ITEM 2 – MATERIAL CHANGES

SUMMARY OF MATERIAL CHANGES

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ITEM 4 – ADVISORY BUSINESS

This Disclosure document is being offered to you by WR Wealth Planners LLC (“WRWP” or “Firm”) about the investment advisory services we provide. It discloses information about our services and the way those services are made available to you, the client.

We are an investment management firm located in Columbia, MO. We specialize in investment advisory services for individuals, high net worth individuals, foundations, employee sponsored retirement plans, charitable organizations, trusts, and corporations. Our Firm became a registered investment adviser in January 2020 and is owned by Carroll Wilkerson and Jared Reynolds. Carroll Wilkerson is the Chief Compliance Officer.

We are committed to helping clients build, manage and preserve their wealth, and to provide assistance that helps clients to achieve their stated financial goals. We will offer an initial complimentary meeting upon our discretion; however, investment advisory services are initiated only after you and WRWP execute an Investment Management Agreement.

INVESTMENT AND WEALTH MANAGEMENT AND SUPERVISION SERVICES

We manage advisory accounts on a discretionary and non-discretionary basis. For discretionary accounts, once we have determined a profile and investment plan with a client, we will execute the day to day transactions without seeking prior client consent. Account supervision is guided by the written profile and investment plan of the client. We may accept accounts with certain restrictions, if circumstances warrant. We primarily allocate client assets among various equities, Exchanged Traded Funds (“ETFs”), no-load or load-waived mutual funds, or alternative investments in accordance with their stated investment objectives.

During personal discussions with clients, we determine the client’s objectives, time horizons, risk tolerance, and liquidity needs. As appropriate, we also review a client’s prior investment history, as well as family composition and background. Based on client needs, we develop a client’s personal profile and investment plan. We then create and manage the client’s investments based on that policy and plan. It is the client’s obligation to notify us immediately if circumstances have changed with respect to their goals.

Once we have determined the types of investments to be included in your portfolio and allocated them, we will provide ongoing investment review and management services. This approach requires us to periodically review your portfolio.

With our discretionary relationship, we will make changes to the portfolio, as we deem appropriate, to meet your financial objectives. We trade these portfolios based on the combination of our market views and your objectives, using our investment process. We tailor our advisory services to meet the needs of our clients and seek to ensure that your portfolio is managed in a manner consistent with those needs and objectives. You will have the ability to leave standing instructions with us to refrain from investing in particular industries or invest in limited amounts of securities.

If a non-discretionary relationship is in place, calls will be placed presenting the recommendation made and only upon your authorization will any action be taken on your behalf.

In all cases, you have a direct and beneficial interest in your securities, rather than an undivided interest in a pool of securities. We do have limited authority to direct the Custodian to deduct our investment advisory fees from your accounts, but only with the appropriate written authorization from you.

Where appropriate, we provide advice about any type of legacy position held in client portfolios. Typically, these are assets that are ineligible to be custodied at our primary custodian. Clients will engage us to advise on certain investment products that are not maintained at their primary custodian, such as variable life insurance, annuity contracts, and assets held in employer sponsored retirement plans and qualified tuition plans (i.e., 529 plans).

You are advised and are expected to understand that our past performance is not a guarantee of future results. Certain market and economic risks exist that adversely affect an account's performance. This could result in capital losses in your account.

FINANCIAL PLANNING

Through the financial planning process, our team strives to engage our clients in conversations around the family's goals, objectives, priorities, vision, and legacy – both for the near term as well as for future generations. With the unique goals and circumstances of each family in mind, our team will offer financial planning ideas and strategies to address the client's holistic financial picture, including estate, income tax, charitable, cash flow, wealth transfer, and family legacy objectives. Our team partners with our client's other advisors (CPAs, Enrolled Agents, Estate Attorneys, Insurance Brokers, etc.) to ensure a coordinated effort of all parties toward the client's stated goals. Such services include various reports on specific goals and objectives or general investment and/or planning recommendations, guidance to outside assets, and periodic updates.

Our specific services in preparing your plan may include:

- Review and clarification of your financial goals
- Assessment of your overall financial position including cash flow, balance sheet, investment strategy, risk management, and estate planning
- Creation of a unique plan for each goal you have, including personal and business real estate, education, retirement or financial independence, charitable giving, estate planning, business succession, and other personal goals
- Development of a goal-oriented investment plan, with input from various advisors to our clients around tax suggestions, asset allocation, expenses, risk, and liquidity factors for each goal. This includes IRA and qualified plans, taxable, and trust accounts that require special attention
- Design of a risk management plan including risk tolerance, risk avoidance, mitigation, and transfer, including liquidity as well as various insurance and possible company benefits; and
- Crafting and implementation of, in conjunction with your estate and/or corporate attorneys as tax advisor, an estate plan to provide for you and/or your heirs in the event of an incapacity or death

A written evaluation of each client's initial situation or Financial Plan is provided to the client. An annual review will be provided by the Advisor, if indicated by the Client and Advisor per the Agreement. More frequent reviews occur, but are not necessarily communicated to the client unless immediate changes are recommended.

CONSULTING SERVICES

We also provide clients investment advice on a more-limited basis on one-or-more isolated areas of concern such as divorce planning, estate planning, real estate, retirement planning, or any other specific topic. Additionally, we provide advice on non-securities matters about the rendering of estate planning, insurance, real estate, and/or annuity advice or any other business advisory / consulting services for equity or debt investments in privately held businesses. In these cases, you will be required to select your own

investment managers, custodian and/or insurance companies for the implementation of consulting recommendations. If your needs include brokerage and/or other financial services, we will recommend the use of one of several investment managers, brokers, banks, custodians, insurance companies or other financial professionals ("Firms"). You must independently evaluate these Firms before opening an account or transacting business, and have the right to effect business through any firm you choose. You have the right to choose whether to follow the consulting advice that we provide.

