-based fee arrangements with "qualified clients."

Because not all of our clients pay performance-based fees and because performance-based fees may vary, we face a conflict of interest by reason of the fact that we may have an incentive to favor accounts for which we receive a performance-based fee (or receive a higher performance-based fee). However, we have policies and procedures in place to seek to ensure that all clients are treated as fairly and equitably as possible under the circumstances, including, without limitation, policies regarding fair trade allocation. In addition, performance-based fees may create an incentive for Riversville to make investments that are riskier or more speculative than would be the case in the absence of performance-based fees.

Outside Managers may also charge performance-based fees. While Riversville does not receive any compensation from Outside Managers, Riversville's fees are not reduced by the fees paid to Outside Managers.

Item 7 – Types of Clients

Riversville provides advisory services primarily to high net worth individuals and their families. Clients invest with us on an individual basis, as well as through various investment vehicles.

We typically manage at least \$1 million per client, but we have no fixed minimum investment amount. We take on a new client at our discretion.

Outside Managers will generally have their own minimum investment requirements.

One of our client's affiliates leases us our office space. The fact that Riversville is provided office space by an affiliate of a Riversville client may create a conflict of interest for Riversville in that we may be incentivized to favor that client. However, we have policies and procedures in place to seek to ensure that all clients are treated as fairly and as equitably as possible under the circumstances, including, without limitation, policies regarding fair trade allocation.

Item 8 – Methods of Analysis, Investment Strategies and Risk of Loss

Methods of Analysis and Investment Strategies

Traditional Equity Strategy

Our traditional equity strategy invests in both U.S. and international exchange-traded equity securities, which may include American Depositary Receipts ("ADRs"), Global Depositary Receipts ("GDRs") and ETFs, across various sectors and market capitalization ranges. Equity securities are both U.S. dollar and foreign currency denominated. Our goal is generally to identify equity securities that have strong potential for long-term appreciation, although we also invest in shorter-term opportunities from time to time.

Ideas for new investments can come from either a "top-down" assessment of a particular sector, country, theme, or trend, or a "bottom-up" investment screen of an individual company. When making investment decisions for equity securities, Riversville may use one or more of a variety of methods of analysis, including, for instance, fundamental analysis, technical analysis, macro-economic analysis, sector analysis, currency analysis, political analysis, corporate due diligence, credit analysis of a company's balance sheet, income statement analysis, cash flow analysis, valuation analysis, business model assessment and regulatory analysis, and/or an assessment of the trends, events or activities that could positively or negatively impact the future prospects of the company.

When evaluating a new equity security, we may also make a separate assessment of the potential risk of the security based on such factors as, without limitation, sector and country allocation. The risk assessment not only can determine if the security is ultimately included or excluded from the portfolio, but can impact the weighting of such security within the portfolio.

We may use one or more of a variety of sources of information to conduct our equity analyses including, for example, newspapers, financial publications and news reports, annual reports,

prospectuses and filings with the SEC or other regulatory bodies, corporate press releases and publications, research material prepared by others, external databases containing financial and corporate information, and publications by governments or other global institutions such as the International Monetary Fund.

Sector Focused Equity Strategy

Our sector focused equity strategy invests in both U.S. and international exchange-traded equity securities, which may include ADRs, GDRs and ETFs, across various market capitalization ranges. Equity securities are both U.S. dollar and foreign currency denominated. Our goal is to provide our clients with enhanced exposure to particular sectors or industries within the broader market. While Rivesville's only current sector focused equity strategy is focused on agricultural companies, material companies, and energy companies, we may add or remove additional sectors to or from the strategy. As part of this strategy, we may invest in companies that operate within the applicable sector(s), as well as companies that service such companies or otherwise have an indirect connection to such sector(s). Our sector focused equity strategy uses similar analysis, risk assessment and research methodologies as our traditional equity strategy.

Dividend Focused Equity Strategy

Our dividend focused equity strategy invests in both U.S. and international exchange-traded equity securities, which may include ADRs, GDRs and ETFs, across various market capitalization ranges. Equity securities are both U.S. dollar and foreign currency denominated. Our goal is to identify equity securities that offer an attractive yield, while at the same time providing strong potential for long-term appreciation. Our dividend focused equity strategy uses similar analysis, risk assessment and research methodologies as our traditional equity strategy.

Fixed Income Strategy

Our fixed income strategy invests in U.S. and international fixed income securities, including, but not limited to, government obligations, inflation protected securities, corporate bonds and agency bonds. Fixed income instruments are both U.S. dollar and foreign currency denominated and may be fixed or floating rate instruments. Our goal is generally to identify fixed income instruments with attractive yields across multiple currencies, taking into consideration the risks of each instrument.

In order to select a security, we generally first identify the currency we are looking for, based on a targeted currency allocation. Secondly, we determine the sector or type of security (e.g., government, corporate, etc.) we would like based on the diversification goals for the portfolio. The final step is to select the individual issuer that best meets our risk and return analysis. This issuer assessment is tailored to the particular investment in which we are interested.

