Item 4: Advisory Business

Stony Point Wealth Management Inc. (“Stony Point”) has been in business since May, 2015. Matthew Daniel, Elizabeth King and Stuart Daniel are the firm’s principal owners. Together, the owners have been in the financial services industry for over 50 years.

Stony Point provides personalized investment management and financial planning services. The firm provides financial advice to individuals, families, trusts, charitable organizations and foundations, pensions and corporations. We believe that working with multiple generations of the same family can enhance the depth to which we understand a client and their situation, and encourage multi-generational families to align their goals. Stony Point strives to provide clients with a high level of individual attention by getting to know the client tailoring the services to their needs.

Wealth should continue to build steadily over time, and Stony Point’s view is that lower growth over period of years will be more beneficial to clients than shooting for unattainable returns year after year. Stony Point tries to align itself with clients who are on board with “average returns” and letting wealth continue to grow. We look at a client’s entire financial picture, ask targeted questions and listen closely to your answers. Our goal is for you to experience financial confidence now and in retirement.

Asset Management

Stony Point requires each client to place at least \$500,000 with the firm. This minimum may be waived in the discretion of Stony Point.

If you wish us to manage your investment accounts, we will ask you to provide us with investment guidelines, so that we can create asset allocations that meet your needs. Some examples of guidelines include your risk tolerance, or a maximum amount of assets to be held in non-U.S. investments, or a limit on the amount of stocks in your portfolio. Stony Point can assist you in developing these guidelines. Each client will have a written investment policy statement to guide both you and us in the management of your assets.

Asset management services may be provided on a “discretionary” or on a “non- discretionary” basis. When Stony Point is engaged to provide asset management services on a discretionary basis, we will monitor your accounts to ensure that they are meeting your asset allocation requirements. If any changes are needed to your investments, we will make the changes. These changes may involve selling a security or group of investments and buying others or keeping the proceeds in cash. You may at any time place restrictions on the types of investments we may use on your behalf, or on the allocations to each security type. You will receive written or electronic confirmations from your account custodian after any changes are made to your account. You will also receive statements at least quarterly from your account custodian. Clients engaging us on a discretionary basis will be asked to execute a Limited Power of Attorney (granting us the discretionary authority over the client accounts) as well as an Investment Management Agreement that outlines the responsibilities of both the client and Stony Point.

When a client engages us to provide investment management services on a non-discretionary basis, we monitor the accounts in the same way as for discretionary services. The difference is that changes to your account will not be made until we have confirmed with you (either verbally or in writing) that our proposed change is acceptable to you.

Clients may also engage Stony Point to manage certain investment products that are not maintained at their primary custodian, such as variable life insurance and annuity contracts, and assets held in employer sponsored retirement plans and qualified tuition plans (e.g., 529 plans). In these situations, these assets are generally maintained at the underwriting insurance company or the custodian designated by the product's provider. Stony Point directs or recommends the allocation of client assets among the various investment options that are available with the product. Clients who engage Stony Point to manage held-away assets will not be eligible for the firm's Wrap Program.

Wrap Program

Stony Point's wrap fee program is only offered to clients who have at least \$150,000 with the firm. For those clients, Stony Point may include certain transactional costs in the client's management fee. This arrangement is referred to as a "Wrap Program". For accounts in the Wrap Program, Stony Point pays a fee to the custodian based on the clients' transaction costs. Fees in the wrap program include transaction costs for the purchase or sale of securities, but do not include expenses related to the use of margin, wire transfer fees, the fees charged to shareholders of mutual funds or ETFs, mark-ups and mark-downs, spreads, odd-lot differentials, fees charged by regulatory agencies, and any transaction fees for securities trades executed by a broker-dealer other than the agreed upon custodian. Expenses for the management fees of third party managers are also not included in the Wrap Program, and to the extent utilized, you will be responsible for such fees. Because Stony Point will be managing the assets of wrap fee program clients the same way as other non-wrap fee program clients, the use of external portfolio managers within the wrap program is expected to be limited. To the extent a third party manager is utilized, the fees payable to such managers will not be included in the wrap program. Therefore, there is no difference between how Stony Point manages wrap fee accounts and how Stony Point manages other accounts.

Because of the nature of a wrap fee program, where wrap fees are not tied to an account's frequency of trading and apply to generally all assets in the account, the wrap fee program client may pay more or less than if the client had compensated Stony Point outside of the wrap fee program. For example, if a client's account is rarely traded, the transaction fees the client would have paid would be minimal, thus limiting the benefits of "wrapping" management fees and transaction fees. Clients whose accounts will be rarely traded should carefully consider whether the Wrap Program is appropriate. Clients are not required to participate in the Wrap Program. Stony Point receives a portion of the wrap fee for our services.

Stony Point does not engage other portfolio managers to manage assets within the wrap fee program. To the extent a third party manager is utilized, the fees payable to such managers will not be included in the wrap program. Stony Point is the sole portfolio manager in the wrap program, which means that Stony Point receives a portion of the wrap fee for our services. Transaction fees are paid to various broker-dealers, mutual funds and ETFs. The remainder of the wrap fee is the management fee payable to Stony Point.

Stony Point will receive no additional compensation for offering the wrap fee program.

Please see the separate Wrap Fee Brochure for a more complete description of the Wrap Program.

Financial Planning

In most cases, the client will supply to Stony Point information including income, investments, savings, insurance, age and many other items that are helpful to the firm in assessing your financial goals. The information is typically provided during personal interviews and supplemented with written information. Once the information is received, we will discuss your financial needs and goals with you, and compare your current financial situation with the goals you state. Once these are compared, we will create a financial and/or investment plan to help you meet your goals.

Part of this plan, should you wish to continue to work with Stony Point for asset management, includes discussion regarding your time horizon and ability to handle volatility.

We cannot stress enough the importance that you accurately and completely communicate to us the information we need. Our goal is provide clients with the most personalized and complete financial plan as possible, as Stony Point intends for clients to use it as a blueprint of how to meet their goals. Each plan given to clients will be unique to their situation, and specifically tailored to each client. We are fully in tune to the fact that each client has different circumstances and needs, and that they often change over time. To ensure that your plan remains accurate and up-to-date, it is very important that you continually update us with any changes to your situation, so that if and updates to your plan are required, we can make those changes.

Retirement Plan Consulting Services

The fiduciaries of self-directed retirement plans (which can include 401(k) plans) are required to, among other things, determine a selection of investments from which the plan's participants choose for their personal allocation in their individual participant account. Stony Point provides assistance to plan sponsors in meeting this obligation through a consultative relationship, which includes the selection of the plan investment options in accordance with the plan's objectives, as well as the ongoing monitoring of those options to assist the plan sponsor in determining when changes to these options are needed. This advice is rendered on a non-discretionary basis, meaning the plan sponsor is free to accept or reject Stony Point's recommendations. In addition, if requested by the plan sponsor, Stony Point will assist with the review of plan service providers on an annual basis.

Assets under Management

As of November 4, 2016, Stony Point has approximately \$128,500,000 in assets under management, in 641 accounts. Of these accounts, approximately \$127,000,000 in 640 accounts are managed on a discretionary basis.

Item 5: Fees and Compensation

A. Fees Charged

All investment management clients will be required to execute an Investment Management Agreement that will describe the type of management services to be provided and the fees, among other items. Clients are advised that they may pay fees that are higher or lower than fees they may pay another advisor for the same services, and may in fact pay lower fees for comparable services from other sources. Clients are under no obligation at any time to engage or to continue to engage, Stony Point for investment services. If you do not receive a copy of this brochure at least 48 hours

prior to the execution of an Agreement, you may terminate the agreement within the first five (5) business days without penalty.