RETIREMENT PLAN SERVICES

When serving as an ERISA 3(38) investment manager, the plan sponsor is relieved of all fiduciary responsibility for the investment decisions made by WRWP. WRWP is a discretionary investment manager in accordance with the terms of a separate ERISA 3(38) Investment Management Agreement between WRWP and the plan sponsor. WRWP provides the following services to the plan sponsor:

- Select the investments.
- Monitor the investments and replace investments when appropriate.
- Provide a quarterly monitoring report.
- Develop a customized IPS.

WRWP goal in identifying the plan's investment options is to provide a range of options that will enable plan participants to invest according to varying risk tolerances, savings time horizons or other financial goals. The plan's investment options may consist of ETFs, CITs, mutual funds, model portfolios, or other similar investment funds. The investment funds from which WRWP will select from will be those that are available on the plan record-keeper's investment platform.

WRWP will prepare an IPS for the plan. The purpose of the IPS is to provide guidelines for making investment-related decisions in a prudent manner. It outlines the underlying philosophies and processes for the selection, evaluation, monitoring, and, if necessary, replacement of the investment options offered by the plan. WRWP will perform on-going monitoring of the investment options within the plan. The ongoing monitoring of investments is a regular and disciplined process. Monitoring confirms that the criteria remain satisfied and that an investment option continues to be appropriate. The process of monitoring investment performance relative to specified guidelines will be consistently applied.

WRWP will make available to participants, either through the provider's recordkeeping platform, a stand-alone form, or a third-party web-site, a risk tolerance questionnaire. The questionnaire's sole purpose is to provide participants with general assistance in order to identify their risk tolerance and investment objectives and, based on this information, help determine which investment is most aligned with their risk tolerance/investment objectives.

REAL ESTATE ADVISORY SERVICES

For clients interested in mitigating certain tax consequences of selling appreciated real property, our Firm will inform, educate, and advise such clients with respect to the exchange of such property for securitized interests in other real property while conforming to Internal Revenue Code Section 1031 (more commonly known as a "1031 Exchange"). In connection with this service, our Firm will evaluate the client's current real property and the likely tax consequences if sold at its present market value, help locate a suitable Qualified Intermediary, perform internal due diligence on potential 1031 Exchange providers that can offer an appropriate securitized interest in like-kind property (via a Delaware Statutory Trust or "DST" structure), utilize multiple third-party due diligence service providers that issue reports on prospective DSTs, coordinate with the client's tax professional or CPA and model projected tax savings (especially as it relates

to DST income tax deferral), and – if the client elects to avail him or herself of the 1031 Exchange – review financial and compliance reports of the DST on an ongoing basis.

Our Firm will also incorporate the addition of the DST into the applicable client's overall portfolio management and/or financial planning services, focused on proactive reviews and updates with the client.

DISCLOSURE REGARDING ROLLOVER RECOMMENDATIONS

A client or prospect leaving an employer typically has four options regarding an existing retirement plan (and may engage in a combination of these options): (i) leave the money in the former employer's plan, if permitted, (ii) roll over the assets to the new employer's plan, if one is available and rollovers are permitted, (iii) rollover to an Individual Retirement Account ("IRA"), or (iv) cash out the account value (which could, depending upon the client's age, result in adverse tax consequences). Our Firm may recommend an investor roll over plan assets to an IRA for which our Firm provides investment advisory services. As a result, our Firm and its representatives may earn an asset-based fee. In contrast, a recommendation that a client or prospective client leave their plan assets with their previous employer or roll over the assets to a plan sponsored by a new employer will generally result in no compensation to our Firm. Our Firm therefore has an economic incentive to encourage a client to roll plan assets into an IRA that our Firm will manage, which presents a conflict of interest. To mitigate the conflict of interest, there are various factors that our Firm will consider before recommending a rollover, including but not limited to: (i) the investment options available in the plan versus the investment options available in an IRA, (ii) fees and expenses in the plan versus the fees and expenses in an IRA, (iii) the services and responsiveness of the plan's investment professionals versus those of our Firm, (iv) protection of assets from creditors and legal judgments, (v) required minimum distributions and age considerations, and (vi) employer stock tax consequences, if any. All rollover recommendations are reviewed by our Firm's Chief Compliance Officer and remains available to address any questions that a client or prospective client has regarding the oversight.

We are fiduciaries under the Investment Advisers Act of 1940 and when we provide investment advice to you regarding your retirement plan account or individual retirement account, we are also fiduciaries within the meaning of Title I of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act and/or the Internal Revenue Code, as applicable, which are laws governing retirement accounts. We have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests.

CO-BRANDED INVESTMENT ADVISOR REPRESENTATIVES

Our firm offers services through our network of investment advisor representatives ("IARs"). IARs may have their own legal business entities whose trade names and logos are used for marketing purposes and may appear on marketing materials and/or disclosure statements and client statements. The Client should understand that the businesses are legal entities of the IAR and not of our firm. The IARs are under the supervision of our firm and the advisory services of the IAR are provided through our firm. A complete listing of the entities is listed on our ADV Part 1.

WRAP FEE PROGRAM

Under our wrap program, you will receive investment advisory services and the execution of securities brokerage transactions for a single specified fee. Our Firm receives this wrap fee for the services rendered. The terms and conditions on a wrap program engagement are more fully discussed in our Wrap Fee Program Brochure. We adhere to our fiduciary duty when trading in your accounts. Trades are made only

on the basis of the account's stated investment objectives, and without concern to the Firm's trading costs and Firm's expenses that trading the accounts will create. We do not charge our clients higher advisory fees based on their trading activity, but you should be aware that we may have an incentive to limit our trading activities in your account(s) because we incur the fees for executed trades. In order to mitigate this conflict of interest, we will fulfill our fiduciary duty by acting in the client's best interest.

ASSETS

As of December 31, 2022, our Firm managed a total of \$353,963,748 of regulatory assets under management. Our Firm manages \$316,018,518 in discretionary assets under management and \$37,945,230 in non-discretionary assets under management.

ITEM 5 - FEES AND COMPENSATION

INVESTMENT MANAGEMENT FEES AND COMPENSATION

Our Firm charges a fee as compensation for providing Investment Management services on your account. These services include advisory services, trade entry, investment supervision, and other account maintenance activities. Our custodian charges transaction costs, custodial fees, redemption fees, retirement plan and administrative fees or commissions. See Additional Fees and Expenses below for details.