When making investment decisions for fixed income investments, Riversville may use one or more of a variety of methods of analysis, including, for instance, fundamental analysis, macro-economic analysis, sector analysis, currency analysis, credit analysis of the issuer's balance sheet, income statement analysis, cash flow analysis, business model assessment, regulatory analysis, political analysis, economic evaluation of a particular country and/or an assessment of the trends, events or activities that could positively or negatively impact the future prospects of the issuer. If no security is found to be attractive, we may start the security selection process over based upon a different currency selection.

We may use one or more of a variety of sources of information to conduct our fixed income analyses, including, for instance, newspapers, financial publications and news reports, annual reports, prospectuses and filings with the SEC or other regulatory bodies, corporate press releases and publications, research material prepared by others, external databases containing financial and corporate information, and publications by governments or other global institutions such as the International Monetary Fund.

Our fixed income portfolios contain concentrated security, sector and currency positions. Such concentrations may create a particularly volatile strategy. Investors should determine whether such volatility is appropriate for their fixed income portfolios.

ETF Investments

In addition to any ETFs in which we invest in accordance with our other strategies, clients may engage Riversville to manage separate ETF portfolios on a discretionary or non-discretionary basis. Depending on the specific needs of the client, Riversville will seek the most appropriate ETFs to represent the desired asset class, industry, sector or country.

Outside Manager Selection and Monitoring

Our Outside Manager selection process typically begins by finding Outside Managers through publications, recommendations, or quantitative screens of data that we obtain from research databases. This data includes information about Outside Manager strategies such as:

- return information (both absolute and as compared to an appropriate benchmark) and
- volatility and other risk metrics.

We undertake due diligence of those Outside Managers that we believe may be potential candidates for our clients. Depending on the type of Outside Manager, our due diligence may focus on, without limitation:

- security selection and portfolio construction methodologies,
- portfolio risk, including, leverage, concentration, currency and country risk,
- valuation procedures,
- the individual portfolio managers and other personnel,
- organizational structure,
- economic terms, such as fees and incentive compensation, and/or
- material conflicts of interest.

Actual areas of focus for due diligence may vary depending on the type and size of an investment. Client investments with Outside Managers are generally long-term investments. After a client makes an investment with an Outside Manager, we monitor the performance of the

investment on an ongoing basis. Where necessary or appropriate, we may make further recommendations to the client regarding the investment, including whether the client should increase, reduce or eliminate its investment with the Outside Manager. The ultimate decision is, however, left to the client. Riversville does not provide legal advice and clients are advised to consult their own legal counsel regarding any legal issues in connection with a client's investment with a particular Outside Manager. Riversville is not responsible for the negotiation or implementation of, or adherence to, the specific terms (including, without limitation, any investment restrictions) of any contracts entered into between our clients and Outside Managers. Clients should be aware of the unique risks applicable to any Outside Manager before investing with such Outside Manager. Riversville encourages its clients to consider all of the risk factors of any Outside Manager, including those enumerated in any private placement memorandum, offering document, and/or ADV disclosure document.

Asset Allocation Construction

The asset allocation construction process is driven by our prospective views of the market, including specific asset classes, geographies, sectors, strategies and/or currencies. Long-term prospective risks and returns are the most important elements in developing an asset allocation. Each asset allocation is customized for a client based upon the client's financial profile, risk tolerance and specific goals and objectives.

We use a variety of sources of information to obtain our views on asset allocations, including, without limitation, newspapers, financial publications and news reports, research material prepared by others and publications by governments or other global institutions such as the World Federation of Exchanges.

Consulting Services

From time to time, certain clients may ask us to provide our thoughts about their ad hoc investments. We generally conduct analyses or research that will help the client make a more informed decision about the prospective opportunity. For example, Consulting Services might include evaluating a potential direct investment in a private corporation or a real estate project.

Non-Discretionary Management of Securities

Riversville may agree to manage certain public equity positions, fixed income instruments, and direct private equity holdings on a non-discretionary basis. All non-discretionary investment decisions remain the responsibility of the client, who may or may not accept our recommendations. In addition, there may be times when a client may request that Riversville facilitate the execution of a security position not selected by Riversville, in which case such client will be responsible as usual for its brokerage commissions and any other related third-party fees; however, Riversville will not receive any transaction-based compensation for executing requested trades. Riversville will only monitor client directed securities if agreed to in advance with client.

Material Risks of Investment Strategies or Methods of Analysis

Investing in securities involves risk of loss that clients should be prepared to bear. Clients should carefully consider, among other factors, the matters described below and the risk factors

described in all applicable Outside Manager offering documents. As a result of these factors, as well as other risks inherent in any investment, there can be no assurance that clients will meet their investment objectives. Past performance is not an indication or guarantee of future performance. The following risks may not be all-inclusive, but should be considered carefully by a prospective client before retaining Riversville's services.