Financial Planning

Hourly: For clients needing advice with a limited scope, financial planning services can be done on an hourly basis. Hourly rates range from \$150 – \$350 for all investment professionals at Stony Point. The professional working on the assignment, as well as, the hourly rates is dependent upon a number of factors, most importantly the complexity of the assignment and the availability of professionals. An estimate of total hours to complete the assignment will be determined at the start of the engagement. Generally, fifty percent (50%) of this estimate will be payable upon signing the Financial Planning Agreement. The hourly rates stated are guidelines. Fees may be higher or lower than this range, based on the nature of the engagement. Fees are negotiable, and will depend on the anticipated complexity of your plan.

Fixed Fee: For clients requiring a complete financial plan, services will be provided on a fixed fee basis. Fixed fees will typically range from \$2,500 to \$50,000, depending upon the nature and complexity of the assignment. For example, a client with complex estate planning issues, multiple sources of investment income, and special needs heirs will have a more complex plan (and therefore a higher fixed fee) than a client with no estate planning issues, a single heir and a single source of income. The fixed fee range stated is a guide. Fees are negotiable, and may be higher or lower than this range, based on the nature of the assignment.

Asset Management

Generally, fees vary from 0.00% to 1.25% per annum of the market value of a client's assets managed by Stony Point. The fee range stated is a guide. Fees are negotiable, and may be higher or lower than this range, based on the nature of the account. Factors affecting fee percentages include the size of the account, complexity of asset structures, and other factors.

A separate fee schedule exists for accounts that are held away from Stony Point's primary custodian. The fee schedule is as follows:

Retirement Plan Consulting Services

Generally, fees are a flat 0.35% per annum of the market value of the plan's assets under the direction of Stony Point. These are the only fees, either direct or indirect, that Stony Point reasonably expects to receive from the plan. Fees are negotiable, in the sole discretion of Stony Point.

B. Fee Payment

Financial Planning: Generally, fifty percent (50%) of the anticipated financial planning fee will be payable upon signing the Financial Planning Agreement, with the remainder due upon completion of

the financial plan. For hourly engagements, the final amount due will be based upon actual hours expended. For fixed fee engagements, the final amount due will be fifty percent (50%) of the fixed fee.

Asset Management:

For clients whose assets are managed by the firm, investment advisory fees will be debited directly from each client's account. The advisory fee is paid monthly in arrears, or in the case of held away accounts, quarterly in arrears, and the value used for the fee calculation is the daily average balance of the portfolio for the previous month. This means that if your annual fee is 1.00%, then each month we will take the sum of each day's balance and then divide by the number of days in the period to calculate our fee. The values used for fee calculations will be based off the valuations provided by a qualified custodian. However, for certain securities that are issued by an issuer or sponsor, Stony Point may use the most recent audited valuation provided by the security sponsor for billing purposes. To the extent there is cash in your account, it will be included in the value for the purpose of calculating fees only if the cash is part of an investment strategy. Once the calculation is made, we will instruct your account custodian to deduct the fee from your account and remit it to Stony Point. While almost all of our clients choose to have their fee debited from their account, we will invoice clients upon request.

Clients whose fees are directly debited will provide written authorization to debit advisory fees from their accounts held by a qualified custodian chosen by the client. Each month, clients will receive a bill itemizing the fees to be debited, including the formula used to calculate the fee, the amount of assets upon which the fee is based, and the time period covered by the fee. The invoice will also state that the fee was not independently calculated by the custodian. The client will also receive a statement from their account custodian showing all transactions in their account, including the fee.

Retirement Plan Consulting Services

For plans whose assets are under the direction of Stony Point, fees will be debited directly from the plan. The fee is paid quarterly, in advance, and the value used for the fee calculation is the market value of the plan's assets on the last day of the previous billing quarter. Once the calculation is made, we will instruct the custodian to deduct the fee from your account and remit it to Stony Point. While almost all of our clients choose to have their fee debited from their account, we will invoice clients upon request.

C. Other Fees

There are a number of other fees that can be associated with holding and investing in securities. You will be responsible for fees including transaction fees for the purchase or sale of a mutual fund or Exchange Traded Fund, or commissions for the purchase or sale of a stock. To the extent you participate in Stony Point's Wrap Program, you will not be responsible for these fees, as they will be paid by Stony Point as part of your management fee. Expenses of a fund will not be included in management fees, as they are deducted from the value of the shares by the mutual fund manager. For complete discussion of expenses related to each mutual fund, you should read a copy of the prospectus issued by that fund. Stony Point can provide or direct you to a copy of the prospectus for any fund that we recommend to you.

Please make sure to read Item 12 of this informational brochure, where we discuss broker-dealer and custodial issues.

D. *Pro-rata Fees*

If you become a client during a month, you will pay a management fee for the number of days left in that month. If you terminate our relationship during a month, you will be responsible for the payment of management fees for the portion of the month during which you were a client. Once your notice of termination is received, we will assess pro-rated fees for the number of days between the end of the prior billing period and the date of termination to be paid in whatever way you direct (check, wire).

E. Compensation for the Sale of Securities.

This item is not applicable.

Item 6: Performance-Based Fees

Stony Point will not charge performance based fees.

Item 7: Types of Clients

Clients advised may include individuals, families, trusts, charitable organizations and foundations, pensions and corporations. Stony Point requires each client to place at least \$500,000 with the firm. This minimum may be waived in the discretion of Stony Point.

Item 8: Methods of Analysis, Investment Strategies and Risk of Loss

It is important for you to know and remember that all investments carry risks. **Investing in securities involves risk of loss that clients should be prepared to bear.**

Our approach to asset management has multiple aspects. We primarily invest in stocks and exchange-traded funds ("ETFs"), as we believe that fewer and fewer fund managers are really adding value for the fees, as evidenced by their failure to beat their benchmarks. When this is the case, an investor adds risk related to that manager's judgement, without adding return versus an ETF or stock. Stocks and ETFs provide clients with a lower cost option, while mutual funds have to overcome higher expenses to give investors acceptable returns. If we feel that a mutual fund is the correct fit for a client, there are many factors that are involved in picking the correct manager, but Stony Point focuses on the tenure and even more importantly the track record of the manager.

The specific securities we recommend for your account will depend on market conditions and our research at the time. Generally, we recommend a mix of stocks, ETFs, and mutual funds. When used, specific funds are chosen based on where its investment objective fits into the asset allocation recommended by Stony Point, its risk parameters, past performance, peer rankings, fees, expenses, and any other aspects of the fund Stony Point deems relevant to that particular fund. We base our conclusions on predominantly publicly available research, such as regulatory filings, press releases, competitor analyses, and in some cases research we receive from our custodian or other market analyses. We will also utilize technical analyses, which means that we will review the past behaviors of the security and the markets in which it trades for signals as to what might happen in the

future.