The fees for investment management are an annual percentage of assets under management. A calendar quarterly investment management fee is billed in arrears based on the average daily balance of your account during the previous calendar quarter. Fees are applied to the household asset value on a pro rata basis are assessed on all assets under management, including securities, cash, and money market balances. Margin account balances are not included in the fee billing.

Our maximum investment advisory fee is 1.50%, or we may negotiate a lower advisory fee. The specific advisory fees are set forth in your Investment Advisory Agreement. Fees may vary based on the size of the account, complexity of the portfolio, extent of activity in the account, or other reasons agreed upon by us and you as the client. In certain circumstances, our fees and the timing of the fee payments may be negotiated. Our employees and their family related accounts are charged a reduced fee for our services.

Unless otherwise instructed by the Client, we will aggregate related client accounts for the purposes of determining the account size and annualized fee. The common practice is often referred to as "house-holding" portfolios for fee purposes and may result in lower fees than if fees were calculated on portfolios separately. Our method of house-holding accounts for fee purposes looks at the overall family dynamic and relationship. When applicable and noted in Appendix A of the Investment Management Agreement, legacy positions will also be excluded from the fee calculation.

The independent and qualified custodian holding your funds and securities will debit your account directly for the advisory fee and pay that fee to us. You will provide written authorization permitting the fees to be paid directly from your account held by the qualified custodian. Further, the qualified custodian agrees to deliver an account statement to you on a quarterly basis indicating all the amounts deducted from the account including our advisory fees.

Either WRWP or you may terminate the management agreement immediately upon written notice to the other party. The management fee will be pro-rated to the date of termination, for the billing cycle in which the cancellation notice was given and the unearned fee will be billed to your account.

Upon termination, you are responsible for monitoring the securities in your account, and we will have no further obligation to act or advise with respect to those assets. In the event of client's death or disability, WRWP will continue management of the account until we are notified of client's death or disability and given alternative written instructions by an authorized party.

FINANCIAL PLANNING FEES

For households with over \$150,000 in assets under our firm's management, financial planning services are included in the investment management fee referenced above. For households with under \$150,000 in total assets under our firm's management or stand-alone financial planning arrangements, WRWP will negotiate the planning fees with you using either a fixed fee or an hourly rate. Fees may vary based on the extent and complexity of your individual or family circumstances and the amount of your assets under our management. WRWP will determine your fee for the designated financial advisory services based on a fixed fee arrangement described below.

Under our fixed fee arrangement, any fee will be agreed in advance of services being performed. The fee will be determined based on factors including the complexity of your financial situation, agreed upon deliverables, and whether or not you intend to implement any recommendations through WRWP. Fixed fees for financial plans range from \$1,500 to \$15,000.

Typically, we complete a plan within a month and will present it to you within 90 days of the contract date, provided that you have provided us all information needed to prepare the financial plan. Fees are billed with one hundred percent (100%) payable at the time the financial plan is delivered. Financial planning fees can be deducted from client's brokerage accounts at their discretion. Written authorization will be required by you, the client. You may terminate the financial planning agreement by providing us with written notice. Upon termination, fees will be prorated to the date of termination and any unearned portion of the fee will be refunded to you via check based on an hourly rate of \$350.00. Services provided up to date of termination but not yet paid to WRWP will be billed to you based on the hourly rate of \$350.00. We will not require prepayment of more than \$1,200 in fees per client, six (6) or more months in advance of providing any services.

In no case are WRWP fees based on, or related to, the performance of your funds or investments.

For financial planning services related specifically to 1031 Exchange/DST consulting, we generally charge a flat fee not to exceed \$1,500 for the initial interview and initial research conducted, all of which is due upon initiation of the engagement. We will not require a retainer exceeding \$750 when services cannot be rendered within 6 months.

Upon client's agreement and desire for implementation of the proposed 1031 Exchange Plan, we will generally charge a fee not to exceed 5% of the assets (debt and equity) of the completed 1031 Exchange Plan which has resulted from the firm's due diligence and assistance with various administrative tasks. This fee is due upon closing and shall be paid from the proceeds of the 1031 Exchange.

When both investment management or plan implementation and wealth planning services are offered, there is a conflict of interest since there is an incentive for us offering wealth planning services to recommend products or services for which WRWP receives compensation. However, WRWP will make all recommendations independent of such considerations and based solely on our obligations to consider your objectives and needs. As a wealth planning client, you have the right not to act upon any of our recommendations and not affect the transaction(s) through us if you decide to follow the recommendations.

CONSULTING

WRWP provides consulting services for clients who need advice on a limited scope of work. WRWP will negotiate consulting fees with you. Fees may vary based on the extent and complexity of the consulting project. Fees will be billed as services are rendered. Either party may terminate the agreement. Upon termination, fees will be prorated to the date of termination and any unearned portion of the fee will be refunded to you as described above.

RETIREMENT PLAN SERVICES

Fees for Retirement Plans services range from 0.50% to 0.75% as disclosed in the Employer Sponsored Retirement Plans Consulting Agreement ("Plan Consulting Agreement"). Fees are negotiable. Fees can also be billed a fixed dollar amount as negotiated and agreed to by our Firm and Plan Sponsor. The compensation method is explained and agreed upon in advance before any services are rendered.

Plan advisory services begin with the effective date of the Plan Consulting Agreement, which is the date you sign the Plan Consulting Agreement. For that calendar quarter, fees will be adjusted pro rata based upon the number of calendar days in the calendar quarter that the Agreement was effective. Our fee is billed in arrears on the last business day of the calendar quarter, as indicated on the Appendix of the Plan Consulting Agreement. Invoices are sent out each quarter to either the client or the custodian of the Plan. For Plans where our fee is billed to the custodian, the fee is deducted directly from the participant accounts. Written authorization permitting us to be paid directly from the custodial account is outlined in the Plan Consulting Agreement.