To mitigate risk, clients should determine whether their entire investment portfolio is properly diversified and whether their overall asset allocation is appropriate. Riversville generally does not manage all of a client's investments, and therefore clients have the responsibility to advise Riversville of any outside investments of which they believe Riversville should be aware.

General Risks

Market Risk - The success of our advisory services depends, to a great extent, upon the correct assessment of the future price movements of securities. There can be no assurance that Riversville will be able to accurately predict these price movements.

Dependence on Key Personnel - The loss of the services of any key personnel could have an adverse impact on our investment performance. In particular, Lawrence Malkin's authority over so many aspects of our business could create a number of risks in the event he is sick, on vacation or otherwise unable to timely focus on things requiring his immediate attention or approval. Our Business Continuity Plan provides that in the event Lawrence Malkin becomes incapacitated for more than 24 hours, Gabriel Morrow, the firm's senior vice president, would have complete authority over our investment decisions until such time as Mr. Malkin is once again available. Additionally, since Gabriel Brecher has multiple roles as chief operating officer, general counsel, and chief compliance officer, there is a risk that certain matters may not receive sufficient or timely attention. Additionally, ensuring compliance over operations may be adversely impacted by having the same person overseeing both areas.

Risks Associated with Performance-Based Fees

Because not all of Riversville's clients pay performance-based fees and because performance-based fees may vary, we face a conflict of interest by reason of the fact that we may have an incentive to favor accounts for which we receive a performance-based fee (or receive a higher performance-based fee). However, we have policies and procedures in place to seek to ensure that all clients are treated as fairly and as equitably as possible under the circumstances, including, without limitation, policies regarding fair trade allocation. In addition, performance-based fees may create an incentive for Riversville to make investments that are riskier or more speculative than would be the case in the absence of performance-based fees. Riversville structures all performance-based fees in accordance with Section 205(a)(1) of Advisers Act, including the exemption set forth in Rule 205-3 of the Advisers Act permitting performance-based fee arrangements with "qualified clients." Any performance-based fees are determined in our clients' discretion or as otherwise set forth in a client's investment management agreement. Outside Managers may also charge performance-based fees. While Riversville does not receive any compensation from Outside Managers, Riversville's fees are not reduced by the fees paid to Outside Managers (see below under "Risks Associated with Outside Managers").

Risks Associated With Our Equity and Fixed Income Strategies

Small and Medium-Sized Company Risk - Certain of our strategies invest in small and medium-sized companies. While small and medium-sized companies generally have the potential for rapid growth, the securities of these companies often involve greater risks than investments in larger, more established companies because small and medium-sized companies may lack the management experience, financial resources, product diversification and competitive strengths of larger companies. In addition, in many instances, the liquidity of securities of small and medium-sized companies is substantially less than is typical of larger companies, while volatility is substantially greater.

Concentration Risk - Certain of our strategies have significant weightings in a particular issuer, industry, sector or country, which may subject them to greater risks than less concentrated portfolios.

Currency Risk - To the extent securities are issued by foreign issuers or denominated in foreign currencies, investment performance is affected by the strength or weakness of a client's base currency relative to these currencies.

Non-U.S. Securities Risk - Investing outside the U.S. involves different risks than U.S. investments. The risks generally include: less liquidity, greater volatility, higher transaction costs, political instability, restrictions on foreign investment and repatriation of capital, expropriation, less complete and reliable information about foreign companies, difficulty in enforcing contractual obligations, reduced government supervision of securities markets, less responsive management to shareholder concerns, and imposition of foreign withholding and other taxes.

Emerging Market Securities Risk - Investments in securities of issuers located in emerging market countries are speculative and subject to certain additional risks not typically associated with issuers located in developed countries. The additional risks associated with emerging markets generally include: even less liquidity, even greater volatility, higher rates of inflation (including hyper-inflation), higher degrees of political instability, greater government involvement in the economy, less extensive government supervision of the economy and securities markets, and the unavailability of material information about issuers.

Special Risks Associated With Our Sector Focused Equity Strategy

Concentration – In addition to certain of the risks associated with our traditional equity strategy, our sector focused equity strategy is by definition more concentrated and less diversified than our traditional equity strategy, which may result in greater volatility and risk.

Sector Specific Risks – Each sector which is the focus of this strategy will carry its own unique risks. While Rivesville's only current sector focused equity strategy is focused on agricultural companies, material companies, and energy companies, we may add or remove additional sectors to or from the strategy. Some of the unique risks associated with agricultural companies, material companies, and energy companies are described in more detail below.

- Agricultural companies pose their own unique risks, including, without limitation, the following: the agriculture industry is highly seasonal; agricultural products are subject to intense price and quantity competition from both domestic and foreign sources; the agriculture industry is subject to increasingly stringent environmental, safety and health laws and regulations which may introduce unpredictability and volatility in the operating results of companies in the agriculture industry; and the price of raw materials for many

agricultural products are affected by factors such as weather conditions, global imbalances of supply and demand, and general economic conditions which are beyond the control of the companies that produce such agricultural products. There can be no assurance that Riversville will be able to accurately assess or predict the impact of these risks.