Each client's portfolio will be invested according to that client's investment objectives. We determine these objectives by interviewing the client and/or asking the client to put these objectives in writing. Once we ascertain your objectives for each account, we will develop a set of asset allocation guidelines. An asset allocation strategy is a percentage-based allocation to different investment types. For example, a client may have an asset allocation strategy that calls for 40-60% of the portfolio to be invested in equity securities, with 20% of that allocated to international equities and the remaining balance in fixed income. Another client may have an asset allocation of 50-60% in fixed income securities and the remainder equities. The percentages in each type that we recommend are based on the typical behavior of that security type, individual securities we follow, current market conditions, your current financial situation, your financial goals, and the timeline to get you to those goals. Because we develop an investment strategy based on your personal situation and financial goals, your asset allocation guidelines may be similar to or different from another client's. Once we agree on allocation guidelines, risk tolerance, time horizon, and how to achieve these results, we will develop a written investment policy statement to guide all parties involved in the execution of these goals, including but not limited to, Stony Point, the client, the custodian, and the investment managers.

Upon completion of the investment policy statement, we will periodically recommend securities transactions in your portfolio to meet the guidelines of the asset allocation strategy. It is important to remember that because market conditions can vary greatly, your asset allocation guidelines are not necessarily strict rules. Rather, we review accounts individually, and may deviate from the guidelines as we believe necessary.

Most clients will place their assets with Schwab Advisor Services, our recommended custodian. However, some clients will place their assets with a custodian or broker dealer of their choosing. This will not affect the investment decision making process for the client's account. However, the process for executing trades in an account may differ for assets held with other broker-dealers.

Risk of Loss

There are always risks to investing. Clients should be aware that all investments carry various types of risk including the potential loss of principal that clients should be prepared to bear. It is impossible to name all possible types of risks. Among the risks are the following:

- **Political Risks.** Most investments have a global component, even domestic stocks. Political events anywhere in the world may have unforeseen consequences to markets around the world.
- **General Market Risks.** Markets can, as a whole, go up or down on various news releases or for no understandable reason at all. This sometimes means that the price of specific securities could go up or down without real reason, and may take some time to recover any lost value. Adding additional securities does not help to minimize this risk since all securities may be affected by market fluctuations.
- **Currency Risk.** When investing in another country using another currency, the changes in the value of the currency can change the value of your security value in your portfolio.
- **Regulatory Risk.** Changes in laws and regulations from any government can change the value of a given company and its accompanying securities. Certain industries are more susceptible to government regulation. Changes in zoning, tax structure or laws impact the return on these investments.
- **Tax Risks Related to Short Term Trading:** Clients should note that Stony Point may engage

in short-term trading transactions. These transactions may result in short term gains or losses for federal and state tax purposes, which may be taxed at a higher rate than long term strategies. Stony Point endeavors to invest client assets in a tax efficient manner, but all clients are advised to consult with their tax professionals regarding the transactions in client accounts.

- **Purchasing Power Risk.** Purchasing power risk is the risk that your investment's value will decline as the price of goods rises (inflation). The investment's value itself does not decline, but its relative value does, which is the same thing. Inflation can happen for a variety of complex reasons, including a growing economy and a rising money supply.

- **Business Risk.** This can be thought of as certainty or uncertainty of income. Management comes under business risk. Cyclical companies (like automobile companies) have more business risk because of the less steady income stream. On the other hand, fast food chains tend to have steadier income streams and therefore, less business risk.

- **Financial Risk.** The amount of debt or leverage determines the financial risk of a company.

- **Default Risk.** This risk pertains to the ability of a company to service their debt. Ratings provided by several rating services help to identify those companies with more risk. Obligations of the U.S. government are said to be free of default risk.

- **Margin Risk.** "Margin" is a tool used to maximize returns on a given investment by using securities in a client account as collateral for a loan from the custodian to the client. The proceeds of that loan are then used to buy more securities. In a positive result, the additional securities provide additional return on the same initial investment. In a negative result, the additional securities provide additional losses. Margin therefore carries a higher degree of risk than investing without margin. Any client account that will use margin will do so in accordance with Regulation T. Stony Point may utilize margin on a limited basis for clients with higher risk tolerances.

- **Risks specific to private placements, sub-advisors and other managers.** If we invest some of your assets with another advisor, including a private placement, there are additional risks. These include risks that the other manager is not as qualified as we believe them to be, that the investments they use are not as liquid as we would normally use in your portfolio, or that their risk management guidelines are more liberal than we would normally employ.

- **Information Risk.** All investment professionals rely on research in order to make conclusions about investment options. This research is always a mix of both internal (proprietary) and external (provided by third parties) data and analyses. Even an adviser who says they rely solely on proprietary research must still collect data from third parties. This data, or outside research is chosen for its perceived reliability, but there is no guarantee that the data or research will be completely accurate. Failure in data accuracy or research will translate to a compromised ability by the adviser to reach satisfactory investment conclusions.

- **Small Companies.** Some investment opportunities in the marketplace involve smaller issuers. These companies may be starting up, or are historically small. While these companies sometimes have potential for outsized returns, they also have the potential for losses because the reasons the company is small are also risks to the company's future. For example, a company's management may lack experience, or the company's capital for growth may be restricted. These small companies also tend to trade less frequently than larger companies, which can add to the risks associated with their securities because the ability to sell them at an appropriate price may be limited compared to the markets as a whole. Not only do these companies have investment risk, if a client is invested in such small companies and requests immediate or short term liquidity, these securities may require a significant discount to value in order to be sold in a shorter time frame.

- **Concentration Risk.** While Stony Point selects individual securities, including mutual funds, for client portfolios based on an individualized assessment of each security, this evaluation comes without an overlay of general economic or sector specific issue analysis. This means that a client's equity portfolio may be concentrated in a specific sector, geography, or sub-sector (among other types of potential concentrations), so that if an unexpected event occurs that affects that specific

sector or geography, for example, the client's equity portfolio may be affected negatively, including significant losses.

- **Transition risk.** As assets are transitioned from a client's prior advisers to Stony Point there may be securities and other investments that do not fit within the asset allocation strategy selected for the client. Accordingly, these investments will need to be sold in order to reposition the portfolio into the asset allocation strategy selected by Stony Point. However, this transition process may take some time to accomplish. Some investments may not be unwound for a lengthy period of time for a variety of reasons that may include unwarranted low share prices, restrictions on trading, contractual restrictions on liquidity, or market-related liquidity concerns. In some cases, there may be securities or investments that are never able to be sold. The inability to transition a client's holdings into recommendations of Stony Point may adversely affect the client's account values, as Stony Point's recommendations may not be able to be fully implemented.

- **Restriction Risk.** Clients may at all times place reasonable restrictions on the management of their accounts. However, placing these restrictions may make managing the accounts more difficult, thus lowering the potential for returns.

- **Risks Related to Investment Term & Liquidity.** Securities do not follow a straight line up in value. All securities will have periods of time when the current price of the security is not an accurate measure of its value. If you require us to liquidate your portfolio during one of these periods, you will not realize as much value as you would have had the investment had the opportunity to regain its value. Further, some investments are made with the intention of the investment appreciating over an extended period of time. Liquidating these investments prior to their intended time horizon may result in losses.

- **REITs:** Stony Point may recommend that portions of client portfolios be allocated to real estate investment trusts, otherwise known as "REITs". A REIT is an entity, typically a trust or corporation, that accepts investments from a number of investors, pools the money, and then uses that money to invest in real estate through either actual property purchases or mortgage loans. While there are some benefits to owning REITs, which include potential tax benefits, income and the relatively low barrier to invest in real estate as compared to directly investing in real estate, REITs also have some increased risks as compared to more traditional investments such as stocks, bonds, and mutual funds. First, real estate investing can be highly volatile. Second, the specific REIT chosen may have a focus such as commercial real estate or real estate in a given location. Such investment focus can be beneficial if the properties are successful, but lose significant principal if the properties are not successful. REITs may also employ significant leverage for the purpose of purchasing more investments with fewer investment dollars, which can enhance returns but also enhances the risk of loss. The success of a REIT is highly dependent upon the manager of the REIT. Clients should ensure they understand the role of the REIT in their portfolio.