Either party may terminate the Plan Consulting Agreement at any time upon immediate notice. You are responsible to pay for services rendered until the termination of the agreement.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES PROVIDED BY BLACK DIAMOND

We have contracted with Black Diamond to utilize its technology platforms to support data reconciliation, performance reporting, fee calculation, client relationship maintenance, quarterly performance evaluations, and other functions related to the administrative tasks of managing client accounts. Due to this arrangement, Black Diamond will have access to client accounts, but Black Diamond will not serve as an investment advisor to our clients or bill the accounts. WRWP and Black Diamond are non-affiliated companies. Black Diamond charges our Firm an annual fee for each account administered by its software. Please note that the fee charged to the client will not increase due to the annual fee WRWP pays to Black Diamond. The annual fee is paid from the portion of the management fee retained by WRWP.

ADDITIONAL FEES AND EXPENSES:

In addition to the advisory fees paid to our Firm, clients may also incur certain charges imposed by other third parties, such as broker-dealers, custodians, trust companies, banks, and other financial institutions (collectively "Financial Institutions"). These additional charges may include custodial fees, fees charged by the Independent Managers, charges imposed directly by a mutual fund or ETF in a client's account, as disclosed in the fund's prospectus (e.g., fund management fees and other fund expenses), deferred sales charges, odd-lot differentials, transfer taxes, wire transfer and electronic fund fees, and other fees and taxes on brokerage accounts and securities transactions. WRWP's brokerage practices are described at length in Item 12, below. Neither our Firm nor its supervised persons accept compensation for the sale of securities or other investment products. Further, our Firm does not share in any of these additional fees and expenses outlined above.

ITEM 6 - PERFORMANCE BASED FEES AND SIDE-BY-SIDE MANAGEMENT

We do not charge advisory fees on a share of the capital appreciation of the funds or securities in a client account (so-called performance-based fees), nor engage side by side management.

ITEM 7 - TYPES OF CLIENTS

We provide investment advice to individuals, high-net worth individuals, employee sponsored retirement plans, institutions, charitable organizations, and trusts. We do not require a minimum dollar amount to open and maintain an advisory account.

ITEM 8 - METHODS OF ANALYSIS, INVESTMENT STRATEGIES AND RISK OF LOSS

METHODS OF ANALYSIS AND INVESTMENT STRATEGIES

Asset classes, market capitalizations, and investment styles are cyclical – coming into and going out of favor without informing market participants when, to what degree, or for how long they intend on remaining dislocated from their long-term averages. Therefore, we do not try to time when to enter and exit the market – as time in the market is more important than timing it – nor do we portend to have some divine knowledge about the short-term direction of markets – markets that are completely out of our control. Instead of diverting our attention to the items that we are unable to influence, we focus all of our energy on the areas of a client portfolio we do have control over – (1) purpose driven investing through aligning the underlying investment strategy to the needs of the client assets, (2) thorough and exhaustive investment research to potentially maximize long-term wealth accumulation through portfolio positioning, (3) consistent and unwavering diversification within the portfolio in an attempt to ensure against the risk of total loss, and (4) disciplined rebalancing of client assets allowing for an objective reallocation of capital and risk. These four tenants do not guarantee the road won't be bumpy at times; however, they do provide the necessary guardrails to ensure our clients stay on the road to meeting their long-term goals.

WRWP's fundamental job is to meet a variety of client financial goals by selecting and actively managing choices of investments against changing market conditions and opportunities as appropriate to accomplish clients' needs for income, wealth accumulation and/or capital preservation.

We subscribe to the following core beliefs about financial markets and these beliefs provide the framework to our investment philosophy and portfolio construction. These are not ranked in any particular order.

- **EMBRACE MARKET PRICING** - With millions of buyers and sellers acting on real-time information, we believe the market is an efficient and effective vehicle for pricing securities.
- **DON'T TRY TO OUTGUESS THE MARKET AND AVOID MARKET TIMING** - We recognize that we cannot predict the future or how it will impact the price of securities.
- **RESIST CHASING PAST PERFORMANCE** - Historical data is useful for financial planning purposes, but past performance alone provides little insight into a fund's ability to outperform in the future.
- **LET MARKETS WORK FOR THE INVESTOR** - The financial markets have rewarded long-term investors. Historically, equity and bond markets have rewarded risk and have provided growth of wealth that has more than offset inflation.

- **CONSIDER THE DRIVERS OF RETURNS** - Academic research has identified equity and fixed income dimensions which point to differences in expected returns. These dimensions are pervasive, persistent, and robust, and can be pursued in cost-effective portfolios.
- **PRACTICE SMART DIVERSIFICATION** - Diversification helps reduce risks that have no expected return. This includes global diversification.
- **MANAGE EMOTIONS** - Many people struggle to separate emotions from investing. Reacting to short-term market conditions may lead to poor decisions at the worst of times.
- **LOOK BEYOND THE HEADLINES AND FOCUS ON LONG-TERM INVESTING** - Headlines are often meant to attract attention, often creating anxiety of missing out or of an impending pullback in the markets. We focus on the long-term nature of investing as opposed to the daily news headlines. We recognize not all investors have a long-term horizon, and in those situations, we manage to risk, as opposed to headlines.

Alternative investments are thought of as investments other than stocks and bonds. The alternative investment strategies we offer tend to move independently of stock and bond markets. The main goal of alternatives is to provide access to other return sources, with the potential benefits of reducing the risk of an investor's portfolio, improving returns, or both.

Our Firm may recommend alternative investments such as public non-traded real estate programs, public non-traded business development companies, and private real estate programs which have their own management fees and operating expenses. Therefore, these investments subject clients to our direct management fee and the indirect fees of the investment.

RISK OF LOSS

Clients must understand that past performance is not indicative of future results. Therefore, current and prospective clients should never assume that future performance of any specific investment or investment strategy will be profitable. Investing in securities involves risk of loss. Further, depending on the different types of investments, there will be varying degrees of risk. Clients and prospective clients should be prepared to bear investment loss including loss of original principal.

Because of the inherent risk of loss associated with investing, our Firm is unable to represent, guarantee, or even imply that our services and methods of analysis can or will predict future results, successfully identify market tops or bottoms, or insulate you from losses due to market corrections or declines.