- Companies in the materials sector may be adversely affected by commodity price volatility, exchange rates, import controls and increased competition. At times, worldwide production of industrial materials has exceeded demand as a result of overbuilding or economic downturns, leading to poor investment returns or losses. Other risks may include liability for environmental damage, depletion of resources, and mandated expenditures for safety and pollution control. The basic materials sector may also be affected by economic cycles, technical progress, labor relations, and government regulations. There can be no assurance that Riversville will be able to accurately assess or predict the impact of these risks.
- Energy companies are generally subject to supply and demand fluctuations and/or earnings variability based upon a wide range of factors, including fluctuating commodity prices, weather, increased conservation or use of alternative fuel sources, increased governmental or environmental regulation, depletion, rising interest rates, declines in domestic or foreign production or consumption, accidents or catastrophic events, and economic conditions, among others. In addition, energy companies engaged in the exploration and production business are subject to overstatement of the quantities of their reserves based upon any reserve estimates that prove to be inaccurate, and that no commercially productive oil, natural gas or other energy reservoirs will be discovered as a result of drilling or other exploration activities. There can be no assurance that Riversville will be able to accurately assess or predict the impact of these risks.

Special Risks Associated With Our Dividend Focused Equity Strategy

Reduction or Elimination of Dividends – In addition to certain of the risks set forth above for our equity strategies generally, there is a risk that the companies in which we invest pursuant to this strategy will reduce or eliminate their dividends.

Special Risks Associated With Our Fixed Income Strategy

Credit Risk - Failure of an issuer to make timely interest or principal payments, or a decline or perception of a decline in the credit quality of a bond or creditworthiness of an issuer, can cause a bond's price to fall.

Interest Rate Risk - There is a risk that a bond's value will change due to a change in the absolute level of interest rates, the spread between two rates, the shape of the yield curve or any other interest rate relationship. Interest rate risk affects the value of bonds more directly than equities, and it is a major risk to all bondholders. As interest rates rise, bond prices generally fall, and as interest rates fall, bond prices generally rise. While interest rate risk can be reduced by investing in a diverse portfolio of fixed-income securities with different interest rates and durations, there is no guarantee that this will be achieved.

Prepayment Risk - Prepayment risk relates to the risk that issuers will prepay fixed rate bonds when interest rates fall, forcing an investor to re-invest in bonds with lower interest rates than the original bond.

Non-Investment Grade Securities - While we primarily invest in investment grade securities, our fixed income strategy may invest in non-investment grade securities, which, while generally offering higher yields than investment grade securities, involve greater credit risk, including the risk of default. The prices of non-investment grade securities tend to be more sensitive to changing economic conditions and can fall dramatically in response to negative news about the borrower or its industry, or the economy in general. In addition, lower quality bonds tend to be less marketable than higher quality bonds because the market for them is not as broad or active.

Special Risks Associated with ETFs

Expenses - An ETF typically includes embedded expenses that may reduce the fund's net asset value, and therefore directly affect the fund's performance and indirectly affect a client's portfolio performance or an index benchmark comparison. Expenses of the fund may include investment advisor management fees, custodian fees, brokerage commissions, and legal and accounting fees. ETF expenses may change from time to time at the sole discretion of the ETF issuer.

Performance - ETF performance may not match the performance of the index or market benchmark that the ETF is designed to track because (i) the ETF will incur expenses and transaction costs not incurred by any applicable index or market benchmark; (ii) certain securities comprising the index or market benchmark tracked by the ETF may, from time to time, temporarily be unavailable, and (iii) supply and demand in the market for either the ETF and/or for the securities held by the ETF may cause the ETF shares to trade at a premium or discount to the actual net asset value of the securities owned by the ETF.

Composition - Certain ETF strategies may from time to time include the purchase of fixed income, commodities, foreign securities, ADRs, or other securities for which expenses and commission rates could be higher than normally charged for exchange-traded equity securities, and for which market quotations or valuation may be limited or inaccurate.

Leverage; Short Selling; Derivatives - Some ETFs may engage in borrowing. Interest on the borrowed amount may be greater than the income from or increase in the value of the securities purchased with the borrowed amount and the value of the securities purchased with the borrowed amount could decline below the amount borrowed. Using leverage is risky because although it can increase gains, it can also amplify losses. Short-selling is also a form of leverage because ETFs may sell borrowed securities with the expectation that it will be able to buy back the same securities later at a cheaper price. Depending on the movements/availability of such securities, this may not be possible. ETFs that hold derivatives may incur large losses because of the inherent use of leverage when investing in derivatives. Derivatives allow investors to earn large returns from small movements in the underlying asset's price. However, investors could lose large amounts if the price of the underlying asset moves against them.

Liquidity - The liquidity of certain ETFs may be substantially less than is typical of other securities in which we invest.