- **MLPs:** Stony Point may recommend that portions of client portfolios be allocated to master limited partnerships, otherwise known as "MLPs". An MLP is a publicly traded entity that is designed to provide tax benefits for the investor. In order to preserve these benefits, the MLP must derive most, if not all, of its income from real estate, natural resources and commodities. While MLPs may add diversification and tax favored treatment to a client's portfolio, they also carry significant risks beyond more traditional investments such as stocks, bonds and mutual funds. One such risk is management risk-the success of the MLP is dependent upon the manager's experience and judgment in selecting investments for the MLP. Another risk is the governance structure, which means the rules under which the entity is run. The investors are the limited partners of the MLP, with an affiliate of the manager typically the general partner. This means the manager has all of the control in running the entity, as opposed to an equity investment where shareholders vote on such matters as board composition. There is also a significant amount of risk with the underlying real estate, resources or commodities investments. Clients should ask Stony Point any questions regarding the role of MLPs in their portfolio.

Item 10: Other Financial Industry Activities and Affiliations

A. Broker-dealer

Neither the principal of Stony Point, nor any related persons are registered, or have an application pending to register, as a broker dealer or as an associated person of the foregoing entities.

B. Futures Commission Merchant/Commodity Trading Advisor

Neither the principal of Stony Point, nor any related persons are registered, or have an application pending to register, as a futures commission merchant, commodity pool operator, a commodity trading advisor, or an associated person of the foregoing entities.

C. Relationship with Related Persons

This item is not applicable.

D. Recommendations of other Advisers

Stony Point does not utilize nor select other advisers or third party managers. All assets are managed by Stony Point management.

Item 11: Code of Ethics, Participation or Interest in Client Transactions and Personal Trading

A. A copy of our Code of Ethics is available upon request. Our Code of Ethics includes discussions of our fiduciary duty to clients, political contributions, gifts, entertainment, and trading guidelines.

B. Not applicable. Stony Point does not recommend to clients that they invest in any security in which Stony Point or any principal thereof has any financial interest.

C. On occasion, an employee of Stony Point may purchase for his or her own account securities which are also recommended for clients. Our Code of Ethics details rules for employees regarding personal trading and avoiding conflicts of interest related to trading in one's own account. To avoid placing a trade before a client (in the case of a purchase) or after a client (in the case of a sale), all employee trades are reviewed by the Compliance Officer. All employee trades must either take place in the same block as a client trade or sufficiently apart in time from the client trade so the employee receives no added benefit. Employee statements are reviewed to confirm compliance with the trading procedures.

D. On occasion, an employee of Stony Point may purchase for his or her own account securities which are also recommended for clients at the same time the clients purchase the securities. Our

Code of Ethics details rules for employees regarding personal trading and avoiding conflicts of interest related to trading in one's own account. To avoid placing a trade before a client (in the case of a purchase) or after a client (in the case of a sale), all employee trades are reviewed by the Compliance Officer. All employee trades must either take place in the same block as a client trade or sufficiently apart in time from the client trade so the employee receives no added benefit. Employee statements are reviewed to confirm compliance with the trading procedures.

Item 12: Brokerage Practices

A. Recommendation of Broker-Dealer

Stony Point does not maintain custody of client assets, though Stony Point may be deemed to have custody if a client grants Stony Point authority to debit fees directly from their account (see Item 15 below). Assets will be held with a qualified custodian, which is typically a bank or broker-dealer. Stony Point recommends that investment accounts be held in custody by Schwab Advisor Services ("Schwab"), which is a qualified custodian. Stony Point is independently owned and operated and is not affiliated with Schwab. Schwab will hold your assets in a brokerage account and buy and sell securities when Stony Point instructs them to, which Stony Point does in accordance with its agreement with you. While Stony Point recommends that you use Schwab as custodian/broker, you will decide whether to do so and will open your account with Schwab by entering into an account agreement directly with them. Stony Point does not open the account for you, although Stony Point may assist you in doing so. Even though your account is maintained at Schwab, we can still use other brokers to execute trades for your account as described below (see "Your brokerage and custody costs").

How we select brokers/custodians

We seek to recommend a custodian/broker that will hold your assets and execute transactions on terms that are, overall, most advantageous when compared with other available providers and their services. We consider a wide range of factors, including both quantitative (Ex: costs) and qualitative (execution, reputation, service) factors. We do not consider whether Schwab or any other broker-dealer/custodian, refers clients to Stony Point as part of our evaluation of these broker-dealers.

Your brokerage and custody costs

For our clients' accounts that Schwab maintains, Schwab generally does not charge you separately for custody services but is compensated by charging you commissions or other fees on trades that it executes or that settle into your Schwab account. In addition to commissions, Schwab charges you a flat dollar amount as a "prime broker" or "trade away" fee for each trade that we have executed by a different broker-dealer but where the securities bought or the funds from the securities sold are deposited (settled) into your Schwab account. These fees are in addition to the commissions or other compensation you pay the executing broker-dealer. Because of this, in order to minimize your trading costs, we have Schwab execute most trades for your account. We have determined that having Schwab execute most trades is consistent with our duty to seek "best execution" of your trades. Best execution means the most favorable terms for a transaction based on all relevant factors, including those listed above (see "How we select brokers/custodians").

Products and services available to us from Schwab

Schwab Advisor Services™ (formerly called Schwab Institutional®) is Schwab's business serving independent investment advisory firms like Stony Point. They provide Stony Point and our clients with access to its institutional brokerage services (trading, custody, reporting, and related services), many of which are not typically available to Schwab retail customers. Schwab also makes available various support services. Some of those services help Stony Point manage or administer our clients' accounts, while others help Stony Point manage and grow our business. Schwab's support services are generally available on an unsolicited basis (we don't have to request them) and at no charge to Stony Point. Following is a more detailed description of Schwab's support services:

Services that benefit you

Schwab's institutional brokerage services include access to a broad range of investment products, execution of securities transactions, and custody of client assets. The investment products available through Schwab include some to which we might not otherwise have access or that would require a significantly higher minimum initial investment by our clients. Schwab's services described in this paragraph generally benefit you and your account.

Services that may not directly benefit you.

Schwab also makes available to us other products and services that benefit us but may not directly benefit you or your account. These products and services assist us in managing and administering our clients' accounts. They include investment research, both Schwab's own and that of third parties. We may use this research to service all or a substantial number of our clients' accounts, including accounts not maintained at Schwab. In addition to investment research, Schwab also makes available software and other technology that:

- Provide access to client account data (such as duplicate trade confirmations and account statements)
- Facilitate trade execution and allocate aggregated trade orders for multiple client accounts
- Provide pricing and other market data
- Facilitate payment of our fees from our clients' accounts
- Assist with back-office functions, recordkeeping, and client reporting

Services that generally benefit only us.