Investors should be aware that accounts are subject to the following risks:

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- **CHARTING ANALYSIS RISK** - Our charting analysis may not accurately detect anomalies or predict future price movements. Current prices of securities may reflect all information known about the security and day-to-day changes in market prices of securities may follow random patterns and may not be predictable with any reliable degree of accuracy.

- **TECHNICAL RISK** - The risk of market timing based on technical analysis is that our analysis may not accurately detect anomalies or predict future price movements. Current prices of securities may reflect all information known about the security and day-to-day changes in market prices of securities may follow random patterns and may not be predictable with any reliable degree of accuracy.
- **MARKET RISK** - Even a long-term investment approach cannot guarantee a profit. Economic, political, and issuer-specific events will cause the value of securities to rise or fall. Because the value of investment portfolios will fluctuate, there is the risk that you will lose money and your investment may be worth more or less upon liquidation.
- **FOREIGN SECURITIES AND CURRENCY RISK** - Investments in international and emerging-market securities include exposure to risks such as currency fluctuations, foreign taxes and regulations, and the potential for illiquid markets and political instability.
- **CAPITALIZATION RISK** - Small-cap and mid-cap companies may be hindered as a result of limited resources or less diverse products or services. Their stocks have historically been more volatile than the stocks of larger, more established companies.
- **INTEREST RATE RISK** - In a rising rate environment, the value of fixed-income securities generally declines, and the value of equity securities may be adversely affected.
- **CREDIT RISK** - Credit risk is the risk that the issuer of a security may be unable to make interest payments and/or repay principal when due. A downgrade to an issuer's credit rating or a perceived change in an issuer's financial strength may affect a security's value and thus, impact the fund's performance.
- **SECURITIES LENDING RISK** - Securities lending involves the risk that the fund loses money because the borrower fails to return the securities in a timely manner or at all. The fund could also lose money if the value of the collateral provided for loaned securities, or the value of the investments made with the cash collateral, falls. These events could also trigger adverse tax consequences for the fund.
- **EXCHANGE-TRADED FUNDS** - ETFs face market-trading risks, including the potential lack of an active market for shares, losses from trading in the secondary markets, and disruption in the creation/redemption process of the ETF. Any of these factors may lead to the fund's shares trading at either a premium or a discount to its "net asset value."
- **PERFORMANCE OF UNDERLYING MANAGERS** - We select the mutual funds and ETFs in the asset allocation portfolios. However, we depend on the manager of such funds to select individual investments in accordance with their stated investment strategy.
- **NON-LIQUID ALTERNATIVE INVESTMENTS** - From time to time, our Firm will recommend to certain qualifying clients that a portion of such clients' assets be invested in private funds, private fund-of-funds and/or other alternative investments (collectively, "Nonliquid Alternative Investments"). Nonliquid Alternative Investments are not suitable for all of our Firm's clients and are offered only to those qualifying clients for whom our Firm believes such an investment is suitable and in line with their overall investment strategy. Nonliquid Alternative Investments typically are available to only a limited number of sophisticated investors who meet the definition of "accredited investor" under Regulation D of the Securities Act of 1933, as amended (the "Securities Act"), or "qualified client" under the Investment Advisers Act of 1940, or "qualified

purchaser” under the Investment Company Act of 1940. Nonliquid Alternative Investments present special risks for our Firm’s clients, including without limitation, limited liquidity, higher fees and expenses, volatile performance, no assurance of investment returns, heightened risk of loss, limited transparency, additional reliance on underlying management of the investment, special tax considerations, subjective valuations, use of leverage and limited regulatory oversight. When a Nonliquid Alternative Investment invests part or all of its assets in real estate properties, there are additional risks that are unique to real estate investing, including but not limited to: limitations of the appraisal value; the borrower’s financial conditions (if the underlying property has been obtained by a loan), including the risk of foreclosures on the property; neighborhood values; the supply of and demand for properties of like kind; and certain city, state and/or federal regulations. Additionally, real estate investing is also subject to possible loss due to uninsured losses from natural and man-made disasters. The above list is not exhaustive of all risks related to an investment in Nonliquid Alternative Investments. A more comprehensive discussion of the risks associated with a particular Nonliquid Investment is set forth in that fund’s offering documents, which will be provided to each client subscribing to a Nonliquid Alternative Investment, for review and consideration. It is important that each potential, qualified investor carefully read each offering or private placement memorandum prior to investing.

- **REAL ESTATE INVESTMENTS** - Real estate funds (including REITs) face several kinds of risk that are inherent in the real estate sector, which historically has experienced significant fluctuations and cycles in performance. Revenues and cash flows may be adversely affected by: changes in local real estate market conditions due to changes in national or local economic conditions or changes in local property market characteristics; competition from other properties offering the same or similar services; changes in interest rates and in the state of the debt and equity credit markets; the ongoing need for capital improvements; changes in real estate tax rates and other operating expenses; adverse changes in governmental rules and fiscal policies; adverse changes in zoning laws; the impact of present or future environmental legislation and compliance with environmental laws. Interests in DSTs that are acquired via a 1031 Exchange can involve significant leverage, which can result in default in the event the loan-to-value ratio becomes unsustainable, and the acquired debt becomes unserviceable. Additionally, real properties acquired by a DST can be overvalued relative to applicable market valuations for similar properties, thus resulting in an initial overpayment for the acquisition of the property and higher ongoing debt service obligations. Since it is the DST that owns the acquired real property, clients will also be largely dependent on the DST sponsor’s management capabilities, experience, solvency, and general professional aptitude. As described above, all real property can be affected by macroeconomic risk, unpredictable market cycles, interest rate fluctuations, and changes in tax rules (among other impacts).
- **CYBERSECURITY RISK** - Cybersecurity risks include both intentional and unintentional events at [Name of Firm] or one of its third-party counterparties or service providers, that may result in a loss or corruption of data, result in the unauthorized release or other misuse of confidential information, and generally compromise our Firm’s ability to conduct its business. A cybersecurity breach may also result in a third-party obtaining unauthorized access to our clients’ information, including social security numbers, home addresses, account numbers, account balances, and account holdings. Our Firm has established business continuity plans and risk management systems designed to reduce the risks associated with cybersecurity breaches. However, there are inherent limitations in these plans and systems, including that certain risks may not have been identified, in large part because different or unknown threats may emerge in the future. As such,

there is no guarantee that such efforts will succeed, especially because our Firm does not directly control the cybersecurity systems of our third-party service providers. There is also a risk that cybersecurity breaches may not be detected.