Two Layers of Fees - Clients should be aware that to the extent they invest in ETF securities they may pay two levels of advisory compensation – advisory fees charged by Riversville plus any advisory fees charged by the investment advisor of the ETF. This scenario may cause a higher advisory cost (and potentially lower investment returns) than if a client purchased the ETF directly.

Risks Associated with Outside Managers

Additional Risks - The risks set forth above with respect to our investment strategies are equally applicable to Outside Managers that have similar investment strategies. However, in addition to these investment strategies, Outside Managers may have other investment strategies that have their own unique risks, some of which are described below.

Performance – Our research on Outside Managers may include a review of Outside Managers' historical performance, which historical performance may not be indicative of future performance.

Multiple Managers - Utilizing multiple Outside Managers poses unique risks to a client. For example, Outside Managers may take positions in the same security or types of securities as Riversville or other Outside Managers at the same time. Such an occurrence may result in more rapid changes to a client's portfolio, whether upward or downward, than would be the case with greater diversification, with the result that a loss in any such position could have a greater adverse impact on a client. The possibility also exists that positive performance achieved by Riversville or one or more Outside Managers may be neutralized by negative performance by Riversville or one or more Outside Managers.

Two Layers of Fees - By investing with Outside Managers, a client, in effect, incurs two layers of fees - the fees paid to Riversville and the fees paid to Outside Managers.

Performance-Based Compensation - Outside Managers will often be compensated, in whole or in part, based on the appreciation in value (including unrealized appreciation) of the assets being managed. Performance-based compensation arrangements may create an incentive for an Outside Manager to make investments that are riskier or more speculative than would be the case in the absence of performance-based compensation arrangements.

Activities of Outside Managers - Although Riversville will seek to recommend Outside Managers which will invest client assets with high levels of competency and integrity, Riversville will have no control over the day-to-day operations of Outside Managers. Riversville would not necessarily be aware of certain Outside Manager activities, including, without limitation, an Outside Manager's engaging in unreported risks, investment "style drift", or even regulatory breach or fraud. As a result, there can be no assurance that the conduct of Outside Managers recommended by Riversville will conform to the desired standards. There is a risk that Outside Managers may suffer a complete failure as a result of regulatory violations and enforcement actions, fraud or other factors, which in any case could result in a complete loss of a client's investment with such Outside Managers.

Leverage; Short Selling; Derivatives – Some Outside Managers may engage in borrowing when they believe that the proceeds from doing so will exceed the cost of the borrowing. Interest on the borrowed amount may be greater than the income from or increase in the value of the securities purchased with the borrowed amount and the value of the securities purchased with the borrowed amount could decline below the amount borrowed. Using leverage is risky

because although it can increase gains, it can also amplify losses. Short-selling is also a form of leverage because the Outside Manager will sell borrowed securities with the expectation that it will be able to buy back the same securities later at a cheaper price. Depending on the movements/availability of such securities, this may not be possible. Outside Managers who use derivatives may incur large losses because of the inherent use of leverage when investing in derivatives. Derivatives allow investors to earn large returns from small movements in the underlying asset's price. However, investors could lose large amounts if the price of the underlying asset moves against them.

Counterparty Risk - The stability and liquidity of certain instruments (such as derivatives) traded by Outside Managers depend, in large part, on the creditworthiness of the counterparties to these transactions. If there is a default by a counterparty to such a transaction, the Outside Manager could suffer a loss. In addition, if a counterparty were to become insolvent or the subject of liquidation proceedings, the losses could be material. Such "counterparty risk" is accentuated for contracts with longer maturities where events may intervene to prevent settlement, or where an Outside Manager has concentrated its transactions with a single or small group of counterparties. An Outside Manager's evaluation of the creditworthiness of its counterparties may not prove sufficient.

Liquidity - Outside Managers and/or the securities in which they invest may offer less liquidity or no liquidity at all during certain periods.

Holdings – Outside Managers may invest in riskier securities, such as “junk bonds” or certain asset backed products. While such products may offer the potential for higher returns, they also involve greater risk, including greater credit risk and the risk of default. The prices of such securities may be more volatile and less marketable than other securities.

Risks of Investing in Funds - Clients may invest with Outside Managers through private funds, like hedge funds and private equity funds. As further described in their offering documents, private funds have their own unique risks, including, but not limited to:

- Clients do not have direct custody of the assets held by a fund. There is a risk that the personnel of a fund could misappropriate its assets. There is also a risk that one or more of a fund's custodians may encounter financial difficulties that impair its operations.
- Funds frequently engage in securities lending and/or allow their prime brokers to pledge their securities to third parties. There is a risk that these securities are never returned to the funds.
- Interests in funds are generally not transferable.
- Interests in funds are generally not redeemable unless certain holding period and/or advance notice provisions have been complied with.
- Funds frequently invest in securities which may be illiquid and which do not have readily ascertainable values. These securities are often valued by the Outside Managers of such funds (or agents appointed by such Outside Managers), even though the Outside Managers may have an incentive to inflate the value of such securities in order to increase their compensation. It is also possible that different Outside Managers may value the same securities differently because of their different valuation policies and procedures.