Schwab also offers other services intended to help us manage and further develop our business enterprise. These services include:

- Educational conferences and events
- Consulting on technology, compliance, legal, and business needs
- Publications and conferences on practice management and business succession
- Access to employee benefits providers, human capital consultants, and insurance providers

Schwab may provide some of these services itself. In other cases, it will arrange for third-party vendors to provide the services to us. Schwab may also discount or waive its fees for some of these services or pay all or a part of a third party's fees. Schwab may also provide us with other benefits, such as occasional business entertainment of our personnel.

Our interest in Schwab's services

The availability of the services described above (under the caption "Products and Services Available to Us from Schwab") from Schwab benefits us because we do not have to produce or purchase them. Schwab has agreed to pay for up to \$25,000 of certain marketing and technology products and services provided to us by third parties once the total of our clients' assets maintained in accounts at Schwab reaches \$65 million. Beyond that, these services are not contingent upon us committing any specific amount of business to Schwab in trading commissions or assets in custody. The \$65 million minimum described above may give us an incentive to require that you maintain your account with Schwab based on our interest in receiving Schwab's services and Schwab's payment for third party services that benefit our business rather than based on your interest in receiving the best value in custody services and the most favorable execution of your transactions. This is a potential conflict of interest. We believe, however, that our selection of Schwab as custodian and broker is in the best interests of our clients. It is primarily supported by the scope, quality and price of Schwab's services and not Schwab's services and Schwab's payment for third party services that benefit only us. We have adopted policies and procedures designed to ensure, at account opening and thereafter, that our wrap fee program and our use of Schwab's services is appropriate for each of our clients.

We do not consider whether Schwab or any other broker-dealer/custodian, refers clients to Stony Point as part of our evaluation of these broker-dealers.

Directed Brokerage

Stony Point does not require that clients direct Stony Point to execute trades through a particular broker-dealer (directed brokerage arrangements). In such client directed arrangements, the client will negotiate terms and arrangements for their account with that broker-dealer. This means that the client, and not Stony Point, will be in the best position to seek and secure the best value for the costs of execution. This means that the client may not pay the most cost effective commission rates. Stony Point will not be able to aggregate orders under these circumstances, which may result in higher commission costs or transaction fees because the trading costs are not allocated among a group. Clients also may not benefit from commission rates Stony Point may be able to negotiate. Further, there may be some transactions in certain securities that must be placed first through Stony Point's recommended broker-dealer. In some circumstances, placing those trades first may mean that a client who directs brokerage may not only pay a higher commission cost, they may also pay a higher price for a given security. In general, clients may not receive value for the commission dollar spent, may spend more than is necessary for execution services, and may have reduced gains in their accounts as a result of directing brokerage.

B. Aggregating Trades

Commission costs per client may be lower on a particular trade if all clients in whose accounts the trade is to be made are executed at the same time. This is called aggregating trades. Instead of placing a number of trades for the same security for each account, we will, when appropriate, executed one trade for all accounts and then allocate the trades to each account after execution. If an aggregate trade is not fully executed, the securities will be allocated to client accounts on a *pro rata* basis, except where doing so would create an unintended adverse consequence (For example, if a *pro rata* division would result in a client receiving a fraction of a share, or a position in the account of less than 1%.)

Item 13: Review of Accounts

All accounts will be reviewed by a member of senior management on at least an annual basis. However, it is expected that market conditions, changes in a particular client's account, or changes to a client's circumstances will trigger a review of accounts. Reviews may vary in focus specific to a client's specific situation but may include performance reviews, changes that have been made since the last review, changes in clients financial situation, current cash holdings, any known immediate need of investments, and risk tolerance. If a Client wishes to engage the Stony Point for an additional or ongoing review of their financial plan, each review may require a new financial planning agreement.

The annual report in writing provided by Stony Point is intended to review asset allocation. All clients will receive statements and confirmations of trades directly from Schwab. Additionally, all clients will receive monthly itemized bills from Stony Point. Please refer to Item 15 regarding Custody.

Item 14: Client Referrals and Other Compensation

- A. Economic Benefit Provided by Third Parties for Advice Rendered to Client.

Please refer to Item 12, where we discuss recommendation of Broker-Dealers.

- B. Compensation to Non-Advisory Personnel for Client Referrals.

Stony Point does not directly or indirectly compensate any person who is not advisory personnel for client referrals.

Item 15: Custody

Stony Point deducts fees from client accounts, but would not have custody of client funds otherwise. Clients will receive statements directly from Schwab, and copies of all trade confirmations directly from Schwab.

Clients whose fees are directly debited will provide written authorization to debit advisory fees from their accounts held by a qualified custodian chosen by the client. Each month, clients will receive a bill itemizing the fees to be debited, including the formula used to calculate the fee, the amount of assets the fee is based, and the time period covered by the fee. The invoice will also state that the fee was not independently calculated by the custodian. The client will also receive a statement from their account custodian showing all transactions in their account, including the fee.

We encourage clients to carefully review the statements and confirmations sent to them by their custodian, and to compare the information on your quarterly report prepared by Stony Point against the information in the statements provided directly from Schwab. Please alert us of any discrepancies.

Item 16: Investment Discretion

When Stony Point is engaged to provide asset management services on a discretionary basis, we will monitor your accounts to ensure that they are meeting your asset allocation requirements. If any changes are needed to your investments, we will make the changes. These changes may involve selling a security or group of investments and buying others or keeping the proceeds in cash. You may at any time place restrictions on the types of investments we may use on your behalf, or on the allocations to each security type. You may receive at your request written or electronic confirmations from your account custodian after any changes are made to your account. You will also receive statements at least quarterly from your account custodian. Clients engaging us on a discretionary basis will be asked to execute a Limited Power of Attorney (granting us the discretionary authority over the client accounts) as well as an Investment Management Agreement that outlines the responsibilities of both the client and Stony Point.

When a client engages Stony Point to provide investment management services on a non-discretionary basis, the accounts are monitored by Stony Point. The difference is that changes to your account will not be made until Stony Point has confirmed with you (either verbally or in writing) that the proposed change is acceptable to you.

Item 17: Voting Client Securities

Copies of our Proxy Voting Policies are available upon request.

From time to time, shareholders of stocks, mutual funds, exchange traded funds or other securities may be permitted to vote on various types of corporate actions. Examples of these actions include mergers, tender offers, or board elections. Clients are required to vote proxies related to their investments, or to choose not to vote their proxies. Stony Point will not accept authority to vote client securities. Clients will receive their proxies directly from the custodian for the client account. Stony Point will not give clients advice on how to vote proxies.

Item 18: Financial Information

Stony Point does not require the prepayment of fees more than six (6) months or more in advance and therefore has not provided a balance sheet with this brochure.

There are no material financial circumstances or conditions that would reasonably be expected to impair our ability to meet our contractual obligations to our clients.

Item 4: Services, Fees, and Compensation

The Stony Point Wrap Program (the “Program”) is a wrap fee program sponsored by Stony Point Wealth Management Inc. (“Stony Point”) which has been in business since May, 2015. Matthew Daniel, Elizabeth King and Stuart Daniel are the firm’s principal owners. Together, the owners have been in the financial services industry for over 50 years.

Stony Point provides personalized investment management and financial planning services. The firm provides financial advice to individuals, families, trusts, charitable organizations and foundations, pensions and corporations. We believe that working with multiple generations of the same family can enhance the depth to which we understand a client and their situation, and encourage multi-generational families to align their goals. Stony Point strives to provide clients with a high level of individual attention by getting to know the client tailoring the services to their needs.