- **RESPONSIBLE, FAITH BASED INVESTING AND ESG RISK** – Clients utilizing responsible or Faith Based investing strategies and environment, social responsibility and corporate governance (ESG) factors may underperform strategies which do not utilize responsible investing and ESG considerations. Responsible, Faith Based investing and ESG strategies may operate by either excluding the investments of certain issuers or by selecting investments based on their compliance with factors such as ESG. This strategy may exclude certain sectors or industries from a client's portfolio, potentially negatively affecting the client's investment performance if the excluded sector or industry outperforms. Responsible, Faith Based investing and ESG are subjective by nature, and our Firm may rely on analysis and 'scores' provided by third parties in determining whether an issuer meets our Firm's standards for inclusion or exclusion. A client's perception may differ from our Firm or a third parties on how to judge an issuers adherence to responsible investing principles.

ITEM 9 - DISCIPLINARY INFORMATION

We do not have any legal, financial or other "disciplinary" item to report.

ITEM 10 - OTHER FINANCIAL INDUSTRY ACTIVITIES AND AFFILIATIONS

INSURANCE

The W Group, an affiliated licensed insurance agency, is under common ownership with our Firm. Because of the common ownership with WRWP there is a conflict of interest to clients because our firm indirectly receives compensation (commissions, trails, or other compensation from the respective insurance products) as a result of effecting insurance transactions for any mutual clients of WRWP.

Commissions generated by insurance sales do not offset regular advisory fees. Our firm has an incentive to recommend insurance products and this incentive creates a conflict of interest between your interests and our Firm. We mitigate this conflict by disclosing to clients they have the right to decide whether or not to engage the services of our affiliated Insurance agency. Further, clients should note they have the right to decide whether to act on the recommendations and the right to choose any professional to execute the advice for any insurance products through any licensed insurance agent not affiliated with our Firm. We recognize the fiduciary responsibility to place the client's interests first and have established policies in this regard to avoid any conflicts of interest.

Some of our IARs may have their own legal business entities whose trade names and logos are used for marketing their Insurance services and these logos may appear on marketing materials. The Client should understand that the businesses are legal entities of the IAR and not of our firm. The IARs are under the supervision of our firm and the advisory services of the IAR are provided through our firm.

Clients should be aware that the ability to receive additional compensation by our Firm and its management persons or employees creates conflicts of interest that impair the objectivity of the Firm and these individuals when making advisory recommendations. Our Firm endeavors at all times to put the interest of its clients first as part of our fiduciary duty as a registered investment adviser; we take the following steps, among others to address this conflict:

- we disclose to clients the existence of all material conflicts of interest, including the potential for the Firm and our employees to earn compensation from advisory clients in addition to the Firm's advisory fees;
- we disclose to clients that they have the right to decide to purchase recommended investment products from our employees;
- we collect, maintain and document accurate, complete and relevant client background information, including the client's financial goals, objectives, and liquidity needs;
- the Firm conducts regular reviews of each client advisory account to verify that all recommendations made to a client are in the best interest of the client's needs and circumstances;
- we require that our employees seek prior approval of any outside employment activity so that we may ensure that any conflicts of interests in such activities are properly addressed;
- we periodically monitor these outside employment activities to verify that any conflicts of interest continue to be properly addressed by the Firm; and

Our Firm does not have an application pending to register, as a futures commission merchant, commodity pool operator, a commodity trading adviser, or an associated person of the foregoing entities.

Our firm nor any of its management persons are registered or have an application pending to register as a broker-dealer or a registered representative of a broker-dealer.

ITEM 11 - CODE OF ETHICS, PARTICIPATION OR INTEREST IN CLIENT TRANSACTIONS AND PERSONAL TRADING

Our Firm and persons associated with us are allowed to invest for their own accounts, or to have a financial investment in the same securities or other investments that we recommend or acquire for your account and may engage in transactions that are the same as or different than transactions recommended to or made for your account. This creates a conflict of interest. We recognize the fiduciary responsibility to act in your best interest and have established policies to mitigate conflicts of interest.

We have developed and implemented a Code of Ethics that sets forth standards of conduct expected of our advisory personnel to mitigate this conflict of interest. The Code of Ethics addresses, among other things, personal trading, gifts, and the prohibition against the use of inside information.

The Code of Ethics is designed to protect our clients to detect and deter misconduct, educate personnel regarding the Firm's expectations and laws governing their conduct, remind personnel that they are in a position of trust and must act with complete propriety at all times, protect the reputation of WRWP, safeguard against the violation of the securities laws, and establish procedures for personnel to follow so that we may determine whether their personnel are complying with the Firm's ethical principles.

We have established the following restrictions in order to ensure our Firm's fiduciary responsibilities:

- A director, officer, or employee of WRWP shall not buy or sell any securities for their personal portfolio(s) where their decision is substantially derived, in whole or in part, by reason of his or her employment unless the information is also available to the investing public on reasonable inquiry. No supervised employee of WRWP shall prefer his or her own interest to that of the advisory client. Trades for supervised employees are traded alongside client accounts.
- We maintain a list of all securities holdings of anyone associated with this advisory practice with access to advisory recommendations. These holdings are reviewed on a regular basis by an appropriate officer/individual of WRWP.

- We emphasize the unrestricted right of the client to decline implementation of any advice rendered, except in situations where we are granted discretionary authority of the client's account
- We require that all supervised employees must act in accordance with all applicable Federal and State regulations governing registered investment advisory practices
- Any supervised employee not in observance of the above may be subject to termination

None of our associated persons may affect for himself/herself or for accounts in which he/she holds a beneficial interest, any transactions in a security which is being actively recommended to any of our clients, unless in accordance with the Firm's procedures.