- As a result of holding illiquid assets, a fund may be permitted to impose certain limitations on redemptions, such as: (i) suspending the net asset value of the fund; (ii) imposing restrictions on redemptions above a certain amount of assets in any specified period (sometimes referred to as a “gate”); (iii) assigning illiquid assets to a special entity or account (sometimes referred to as a “side pocket”), (iv) paying redemptions in assets, rather than cash (sometimes referred to as paying redemptions “in-kind”); or (v) winding up the relevant fund and assigning its management to a liquidator. As a result, investors in a fund may not be able to liquidate their investment for prolonged periods of time.
- There is generally little publicly available information regarding private funds like hedge funds and private equity funds. There is no guarantee that Riversville or a client can obtain sufficient information from these funds or their service providers to monitor a client’s investment effectively.

The foregoing are just some of the risks of investing with Outside Managers and are by no means exhaustive. Clients should be aware of the unique risks applicable to any Outside Manager before investing with such Outside Manager. Riversville encourages its clients to consider all of the risk factors of any Outside Manager, including those enumerated in any private placement memorandum, offering document, and/or ADV disclosure document.

Risks Associated with our Asset Allocation Services

Although our Asset Allocation Services are designed to help optimize returns given the various levels of risk, there is no assurance that investments made based on our Asset Allocation Services will not lose money or that investment results will not experience volatility. A client’s investment performance may be better or worse by participating in our Asset Allocation Services. A portfolio based on our Asset Allocation Services may perform better or worse than any single investment option or asset class or other combinations of investment options or asset classes. Asset allocation research may include a review of the historical performance of different asset classes, which historical performance may not be indicative of future performance. The success of any such portfolio will be dependent upon the performance of the component investment options, which have their own particular risks. The timing of the implementation of an asset allocation and any rebalancing may also affect performance. A client’s portfolio value will fluctuate, and when redeemed, may be worth more or less than the original cost. In addition, periodic updating of any asset allocation may cause a client to incur transactional or other expenses, which may adversely affect performance. While Riversville may provide advice, it is ultimately up to each client to determine its asset allocation.

Risks Associated with our Consulting Services

There can be no assurance that any recommendations or analysis that we provide in connection with our Consulting Services will be successful or will not result in financial loss. The outcome of any matter for which we have provided Consulting Services may be better or worse than it would have been without our input. In addition, matters for which we provide our Consulting Services may be dependent on the unique risks associated with the particular circumstances of any such matter.

Special Risks Associated with Non-Discretionary Management of Securities

There can be no assurance that any recommendations or analysis that we provide in connection with our management of securities on a non-discretionary basis will be successful or will not result in financial loss. The success of any investment which we manage on a non-discretionary basis may be better or worse than it would have been without our input. In addition, the success of any investment which we manage on a non-discretionary basis will be dependent upon the specific securities selected, which have their own particular risks. While Riversville may provide advice, it is ultimately up to each client to buy or sell any such securities.

Item 9 – Disciplinary Information

We are required to disclose all material facts regarding any legal or disciplinary events that would be material to your evaluation of Riversville or the integrity of our management. Neither Riversville nor any of its management persons has been the subject of any legal or disciplinary events.

Item 10 – Other Financial Industry Activities and Affiliations

This Item is not applicable to our business. Beyond Riversville's operations, neither Riversville nor its staff engages in any activity in the financial industry that merits mention.

Item 11 – Code of Ethics, Participation or Interest in Client Transactions and Personal Trading

Riversville has adopted a Code of Ethics (the "Code") for all personnel of the firm, incorporating our high standards of business conduct. The Code includes provisions relating to standards of professional conduct, the confidentiality of client information, a prohibition on insider trading, restrictions on the acceptance of certain gifts and the reporting of certain gifts and business entertainment items, and personal securities trading procedures, among other matters.

All of our personnel must comply with and agree to abide by the terms of the Code annually, or as amended from time to time. Any individual not abiding by the Code may be subject to disciplinary action, including termination.

A copy of the Code may be obtained by contacting us at 212-230-1836 or by writing to us at the address on the cover page of this document.

Personal Trading

Riversville does not engage in proprietary trading (i.e., buying and selling securities for the firm's own account). However, our personnel are permitted to buy and sell securities, including the securities which we recommend and/or purchase or sell for our clients. Personal trading creates a conflict of interest which could disadvantage our clients. In order to minimize the potential for disadvantage, a material portion of the Code is dedicated to our personal securities trading procedures (the "Personal Trading Procedures").

The Personal Trading Procedures provide, among other items, that:

- Our personnel are prohibited from engaging in "front running" or similar trading practices ("front running" is the practice of executing an order for a security while taking advantage of advance knowledge of a pending order for a client). If Riversville

personnel are aware of any pending orders to buy or sell a security for a client, they are prohibited from making any personal trades for their own account in such security until the client's transactions have been completed or abandoned.