Wealth should continue to build steadily over time, and Stony Point’s view is that lower growth over period of years will be more beneficial to clients than shooting for unattainable returns year after year. Stony Point tries to align itself with clients who are on board with “average returns” and letting wealth continue to grow. We look at a client’s entire financial picture, ask targeted questions and listen closely to your answers. Our goal is for you to experience financial confidence now and in retirement.

A. Description of the Program

Asset Management

Stony Point requires each client to place at least \$500,000 with the firm. This minimum may be waived in the discretion of Stony Point. Stony Point’s wrap fee program is only offered to clients who have at least \$150,000 with the firm.

If you wish us to manage your investment accounts, we will ask you to provide us with investment guidelines, so that we can create asset allocations that meet your needs. Some examples of guidelines include your risk tolerance, or a maximum amount of assets to be held in non-U.S. investments, or a limit on the amount of stocks in your portfolio. Stony Point can assist you in developing these guidelines. Each client will have a written investment policy statement to guide both you and us in the management of your assets.

Asset management services may be provided on a “discretionary” or on a “non- discretionary” basis. When Stony Point is engaged to provide asset management services on a discretionary basis, we will monitor your accounts to ensure that they are meeting your asset allocation requirements. If any changes are needed to your investments, we will make the changes. These changes may involve selling a security or group of investments and buying others or keeping the proceeds in cash. You may at any time place restrictions on the types of investments we may use on your behalf, or on the allocations to each security type. You will receive written or electronic confirmations from your account custodian after any changes are made to your account. You will also receive statements at least quarterly from your account custodian. Clients engaging us on a discretionary basis will be

asked to execute a Limited Power of Attorney (granting us the discretionary authority over the client accounts) as well as an Investment Management Agreement that outlines the responsibilities of both the client and Stony Point.

When a client engages us to provide investment management services on a non-discretionary basis, we monitor the accounts in the same way as for discretionary services. The difference is that changes to your account will not be made until we have confirmed with you (either verbally or in writing) that our proposed change is acceptable to you.

Assets under Management

As of November 4, 2016, Stony Point has approximately \$128,500,000 in assets under management, in 641 accounts. Of these accounts, approximately \$127,000,000 in 640 accounts are managed on a discretionary basis.

Schwab's Brokerage Services.

In addition to the foregoing portfolio management and other services, the Program includes the brokerage services of Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. ("Schwab") a broker-dealer registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission and a member of FINRA and SIPC. Stony Point is an independently owned and operated and not affiliated with Schwab. Schwab will act solely as a broker-dealer and not as an investment advisor to you. It will have no discretion over your account and will act solely on instructions it receives from us [or you]. Schwab has no responsibility for our services and undertakes no duty to you to monitor our management of your account or other services we provide to you. Schwab will hold your assets in a brokerage account and buy and sell securities and execute other transactions when we [or you] instruct them to. While we require that you use Schwab as custodian/broker to participate in our program, you will decide whether to do so and open your account with Schwab by entering into an account agreement directly with them. We do not open the account for you. If you do not wish to place your assets with Schwab, then we cannot manage your account in the program. Not all advisors require their clients to use a particular broker-dealer or other custodian selected by the advisor. Even though your account is maintained at Schwab, we can still use other brokers to execute trades for your account, as described below.

Fees and Compensation

Fees Charged

All investment management clients will be required to execute an Investment Management Agreement that will describe the type of management services to be provided and the fees, among other items.

Our Wrap Fees

Generally, fees vary from 0.00% to 1.25% per annum of the market value of a client's assets managed by Stony Point. The fee range stated is a guide. Fees are negotiable, and may be higher or lower than this range, based on the nature of the account. Factors affecting fee percentages include the size of the account, complexity of asset structures, and other factors.

Generally, only clients with over \$150,000 in assets managed by Stony Point will be eligible for the wrap fee program. Because our wrap fees are not tied to an account's frequency of trading and apply generally to all assets in the account, this fee arrangement is not appropriate for all accounts. For

example, a wrap fee arrangement would not be appropriate for an account that holds primarily cash and cash equivalents, fixed income securities or no-transaction-fee mutual funds for a substantial period of time.

Fees paid by wrap fee program participants will follow the same general guidelines, the only difference being that wrap fee clients will have some or all of their transaction fees covered by Stony Point. Fees included in the wrap fee include transaction fees for the purchase or sale of securities, but do not include expenses related to the use of margin, wire transfer fees, the fees charged to shareholders of mutual funds or ETFs, mark-ups and mark-downs, spreads, odd-lot differentials, fees charged by regulatory agencies, and any transaction fees for securities trades executed by a broker-dealer other than Schwab Advisor Services. Because Stony Point will be managing the assets of wrap fee program clients the same way as other non-wrap fee program clients, the use of external portfolio managers is expected to be limited. Any fees due to another portfolio manager will be paid by the client.

Because of the nature of a wrap fee program, the wrap fee program client may pay more or less than if the client had compensated Stony Point outside of the wrap fee program. For example, if a client's account is rarely traded, the transaction fees the client would have paid would be minimal, thus limiting the benefits of "wrapping" management fees and transaction fees. Because Stony Point will be compensated the same amount whether an account participating in the wrap program is traded or not, we have a financial incentive to avoid trading the account. This creates a conflict of interest between the firm and its wrap clients. Stony Point attempts to mitigate this conflict by requiring that the firm's employees acknowledge their fiduciary duty to place client interests ahead of their own and by periodically comparing wrap program client performance against any clients who are not in the wrap program.

Stony Point will receive no additional compensation for offering the wrap fee program.

Fee Payment

Investment advisory fees will be debited directly from each client's account. The advisory fee is paid monthly, in arrears, and the value used for the fee calculation is the daily average balance of the portfolio for the previous month. This means that if your annual fee is 1.00%, then each month we will take the sum of each day's balance and then divide by the number of days in the period to calculate our fee. The values used for fee calculations will be based off the valuations provided by a qualified custodian. However, for certain securities that are issued by an issuer or sponsor, Stony Point may use the most recent audited valuation provided by the security sponsor for billing purposes. To the extent there is cash in your account, it will be included in the value for the purpose of calculating fees only if the cash is part of an investment strategy. Once the calculation is made, we will instruct your account custodian to deduct the fee from your account and remit it to Stony Point. While almost all of our clients choose to have their fee debited from their account, we will invoice clients upon request.

Clients whose fees are directly debited will provide written authorization to debit advisory fees from their accounts held by a qualified custodian chosen by the client. Each month, clients will receive a bill itemizing the fees to be debited, including the formula used to calculate the fee, the amount of assets upon which the fee is based, and the time period covered by the fee. The invoice will also state that the fee was not independently calculated by the custodian. The client will also receive a statement from their account custodian showing all transactions in their account, including the fee.

Fees We Pay Schwab.

In addition to compensating us for our portfolio management, other investment advisory, and other services to you, the wrap fees you pay us also allow us to pay Schwab for the brokerage services it provides to you, as described above, as well as additional services Schwab provides us, as described below. The fees we pay Schwab consist primarily of transaction fees for the purchase or sale of a mutual fund or Exchange Traded Fund, or commissions for the purchase or sale of a stock. Expenses of a fund will not be included in management fees, as they are deducted from the value of the shares by the mutual fund manager. For complete discussion of expenses related to each mutual fund, you should read a copy of the prospectus issued by that fund. Stony Point can provide or direct you to a copy of the prospectus for any fund that we recommend to you.