ITEM 12 - BROKERAGE PRACTICES

Clients must maintain assets in an account at a "qualified custodian," generally a broker-dealer or bank. We recommend that our clients use Charles Schwab & Co., Inc. Advisor Services or TD Ameritrade, Inc. ("Custodian"), both registered broker-dealers, member SIPC, as the qualified custodian. We are independently owned and operated, and unaffiliated with the Custodian. The Custodian will hold client assets in a brokerage account and buy and sell securities when we instruct them to.

While we recommend that clients use the recommended Custodian, client must decide whether to do so and open accounts by entering into account agreements directly with them. The Client opens the accounts with Custodian. The accounts will always be held in the name of the client and never in our Firm's name.

There is no direct link between our participation in the program and the investment advice we give to our clients, although we receive economic benefits through our participation in the program that are typically not available to any other independent investment advisors participating in the program. These benefits include the following products and services (provided without cost or at a discount): receipt of duplicate Client statements and confirmations; research related products and tools; consulting services; access to a trading desk serving advisor participants; access to block trading (which provides the ability to aggregate securities transactions for execution and then allocate the appropriate shares to Client accounts); the ability to have advisory fees deducted directly from Client accounts; access to an electronic communications network for Client order entry and account information; access to mutual funds with no transaction fees and to certain institutional money managers; and discounts on compliance, marketing, research, technology, and practice management products or services provided to us by third party vendors. The Custodian may also have paid for business consulting and professional services received by some of our related persons. Some of the products and services made available by the Custodian through the program may benefit us but may not benefit your account. These products or services may assist us in managing and administering your account, including accounts not maintained at the Custodian. Other services made available by the Custodian are intended to help us manage and further develop our business enterprise. The benefits received by our Firm or our personnel through participation in the program do not depend on the amount of brokerage transactions directed to the Custodian. As part of our fiduciary duties to clients, we endeavor at all times to put the interests of our clients first. You should be aware, however, that the receipt of economic benefits by our Firm or our related persons in and of itself creates a conflict of interest and may indirectly influence our choice of the Custodian for custody and brokerage services.

In the event you request us to recommend a broker/dealer custodian for execution and/or custodial services, we generally recommend your account to be maintained at TD Ameritrade or Charles Schwab. We

may recommend that you establish accounts with the recommended Custodian to maintain custody of your assets and to effect trades for your accounts. You are under no obligation to act upon any recommendations, and if you elect to act upon any recommendations, you are under no obligation to place the transactions through any broker/dealer we recommend. Our recommendation is generally based on the broker's cost and fees, skills, reputation, dependability and compatibility with the client. You may be able to obtain lower commissions and fees from other brokers and the value of products, research and services given to us is not a factor in determining the selection of broker/dealer or the reasonableness of their commissions.

Some of the products, services, and other benefits provided by Custodian(s) benefit WRWP and may not benefit our client accounts. Our recommendation or requirement that you place assets in our recommended Custodian's custody may be based in part on benefits they provides to us, or our agreement to maintain certain Assets Under Management at the Custodian, and not solely on the nature, cost, or quality of custody and execution services provided by the Custodian.

We place trades for our clients' accounts subject to its duty to seek best execution and its other fiduciary duties. The Custodian's execution quality may be different than other broker-dealers.

BROKERAGE FOR CLIENT REFERRALS

Our Firm does not receive client referrals from any custodian or third party in exchange for using that broker-dealer or third party.

AGGREGATION AND ALLOCATION OF TRANSACTIONS

We may aggregate transactions if we believe that aggregation is consistent with the duty to seek best execution for our clients and is consistent with the disclosures made to clients and terms defined in the client investment advisory agreement. No advisory client will be favored over any other client, and each account that participates in an aggregated order will participate at the average share price (per custodian) for all transactions in that security on a given business day.

If we do not receive a complete fill for an aggregated order, we will allocate the order on a pro rata basis. If we determine that a pro rata allocation is not appropriate under the particular circumstances, we will base the allocation on other relevant factors, which may include:

- When only a small percentage of the order is executed, with respect to purchase allocations, allocations may be given to accounts high in cash
- With respect to sale allocations, allocations may be given to accounts low in cash
- We may allocate shares to the account with the smallest order, or to the smallest position, or to an account that is out of line with respect to security or sector weightings, relative to other portfolios with similar mandates
- We may allocate to one account when that account has limitations in its investment guidelines prohibiting it from purchasing other securities that we expect to produce similar investment results and that can be purchased by other accounts in the block
- If an account reaches an investment guideline limit and cannot participate in an allocation, we may reallocate shares to other accounts. For example, this may be due to unforeseen changes in an account's assets after an order is placed
- If a pro rata allocation of a potential execution would result in a de Minimis allocation in one or more accounts, we may exclude the account(s) from the allocation
- We will document the reasons for any deviation from a pro rata allocation.

TRADE ERRORS

We have implemented procedures designed to prevent trade errors; however, trade errors in client accounts cannot always be avoided. Consistent with our fiduciary duty, it is our policy to correct trade errors in a manner that is in the best interest of the client. In cases where the client causes the trade error, the client will be responsible for any loss resulting from the correction. Depending on the specific circumstances of the trade error, the client may not be able to receive any gains generated as a result of the error correction. In all situations where the client does not cause the trade error, the client will be made whole and we will absorb any loss resulting from the trade error if the error was caused by the Firm. If the error is caused by the Custodian, the Custodian will be responsible for covering all trade error costs. If an investment gain results from the correcting trade, the gain will be donated to charity. We will never benefit or profit from trade errors.

DIRECTED BROKERAGE

We do not routinely recommend, request, or require that you direct us to execute transaction through a specified broker dealer. Additionally, we typically do not permit you to direct brokerage. We place trades for your account subject to our duty to seek best execution and other fiduciary duties.