- Our personnel are prohibited from acquiring any securities in an initial public offering or a private placement without the prior written approval of the Chief Compliance Officer.
- Our personnel must regularly submit to the Chief Compliance Officer records of their personal trading activities and security holdings so that we may assess compliance with our Personal Trading Procedures, as well as our prohibitions on insider trading.

Item 12 – Brokerage Practices

Selection of Broker-Dealers

Factors in Selecting Broker-Dealers for Client Transactions

Riversville generally possesses the discretion to determine the broker-dealers to be used for the Separate Accounts we manage. Brokerage transactions are executed electronically or over the phone.

In placing orders to purchase and sell securities, it is our policy to seek “best execution”. The term “best execution” means executing securities transactions for clients such that each transaction is the most favorable under the circumstances.

In selecting broker-dealers to execute transactions, Riversville may consider various factors, including, but not limited to:

- the rate of commission,
- execution capability, based on the size, difficulty and other characteristics of the specific order,
- the value of research or other brokers products and/or services provided,
- financial strength, and
- reliability and responsiveness.

A client may pay a commission that is higher than what another qualified broker-dealer might charge to effect the same transaction when Riversville determines, in good faith, that the commission is reasonable in relation to the value of the overall brokerage and research services received. In seeking “best execution”, the determinative factor is not the lowest possible cost, but whether the transaction represents the best qualitative execution, taking into consideration the full range of a broker-dealers' services. Consistent with the foregoing, while Riversville will always seek competitive institutional rates, it may not necessarily obtain the lowest possible commission rates for client transactions.

Outside Managers will select their own broker-dealers, and may have their own policies and procedures in place designed to seek “best execution”. Clients are encouraged to carefully review any such policies and procedures.

Research and Other Soft Dollar Benefits

As a result of placing orders with certain broker-dealers for the Separate Accounts we manage, Riversville may also receive research and brokerage products and/or services at no additional charge (sometimes referred to as a “soft dollar arrangement”). However, the products and/or services are ultimately paid for by our clients’ brokerage commissions. The products and/or services may be proprietary (i.e., created by the broker-dealer) or third-party (i.e., developed by a third party). The products and/or services we received in our last fiscal year included (i) research reports and analyses received from broker-dealers relating to (a) particular securities and classes of securities and (b) economic, technical, industry, national and international trends affecting securities markets, and (ii) access to broker trading software and algorithms.

As a result of a soft dollar arrangement, Riversville may have an incentive to select broker-dealers based on our interest in receiving research products and/or services, rather than based on our clients’ interest in receiving the most favorable execution.

As a result, in order to be consistent with our fiduciary duty to seek “best execution”, Riversville only utilizes soft dollar brokerage and research products and/or services if they fall within the safe harbor of Section 28(e) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, which include (i) ensuring that such products and/or services are used in making investment decisions and (ii) making a good faith determination that the commissions that clients pay are reasonable in relation to the value of the products and/or services received.

Products and/or services furnished by broker-dealers through whom we effect transactions for a particular account may be used by us in servicing our other accounts, and not all such products and/or services may be used for the benefit of the client that pays the brokerage commission. We do not seek to allocate soft dollar benefits to client accounts proportionately to the commissions the accounts generate.

Outside Managers may have their own policies and procedures in place regarding “soft dollar arrangements”. Clients are encouraged to carefully review any such policies and procedures.

Brokerage for Client Referrals

Riversville does not receive client referrals from its brokerage relationships.

Directed Brokerage

Riversville is responsible for the selection of the broker-dealers used to execute transactions for the Separate Accounts we manage. Clients are not involved in this selection process. We would consider a client request for directed brokerage, but if honored, we may be unable to achieve the most favorable total costs or proceeds reasonably attainable under the circumstances. Ultimately, this practice may cost the client more money. Outside Managers may have their own policies and procedures regarding directed brokerage. Clients are encouraged to carefully review any such policies and procedures.

Aggregation of Orders

Where appropriate and consistent to facilitate “best execution”, it is our practice generally to aggregate or “bunch” orders for the discretionary Separate Accounts we manage in a single transaction or multiple transactions. Each client that participates in a bunched transaction will participate at the average share price obtained in that transaction. In a bunched transaction, brokerage commissions and any other transaction costs are allocated pro rata in proportion to each participating client’s share of the order.