The fees we pay Schwab may be more than what we would pay solely for Schwab's brokerage services. In addition to those brokerage services, for the fees we pay Schwab we also receive from a Schwab affiliate a software system and related support services called the "Integrated Office," which helps us manage our client relationships and client investment portfolios. More detail on this arrangement appears below under "Additional Compensation We Receive."

Relative Cost of Our Wrap Fee Program to You.

The program may cost you more or less than purchasing our investment advice and Schwab's brokerage services separately. The relative cost of our wrap fee program to you is influenced by various factors, including the cost of our investment advice and Schwab's brokerage services if you purchased them separately, the types of investments held in your account, and the frequency and size of trades we make for your account. For example, if the number of transactions in your account is low enough, the wrap fee you pay us may exceed the stand-alone investment advisory fee and separate brokerage commissions that you otherwise would have paid. In addition, because the fees we pay Schwab and that comprise a portion of the wrap fee you pay us include certain transaction fees, client accounts that trade relatively frequently could disproportionately benefit from the program compared to accounts that trade less frequently.

Our fees for stand-alone investment advisory services that are comparable to those we provide as part of the program fall in the same range as fees for account in the Program.

B, C Additional Fees and Costs You May Pay.

Our wrap fee does not cover the fees and costs listed below, which may apply to assets in your enrolled accounts to which our wrap fee also applies, and to transactions in your accounts.

- Commissions and other fees for services provided by broker-dealers other than Schwab for transactions executed or effected by or through them that settle into or from your account at Schwab such as through our use of Schwab's Prime Brokerage or Trade Away Services. You will be responsible for paying any commissions and other fees or compensation charged by broker-dealers other than Schwab. Because you will pay our wrap fee in addition to any commissions and/or other charges paid to broker-dealers other than Schwab who execute transactions for your account, we may have an incentive to execute transactions for your accounts through Schwab, and this incentive could, in some circumstances, conflict with our duty to seek best execution.
- Fees charged by mutual fund companies, unit investment trusts (UITs), closed-end funds and other collective investment vehicles, including, but not limited to, sales loads (a portion of which are paid to Schwab) and/or charges and short-term redemption fees.

- Short-term redemption fees charged by Schwab for funds other than those available through the Schwab Mutual Fund OneSource® service.
- Markups and markdowns, bid-ask spreads, selling concessions and the like received by Schwab in connection with transactions it executes as principal by selling or buying securities to or from you for its own account. Principal transactions contrast with those in which Schwab acts as your agent in effecting trades between you and a third party. Schwab may make a profit or incur a loss on trades in which it acts as principal. Markups and markdowns and bid-ask spreads are not separate fees, but rather are reflected in the net price at which a trade order is executed.
- Transfer taxes, odd-lot differentials, certificate delivery fees, reorganization fees, fees required by law, and any other fees or charges similar to those described above.

A complete list of Schwab's charges and fees is contained in the Charles Schwab Institutional Pricing Guide, which you will receive promptly following the opening of your account with Schwab.

Pro-rata Fees

If you become a client during a month, you will pay a management fee for the number of days left in that month. If you terminate our relationship during a month, you will be responsible for the payment of management fees for the portion of the month during which you were a client. Once your notice of termination is received, we will assess pro-rated fees for the number of days between the end of the prior billing period and the date of termination to be paid in whatever way you direct (check, wire).

D. Additional Compensation We Receive.

We may receive more compensation from your participation in our wrap fee program than if you purchased our investment advisory services and Schwab's (or another broker/custodian's) services separately. As part of the services for the fees we pay Schwab, Schwab pays for its affiliate to provide us with the Integrated Office (a customer relationship and portfolio management system and related support services). The Integrated Office benefits us and may indirectly benefit you by enhancing our service to you. If we did not have the fee arrangement with Schwab, as described above, Integrated Office would be available to us only through paying fees for it directly to Schwab's affiliate. Consequently, we may have an incentive to recommend that you participate in our wrap fee program and open your account with Schwab. That incentive may be based on our interest in receiving Integrated Office as part of our services/fees arrangement with Schwab rather than based on your interest in having the most appropriate fee arrangement for our investment advisory services and the best value in custody services and the most favorable execution of your transactions. This is a potential conflict of interest. We believe, however, that our recommendation of our wrap fee program, including the use of Schwab as custodian and broker, is in the best interests of those of clients to whom we recommend it based on an assessment of their investment objectives, financial situation, our investment plans and anticipated trading activity in their accounts and all other relevant factors.

Item 5: Account Requirement and Type of Clients

Clients participating in the program may include individuals, families, trusts, charitable organizations and foundations, pensions and corporations. Stony Point requires each client to place at least \$500,000 with the firm, and must have at least \$150,000 with the firm to participate in the wrap program. This minimum may be waived in the discretion of Stony Point.

Item 6: Portfolio Manager Selection and Evaluation

The wrap fee program offered by Stony Point is sponsored by the firm, and Stony Point is the only portfolio manager. The only fees covered under the wrap fee program are transaction fees associated with the purchase and sale of securities in an account managed by Stony Point. All client accounts managed by Stony Point, including wrap fee program clients, are managed with similar processes, although account recommendations may differ. You may at any time place restrictions on the types of investments we may use on your behalf, or on the allocations to each security type.

Methods of Analysis, Investment Strategies and Risk of Loss

It is important for you to know and remember that all investments carry risks. **Investing in securities involves risk of loss that clients should be prepared to bear.**

Our approach to asset management has multiple aspects. We primarily invest in stocks and exchange-traded funds (“ETFs”), as we believe that fewer and fewer fund managers are really adding value for the fees, as evidenced by their failure to beat their benchmarks. When this is the case, an investor adds risk related to that manager’s judgement, without adding return versus an ETF or stock. Stocks and ETFs provide clients with a lower cost option, while mutual funds have to overcome higher expenses to give investors acceptable returns. If we feel that a mutual fund is the correct fit for a client, there are many factors that are involved in picking the correct manager, but Stony Point focuses on the tenure and even more importantly the track record of the manager.

The specific securities we recommend for your account will depend on market conditions and our research at the time. Generally, we recommend a mix of stocks, ETFs, and mutual funds. When used, specific funds are chosen based on where its investment objective fits into the asset allocation recommended by Stony Point, its risk parameters, past performance, peer rankings, fees, expenses, and any other aspects of the fund Stony Point deems relevant to that particular fund. We base our conclusions on predominantly publicly available research, such as regulatory filings, press releases, competitor analyses, and in some cases research we receive from our custodian or other market analyses. We will also utilize technical analyses, which means that we will review the past behaviors of the security and the markets in which it trades for signals as to what might happen in the future.

Each client’s portfolio will be invested according to that client’s investment objectives. We determine these objectives by interviewing the client and/or asking the client to put these objectives in writing. Once we ascertain your objectives for each account, we will develop a set of asset allocation guidelines. An asset allocation strategy is a percentage-based allocation to different investment types. For example, a client may have an asset allocation strategy that calls for 40-60% of the portfolio to be invested in equity securities, with 20% of that allocated to international equities and the remaining balance in fixed income. Another client may have an asset allocation of 50-60% in fixed income securities and the remainder equities. The percentages in each type that we recommend are based on the typical behavior of that security type, individual securities we follow, current market conditions, your current financial situation, your financial goals, and the timeline to get you to those goals. Because we develop an investment strategy based on your personal situation and financial goals, your asset allocation guidelines may be similar to or different from another client’s. Once we agree on allocation guidelines, risk tolerance, time horizon, and how to achieve these results, we will develop a written investment policy statement to guide all parties involved in the execution of these goals, including but not limited to, Stony Point, the client, the custodian, and the investment managers.