ITEM 13 - REVIEW OF ACCOUNTS

ACCOUNT REVIEWS AND REVIEWERS – INVESTMENT SUPERVISORY SERVICES

Our Investment Adviser Representatives will monitor client accounts on a regular basis and perform annual reviews with each client. All accounts are reviewed for consistency with client investment strategy, asset allocation, risk tolerance, and performance relative to the appropriate benchmark. More frequent reviews may be triggered by changes in an account holder's personal, tax, or financial status. Geopolitical and macroeconomic specific events may also trigger reviews. Written documentation of reviews will be maintained within the firm's CRM system.

STATEMENTS AND REPORTS

The custodian for the individual client's account will provide clients with an account statement at least quarterly. Upon request, clients can receive WRWP prepared written report detailing their current positions, asset allocation, and year-to-date performance. You are urged to compare the reports and invoices provided by our Firm against the account statements you receive directly from your account custodian.

ITEM 14 – CLIENT REFERRALS AND OTHER COMPENSATION

We receive an economic benefit from our recommended Custodian in the form of the support products and services it makes available to us. These products and services, how they benefit us, and the related conflicts of interest are described above under - Item 12 Brokerage Practices. The availability to us of Custodian's products and services is not based on us giving particular investment advice, such as buying particular securities for our clients.

We pay referral fees to independent promoters for the referrals of their clients to our Firm in accordance with Rule 206 (4)-1 of the Investment Advisers Act of 1940. Such referral fees represent a share of our investment advisory fee charged to our clients. This arrangement will not result in higher costs to you. In this regard, we maintain Client Referral Agreements in compliance with Rule 206 (4)-1 of the Investment Advisers Act of 1940 and applicable state and federal laws. All clients referred by Promoters to our Firm will

be given full written disclosure describing the terms and fee arrangements between our Firm and Promoter(s). In cases where state law requires licensure of promoters, we ensure that no referral fees are paid unless the promoter is registered as an investment adviser representative of our Firm as required by state statute. The promoter will not provide clients any investment advice on behalf of WRWP.

Non-cash referral arrangements:

Our Firm may be asked to recommend a financial professional, such as an attorney, accountant, or mortgage broker. In such cases, our Firm does not receive any direct compensation in return for any referrals made to individuals or firms in our professional network. Clients must independently evaluate these firms or individuals before engaging in business with them and clients have the right to choose any financial professional to conduct business. Individuals and firms in our financial professional network may refer clients to our Firm. Again, our Firm does not pay any direct compensation in return for any referrals made to our Firm. Our Firm does recognize the fiduciary responsibility to place your interests first and have established policies in this regard to mitigate any conflicts of interest.

ITEM 15 – CUSTODY

We do not have physical custody, as it applies to investment advisors. Custody has been defined by regulators as having access or control over client funds and/or securities.

DEDUCTION OF ADVISORY FEES

For all accounts, our Firm has the authority to have fees deducted directly from client accounts. Our Firm has established procedures to ensure all client funds and securities are held at a qualified custodian in a separate account for each client under that client's name. Clients, or an independent representative of the client, will direct, in writing, the establishment of all accounts and therefore are aware of the qualified custodian's name, address, and the manner in which the funds or securities are maintained. Finally, account statements are delivered directly from the qualified custodian to each client, or the client's independent representative, at least quarterly. You should carefully review those statements and are urged to compare the statements against reports received from WRWP. When you have questions about your account statements, you should contact WRWP or the qualified custodian preparing the statement.

Please refer to Item 5 for more information about the deduction of advisor fees.

STANDING LETTERS OF AUTHORIZATION ("SLOA")

Our Firm is deemed to have custody of clients' funds or securities when clients have standing authorizations with their custodian to move money from a client's account to a third-party ("SLOA") and, under that SLOA, it authorizes us to designate the amount or timing of transfers with the custodian. The SEC has set forth a set of standards intended to protect client assets in such situations, which we follow. We do not have a beneficial interest on any of the accounts we are deemed to have Custody where SLOAs are on file. In addition, account statements reflecting all activity on the account(s), are delivered directly from the qualified custodian to each client or the client's independent representative, at least quarterly. You should carefully review those statements and are urged to compare the statements against reports received from us. When you have questions about your account statements, you should contact us, your Advisor or the qualified custodian preparing the statement.

ITEM 16 – INVESTMENT DISCRETION

For discretionary accounts, prior to engaging WRWP to provide investment advisory services, you will enter a written Agreement with us granting the Firm the authority to supervise and direct, on an on-going basis, investments in accordance with the client's investment objective and guidelines. In addition, you will need to execute additional documents required by the Custodian to authorize and enable WRWP, in its sole discretion, without prior consultation with or ratification by you, to purchase, sell, or exchange securities in and for your accounts. We are authorized, in our discretion and without prior consultation with you to: (1) buy, sell, exchange and trade any stocks, bonds or other securities or assets and (2) determine the amount of securities to be bought or sold, and (3) place orders with the custodian. Any limitations to such discretionary authority will be communicated to our Firm in writing by you, the client.

The limitations on investment and brokerage discretion held by WRWP for you are:

- For discretionary accounts, we require that we be provided with authority to determine which securities and the amounts of securities to be bought or sold.
- Any limitations on this discretionary authority shall in writing as indicated on the investment advisory Agreement. You may change/amend these limitations as required.

In some instances, we may not have discretion. We will discuss all transactions with you prior to execution or you will be required to make the trades if in an employer sponsored account.

ITEM 17 – VOTING CLIENT SECURITIES

We will not vote proxies on your behalf. You are welcome to vote proxies or designate an independent third-party at your own discretion. You designate proxy voting authority in the custodial account documents. You must ensure that proxy materials are sent directly to you or your assigned third party. We do not take action with respect to any securities or other investments that become the subject of any legal proceedings, including bankruptcies. Clients can contact our office with questions about a particular solicitation by phone at (573) 875-3939.

ITEM 18 – FINANCIAL INFORMATION

We do not require or solicit prepayment of more than \$1,200 in fees per client, six months or more in advance. Therefore, we are not required to include a balance sheet for our most recent fiscal year. We are not subject to a financial condition that is reasonably likely to impair our ability to meet contractual commitments to clients. Finally, we have not been the subject of a bankruptcy petition at any time.