If an aggregated trade order is only partially filled, all participating clients will generally receive a pro rata share of the fill in proportion to each participating client’s share of the initial order. In the event such pro rata allocation would result in distributions to clients that are smaller than the minimum lot sizes for such security, we will generally round up such smaller distributions so that each client receives at least one minimum lot, provided that there are enough minimum lots for each client to participate. In the event the pro rata allocation of a partial fill of a security *sale* results in excess shares that cannot be evenly distributed, we will generally allocate such excess shares to the account(s) holding the *greatest* amount of that particular security as a percent of its portfolio within the applicable strategy. In the event such pro rata allocation of a partial fill of a security *purchase* results in excess shares that cannot be evenly distributed, we will generally allocate such excess shares to the account(s) holding the *least* amount of that particular security as a percent of its portfolio within the applicable strategy. In the event of a partial fill in which the allocation cannot be properly addressed by reference to the above principles, we will use our discretion to make as fair and equitable an allocation as we believe possible.

However, because we tailor our clients’ portfolios to meet their unique and individual needs, we may purchase/sell a security for one client which we do not purchase/sell for other clients.

In recommending Outside Managers that are appropriate for more than one client, it is our practice, when feasible, to have the clients invest with Outside Managers at the same time, but we ultimately cannot control the timing of their investments. However, because we tailor our clients’ portfolios to meet their unique and individual needs, we may recommend an Outside Manager to one client which we do not recommend to another client.

Item 13 – Review of Accounts

Periodic Review of Accounts

Our investment personnel maintain continuous oversight of the Separate Account portfolios we manage.

Once a Client has made an investment with an Outside Manager, the investment is monitored. The extent and level of monitoring will vary depending on the investment.

When requested by a client, our Chief Investment Officer will review a client’s asset allocation. Such a review may include evaluating the actual asset allocation as compared to the allocation target.

Non-Periodic Review of Accounts

More frequent reviews may be triggered by material changes in variables such as a client's individual circumstances, market conditions or the political or economic environment.

Client Reports

Clients should receive reports from their own “qualified custodians”, including Outside Managers who typically provide reports on a monthly/quarterly basis (Riversville does not maintain custody of any client assets - see “Item 15” below). In addition, certain of our clients have contracted directly with one or more third parties for independent performance reporting services that may contain, among other things, detailed information concerning asset values, asset allocation, performance and holdings for the Separate Accounts we manage, as well as the investments managed by Outside Managers. We urge clients to carefully review their custodial statements and reports from Outside Managers and compare them to any other performance reports they receive from third parties with whom they have contracted. While Riversville does not provide regular reports to its clients regarding their accounts, we may provide reports to clients on an ad hoc basis as requested by clients.

Item 14 – Client Referrals and Other Compensation

This Item is not applicable to our business.

Item 15 – Custody

Riversville does not maintain possession of any client assets.

For the Separate Accounts we manage or which are managed by Outside Managers, clients choose their own “qualified custodian” to take and have possession of their assets. Clients should receive at least quarterly statements from the qualified custodian. We urge clients to carefully review their custodial statements and reports from Outside Managers and compare them to any other performance reports they receive from third parties with whom they have contracted. Such statements may vary from custodial statements based on accounting procedures, reporting dates or the valuation methodologies of certain securities.

For fund investments managed by Outside Managers, custody of the assets will typically be at the custodian selected by the Outside Manager. We urge clients to carefully review statements from their Outside Managers.

Item 16 – Investment Discretion

For the Separate Accounts we manage, Riversville receives discretionary authority from the client at the outset of the advisory relationship. This includes, but is not limited to, the authority to:

- select the type and amount of securities to be bought or sold,
- transact trading in the client's custodial account, including the selection of broker-dealers, and

- make decisions regarding corporate actions, such as whether to exercise a right of conversion or take receipt of a dividend in one currency or another.

In all cases, however, the discretion is exercised in a manner consistent with the stated investment objectives, policies and/or restrictions, if any, for the particular Separate Account, as stated in the applicable investment management agreement or as otherwise agreed to by Riversville and the client in writing from time to time.

For the Outside Managers we recommend and monitor, we do not typically have discretionary authority. Clients who engage an Outside Manager based on our recommendations will contract with the Outside Manager directly.

Item 17 – Voting Client Securities

With respect to our discretionary strategies, Riversville does not vote client securities (referred to as voting client “Proxies”). Riversville also does not make decisions as to whether or not a client should participate in a class action lawsuit, bankruptcy proceeding or other legal claim regarding the securities of an issuer purchased by Riversville (referred to as “Claims”). Proxies and Claims are left to each client, as agreed with each client in its investment management agreement. Clients will generally receive materials relating to Proxies and Claims directly from their custodian.

For investments managed by Outside Managers, the Outside Manager typically has the discretion to vote Proxies of the underlying securities. Claims are generally left to the client. For those Outside Managers who do not vote proxies or make decisions on Claims, clients will generally receive the Proxies and/or Claims directly from their custodian and/or the Outside Manager or its agent.

In instances where a fund asks a client to vote on any proposal, amendment, consent or similar action relating to the fund itself, the client, and not Riversville, will receive the solicitation directly from the fund and make the determination as to whether or not to take action.

While we do not vote Proxies or make decisions regarding Claims, we may, when requested by a client, provide a recommendation to a client regarding a Proxy, Claim or other solicitation, although we are under no obligation to do so.