Upon completion of the investment policy statement, we will periodically recommend securities transactions in your portfolio to meet the guidelines of the asset allocation strategy. It is important to remember that because market conditions can vary greatly, your asset allocation guidelines are not necessarily strict rules. Rather, we review accounts individually, and may deviate from the guidelines as we believe necessary.

Performance-Based Fees

Stony Point will not charge performance based fees.

Voting Client Securities

Copies of our Proxy Voting Policies are available upon request.

From time to time, shareholders of stocks, mutual funds, exchange traded funds or other securities may be permitted to vote on various types of corporate actions. Examples of these actions include mergers, tender offers, or board elections. Clients are required to vote proxies related to their investments, or to choose not to vote their proxies. Stony Point will not accept authority to vote client securities. Clients will receive their proxies directly from the custodian for the client account. Stony Point will not give clients advice on how to vote proxies.

Clients may contact Stony Point, the only portfolio manager, at any time.

Neither the principal of Stony Point, nor any related persons are registered, or have an application pending to register, as a broker dealer or as an associated person of the foregoing entities.

Futures Commission Merchant/Commodity Trading Advisor

Neither members of management, nor any related persons are registered, or have an application pending to register, as a futures commission merchant, commodity pool operator, a commodity trading advisor, or an associated person of the foregoing entities.

Relationship with Related Persons

Recommendations of other Advisers

Stony Point does not utilize nor select other advisers or third party managers. All assets are managed by Stony Point management.

Code of Ethics, Participation or Interest in Client Transactions and Personal Trading

- A. A copy of our Code of Ethics is available upon request. Our Code of Ethics includes discussions of our fiduciary duty to clients, political contributions, gifts, entertainment, and trading guidelines.
- B. Not applicable. Stony Point does not recommend to clients that they invest in any security in which Stony Point or any principal thereof has any financial interest.
- C. On occasion, an employee of Stony Point may purchase for his or her own account securities which are also recommended for clients. Our Code of Ethics details rules for employees regarding personal trading and avoiding conflicts of interest related to trading in one's own account. To avoid placing a trade before a client (in the case of a purchase) or after a client (in the case of a sale), all employee trades are reviewed by the Compliance Officer. All employee trades must either take place in the same block as a client trade or sufficiently apart in time from the client trade so the employee receives no added benefit. Employee statements are reviewed to confirm compliance with the trading procedures.
- D. On occasion, an employee of Stony Point may purchase for his or her own account securities which are also recommended for clients at the same time the clients purchase the securities. Our Code of Ethics details rules for employees regarding personal trading and avoiding conflicts of interest related to trading in one's own account. To avoid placing a trade before a client (in the case of a purchase) or after a client (in the case of a sale), all employee trades are reviewed by the Compliance Officer. All employee trades must either take place in the same block as a client trade or sufficiently apart in time from the client trade so the employee receives no added benefit. Employee statements are reviewed to confirm compliance with the trading procedures.

Review of Accounts

All accounts will be reviewed by a member of senior management on at least an annual basis. However, it is expected that market conditions, changes in a particular client's account, or changes to a client's circumstances will trigger a review of accounts. Reviews may vary in focus specific to a client's specific situation but may include performance reviews, changes that have been made since the last review, changes in clients financial situation, current cash holdings, any known immediate need of investments, and risk tolerance. If a Client wishes to engage the Stony Point for an additional or ongoing review of their financial plan, each review may require a new financial planning agreement.

The annual report in writing provided by Stony Point is intended to review asset allocation. All clients will receive statements and confirmations of trades directly from Schwab. Additionally, all

clients will receive monthly itemized bills from Stony Point. Please refer to Item 15 of the Information Brochure regarding Custody.

Client Referrals and Other Compensation

A. Other Products and Services Available to Us from Schwab.

Schwab Advisor Services (formerly called Schwab Institutional) is Schwab's business serving independent investment advisory firms like us. They provide us and our clients with access to its institutional brokerage – trading, custody, reporting and related services – many of which are not typically available to Schwab retail customers. Schwab also makes available various support services. Some of those services help us manage or administer our clients' accounts while others help us manage and grow our business. The availability to us of Schwab's products and services is not based on us giving particular investment advice, such as buying particular securities for our clients. Here is a more detailed description of Schwab's support services:

Services that Benefit You. Schwab's institutional brokerage services include access to a broad range of investment products, execution of securities transactions, and custody of client assets. The investment products available through Schwab include some to which we might not otherwise have access or that would require a significantly higher minimum initial investment by our clients. Schwab's services described in this paragraph generally benefit you and your account.

Services that May Not Directly Benefit You. Schwab also makes available to us other products and services that benefit us but may not directly benefit you or your account. These products and services assist us in managing and administering our clients' accounts. They include investment research, both Schwab's own and that of third parties. We may use this research to service all or some substantial number of our clients' accounts, including accounts not maintained at Schwab. In addition to investment research, Schwab also makes available software and other technology that:

- provide access to client account data (such as duplicate trade confirmations and account statements);
- facilitate trade execution and allocate aggregated trade orders for multiple client accounts;
- provide pricing and other market data;
- facilitate payment of our fees from our clients' accounts; and
- assist with back-office functions, recordkeeping and client reporting.

Services that Generally Benefit Only Us. Schwab also offers other services intended to help us manage and further develop our business enterprise. These services include:

- educational conferences and events
- technology, compliance, legal, and business consulting;
- publications and conferences on practice management and business succession; and
- access to employee benefits providers, human capital consultants and insurance providers.

Schwab may provide some of these services itself. In other cases, it will arrange for third-party vendors to provide the services to us. Schwab may also discount or waive its fees for some of these services or pay all or a part of a third party's fees. Schwab may also provide us with other benefits such as occasional business entertainment of our personnel.

Our Interest in Schwab's Services.

The availability of the services described above (under the caption "Other Products and Services Available to Us from Schwab") from Schwab benefits us because we do not have to produce or purchase them. Schwab has agreed to pay for up to \$25,000 of certain marketing and technology products and services provided to us by third parties once the total of our clients' assets maintained in accounts at Schwab reaches \$65 million. Beyond that, these services are not contingent upon us committing any specific amount of business to Schwab in trading commissions or assets in custody. The \$65 million minimum described above may give us an incentive to require that you maintain your account with Schwab based on our interest in receiving Schwab's services and Schwab's payment for third party services that benefit our business rather than based on your interest in receiving the best value in custody services and the most favorable execution of your transactions. This is a potential conflict of interest. We believe, however, that our selection of Schwab as custodian and broker is in the best interests of our clients. It is primarily supported by the scope, quality and price of Schwab's services and not Schwab's services and Schwab's payment for third party services that benefit only us. We have adopted policies and procedures designed to ensure, at account opening and thereafter, that our wrap fee program and our use of Schwab's services is appropriate for each of our clients.

B. Compensation to Non-Advisory Personnel for Client Referrals.

Stony Point does not directly or indirectly compensate any person who is not advisory personnel for client referrals.

Financial Information

Stony Point does not require the prepayment of fees more than six (6) months or more in advance and therefore has not provided a balance sheet with this brochure.

There are no material financial circumstances or conditions that would reasonably be expected to impair our ability to meet our contractual obligations to our clients.
